Based on the project plans and information provided in your permit application for the development described below, the Executive Director of the Coastal Commission hereby waives the requirement for a Coastal Development Permit pursuant to Section 13238.1, Title 14, California Code of Regulations. If, at a later date, this information is found to be incorrect or the plans revised, this decision will become invalid; and, any development occurring must cease until a coastal development permit is obtained or any discrepancy is resolved in writing.

APPLICANT: MARY O'REILLY

LOCATION: 3110 Patricks Point Drive, Trinidad (Humboldt County)

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT: Remove nine trees (6 red alders, 2 redwoods, and 1 cedar) ranging in height from approximately 30 to 50 feet and diameter at breast height from 9 to 18 inches, all of which are either topped or have compromised roots and are in danger of falling and damaging adjacent structures.

RATIONALE: The trees proposed for removal are not part of any environmentally sensitive habitat area or riparian habitat. Removal of the various trees will not affect public views or the forested character of the area, as the majority of the trees are located on the opposite site of the existing detached garage from the public roadway, and there are numerous existing trees on and around the property that will remain. The proposed development will not adversely impact coastal resources, public access, or public recreation opportunities, and is consistent with the Chapter 3 policies of the Coastal Act.

This waiver will not become effective until reported to the Commission at their MAY 16, 2014 meeting and the site of the proposed development has been appropriately noticed, pursuant to 13054(b) of the California Code of Regulations. The Notice Card shall remain posted at the site until the waiver has been validated. If four (4) Commissioners object to this waiver of permit requirements, a coastal development permit will be required.

APPLICANT: Humboldt Bay Harbor, Recreation, and Conservation District (Attn: Dan Berman)

LOCATION: Indian Island, Highway 255, Eureka (Humboldt County)

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT: Remove remnant debris from former marine structures within intertidal habitat of Humboldt Bay near Indian Island, including 17 wooden dock piles from an old destroyed dock, miscellaneous pieces of metal and timbers, and a 10-foot-cube concrete boat dock float that detached from a City of Eureka boat dock. Debris removal will be accomplished by tying chokers with floats around debris at low tide by hand and using two barges equipped with crane and excavator at high tide to pull debris from the tidelands.

RATIONALE: As proposed, the project will protect and improve the water quality and habitat quality of Humboldt Bay by removing old creosote piles and other defunct marine debris that is contaminating intertidal habitat areas. Various mitigation measures have been incorporated into the project description to assure water quality protection, including: (1) limiting fueling of construction to offsite areas at least 100 feet from the waters of the bay; (2) ensuring hazardous materials management equipment, including oil containment booms and absorbent pads, will be available immediately on-hand; (3) ensuring a registered first-response, professional hazardous materials clean-up/remediation service will be locally available on call to respond to a spill; (4) provisions to rapidly contain and clean up any accidental spill; (5) using biodiesel for fuel and vegetable oil and/or approved non-petroleum hydraulic fluid as hydraulic fluid; (6) ensuring construction equipment will be free of leaks and in good working order; (7) storing and/or containing all construction materials and debris originating from the project in a manner that precludes uncontrolled entry and dispersion to the waters of Humboldt Bay; (8) immediately recovering any debris from construction activities that inadvertently enters the bay; (9) ensuring all debris removal activities comply with the requirements of the final non-point source/stormwater pollution prevention plan and the final spill prevention, containment, and countermeasure plan; and (10) requiring proper disposal of all removed material, including any material contaminated with creosote or other contaminants (the applicant will require proof of proper disposal from the contractor). Therefore, the proposed development will not adversely impact coastal resources, public access, or public recreation opportunities, and is consistent with the Chapter 3 policies of the Coastal Act.

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This waiver will not become effective until reported to the Commission at their MAY 16, 2014 meeting and the site of the proposed development has been appropriately noticed, pursuant to 13054(b) of the California Code of Regulations. The Notice Card shall remain posted at the site until the waiver has been validated. If four (4) Commissioners object to this waiver of permit requirements, a coastal development permit will be required.
