SUBJECT: Minor Amendment Request No. 4-96 to the City of Long Beach Certified

Local Coastal Program (for Commission Concurrence at the August

13-16, 1996 meeting in Los Angeles).

Amendment Description

The City of Long Beach has requested to amend its certified Local Coastal Program (LCP) in order to make minor changes to the Downtown Shoreline Policy Plan Map contained in the City's Land Use Plan (LUP). The proposed changes to the Downtown Shoreline Policy Plan Map will route the planned east-west regional bicycle path onto the north side of Shoreline Drive between the north-south streets of Chestnut Place and Shoreline Village Drive, instead of on both the north and south sides of Shoreline Drive as previously planned (See Exhibits A&B). The planned regional bicycle path located on the south side of Shoreline Drive between Chestnut Place and Shoreline Village Drive will be deleted from the plan in order to avoid conflicts between bicycles. pedestrians and vehicles at the planned intermodal transfer center located on the south side of Shoreline Drive near Pine Avenue where water taxis, buses and automobiles will load and unload (Exhibit A). The recreational bicycle path in Shoreline Park will remain part of the LUP. In addition, one bicycle path will be relocated from Queen's Way to Chestnut Place, and the bicycle path on Shoreline Village Drive will be moved from the west side of the drive to the east side (Exhibit B). Finally, the proposed LCP amendment adds the following policy language to the certified LUP (Exhibit #1):

"The regional bicycle path that traverses the Queensway Bay Project will have access and bicycle racks adjacent to each of its major attractions. Beginning at the western end of the project, a bicycle rest area and observation point will be provided at the wetlands mitigation area. Just east of the Queen's Way Bridge, bicycle access and racks will be provided on the plaza near the aquarium entrance. At the signalized crossings of Shoreline Drive at Aquarium Way and Pine Avenue, cyclists will have a protected crossing to the project area, and bicycle racks will be provided nearby the commercial uses on the esplanade. Finally, at the eastern end of the project, a bicycle rest area and bicycle racks will be provided in Shoreline Village in the vicinity of Parker's Lighthouse."

The proposed LCP amendment is consistent with the intent of the certified LUP and does not change the kind, location, intensity, or density of use or modify the resource protection measures for any area or property.

The proposed LCP amendment affects only the LUP portion of the LCP but does not propose any land use changes. The certified implementing ordinances (LIP) portion of the LCP is not affected by this amendment. The proposed changes to the certified LUP are contained in Resolution No. C-26040 (Exhibit #1). The City Planning Commission held a public hearing for the proposed LCP amendment on July 5, 1996. The Long Beach City Council held a public hearing for the proposed LCP amendment and adopted Resolution No. C-26040 on July 9, 1996.

Procedure

Pursuant to Section 30514(c) of the Coastal Act and Section 13554(d) of the California Code of Regulations, the Executive Director has determined that the proposed LCP amendment is "minor" in nature. Section 13554(d)(2) of the California Code of Regulations defines a minor amendment to a certified LUP as a correction, reorganization, revision, or deletion of certified language which when taken together does not change the kind, location, intensity or density of use or modify the resource protection measures for any area or property.

The proposed LCP amendment revises the certified LUP language and does not change the kind, location, intensity or density of use or modify the resource protection measures for any area or property. Therefore, the Executive Director has determined that City of Long Beach LCP Amendment No. 4-96 is a minor LCP amendment.

The proposed LCP amendment will become effective after report to the Commission of any written objections received within ten working days of the mailing of notice unless one-third of the appointed members of the Commission request that the LCP amendment be processed and heard as a "major" LCP amendment pursuant to Section 13555 of the California Code of Regulations.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH ADOPTING, AFTER PUBLIC HEARING, AMENDMENT No. 96-2 TO THE LOCAL COASTAL PROGRAM RELATING TO THE RECONFIGURATION OF THE BICYCLE PATH AND THE PROVISION OF CERTAIN BICYCLE RELATED AMENITIES IN THE DOWNTOWN SHORELINE AREA

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The City Council of the City of Long Beach does hereby resolve as follows:

Section 1. The City Council finds, determines and declares:

- A. Pursuant to the California Coastal Act of 1976, the City Council approved the Local Coastal Program for the City of Long Beach on April 29, 1980; and
- B. The California Coastal Commission certified the Long Beach Local Coastal Program on July 22, 1980; and
- C. The California Coastal Act, at Public Resources

 Code Section 30514, provides a procedure for amending local

 coastal programs; and
- D. Following a duly noticed public hearing on July 5, 1996, the Planning Commission reviewed and certified Negative Declaration ND-29-96 relating to Amendments to the Local Coastal Program, and approved and recommended that the City Council adopt such Amendments to the Local Coastal Program; and

E. That on July 9, 1996, after due certification and
appropriate environmental documents, and after public
hearing duly noticed and conducted, the City Council
considered and approved a revision to the Local Coastal
Program relating to the reconfiguration of the bicycle path,
and the provision of certain bicycle related amenities in
the Downtown Shoreline area; and

- F. These Amendments to the Local Coastal Program are intended to be carried out in a manner fully in conformity with the California Coastal Act; and
- G. These Amendments to the Local Coastal Program shall be effective upon certification and approval by the California Coastal Commission.

Sec. 2. The City Council hereby amends the Local Coastal Program at Page III-DS-17, "Downtown Shoreline Policy Plan" diagram, and substitutes the new "Downtown Shoreline Policy Plan" diagram indicating the new configuration of the bicycle path as shown on Exhibit "A", attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference as if set forth in full. Said "new" diagram reflects the elimination of a portion of the bicycle path on the south side of Shoreline Drive between Chestnut Place and Shoreline Village Drive; and the relocation of a section of the bicycle path at Shoreline Village Drive from the west side of the street (in the Shoreline Village parking lot area) to the east side of the street (adjacent to Marina Green Park).

Sec. 3. The City Council hereby amends the Local Coastal Plan at Page III-DS-22, "Bicycle Path" to add an additional paragraph to read as follows:

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The regional Bicycle Path that traverses the Queensway Bay Project will have access and bicycle racks adjacent to each of its major attractions. Beginning at the western end of the Project, a bicycle rest area and observation point will be provided at the wetlands mitigation area. Just east of the Queen's Way Bridge, bicycle access and racks will be provided on the plaza near the Aquarium entrance. At the signalized crossings of Shoreline Drive at Aquarium Way and at Pine Avenue, cyclists will have a protected crossing to the project area, and bicycle racks will be provided nearby the commercial uses on the esplanade. Finally, at the eastern end of the project, a bicycle rest area and bicycle racks will be provided in Shoreline Village in the vicinity of Parker's Lighthouse.

Sec. 4. The Director of Planning and Building is hereby directed to submit a certified copy of this resolution, together with appropriate supporting materials, to the California Coastal Commission for certification pursuant to the California Coastal Act.

Sec. 5. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by the City Council, and the City Clerk shall certify the vote adopting this resolution.
