Request to extend the sixty-day time limit for Commission action on City of Manhattan Beach LCP Amendment Request No. MNB-MAJ-1-03 (for Commission Action at its July

9, 2003 meeting in Petaluma).

On May 12, 2003, the Commission's South Coast District office in Long Beach received a City of Manhattan Beach request to amend its certified Local Coastal Program (LCP) in order to repeal and replace Chapter 7.36 of the Municipal Code. Chapter 7.36 of the Municipal Code regulates private uses and encroachments in the public rights-of-way. Proposed LCP Amendment Request No. 1-03, submitted with City Council Resolution No. 5816 and contained in City Council Ordinance No. 2039, would affect only the Implementing Ordinances (LIP) portion of the certified LCP.

In a letter dated June 3, 2003, the Executive Director determined that LCP Amendment Request No. 1-03 was in proper order and legally adequate to comply with the submittal requirements of the Coastal Act and the California Code of Regulations. Therefore, LCP Amendment Request No. 1-03 is deemed submitted pursuant to the requirements of Section 30510 of the Coastal Act and Section 13553 of the California Code of Regulations (Title 14).

Pursuant to Section 30513 of the Coastal Act, an LCP amendment that includes changes to the LIP portion of a certified LCP must be scheduled for a public hearing and the Commission must take action within sixty days of receipt of a complete submittal. The sixtieth day after the City's filing of the complete submittal is July 11, 2003. In order to be heard within this time frame, the LCP amendment would have to be scheduled for the Commission's July 9-11, 2003 meeting in Petaluma.

Coastal Act Section 30517 and Section 13535(c) of the Coastal Commission Regulations state that the Commission may extend for good cause the sixty-day time limit for a period not to exceed one year. Because of the expansive scope and complexity of the proposed LCP amendment, staff is recommending that the Commission extend the sixty-day time limit for the review of the LCP amendment request. The time extension would allow for a thorough review of the City's proposed changes and would also increase the potential for a local public hearing for the LCP amendment.

## STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Commission extend the deadline for Commission action for one year.

MOTION: I move that the Commission extend the sixty-day time limit to act on the City of Manhattan Beach Local Coastal Program Amendment No.

MNB-MAJ-1-03 for a period of one year.

Staff recommends a YES vote. An affirmative vote of a majority of the Commission present is needed to pass the motion.
