Subject: Summary of Coastal Conservancy Actions, August 2000 Meeting

Significant Events at the August 2 Meeting of the Coastal Conservancy

- 1. The Conservancy authorized the following grants for coastal projects:
 - a. \$450,000 to the Ocean Institute (formerly the Orange County Marine Institute) to improve shoreline access facilities between the Ocean Education Center and the Dana Point Marine Life Refuge, including reallocating to this purpose \$36,500 previously authorized for planning a dock and interpretive signs.
 - b. \$194,000 to the City of Costa Mesa in Orange County for engineering and design of access improvements identified in the Fairview Park Master Plan along the Santa Ana River Estuary.
 - c. \$300,000 to the City of Pacifica in San Mateo County for the construction of a pedestrian and wheelchair-accessible segment of the Coastal Trail.
 - d. \$63,000 to Coastwalk for the analysis and acceptance of Offers to Dedicate public coastal access in Mendocino County.
 - e. \$63,000 to the San Elijo Lagoon Conservancy to remove exotic species from approximately 2.4 acres along the southern edge of San Elijo Lagoon in San Diego County and revegetate with native riparian and buffer species.
 - f. \$67,000 to the San Elijo Lagoon Conservancy to assess the sediment quality and depositional patterns of San Elijo Lagoon in San Diego County.
 - g. \$50,000 to the Southern California Coastal Water Research Project Authority for assistance with the Science Advisory Panel of the Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project.
 - h. \$250,000 to the City of San Buenaventura to implement the Surfer's Point Beach Nourishment Demonstration Project, Ventura County.
 - i. \$500,000 to the Santa Barbara County Flood Control District to implement the Santa Rosa Creek Riparian Restoration Plan.

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- j. \$50,000 to the Institute for Fisheries Resources to evaluate alternatives for modifying the San Clemente Dam on the Carmel River in Monterey County, including the feasibility of removing all or portions of the dam to improve fish passage and habitat conditions.
- k. \$2,000,000 to the Mendocino Land Trust, including \$1,500,000 of federal Transportation Enhancement Activities Program grant funds, to complete acquisition of the approximately 72-acre Caspar Headlands property, Mendocino County.
- 1. \$12,500 for an appraisal of the fair market value of an agricultural conservation easement for the Punta Arena Dairy near Manchester State Beach in Mendocino County
- 2. The Conservancy accepted an offer to dedicate a public access easement to and along the ocean shoreline in the city of Laguna Beach, and deferred until a later meeting consideration to accept an OTD in the city of Del Mar.
- 3. The Conservancy received reports on the following subjects: (1) the strategic plan adoption process; (2) long- and short-term objectives for the Public Access Program; and (3) the process for identifying beach nourishment projects for funding under Proposition 12.
- 4. The Conservancy authorized the following grants for San Francisco Bay projects:
 - a. \$313,000 to the Sonoma Land Trust to implement the Conceptual Enhancement Plan for Seasonal Wetlands for North Parcel and Leonard Ranch, Sonoma County.
 - b. \$100,000 to the Port of San Francisco for the creation of a design plan for the Brannan Street Wharf open space project at Piers 34-36 in San Francisco.

The next Conservancy meeting will be held on September 28, 2000, in Eureka.
