Highlights from the Coastal Commission's monthly meetings

Executive Director's Report

Executive Director Kate Huckelbridge <u>updated</u> the Commissioners on staff activities since the June meeting, including:

- Groundbreaking of the 7.5-mile North Coast Rail Trail
 Project in Santa Cruz County, one of five bicycle and pedestrian paths making up the Monterey Bay Sanctuary Scenic Trail Network.
- Successful completion of the state's <u>Dockwalker Program</u> this year, which included more than 200 volunteers and 16 training events aimed at improving boater safety and environmental health.
- Winners announced for this year's <u>Climate Video</u> <u>Challenge</u>, which included three-minute submissions from middle and high school students.

Briefings

Staff provided a status <u>update</u> on efforts to implement Coastal Act policies to provide lower-cost overnight accommodations throughout the coastal zone.

Staff provided an <u>update</u> on the Tijuana River sewage crisis in San Diego County.

Public Access

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a \$1.5 million grant to help San Clemente complete its Local Coastal Program and boost beach restoration efforts.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> new rules for short-term rentals in the city of Seal Beach in Orange County.

The Coastal Commission approved the replacement of boat slips and docks at Channel Island Harbor in Ventura County.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> repairs to Kiddie Beach parking lot in Ventura County.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> an overhaul of a beach playground that serves the public and Newport Elementary School in Orange County.

Housing & Development

The Coastal Commission <u>cleared</u> the way for 250 units of new housing at the Magnolia Tank Farm site in Huntington Beach, of which 20 percent would be affordable in perpetuity, and a hotel with 25% lower-cost rooms.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a request by the city of San Diego to allow a 380-unit apartment complex, including 100 affordable units along the Otay River.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> zoning changes needed for the development of 18 single-family homes and 36 accessory dwelling units in the city of San Diego.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a plan by the city of San Diego for 190 safe, overnight parking spaces and bathroom/ shower facilities to serve unhoused people sleeping in their vehicles.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a plan to encourage the development of accessory dwelling units in Newport Beach.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a plan to renovate the Irish Cultural Center in San Francisco.

Water

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> replacing a wastewater pump station operated by the Orange County Sanitation District.

Habitat

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> an electronic elk detection system, warning signs and other upgrades to protect wildlife along Highway 101 in Humboldt County.

Offshore Wind

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a request by Atlas Wind to conduct seafloor surveys for electric cable routes in state waters off San Luis Obispo County.
