

Highlights from the California Coastal Commission's monthly public hearings

Executive Director's Report

Executive Director Kate Huckelbridge provided an update on recent agency activities, including:

- The Coastal Commission released draft guidance on nature-based adaptation strategies, which is available for public comment until Oct. 24.
- The Coastal Commission and the Department of Housing and Community Development are seeking input from the public as they work to develop guidance for local governments on ways to clarify and simplify the process for building accessory dwelling units (ADUs) in the Coastal Zone.
- The Coastal Commission released its 2024
 Year in Review, highlighting the agency's major accomplishments last year.
- The Coastal Commission's annual Coastal Art & Poetry Contest is now accepting submissions from K-12 students through Jan. 29, 2026.
- The Coastal Commission is seeking public feedback on its draft 2026 to 2030 Strategic Plan.

Enforcement

The Coastal Commission fined a homeowner in Carlsbad more than \$1.4 million for blocking public access to a nearby beach and Buena Vista Lagoon in San Diego County. Approved enforcement orders require habitat restoration and opening and eventual removal of two gates.

Oil and Gas

The Coastal Commission cleared the way for the decommissioning and removal of fossil fuel infrastructure and remediation of impacted soils at the Carpinteria Oil and Gas Processing Facility in Santa Barbara County.

Transportation

The Coastal Commission approved a road realignment in the city of Long Beach to accommodate protected bicycle and pedestrian paths along West Shoreline Drive.

Commercial

The Coastal Commission approved a new ocean-front restaurant in the city of Los Angeles on the site of the former Gladstones restaurant. The new restaurant will feature a public deck, public parking, public restrooms and a new bus stop on Pacific Coast Highway to increase coastal access.

The Coastal Commission cleared the way for the renovation of a restaurant and theater in a historic building in the Venice neighborhood of the city of Los Angeles.

The Coastal Commission approved a permit amendment to downsize the Belmont Pool in Long Beach. The new plan will include a competitive pool, recreation pool and teaching pool, as well as a spa and diving well.

The Coastal Commission approved a proposal to convert a bank building into a restaurant in downtown Seal Beach in Orange County. The project includes the addition of a patio, onsite bicycle parking and employee transit passes.

The Coastal Commission approved a 28-unit hotel in San Clemente in Orange County, including six lower-cost units.

Housing

The Coastal Commission approved five ADUs at three sites in Santa Monica in Los Angeles County.

The Coastal Commission approved two 530-square foot ADUs in the city of Hermosa Beach.

The Coastal Commission approved a two-story ADU on a lot with an existing duplex in the city of Del Mar.
