

# Highlights from the Coastal Commission's monthly meetings

### **Executive Director's Report**

Executive Director Kate Huckelbridge <u>updated</u> the commissioners on Commission staff activities since the May meeting, including:

- NOAA workshop on preservation of kelp and seagrass along the Pacific coast.
- The third meeting for the Offshore Wind and Fisheries Working Group.
- Opening of a bike and pedestrian path completing an 8-mile connection between Carmel Valley and Sorrento Valley.
- Kids Ocean Day events from San Diego to Humboldt counties.

## **Briefings**

The San Diego Association of Governments gave a <u>presentation</u> on recent efforts to stabilize the crumbling Del Mar bluffs along the Los Angeles-San Diego-San Luis Obispo (LOSSAN) Rail Corridor in San Diego County.

Federal officials provided an <u>update</u> on trans-boundary pollution crisis in the Tijuana River and Tijuana River Valley, including recent efforts and coordination activities carried out in response.

### **Enforcement**

The Coastal Commission approved a settlement agreement with the owner of Rocky Point Restaurant in Big Sur to resolve violations related to a previous owner. The deal includes trail improvements as well as public parking and restrooms at a scenic location along Highway 1 about 10 miles south of Carmel.

# Housing

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a sustainable development blueprint for Los Osos in San Luis Obispo County that will protect groundwater and endangered species while allowing for new infill housing in the town

### **Public Access**

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> the expansion of bicycle parking at the University of California Santa Barbara, adding 294 new spaces, as well as improving a nearby bicycle path.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a new 1.25 mile extension of the California Coastal Trail connecting the city of Morro Bay and Cayucos, including bicycle and pedestrian amenities as well as habitat restoration.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a modified plan to revitalize the Dana Point Harbor in Orange County that preserves lower-cost hotel accommodations while expanding public access and recreational opportunities.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> two coastal development permit waivers for sand replenishment projects in Orange County at North Beach (San Clemente) and Capistrano Beach County Park.

#### Water

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> modifications to Daly City's stormwater and wastewater infrastructure, including canal, pipeline and tunnel improvements.

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> highway safety and stormwater infrastructure in Sonoma County along Highway 1, including mumble strips, biofiltration and drainage upgrades.

### Restoration

The Coastal Commission <u>approved</u> a proposal by the University of California Irvine to improve wetland habitat on a portion of the San Joaquin Marsh Reserve, a 200-acre wetland complex in Orange County.
