

Comments for Appeal Number 2004-14 (LCDP 20-013 SPR 20-017)

City project to revitalize Belmont Pier Plaza by removing one unhealthy Coral Tree and replacement LED lighting, new planter palette, interpretive and wayfinding signage walkway mural, relocated bicycle racks and refreshed paint, located in the Park ® and Belmont Pier Planned Development District (PD-2)

In 2009, the CA Coastal Commission and the City of Long Beach approved application 5-08-187 which is a tree trimming policy for <u>all</u> state tidelands and beaches within the City of Long Beach. This policy states that no tree used for nesting within the last 5 years shall be trimmed or removed unless it is a danger to public safety. Photos taken by me on June 22 show what appears to be a nest in the tree to be removed. There were also numerous bird droppings around the tree, indicating it is being used for nesting and roosting.

The City proposes to remove this mature Coral tree which Psomas, the arborists hired by the City, found to have a healthy root system; a leafy 45 foot canopy and no visible pests. There was concern about a crack in one branch and bark sloughing, with a moderate likelihood of tree failure on a scale of low, moderate, high or extreme. Their suggested solution was to put a fence within the drip-line of the tree to prevent any risk to the public. Additional options to removing the tree included pruning all weakly attached and overextended branches; install a cable and bracing system; or retain the tree and monitor its condition once a year. The Zoning Administrator stated the other options were too expensive, although monitoring the condition is less costly than removing the tree. We ask that other options be tried before removing this important coastal LED. (Please see attached photo of this magnificent Coral tree.)

All of the other 'sprucing up' activities of the Belmont Pier can be achieved without removing this tree. However, the LED lighting should not be placed under the trees. This light shining up into the trees is disrupting to nesting and roosting birds. (See *Ecological Consequences of Artificial Night Lighting*, edited by C. Rich and Travis Longcore.) In a recent e-mail from Dr. Longcore, he states "The only real way to fix uplighting is to not have uplighting. It is not good for birds to have lights shining up at their nests.

Some research was just published that shows that a change in color of the lights can help for some bird species but not others. Here is a press release for the paper." https://www.sciencedaily.com/releases/2020/07/200723115902.htm and the paper:

We suggest that if this permit is approved that it be stipulated the LED lights not be placed to shine up into the trees and the color be amber, not white.

Dear California Coastal Commission,

The City of Long Beach Public Works is seeking Coastal Commission approval for a project which includes the removal of a mature Coral Tree. We find this tree to be within the Tidelands Area subject to CDP 5-08-187, a Tree Trimming and Removal Plan established specifically to protect trees providing habitat for coastal birds in the Tidelands Area in Long Beach. Trees falling under this Tree Trimming and Removal Plan may only be removed or trimmed during nesting season if they present an imminent threat to public safety, which this tree does not. The Department of Parks, Recreation, and Marine, not Public Works, maintains this Coral tree as it is in a public park and beach area subject to CDP 5-08-187. However, we are certain that Public Works is aware of CDP 5-08-187, as well as of the Coastal Commission's designation of all trees which provide habitat for coastal birds in our wetlands, and along our bays, marinas, beaches, and bluffs as "significant vegetation" under the Coastal Act. Yet again, the Department of Public Works is pushing for the arbitrary removal of a protected coastal tree as well as a project timeline that would allow its removal during nesting season.

To argue that this Coral Tree needs to be cut down is to ignore Trevor Bristle, the Arborist who works for PSOMAS who the City paid to assess the health of this particular tree. Trevor Bristle finds the tree to be in "good health" and recommends FOUR options other than tree removal, including simply checking on it ONCE A YEAR! His assessment concludes that the tree presents a "Moderate" level of risk (all trees present a "Low" level), and further states that the risk to the public is neither "High" or "Extreme." His report defines "Extreme" as meaning that "Immanent failure has started or is most likely to occur in the near future, even if there is no significant wind or increased load. This is a rare occurrence for a risk assessor to encounter, and it may require immediate action to protect people from harm."

Yet, Mr. Aquirre, our Public Works Department Arborist, has overridden Trevor Bristle's assessment and has ruled that the tree does present an imminent danger to the public and can be chopped down during nesting season (but not just yet, as the project requires both a zoning and Coastal permit). The City presents Mr. Bristle's thorough and science based tree assessment of risk (Moderate), which it asks the Coastal Commission staff to ignore in favor of arbitrary decisions by Mr. Aquirre and the Zoning Commissioner which should necessitate immediate action but apparently require none until the project is shovel ready. It is worth noting that the City's application does not state that the Coral Tree is "significant vegetation" under the Coastal Act, even there is clear evidence, including large quantities of bird droppings under multiple

branches, that it provides roosting and nesting sites for shore and wading birds. Nor does the City note that this mature Coral tree contributes to the scenic coastal view.

The City of Long Beach continues to design, promote, and approve projects that erase habitat for birds and other wildlife, in violation of laws meant to ensure their survival. Coastal Commission Enforcement has repeatedly charged the City with violations and has required that the Department of Public Works make amends for the illegal removal and trimming of palms on Marina Drive and the illegal trimming of palms on Ocean Blvd. Both of these projects resulted in the destruction of multiple nests and death of birds including Great Blue Herons. Residents and environmental organizations continue to sound the alarm, to the Zoning Administrator, the Planning Commission, to City Council, and the Coastal Commission, or, when these destructive operations are in progress, rush into the street to confront those doing the cutting and chopping.

We ask that Coastal Commission staff consider the attached letter from Enforcement Officer Jordan Sanchez to the Public Works Department, pointing out the need to protect "major vegetation." Staff may also want to review Agenda Item 16a at the June 12th Coastal Commission meeting. Commissioners ignored the City of Long Beach and their own Commission staff's approval of a project that would have removed twenty trees on Marina Drive, and granted the Appeal of a single resident of Marina Pacific who did not think the trees should be cut down to build a new fence. Due to the Commissioners' concerns, the Marina Pacifica Homeowners Association has now decided not to move forward with the project.

Accommodating development at the expense of nature, should no longer be considered automatic. The assumption of City Staff that replacement is equivalent to sustaining existing populations fails to recognize the inherent right to life of individual beings, including this Coral tree. We ask that Coastal Commission staff challenge this erase and replace mentality, and be a good steward of our existing coastal resources.

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APPEALS TO THE CITY PLANNING COMMISSION AND/OR TO THE CITY COUNCIL

- A. Any aggrieved person may appeal a decision on a project that required a public hearing.
- B. An appeal must be filed within ten (10) calendar days after decision.
- C. An appeal shall be filed with Long Beach Development Services on a form provided by that Department with the appropriate filing fee.
- D. A public hearing on an appeal shall be held within sixty (60) calendar days after Long Beach Development Services receives a completed appeal form or after the City Clerk receives the appeal from Long Beach Development Services.
- E. A notice of the public hearing on the appeal shall be mailed by Long Beach Development Services to the applicant, all persons entitled to mailed notice, and any known aggrieved person not less than fourteen (14) calendar days prior to the hearing.
- F. The Planning Commission shall have jurisdiction on appeals from the decisions of the Current Planning Officer and the City Council shall have jurisdiction on appeals from the Planning Commission.
- G. Except for appeals to the Coastal Commission for projects located seaward of the appealable area boundary and appeals to the City Council of local coastal development permits on developments regulated under the City's Oil Code, there shall be no further appeals after a decision on an appeal.
- H. You are hereby provided notice that the time within which judicial review of the herein reported decision must be sought is governed by Section 1094.6 of the California Code of Civil Procedure.

APPEALS TO THE COASTAL COMMISSION

All actions on local coastal development permits seaward of the appealable area boundary may be appealed by any aggrieved person to the Coastal Commission according to the procedures of the Coastal Commission, provided that all local appeals have been exhausted and no fee was charged the appellant for such appeal, by filing such appeal at the Coastal Commission offices, 301 E. 

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


CONCEPT 'D' LONG BEACH, CA April 20, 2020
