





Remaining Salient Points:

- 1. The evidence is comprehensive that the entire Sunset Ridge Park Property has been annually disked or mowed since 1965.
- 2. Due to the unique location of the land relative to critical medical facilities surrounding the park, the fire chief will continue to require complete clearance in the future.
- 3. The park landscaping plan will create over four acres of permanent undisturbed habitat as approved by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which does not presently exist.
- 4. The Fire Chief will allow the significant expansion of native vegetation on the site because it will be irrigated, and adjacent to the grass fields.
- 5. Even though the mowed lot does not qualify as ESHA, the city acknowledges that for a few months between mowing there is some habitat value. Accordingly, the City is proposing to create 1.5 acres of permanent Coastal Sage Scrub habitat in Upper Newport Bay which has an established and documented nesting Gnatcatcher population.







- Hospital patients were evacuated




Marek Fire Distance to Olive View Hospital

The entirety of the Sunset Ridge Park property is located within a short distance of numerous medical facilities, child care centers, senior care centers and a methane co-generation plant. All of these facilities would need to be evacuated in the event of a large fire on the Sunset Ridge Park property.



Existing Disturbed Encelia



Disturbed Encelia Facts:

- 3.64 acres at issue
- Beginning prior to the enactment of the Coastal Act, the entire park property has been disturbed annually
- No Gnatcatcher ever found in any protocol survey within property boundaries
- Sunset Ridge Park EIR:
 - "The 3.64 acres of disturbed Encelia scrub is regularly mowed for fuel modification and weed abatement purposes and *contains a high percentage of non-native weeds*; therefore, it is not considered special status."
 - "This vegetation type (disturbed Encelia scrub) is dominated by bush sunflower and deerweed (lotus scoparius). The understory consists of non-native grasses and forbs, including black mustard (Brassica nigra), foxtail chess (Bromus madritensis ssp. *rubens*), Russian thistle (Salsola tragus), and tocalote (Centaurea melitensis)."

Proposed Onsite High-Quality Native Planting



Proposed Planting Plan Facts:

- 4.4 acres of pristine, high-quality native plant species of the coastal sage scrub vegetation community
- Plants identified by the California Invasive Plant Council as an invasive risk in southern California will be excluded from all landscaping within the park
- Human intrusion into pristine habitat areas will be discouraged through the use of signs and fencing to create a more sustainable and ecologically significant habitat area than currently exists on the park property
- All vegetated areas will be irrigated significantly reducing the fire risk to surrounding neighborhoods and eliminating the need to mow



- Seven Plant Communities on site including southern willow scrub, Diegan coastal sage scrub, non-native grassland, southern coastal bluff scrub, southern coastal marsh, southern cottonwood willow riparian forest and coastal freshwater marsh

Potential Habitat Enhancement Site: Buck Gully




Buck Gully Facts:

- Invasive species are prevalent in the upper portions of the Gully due to residential development encroaching onto the Gully slopes








Conclusion:

- The Sunset Ridge Park property presents a significant fire risk to the numerous surrounding medical facilities, child care centers, senior care centers, and the methane co-generation plant. These centers would need to be evacuated in the event of a large fire on the property. Pursuant to this risk, Fire Chief Poster will continue to mow the property under the authority delegated to him in the California Fire Code and Coastal Act Section 30005.
- The evacuation of Olive View Hospital serves as a reminder of the severe risks fires pose on nearby hospitals and the evacuation that would be required.
- The proposed planting plan will create 4.4 acres of onsite pristine, highquality native plant species of the coastal sage scrub vegetation community.
 The proposed pristine coastal sage scrub will replace 3.64 acres of highly disturbed Encelia scrub whose area includes many non-native invasive species.
- The City of Newport Beach is proposing 1.5 acres of offsite habitat enhancement in significant resource areas damaged by previous development.

Dear Chair Shallenberger and Members of the Commission:

On behalf of the City of Newport Beach Fire Department, we appreciate the opportunity to summarize our comments at the public hearing on July 12, 2012 relating to the above-referenced application.

Fire and the resulting products of combustion are a continual threat to the community. Preventing and minimizing the risk of uncontrolled fire protects public safety and is a core principal of a modern fire department. Whether property is developed or not, it is the responsibility of the Fire Chief to prevent and suppress fires. With appropriate planning, along with prudent and reasonable mitigation measures, buildings and surrounding areas can be made safer, regardless of the occupancy or other activities at and around the site. The primary focus of the requirements set forth in the fire code is public safety, such as preventing fire. The removal of heat, oxygen, and fuel are means by which fires can be prevented, or the impact reduced and lessened.

The 13.7 acres of vacant land in Newport Beach, which is commonly referred to as the Sunset Ridge Park property, presents several challenges from a fire and life safety perspective. The first challenge is life safety. Although a vegetation fire in the proposed park area may be confined to the parcel of origin, the products of combustion (smoke) will not. The smoke plume will travel with the wind and presents potentially critical life safety issues on a larger scale than one may assume from a 13.7 acre vegetation fire in a different area. Within close proximity of the Sunset Ridge Park property is Hoag Hospital, a regional asset and primary receiving hospital for Newport Beach and Costa Mesa. Also located on or adjacent to the Hoag campus and near Sunset Ridge Park, is a large child care facility, three surgery centers (in addition to the numerous surgical activities at Hoag) as well as a Cancer Center. There are also five elderly care facilities

in the immediate area. According to Hoag's staff, large volumes of smoke will cause all surgical activities to cease due to the requirement for clean, outside air. The two populations most at risk for exposure to smoke are the children and the elderly, both of whom are located within the immediate area of Sunset Ridge Park. (Attachment A).

The second challenge is firefighter access. The Sunset Ridge Park property is surrounded on three sides by steep and limited access; there is no direct manner for fire apparatus to access the site. All fire suppression activities would likely be conducted on foot thereby increasing the time and resources required to contain a fire. The hose lines used to fight fires from apparatus are 150 feet long and pre-connected, which would require time to extend and reach a fire that could be as far as 400 to 500 feet away. Water supplies to support suppression efforts are also limited with no onsite fire hydrants or irrigation, increasing the time and resources required to contain such an event. The north side of the parcel boundary is unincorporated county area, outside of the jurisdictional authority of the City of Newport Beach and provides no site or water access.

The third challenge is the proposed park's location adjacent to Pacific Coast Highway and directly adjacent to mass transit facilities. There is a high level of human activity in the area, and this directly translates into a higher probability of ignition sources as human activities and ignition sources are highly correlated. The 1988 Sunset Ridge Park incendiary fire caused over \$50,000.00 in property damage even with the strict vegetation management requirements in force. Recently, nearby on the County land, youths ignited a vacant structure causing a total loss.

To protect life and property is the Fire Chief's responsibility and requires good planning measures combined with common sense code enforcement designed to make buildings, premises, and surrounding areas safer for all occupants and the public. Appropriately, it should also be noted that the California State Health and Safety Codes mandates a higher level of protection for the elderly, those unable to assist themselves (surgical patients), and children relative to the general population.

Furthermore, the Fire Chief is authorized and is duty bound to enforce the provisions of the Fire Codes and has the authority to render interpretations of these codes, and to adopt policies, procedures, rules and regulations in order to clarify the application of its provisions. The City of Newport Beach has adopted the 2009 edition of the International Fire Code. A few of the applicable excerpts from this code are as follows:

Section 101.2.2 Scope:

The code establishes regulations affecting or relating to structures, processes, premises and safeguards regarding conditions, hazardous to life, property, or public welfare in the occupancy of structures or premises.

Section 101.3 Intent:

The purpose of this code is to establish the minimum requirements consistent with nationally recognized good practice for providing a reasonable level of life safety and property protection from the hazards of fire, explosion or dangerous conditions in new and existing buildings, structures, and premises and to provide safety to fire fighters and emergency responders during emergency operations.

Section 102.1.4 Applicability:

The construction and design provisions of this code shall apply to existing structures, facilities and conditions which, in the opinion of the fire code official, constitute a distinct hazard to life or property.

The prevention or lessening of the occurrence of fire and the production of smoke and the byproducts of combustion is focused on eliminating or minimizing the occurrence of heat sources, removing or eliminating fuel sources, and/or the removal of oxygen.

A careful and reasonable assessment of the fire and life safety profile of the area in and around the proposed Sunset Ridge Park project confirms that the removal of oxygen is not possible and that effective elimination of ignition sources is also difficult. Reducing the fuel source, however, is an industry best practice and has been, and continues to be, an achievable and highly effective interpretation of the locally adopted codes designed to reduce the occurrence and impacts of uncontrolled fires.

Furthermore, the policies, procedures, rules and regulations that the City of Newport Beach has implemented for this area are in the best interests of the community. These policies meet, and will continue to meet, a reasonable level of life safety and property protection from the hazards of fire, and dangerous conditions in new and existing buildings, structures and premises consistent with local and state adopted fire, and health and safety codes.

The Newport Beach Fire Department has required the 13.7 acres of vacant land on Sunset Ridge Park to be maintained with minimal flammable vegetation and has caused the area to be treated on an annual basis to mitigate the fire hazard. This area is not irrigated and during the winter and spring vegetation grows while water is abundant; summer comes and if untreated the vegetation will cure, turn brown with extremely low fuel moisture and become an explosive fuel bed with tons of flammable fuel. Therefore, until onsite conditions change, to protect safety and critical infrastructure I will continue to require the flammable vegetation by code or regulation to be treated until such time flammable vegetation does not exist on the site.

To the Coastal Commission Staff and Commissioners:

The Banning Ranch Conservancy recently met with the City of Newport Beach to discuss a redesign of the Sunset Ridge Park plan. While the Banning Ranch Conservancy considers the City's willingness to engage to be a very encouraging action, the ultimate solution for Sunset Ridge Park will require considerably more discussion among the parties involved. While modifications such as planting of additional Encelia (permitted in both irrigated and non-irrigated fire buffers by the Orange County Fire Authority) on the site remain a worthy goal, these will not mitigate against destruction of ESHA. It remains the goal of the Banning Ranch Conservancy that Sunset Ridge Park be designed in a manner which protects the sensitive natural resources consistent with the Coastal Act as the Act has been interpreted following the appellate decision in the Bolsa Chica case.

It is our understanding that the City is contemplating asking the Coastal Commission for a continuance to present a newly modified Sunset Ridge Park plan at the hearing in San Diego in October.

The Banning Ranch Conservancy does not support a continuance. Rather, it is the opinion of the Banning Ranch Conservancy that the best action for the City would be to formally withdraw the Sunset Ridge Park plan, and then work, in earnest, with Coastal Commission staff, as well as the Banning Ranch Conservancy, on a new Sunset Ridge Park plan that is consistent with the Coastal Act. We have communicated this point with the City.


To Coastal Commission staff:

The City of Newport Beach has plans to build a 15-acre sports complex 1500 feet away from Sunset Ridge. This sports complex would include one basketball court, one baseball field, one softball field, three soccer fields, six tennis courts and other features.

This sports complex is planned to be built on the Banning Ranch property. This sports complex is one of the incentives included in the proposed Banning Ranch development project, placed with the intention of winning favor with the City Council. The details of the sports complex, along with development fees and other perks, were negotiated between the City and NBR LLC as part of a "Development Agreement."

On 7-23-12, by a 6-0 vote, the City Council approved the "Development Agreement," including the 15-acre sports complex, along with the overall proposed Banning Ranch development project.

Should, as prioritized in the City's General Plan, Banning Ranch be preserved as open space, there would still be an active sports component. Though details (such as location and size) would likely change pending biological surveys, it is the position of the Banning Ranch Conservancy that a future preserved Banning Ranch would have an active sports component. This position has been clearly communicated to the City Council.

Dear Commissioners,

Thank you for the invitation to comment on Item No. Th10a that is on your agenda for August 9, 2012.

My main concern is for the safety of all those who travel up and down Superior Ave. both in autos, and more importantly for pedestrians who walk or ride their bikes from PCH up to Hospital Road and reverse. I have lived in Villa Balboa for almost 30 years and I am very familiar with the area. The intersection at PCH and Superior is one of the busiest in Newport Beach. Autos speed up Superior from PCH at speeds that can be dangerous. In the years I have been here autos have jumped the curb coming up and crashed through the heavy iron fence surrounding Villa Balboa several times, the last of which knocked about 25 feet of fence and bent it like a pretzel. This happened about four weeks ago.

If anyone had been there at the time, they would have been killed. People with baby carriages, kids and adults riding bikes are in jeopardy. I walk that route almost every day and I am constantly alert of the traffic coming up from PCH, especially on the curve. There have been fatal accidents on that stretch of road, people have been needlessly killed.

Having a park there is just not a good idea. It is in the wrong place. Access to the park is going to be a nightmare. You may even have Soccer Moms stopping on Superior Ave. to let their kids out to go into the park. That is going to be a disaster waiting to happen. The same goes for stopping on PCH to let the kids out.

My second concern is for the plan to build restrooms and a storage area. At this time the homeless use the clump of trees and bushes at the northeast corner of PCH and Superior for their bedroom, toilet and camping. When the park is built it will become a tourist attraction for the homeless.

Enforcement of rules and regulations seem to occur when it is convenient.


Some of the Coastal Commissioners began to suspect that enforcement and declarations were being made so that the land could be deemed "ugly, useless and in need of development".


By the way, won't the grasses for the fields and other vegetation installed by the City present a "fire hazard"?

Dear Mr. John Del Arroz:

In reviewing the plans submitted by the city of Newport Beach, we noticed that they have included an overlook structure, complete with seats and shelter [i.e. roof] in the East part of the park.

While we can understand the reason behind providing a seating arrangement, the rationale behind building a tall structure to shelter those seated is unclear. Such a structure would stick out in contrast to the surroundings of the proposed serene part of the park.

In addition, we view the justification of a shelter in the form of a tall structure as rather weak, when you consider that the sunset observers would not be protected from the sun <u>above</u> as it normally sets <u>horizontally</u> in the west. If that protection is intended against the rain, then it is quite obvious there will be no sunsets to gaze at, and therefore no need for protection, on rainy days.

We fear that such a structure would become more of an attractive nuisance in addition to being an eye sore and we hope that the coastal commission would agree with our comment and approve the seating but not the tall sheltered structure attached to it.

Please include our comments in the above Park file.

Dear Mr. Del Arroz:

This correspondence is to supplement my prior correspondence dated June 7, 2012 referenced below to the Coastal Commission regarding the Coastal Development Permit Application concerning Sunset Ridge Park. In that correspondence I noted that throughout all proceedings regarding Sunset Ridge Park it has been the position of the City of Newport Beach that its design must be as an "active sports park." That is, it must include active sports fields for baseball and soccer.

In that correspondence I pointed out that this need for active sports derives largely from the claims of two organizations: Newport Harbor Baseball Association and American Youth Soccer Organization, Region 97 (AYSO 97). In the correspondence I noted that under the City of Costa Mesa's Athletic Field Use and Allocation Policy through the City's Joint Agreement with Newport Mesa Unified School District (NMUSD) hoth Newport Harbor Baseball Association and AYSO 97 are given priority access to some 23 City park and School District facilities located in the City of Costa Mesa. One such Costa Mesa Park Lion's Park whose baseball field has recently been renovated at a cost of over \$500,000. Lion's Park is located 1.5 miles from the proposed site of Sunset Ridge Park.

In this correspondence, I turn to the availability of active sports parks located within the City of Newport Beach. Attached is a printout from the City of Newport Beach's website displaying City Parks and Facilities. As you can see, the City lists some twelve (12) City parks and facilities containing baseball diamonds. Further, the printout lists some fourteen (14) City parks and facilities containing athletic fields. Adding these totals to the above Costa Mesa facilities indicates that Newport Harbor Baseball Association has access to some thirty-four (34) facilities in Newport Beach and Costa Mesa. For AYSO 97 the total reaches thirty-six (36) facilities.

Also discussed in my prior correspondence was that under the Joint Agreement between the City of Costa Mesa and NMUSD the City "coordinates and issues permits for the use of athletic fields in the City and at Newport Mesa Unified School District sites in Costa Mesa when school is not in session..." In researching this issue, I found no such similar Joint Agreement between the City of Newport Beach and NMUSD regarding the City of Newport Beach permitting the use of NMUSD sites in Newport Beach when school is not in session.

The significance of this omission and the potential access to NMUSD sites in Newport Beach is illustrated by the attached NMUSD map of schools located in both Costa Mesa and Newport Beach. Among the schools listed on the map are Ensign Intermediate School 2000 Cliff Drive Newport Beach and Newport Harbor High School 600 Irvine Ave. Newport Beach. Ensign Intermediate School is located 1.6 miles from the proposed Sunset Ridge Park site. Newport Harbor High School is located 1.9 miles from the Sunset Ridge Park site. The obvious alternative(s) to active sports fields on Sunset Ridge Park is for the City of Newport Beach, like the City Costa Mesa, through agreement with NMUSD to achieve public access to school facilities in Newport Beach while school is not in session.

Currently, the 2012 Summer Olympic Games are ongoing in London, England. If you recall, in 1984 the Summer Olympic Games were held in Los Angeles, California. Prior to the Los Angeles Olympics there were dire predictions ranging from terrible gridlock to financial catastrophe circulated in the media. Yet the 1984 Los Angeles Summer Olympic Games proved to be a resounding success most of all financially. According to Wikipedia, the 1984 Games showed a profit of over \$200 million. This in large part was due to the use of existing athletic facilities to hold the games thus avoiding the cost of construction of new facilities.

The construction of active sports fields on Sunset Ridge Park will entail the permanent destruction of 3.3 acres of critical habitat protected under the Coastal Act. From the above and my prior correspondence, the City of Newport Beach has completely failed to show the "need" for active sports fields on the Sunset Ridge Park site. There are and could be even more existing facilities available to serve the need for more active sports fields for the residents of Newport Beach. Far better than destroying the unique habitat on Sunset Ridge to build unnecessary sports fields.

As before, the above information should be presented to the Coastal Commission before and/or at the August 9th hearing on the SRP CDP. Given the above, I oppose the SRP project and support the Coastal Commission Staff Recommendation the SRP CDP application be denied.
