Subj: Oceano Dunes CDP Review

These comments are submitted on behalf of the Oceano Economic Development Council (OEDC), an organizational outgrowth of work done over past two and a half years with Cal Poly faculty and students on a redevelopment initiative for Oceano. The initiative was initially undertaken under the aegis of the Oceano Beach Community Association (OBCA) with whom the OEDC remains associated. The OEDC is being formed to advance the initiative with business leaders and public officials in San Luis Obispo County.

OEDC position

The OEDC's position is that continued allowance of recreational vehicle activity on Oceano's beachfront would violate the Coastal Commission's stated environmental justice policy while also violating State law and the Local Coastal Plans.

Such activity would also conflict with the underlying aim and spirit of Opportunity Zone (OZ) legislation enacted for the express purpose of helping disadvantaged communities like Oceano, whose best, and possibly only, hope for socioeconomic recovery and growth rests with becoming the destination beach community its early town leaders aspired for it.

OHV Impacts

Next to public health and safety, the chief concern of beach communities like Oceano and Grover Beach is the impact off-highway vehicle (OHV) activity has on business volume and the local economy. Community beachfronts are their most valuable economic asset for generating revenue growth and creating jobs. This is especially the case for a distressed community like Oceano where OHV activity extends across the full length of its beachfront, effectively obstructing pedestrian use, visitor-serving business activity and prospects for economic growth.

In addition to OHV activity being economically obstructive to Oceano, it also deprives residents of the only expansive outdoor recreation area that Oceano families have to enjoy. During the March-September 2020 suspension of OHV activity, Oceano families swarmed to their beachfront for the first time possible in decades. For many, it was their only feasible outdoor recreation area and refuge. With the recent resumption of OHV activity, the beach no longer offers such an option.

Exploring What's Possible

As a low-income community with a predominantly Latino population and a high jobless rate, Oceano was designated a disadvantaged community and Opportunity Zone by Governor Brown in April 2018. This designation sparked community interest in exploring with graduate students in Cal Poly's City and Regional Planning Department (CRP) what might be possible as an economic growth path.

In two successive "planning studios" in the 2018-19 academic year the Cal Poly graduate students helped residents map out alternative futures for Oceano. In the first of these, CRP students met with residents in Oceano for a series of four workshops, leading them progressively through a process that culminated in the preparation of a community plan update in March 2019.

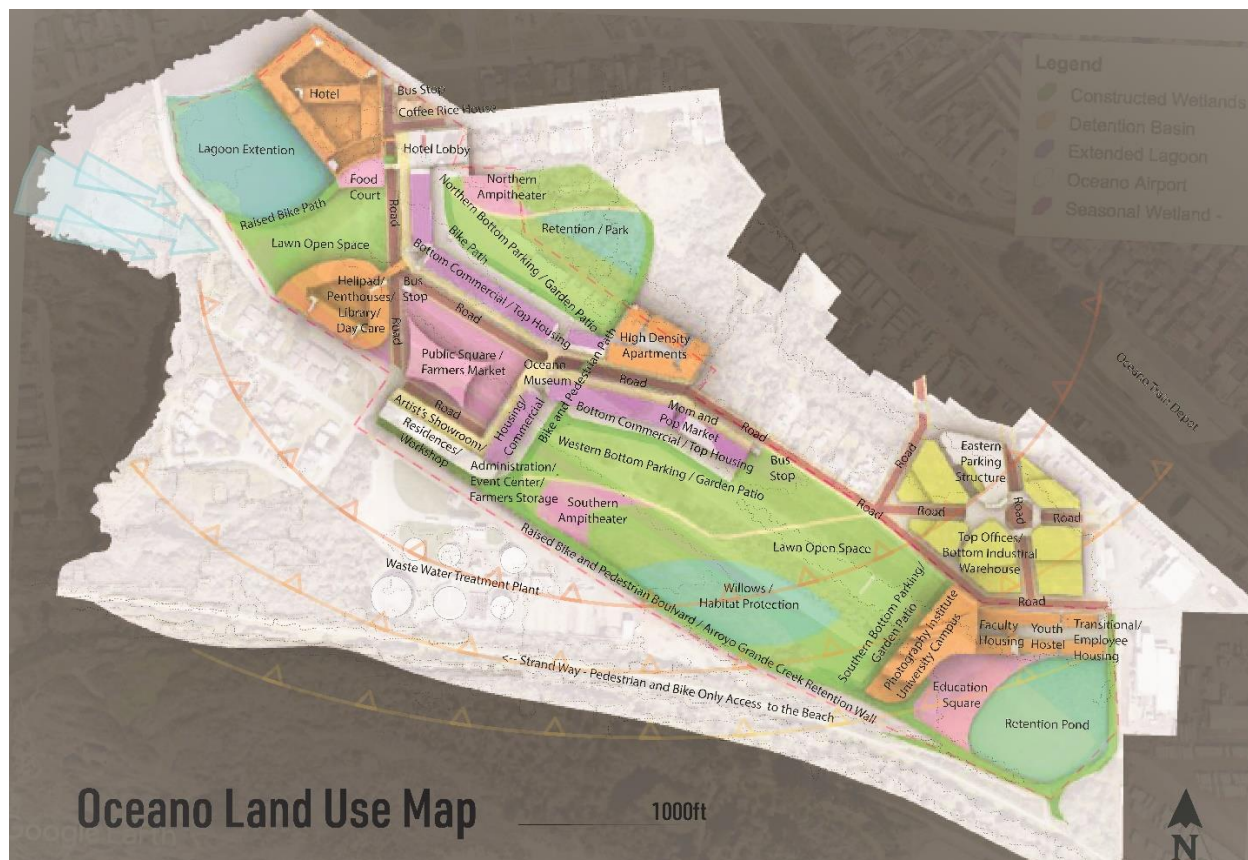
The second workshop picked up where the first left off, with a series of projects that included specific plans for the conceptual modeling of Pier Avenue as a visitor-serving business district, and of an Oceano Town Center in an adjoining area with a mix of commercial, residential, educational, and cultural/historical land uses.

The Town Center Concept

The County's 2013 revitalization plan for Oceano and earlier plans emphasized the need to create a sense of place for the community, a need that town leaders recognized as far back as the early 1900s when they planned for a park surrounded by a residential neighborhood near the beachfront; something akin to a town center – a theme reprised in the 2018 community workshops and subsequently conceptualized in the Town Center specific plan.

The 65-acre Town Center plan was recently mapped with 30 acres of open space and trails, 12 types of residential housing, more than 350,000 square feet of commercial space, 200,000 square feet of hospitality and community facilities, 350,000 square feet of education and historic facilities, and 150,000 square feet of parking space.

The resultant land-use map and underlying construction details are now being used by Cal Poly Professor Pratish Patel and his finance students for the preparation of a pro forma financial analysis of projected business revenue, sales tax revenue, TOT revenue, property tax revenue, County leasing revenue, costs and capital requirements, operating expenses, asset valuation, financial returns where applicable, and jobs.

When this is done, it will then be possible to design and implement a community-wide study with Oceano residents, basically asking them about the kind and mix of redevelopment they'd like to see in Oceano, while showing them what might be possible in terms of job creation, housing and improved living conditions. The sole purpose of the Town Center design and economic modeling being done is to promote creative thinking about a future vision for Oceano that reflects the stated goals of its residents.

The basic question being addressed is whether and to what extent the asset value of Oceano's beachfront and the resultant socioeconomic returns on this asset (to Oceano residents, businesses, and the County) are greater with or without recreational vehicle activity on Oceano's beachfront.

We already know that communities with vehicle-free beachfronts in the County are thriving, while Oceano is not, and will not, if cars and trucks continue to drive on its beachfront.

We also know that State Parks' 2017 claim of a \$243 million impact is spurious, a claim that Patel refuted in a widely circulated 2018 critique, and further debunked in his just-published report, [Economic Impact from Suspension of the Vehicular Use at the Oceano Dunes SVRA](#).

So, we have three evidentiary sources telling us two things: that OHV activity in the Pismo State Beach and Oceano Dunes has had no significant economic impact; and, that OHV activity on beachfronts can obstruct or inhibit a community's economic growth.

What remains to find out is...

- how much of an economic opportunity there might be for Oceano and the County by redeveloping Oceano as a destination beach community versus the non-beach-community it has become since 1982 when its beachfront was repurposed for recreational driving, and
- what area-residents prefer versus what governing authorities, special interests and outsiders prefer.

The Choice

Oceano's future will be determined by whatever final action is taken on the CDP/PWP regarding the continuation of OHV activity on Oceano's beachfront, whether it be for more of the same repressive socioeconomic conditions that residents have contended with for nearly four decades, or, to lend residents and their town a new lease on life.

For the Coastal Commission, it would seem to boil down to a making simple choice of whether or not to comply with its own environmental justice policy.

It has been so beneficial to residents to have the dunes closed to vehicles during the last several months. It has made walking safe as well as improving the air quality in the Nipomo Mesa for thousands of residents.

There are many options for beneficially capitalizing on the unique character of our dunes. Visitors, both from the US and from overseas attracted by the natural beauty and serenity of our Dunes, can be a greater economic resource for the area than off-roaders.

Nature-oriented tourism could be a more profitable use if they are encouraged to come to the area. A good plan for the Oceano State Park would be to provide visitor services in the same way as the national parks (like Yosemite).

Grover Beach has long wanted to upgrade the area. With the building of its convention center, changing the park to an environmentally sensitive tourist area with camping, hiking, bird and wildlife tours seems to be a better use. This would benefit Oceano, Grover Beach and the health of the residents of the Nipomo Mesa.

How many people must die from insidious air pollution and reckless vehicle operation before the Coastal Commission and State Parks will protect us?

In the recent past, concerns about cigarette smoke and asbestos were swept away. It took many years and lives lost for the serious health dangers of these two environmental pollutants to be understood.

I urge you to take seriously the particulate matter in the air on the Nipomo Mesa, which is classified as one of the most polluted areas in the nation. The health of the residents of the area is at risk and endangered.

Please reject the Public Works Plan for Oceano Dunes State Park. This plan doesn't adequately protect coastal resources or endangered species, and it doesn't comply with the Coastal Act.

Your commission directed State Parks to evaluate phasing out off-roading and transitioning the park to nonmotorized recreation. But this plan prioritizes off-road recreation over protection of wildlife and doesn't address the resource-protection issues your agency raised. It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

The Public Works Plan would open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. It also proposes a massive 120-acre development near Oso Flaco Lake, including yet more off-roading, hundreds of campsites, huge parking lots, offices, residences, and other infrastructure. Leaving little room for wildlife, the development would destroy one of the best birdwatching spots in San Luis Obispo County.

Please reject this plan and impose your own permit conditions and a phase-out of off-roading, as recommended by your staff.

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

Your current draft plan could doom these species by allowing more off-roading, the result of which would cause more protected birds to be run over and reduce their protected nesting areas.

In addition, permitting more vehicles to drive in essential bird habitat areas during the nesting season will hurt these iconic birds and undermine the very reason for the "conservation" plan. Also, your plan fails to provide safeguards for resident snowy plovers, which continue to be struck by vehicles during the non-breeding season.

Finally, this proposal further threatens air quality by proposing to expand driving areas and use mechanical beach cleanup. Doing so will decrease the amount of stabilizing vegetation and thus create larger areas where sand can get airborne and blow into nearby communities.

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at OSDVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Dear California State Parks and California Coastal Commission:

For many reasons State Park's PWP/EIR+ plan is problematic as it overlooks many of the reasonable recommendations made previously by the California Coastal Commission to resolve longstanding environmental and public health and safety issues. This plan submitted by state Parks does not do what it should do to weave the various complexities of this stretch of coast into a sensible plan.

I have also reviewed the Coastal Commission staff report and its recommendations. I concur with their assessment that this area and where State Parks' PWP plan falls short- the Coastal Commission Staff report is a more comprehensive, all-inclusive, and strategic answer for the Central Coast.

They, at least, have examined the totality of evidence from the perspective of public health, agricultural and economic vitality for the region, wildlife and habitat protection, environmental justice, community fairness, and access to the beach and coast, for all people.

I like the Coastal Commission Staff recommendation that the Coastal Commission “partner with State Parks, the local community, and visitors to the area to reimagine the Park operating in a **more environmentally sustainable and legally consistent way.**” Staff has indicated that their official staff recommendation will be to phase out off-roading over five years and to expand different types of recreational uses that will not harm coastal resources at the Park.

Unfortunately, the State Parks plan has not done well in its PWP/ EIR assessment. For these specific reasons:

1. It does not comply with the law:

- **California Coastal Act Section 30240A-** ESHA Environmentally sensitive habitat areas shall be protected.
- **California Coastal Act Section – 30240B-** **Adjacent** to ESHA requires siting of proposed development to be non-impactful and non-degrading to ESHA.
- **CCA Section 3024-** Prime Ag land

- **CEQA-** The submitted PWP/ EIR is incomplete and insufficient in disclosure and assessment of comprehensive impacts to the Oso Flaco Lake region and will be challenged.

2. **It is bad for people-** The local schools, the birders, the fisherman, the hikers, the curious nature seeker, the hiker, the tourist seeking Coastal Dune hiking and viewing access would all be forced to surrender this sacred exploration space to noisy, polluting, destructive commercial and RV activity.
It is also dangerous to insert the volume and types of traffic, w large RVs, Towed OHV Trailers, etc.- into the same stretch of agricultural workers, pedestrians, and farming equipment. Bad Vehicle accidents are guaranteed.
3. **It is bad for wildlife.** The many birds, animals, and plants that currently thrive in the protected space of Oso Flaco. Their future and survival would be greatly impacted by the impacts and the magnitude of the proposed projects to the environment would be devastating.

The Oso Flaco Lake region is a critical flyway path for migrating birds and for the threatened Monarch Butterfly, as well as a protected home for numerous other sensitive animals and plants.

4. **It is bad for the environment** – This area features prime agricultural soils in addition to a currently protected ecosystem of Dune lake habitat.

The prime agricultural class I & class II soils are rich and rewarding- allowing essential food and jobs to be produced and to supply the area with economic benefits and replenishment of the natural hydrologic cycles.

USFWS ranked Oso Flaco Region as a “top tier” category of fragile ecosystem habitats that need protection.

It has taken 40 years of protection to allow Oso Flaco to heal and evolve from the last time large scale human impact interfered with the natural conditions. The plants and animals evolving here are now going to be sacrificed and put in jeopardy because we want our carbon spewing vehicles and toys to have a place to be destructive? That is both illegal and shameful.

5. **The project has much public opposition.** When the local media publicized the State Parks Plan for Oso Flaco-the public sentiment was largely against such a massive and destructive new intrusion and point of entry to the Dunes.

Over 2,000 letters sent to State Parks in opposition to the first PWP that State Parks submitted. Other groups have stated their opposition to this PWP/EIR:

Coastal Commission Staff Report (July 2019): “Serious LCP inconsistencies related to agricultural conversion and ESHA degradation. PWP effort is not moving in the right direction”-

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Out of the two contrasting visions, the voice of support from a multitude of residents and visitors, absolutely loved spending time walking, biking, and riding horses at the beach when vehicles were prohibited over the summer, and who feel vehicles on the beach should be reduced or regulated, as opposed to expanded, like the State Parks PWP outlines.

Some important considerations for this decision include:

1. **Protecting our public health should always come first.** Off-road vehicle use has been determined to contribute to poor air quality conditions on the Nipomo Mesa. Mitigation installed to date has improved the air quality according to **APCD reports** by reducing emissions by over 20% in some years.
2. **A recent economic impact study** by a Cal Poly professor concluded that during the time off-road vehicles were temporarily prohibited during the pandemic, there was no significant economic impact to our community. This study **challenges previous studies** that have indicated the economic impact of losing off-road vehicles would be significant to our community.
3. If we are going to continue to allow vehicles at the Oceano Dunes, we need to balance **all interests**, including social, economic, and environmental. There is a way to do this, but State Parks does not seem to be indicating a willingness to get there.

I urge you to reject the Oso Flaco Lake “Improvement” project as submitted and begin the work as outlined in the Coastal Commission Staff analysis.

Follow your thorough and accurate Coastal Commission Staff Report and you will have done a better job of managing the complexities of this stretch of vital coastline, which is exactly what your commission is.

Dear California Coastal Commission,

Please reject the Public Works Plan for Oceano Dunes State Park. This plan doesn't adequately protect coastal resources or endangered species, and it doesn't comply with the Coastal Act.

Your commission directed State Parks to evaluate phasing out off-roading and transitioning the park to nonmotorized recreation. But this plan prioritizes off-road recreation over protection of wildlife and doesn't address the resource-protection issues your agency raised. It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

The Public Works Plan would open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. It also proposes a massive 120-acre development near Oso Flaco Lake, including yet more off-roading, hundreds of campsites, huge parking lots, offices, residences, and other infrastructure. Leaving little room for wildlife, the development would destroy one of the best birdwatching spots in San Luis Obispo County.

Please reject this plan and impose your own permit conditions and a phase-out of off-roading, as recommended by your staff.

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

I am writing to ask your support for the following three items:

- 1. Permanent elimination of Off Highway Vehicles (OHV) on the Oceano Dunes.** The Oceano Dunes area is a precious natural resource that has been greatly harmed from OVH usage. Not only are the dunes being harmed, but so is the health of the Pacific Ocean. I have walked the dune area for years, and noticed trash caused by humans (bottles, cans, food wraps, shoes, etc.) has always been in abundance at the shoreline. During this last year with the COVID situation preventing OVH traffic, that trash has been greatly reduced. Eliminating OVH use will provide an opportunity for native plants and wildlife to replenish themselves, while greatly reducing trash that ends up in the ocean that causes harm to sea life. Additionally, human lives will be saved with no OHV allowed on the dunes. Every year multiple deaths and injuries are caused by OHV usage on the dunes.
- 2. Limited camping on the Oceano Dunes**--not all harm on the dunes is caused by OVH, much of it is caused by camping. Your commission directed State Parks to evaluate phasing out off-roading and transitioning the park to nonmotorized recreation. But this plan prioritizes off-road recreation over protection of wildlife and doesn't address the resource-protection issues your agency raised. It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. We write in support of the Staff Report and against the State Parks plan for the future of the Oceano Dunes area. Although we, like many local residents, would prefer no motor vehicles on the beach and dunes, the recommendations in the Staff Report represent a compromise, which we can support. Allowing low-cost vehicle camping in a more limited portion of the beach would still allow a unique experience for locals and tourists. We are encouraged by the Staff Report having addressed the livelihood and need for a sense of community in Oceano and specifically, businesses on Pier Ave.

We support eliminating OHV from the beach and dunes. Healthy sand dunes and developed foredunes provide natural coastal protection against storm surge and high waves, preventing or reducing coastal flooding as well as providing important ecological habitat. OHVs traversing the dunes have an adverse impact on them and their plant and animal residents and on the air quality. With rising sea levels, healthy dunes are of increasing importance. Recent efforts by State Parks to protect endangered or threatened species and mitigate poor air quality have led to miles of fencing, signs and scientific monitoring equipment, degrading the beauty of the spectacular Oceano Dunes. State Parks often relies on heavy equipment - bull dozers and graders to traverse the beach and dunes. It can be argued that most "mitigation" is done to support continued OHV use.

We are adamantly opposed to the State Parks plan to develop the Oso Flaco area. We find development most unacceptable in light of the fragile nature of Oso Flaco. It is protected within the Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes complex, which has been designated "the most unique and fragile ecosystem in the State of California" by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service: <https://documents.coastal.ca.gov/reports/2000/3/T14c-3-2000.pdf> Protection of Oso Flaco wildlife would be weakened by nearby development, including increased light at night, pavement, and noise at all hours.

Oso Flaco is currently enjoyed by many families and student groups with low impact. For example, on New Year's Day we were impressed by the number of Hispanic families with whom we shared the boardwalk and beach; we Caucasians were the minority as opposed to our typical experience on Pismo Beach. It appears that this is because Oso Flaco represents convenient, local access to nature for residents of nearby Santa Maria, Guadalupe and Oceano, which are areas with a majority of low-income Hispanic families. It seems highly unlikely that many of these families would utilize the facilities envisioned by the State Parks plan.

In closing, we encourage the Coastal Commission to adopt the recommendations in the Staff Report and dismiss the State Parks plan.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
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- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

Good morning,

My name is Ryan. I've lived in Oceano for thirteen years. When I first moved here I was excited to live so close to the ocean and looked forward to taking advantage of the beach in Oceano. Sadly however I quickly learned that the beach front from Grand Ave to the camping area in the Oceano Dunes is NOT a beach for locals, but instead is a "playground" for out of town tourists who come to our area with an attitude of consumption and destruction.

During the closure of the Oceano Dunes amid the Coronavirus Pandemic, we were finally able to enjoy the beach front area directly in front of the Pier Ave access the way the beach is meant to be enjoyed. We were not alone. Everytime we went to the beach to enjoy a picnic, sunbathing, and other activities as simple as walking three miles along the surf, we saw copious amounts of people doing the same. It was so nice to see a different crowd embracing the area, a crowd that was willing and able to pump money into our immediate local economy. I could easily imagine several shops, restaurants, and storefronts along Pier Ave that would thrive among a crowd of the likes.

Instead we pander to a community of loud, offensive, and destructive vehicles. The day the beach was reopened for vehicle access, our oasis on the beach was a parking lot trodden down by hundreds of vehicles. No longer were there crowds of beach goers basking in the sun, instead all I saw were lifted trucks with flags tearing up the sand. It honestly broke my heart to see what was a promising local hangout being literally destroyed before us.

With the community of OHV enthusiasts who frequent our area, in the thirteen years I've been here I have never seen any change to the businesses along Pier Ave. There's a liquor store, an ever-changing burger joint, and a confectionary. Everything else is geared to consumption and destruction. Included with this is the state of our roads in the immediate area. Can we realistically think that \$5/day per vehicle or \$20/night for camping produces enough tax revenue to repair the section of the Highway 1 or Pier Ave that is used by visitors?

Not all is gloom and doom, however. I do see improvements within Oceano. The neighborhood between Highway 1 and the beach is mostly rental units, hotels, and camping. I can only dream about a day when we have visitors coming to our area for a beach getaway from areas to the north and south of us bringing with them their disposable income. I imagine boutique stores, coffee shops, and restaurants along Pier Ave dedicated to this crowd of people, not just the weekend warriors from the east.

So what can we do about it?

This is a question I've asked myself over and over keeping in mind that a large amount of locals enjoy recreating at the OHV area of the dunes as well. In Social Media posts, I have seen arguments for closing the Pier Ave access ramp or closing the Grand Ave access ramp. But counter arguments pointed out that closing one of those ramps would equal doubling traffic at the other.

With the proposed expansion of the recreation area into the Oso Flaco portion of the beach, I see new opportunities for accessing the OHV area. If there were one access point near the Phillips plant and another from 22nd street many of the problems I've outlined would be solved.

1. Traffic congestion in Oceano and Grover Beach would be reduced.
2. Less of the beach would be driven on, granting expedited access to the OHV area
3. Small businesses could thrive along Pier Ave catering to wealthy urban tourists
4. Less wear and tear to Highway 1 through Oceano
5. Increased transient tax due to the increased volume of short term vacation rentals

I am not proposing excluding the community of OHV enthusiasts from visiting our area. Some of them do contribute to the local economy by purchasing fuel and groceries. Instead I would like to find a way to allow both sides of the issue to have a win. Allow for Pier Ave gentrification to happen and move the OHV access to a safer spot with better access. After all, doesn't the betterment of our community benefit us all?

I appreciate you taking the time to hear my opinion. I hope some of what I have written will be considered when making a decision regarding the community of Oceano.

Commissioners:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Draft Public Works Plan submitted by the State Department of Parks & Recreation for the Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area. I strongly believe that any proposed coastal development must be consistent with two overarching goals: 1) to provide opportunities for coastal access and recreation to as many people as possible, and 2) to protect our coastal resources, most notably our endangered species and environmentally sensitive habitat area. Sadly, the Draft PWP submitted by DPR fails on both of these goals.

Having studied the situation at ODSVRA for the past 8 years, I've reached two basic conclusions. First, motorized recreation irreparably damages coastal resources. It destroys ESHA, it threatens endangered species, and it creates pollution that has far-reaching impacts that extend along the coast and beyond. Second, motorized recreation in a coastal area precludes the use of that area by other groups, i.e., walkers, hikers, bikers, etc. It's just common sense; it's why we don't let our children play in the street. Unfortunately, the Draft PWP clearly shows that not only does DPR not appreciate the damage that their current motorized recreational activities cause, they want to expand these activities into areas that are natural and environmentally sensitive. In particular, their plans to develop Oso Flaco Lake and the Phillips 66 site are, in my view, a huge mistake. Oso Flaco is one of the few local areas where people on foot can get a true coastal nature experience. To essentially pave it over is unacceptable. Similarly, if and when the Phillips 66 site becomes available, we need to let it revert to a more natural state, so that its natural beauty can be enjoyed by all.

Your Staff has provided a comprehensive and very thoughtful report on the situation at ODSVRA, and I find it to be excellent and well-reasoned. As I've commented to you before, I think that Commission Staff has the clearest vision of any group regarding the future of the ODSVRA, and I commend Staff for the hard work that they have put into their report and recommendations. In my view, any plan for development at ODSVRA needs to reflect the following realities, all of which are addressed in detail in the Staff Report: 1) OHV has no place on the dunes, and it needs to be phased out. We've been kicking this can down the road for 40 years. Isn't it time finally to stand up and address this problematic issue? 2) Motorized recreation needs to be separated from other types of recreation. I believe there is a place for car camping at the beach, but for safety reasons it has to be segregated from non-motorized recreation. 3) Coastal resources are supposed to benefit us all, not just a small group of us. That includes not only recreational visitors but also members of the local community, i.e., Oceano, who have taken the brunt of the negative impacts associated with OHV use without receiving much positive benefit.

I urge you in the strongest possible terms to approve the recommendations contained in the Staff Report, so that the ODSVRA can become the jewel of the California Coast that it was always meant to be.

- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).

-) It is not consistent with the Coastal Act and the Grover Beach and San Luis Obispo County Local Coastal Plans, which are the standard of review for the Public Works Plan.
- 2) The draft PWP does not address the multiple issues and impacts associated with the use and intensity of use in the Park. Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

Protect the Oceano Dunes!

Dear Coastal Commissioners, Alternates, Non-Voting members of the Commission and Staff,

As a 40 year resident of Arroyo Grande, CA, I have enjoyed the most remarkable relationship with and privileged use of Pismo State Beach and the Oso Flaco Lake area as a hiker, birder, equestrian, observer, preserver and lover of the ocean. And with the recent closure of the State Vehicular Recreation Area due to Covid-19 and the welfare of the Snowy Plover, I and many others have finally had the pleasure of enjoying this specific area of the beach without the crowds, noise, dust, trash, air pollution, artificial light, etc. that is part and parcel of the vehicular off-road use. Thus it is with optimism and hope that I submit my comments regarding the State Parks' Public Works Master Plan for this area and my concern that if this plan goes forward as envisioned, every human (other than the off-road enthusiast), every bird, special plant species, and diverse wildlife will suffer permanently from its implementation.

Pismo State Beach Plan

Because this area serves as the hub for the general population's access to the beach, improvements identified in the plan appear to address many long-standing needs, including upgrades to entry kiosks, lifeguard stands, the boardwalk, campgrounds, the Monarch butterfly habitat, overall access for people with disabilities, and equestrian and hiking trails.

However, the Plan continues to ignore the need for a ***staging area for equestrian use***, a critical component for equestrians to access the beach and dune trails.

Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area

Maybe someday State Parks will realize that money from off-road vehicle use isn't the be-all-to-end-all and that if those funds should happen to go away, an entirely different and environmentally conscious source of revenue should and will replace it. ***It is my hope that off-road vehicle use will be removed permanently from the whole of Pismo Beach and Oceano Dunes Recreation areas.*** However, since this dream seems remote, I submit the following:

1. The Plan should do more to limit the number of off-road vehicles permitted to use the area on a daily basis, including limiting the number of campsites. The proposed use remains too dense.
2. The Plan fails to intelligently address the sensitive habitat of the Snowy Plover by assuming that the Snowy Plover wants only to nest in the areas designated by State Parks. I think this past nesting season proved otherwise. When vehicles were removed, the bird was found throughout the off-road vehicle area (except where State Parks meddled with their nests).

Oso Flaco Lake Plan

The Oso Flaco Lake area is one of the most beautiful, peaceful, pristine, serene places in the whole of California and beyond. ***Proposed elements that would enhance the current and existing uses surrounding the lake, the dunes and the beach area are appropriate.*** These

include specific improvements that continue to promote human hiking (trails), birding, picnicking and fishing, preserving the environmentally sensitive habitat for migratory birds and special status plant species, and the continuation of agricultural farming practices on prime agricultural land. All of these activities contribute to rather than harm the unique character of Oso Flaco Lake.

The Oso Flaco Plan as proposed is plainly a BAD Plan for the following reasons:

1. It would turn this beautiful, natural area into a noisy hub of commercial and recreational vehicle activity by illogically converting 120 acres of prime agricultural and sensitive dune land into a shocking and shameful number of camping sites, cabins, RV sites, parking spaces, group event areas, access trails for OHV use (and more), which ultimately require the addition of infrastructure for support (sewage disposal, maintenance area, concessionaire facilities, residence quarters, major renovations to the access road and railroad crossing, etc.). It defies common sense that this area should ever be considered an appropriate location for a major development that principally serves off-road vehicle use.
2. It is BAD for Wildlife. This environmentally sensitive area provides habitat for many mammals and migratory birds, especially the Least Tern and the Snowy Plover, and many other water birds too numerous to name here. Additionally, it is habitat for special status plant species that are unique to the area and fragile.
3. It gravely impacts the nature of the uses for the people who frequent the area on a regular basis, particularly, the residents of Santa Maria and Guadalupe, birders, hikers, fishermen, school groups, nature groups, etc. who prefer this tranquil environment.
4. The Oso Flaco Lake area is just north and adjacent to a designated Wildlife Refuge, which, by law, must be protected. The plan fails to protect much of anything!
5. Unlike Pismo Beach, where large numbers of people actually spend time in the water necessitating lifeguards and a tower, this is not the case with Oso Flaco beach. In all the many, many times I have visited Oso Flaco, I have yet to see anyone playing or swimming in the ocean. The waves are rough, deep and hazardous and the beach rugged and natural. People will play in the creek, but not the ocean. A lifeguard tower and lifeguards at Oso Flaco beach are not practical or necessary.
6. The proposed Plan has received strenuous opposition from many individuals and groups, including the Audubon Society, Oceano Beach Community Association, Northern Chumash Tribal Council, Surfriders Foundation, Sierra Club, Nature Conservancy and more. ***State Parks has been anything but reflective of this input.***
7. As required by CEQA, this Plan does not sufficiently identify the environmental impacts to the Oso Flaco region.
8. Lastly, the Plan does not comply with the CA Coastal Act, specifically:
 - a) Section 30240(a) which states that environmentally sensitive habitat areas shall be protected and only uses dependent on those resources shall be allowed.

- b) Section 30240(b) which states that development in areas adjacent to environmentally sensitive habitat shall...prevent impacts that would degrade those areas and must be compatible.
- c. Section 30241 which specifically preserves prime agricultural land and minimizes conflict between ag and other uses.

Phillips 66 Property Site Development

Development of this site as envisioned in the Conceptual Plan is equally as perverse as the Oso Flaco Lake Plan for many of the same reasons. And because implementation of such a plan appears far in the future due to environmental contamination, costs, logistics, etc. I will hold my comments until such time that they are relevant. However, I do want to say that the idea of having 75 equestrian campsites in an area that has 200 campsites, 20 cabins, 50 tents, pro-tracks, youth tracks, OHV parking and people, OHV rental, etc. is ludicrous. Equestrians ride Pismo Beach and its associated dune trails because it is beautiful, quiet, and safe. We specifically stay away from the OHV area because it is loud, unsafe, not relaxing, not enjoyable, and entirely undesirable to be anywhere near off-road vehicles.

Recommendation:

1. Reject the State Parks Public Works Development Plan for the SVRA, particularly as it pertains to the Oso Flaco Lake region.
2. Consider the permanent removal of all OHV use on Pismo State Beach and the SVRA, which, in essence, renders the Phillips 66 Property Conceptual Plan a non-starter.

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. - Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. We all rely on you to help protect our unique coastline for the future, and act decisively when we become aware of activities or proposed changes that will erode and destroy this limited resource.

I first learned about the Oceano Dunes State Recreational Vehicle Area in the 1980's, I was surprised a significant portion of the coastline seemed designated for destruction, allowing any and all vehicles to actively "tear it up" on a constant basis. The concept seemed irresponsible and outdated to me at that time and I naively assumed the process would gradually "go away", since it appeared the public was learning more about our human impact on nature and the horrific consequences of unchecked abuse to our planet and its inhabitants, including ourselves.

In 2021 I now find myself retired and newly residing in Shell Beach. On a regular basis I receive weather alerts advising of unhealthy air quality in Pismo, Oceano, Nipomo and the Mesa from dust spreading from the ODSRVA. From my deck I daily see "smog" over the areas south of me, appearing to stretch inland from the dunes across the Five Cities area. It is a disturbing sight for an area with little industry and such a small population. The future does not bode well if this activity continues unrestrained.

My husband and I regularly walk Pismo Beach for health and recreation, but find it too unsafe and unpleasant to venture south past Grand Ave, due to the abundance and often irresponsible use of vehicles on the beach on the ODSRVA. Over the years we have continually learned in news reports of violent and often fatal collisions on the dunes. Our few forays into the "drive on beach" area have left us disturbed and saddened about the abuse of this land. Reports of activities on the dunes reflect little concern for the land or the local communities, along with unfettered destruction for pleasure and profit.

I understand the folks who ride their vehicles over the dunes enjoy that activity and do not want to see it end, but there must be other areas in California with land that is already in disrepair and possibly unfit for other uses, which could be refurbished for such use and could be better situated to allow such an activity with less terrestrial, human and wildlife fallout. And if this activity is popular and financially viable, other privately owned off roading areas in the state will likely spring up to fill any void.

I also understand the local recreation businesses and State Parks may rely on income from the dunes to help them financially. However destruction for profit has always proven to be short sighted and detrimental in numerous and often irreversible ways. Encouraging protection of the Dunes or movement toward it becoming an eco-friendly recreation destination, with adequate protections for the land, its history and its wildlife, may not be the path of least resistance, but it will definitely be the path of greatest benefit long term to all, but especially for this precious coast.

Dear Coastal Commissioners, Alternates, Non-Voting members of the Commission and Staff,

As a 40 year resident of Arroyo Grande, CA, I have enjoyed the most remarkable relationship with and privileged use of Pismo State Beach and the Oso Flaco Lake area as a hiker, birder, equestrian, observer, preserver and lover of the ocean. And with the recent closure of the State Vehicular Recreation Area due to Covid-19 and the welfare of the Snowy Plover, I and many others have finally had the pleasure of enjoying this specific area of the beach without the crowds, noise, dust, trash, air pollution, artificial light, etc. that is part and parcel of the vehicular off-road use. Thus it is with optimism and hope that I submit my comments regarding the State Parks' Public Works Master Plan for this area and my concern that if this plan goes forward as envisioned, every human (other than the off-road enthusiast), every bird, special plant species, and diverse wildlife will suffer permanently from its implementation.

Pismo State Beach Plan

Because this area serves as the hub for the general population's access to the beach, improvements identified in the plan appear to address many long-standing needs, including upgrades to entry kiosks, lifeguard stands, the boardwalk, campgrounds, the Monarch butterfly habitat, overall access for people with disabilities, and equestrian and hiking trails.

However, the Plan continues to ignore the need for a ***staging area for equestrian use***, a critical component for equestrians to access the beach and dune trails.

Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area

Maybe someday State Parks will realize that money from off-road vehicle use isn't the be-all-to-end-all and that if those funds should happen to go away, an entirely different and environmentally conscious source of revenue should and will replace it. ***It is my hope that off-road vehicle use will be removed permanently from the whole of Pismo Beach and Oceano Dunes Recreation areas.*** However, since this dream seems remote, I submit the following:

1. The Plan should do more to limit the number of off-road vehicles permitted to use the area on a daily basis, including limiting the number of campsites. The proposed use remains too dense.
2. The Plan fails to intelligently address the sensitive habitat of the Snowy Plover by assuming that the Snowy Plover wants only to nest in the areas designated by State Parks. I think this past nesting season proved otherwise. When vehicles were removed, the bird was found throughout the off-road vehicle area (except where State Parks meddled with their nests).

Oso Flaco Lake Plan

The Oso Flaco Lake area is one of the most beautiful, peaceful, pristine, serene places in the whole of California and beyond. ***Proposed elements that would enhance the current and existing uses surrounding the lake, the dunes and the beach area are appropriate.*** These

include specific improvements that continue to promote human hiking (trails), birding, picnicking and fishing, preserving the environmentally sensitive habitat for migratory birds and special status plant species, and the continuation of agricultural farming practices on prime agricultural land. All of these activities contribute to rather than harm the unique character of Oso Flaco Lake.

The Oso Flaco Plan as proposed is plainly a BAD Plan for the following reasons:

1. It would turn this beautiful, natural area into a noisy hub of commercial and recreational vehicle activity by illogically converting 120 acres of prime agricultural and sensitive dune land into a shocking and shameful number of camping sites, cabins, RV sites, parking spaces, group event areas, access trails for OHV use (and more), which ultimately require the addition of infrastructure for support (sewage disposal, maintenance area, concessionaire facilities, residence quarters, major renovations to the access road and railroad crossing, etc.). It defies common sense that this area should ever be considered an appropriate location for a major development that principally serves off-road vehicle use.
2. It is BAD for Wildlife. This environmentally sensitive area provides habitat for many mammals and migratory birds, especially the Least Tern and the Snowy Plover, and many other water birds too numerous to name here. Additionally, it is habitat for special status plant species that are unique to the area and fragile.
3. It gravely impacts the nature of the uses for the people who frequent the area on a regular basis, particularly, the residents of Santa Maria and Guadalupe, birders, hikers, fishermen, school groups, nature groups, etc. who prefer this tranquil environment.
4. The Oso Flaco Lake area is just north and adjacent to a designated Wildlife Refuge, which, by law, must be protected. The plan fails to protect much of anything!
5. Unlike Pismo Beach, where large numbers of people actually spend time in the water necessitating lifeguards and a tower, this is not the case with Oso Flaco beach. In all the many, many times I have visited Oso Flaco, I have yet to see anyone playing or swimming in the ocean. The waves are rough, deep and hazardous and the beach rugged and natural. People will play in the creek, but not the ocean. A lifeguard tower and lifeguards at Oso Flaco beach are not practical or necessary.
6. The proposed Plan has received strenuous opposition from many individuals and groups, including the Audubon Society, Oceano Beach Community Association, Northern Chumash Tribal Council, Surfriders Foundation, Sierra Club, Nature Conservancy and more. ***State Parks has been anything but reflective of this input.***
7. As required by CEQA, this Plan does not sufficiently identify the environmental impacts to the Oso Flaco region.
8. Lastly, the Plan does not comply with the CA Coastal Act, specifically:
 - a) Section 30240(a) which states that environmentally sensitive habitat areas shall be protected and only uses dependent on those resources shall be allowed.

- b) Section 30240(b) which states that development in areas adjacent to environmentally sensitive habitat shall...prevent impacts that would degrade those areas and must be compatible.
- c. Section 30241 which specifically preserves prime agricultural land and minimizes conflict between ag and other uses.

Phillips 66 Property Site Development

Development of this site as envisioned in the Conceptual Plan is equally as perverse as the Oso Flaco Lake Plan for many of the same reasons. And because implementation of such a plan appears far in the future due to environmental contamination, costs, logistics, etc. I will hold my comments until such time that they are relevant. However, I do want to say that the idea of having 75 equestrian campsites in an area that has 200 campsites, 20 cabins, 50 tents, pro-tracks, youth tracks, OHV parking and people, OHV rental, etc. is ludicrous. Equestrians ride Pismo Beach and its associated dune trails because it is beautiful, quiet, and safe. We specifically stay away from the OHV area because it is loud, unsafe, not relaxing, not enjoyable, and entirely undesirable to be anywhere near off-road vehicles.

Recommendation:

1. Reject the State Parks Public Works Development Plan for the SVRA, particularly as it pertains to the Oso Flaco Lake region.
2. Consider the permanent removal of all OHV use on Pismo State Beach and the SVRA, which, in essence, renders the Phillips 66 Property Conceptual Plan a non-starter.

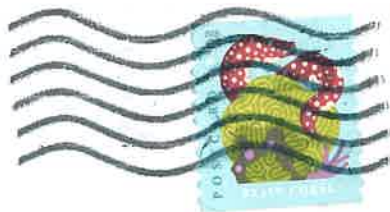

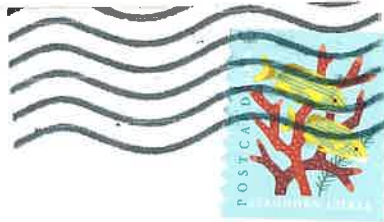

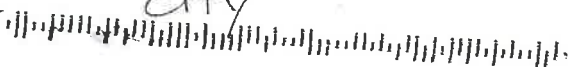

Dear Planning Team:

Americans for Responsible Recreational Access (ARRA) works to ensure that Americans are not arbitrarily denied the right to responsibly experience and enjoy the public lands that belong to the United States' citizens. The diverse members of ARRA have joined together to provide input on decisions regarding land use designation, recreation opportunities, and preservation. ARRA members seek responsible consideration of competing activities, which are based on sound environmental principles.

ARRA has reviewed the Draft Public Works Plan (PWP), and Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for Pismo State Beach and Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (SVRA) released on December 31, 2020. While the draft PWP provides limited meaningful OHV enhancements, we have significant concerns about several provisions that could end access to the park for hundreds of thousands of individuals. If implemented as drafted, the proposed PWP would create considerable adverse economic impact and negatively affect the off-highway vehicle recreation community. Within the PWP the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes possible purchase of the Phillips 66 refinery property and construction of new camping, OHV staging, and day-use facilities near the South Entrance, which is close to a

residential area whose residents have voiced strong objections to any OHV use (p. 53 of the PWP).

- Proposes to conduct an “independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study” to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

ARRA supports safe and responsible recreation management and resource protection by working in partnership with public land managers and recreation planners. We understand that environmental reviews are necessary, but the PWP as drafted favors eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation for people to gather and enjoy beach camping and OHV use. Furthermore, banning access and rentals will severely impact local businesses, restaurants, hotels, gas stations, vehicle service stations, and grocery stores.

Americans' lives and communities have changed dramatically in recent months. As schools, businesses, shops, and more temporarily close and reopen due to COVID-19, Americans have flocked to the outdoors to provide a necessary reprieve from the intense mental and physical stress caused by this crisis. We are confident we can find common ground with a goal of both protecting open sand resources and providing a high-quality outdoor experience for tourists and OHV enthusiasts from around the world who visit Oceano Dunes SVRA.

ARRA requests that the provisions outlined above be eliminated from the PWP and appreciates the consideration of our comments.

Your commission directed State Parks to evaluate phasing out off-roading and transitioning the park to nonmotorized recreation. But this plan prioritizes off-road recreation over protection of wildlife and doesn't address the resource-protection issues your agency raised. It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

The Public Works Plan would open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

The Porras Family are members of the American Sand Association. I visit the Oceano Dunes SVRA to recreate with my OHV. I oppose staff's recommendation to phase out OHV use at the SVRA over the next 5 years. In fact, I oppose any attempt by the Coastal Commission to shut down OHV use at the park. I do not believe the Coastal Commission has the legal authority to take such a radical action, especially since OHV use at Oceano predates the Coastal Act and the Coastal Commission. Therefore, I would request that the Commission reject staff's recommendation.

I am writing to voice my concern regarding the The California Coastal Commission staff recommendation that the California Coastal Commission (CCC) phase out all OHV use at Oceano Dunes SVRA over the next five years. I do not agree with this recommendation, and propose that ODSVRA open for OHV recreation immediately.

Oceano Dunes SVRA was purchased with Green Sticker Trust Fund money for the purpose of promoting OHV recreation and preserving these OHV areas for future generations.

The Oceano Dunes SVRA provides a major economic benefit to the local businesses and residents and the dunes also offer a unique recreational experience that provides access to coastal recreation for millions of Californians.

The Oceano Dunes SVRA itself generates more than \$150 Million dollars a year in economic activity from outside visitors. It is a major contributor to the SLO County's tourism industry that has already been hit hard by the COVID19 lock down.

we are begging that you not reduce, but expand OHV use and Oceano SVRA OHV. we our proud OHV campers who rely on this local activity as a safe physical distance activity for our family.

The Porras Family are members of the American Sand Association. I visit the Oceano Dunes SVRA to recreate with my OHV. I oppose staff's recommendation to phase out OHV use at the SVRA over the next 5 years. In fact, I oppose any attempt by the Coastal Commission to shut down OHV use at the park. I do not believe the Coastal Commission has the legal authority to take such a radical action, especially since OHV use at Oceano predates the Coastal Act and the Coastal Commission. Therefore, I would request that the Commission reject staff's recommendation.

I am writing to voice my concern regarding the The California Coastal Commission staff recommendation that the California Coastal Commission (CCC) phase out all OHV use at Oceano Dunes SVRA over the next five years. I do not agree with this recommendation, and propose that ODSVRA open for OHV recreation immediately.

Oceano Dunes SVRA was purchased with Green Sticker Trust Fund money for the purpose of promoting OHV recreation and preserving these OHV areas for future generations.

The Oceano Dunes SVRA provides a major economic benefit to the local businesses and residents and the dunes also offer a unique recreational experience that provides access to coastal recreation for millions of Californians.

The Oceano Dunes SVRA itself generates more than \$150 Million dollars a year in economic activity from outside visitors. It is a major contributor to the SLO County's tourism industry that has already been hit hard by the COVID19 lock down.

Right now, the future of the dunes has been based solely on environmental concerns, the fiscal impact of closing the Oceano Dunes SVRA has not been given equal consideration. Both of these issues must be addressed before making any decision to close the Oceano Dunes SVRA.

Since the Oceano Dunes is now closed due to Covid19 restrictions, there has been zero OHV activity or vehicle access to the dunes for months. But the dust emissions are much worse now. The CDF site exceedances have doubled to 12 and the Nipomo-Guadalupe Road site exceedances have nearly quadrupled to 11. As an RN who worked with patients with lung disease in the intensive care unit, I understand the need for clean air, without the fine particulate matter that has plagued the area east of Oceano dunes for decades. I get texts from the San Luis Obispo County Air Pollution Control District, and I started keeping those to see the extent that we are in jeopardy regarding clean air. So far this month we've had 5 notifications of blowing dust on the Nipomo Mesa. Prior to February we had 104 incidences, and that is only since September 17, 2019 when I began keeping these text. At times, Nipomo has had the worst air IN THE COUNTRY!!

As I see it, we need dune restoration so native vegetation species would again be able to grow and be restored. The impact on snowy plovers would be lessened; they could find nesting sites that would enable the population to again expand. The State Parks employees have moved nests in the last 6-10 months, which is NOT in compliance with the directives set last year for dune restoration!

I believe the State Park's plan to EXPAND rather than modify camping and eliminate OHV use is detrimental to the overall use of the local dunes. The proposed plan includes such items as a weapons range and a Pro-OHV riding area and negatively impacts the environmentally sensitive habitat area of pristine Oso Flaco. Not only would their plan worsen our air quality, but we would then also have increased noise pollution and destruction of even more habitat at Oso Flaco.

My family loves to hike the board walk trail to the Oso Flaco beach, and this lovely area would be devastated by more use. It would no longer be the peaceful experience that we have loved.

The Commission should insist on non-invasive recreational uses of the Park to be in compliance with the Coastal Act. State Parks have not mitigated the destruction of the dunes as they were directed to do within the last many years.

It is time to act to preserve our air, protect the environment for sensitive species, and allow for other recreational uses that don't destroy this beautiful area.

As a homeowner upon the Nipomo Mesa, I am writing to ask you to deny State Parks approval of their latest flawed Public Works Plan for Oso Flaco. This PWP would ruin this quiet, natural retreat we locals use for fishing, ocean access, exercise and birdwatching. I enjoy this lovely haven 1-2x/month.

The coastal zone of Oso Flaco was designated by your own Commission an "Environmentally Sensitive Habitat Area". Yet, the State plan for this legally protected habitat is to be ravaged by hundreds of campers, cars and OHV's. The anachronistic, exhaust-spewing "sport" of OHV riding harms our environment, people's lungs, and worsens global warming. 
Oso Flaco, our perfect, quiet oasis of natural lakes with its hand-crafted wheelchair-adapted path to the ocean, *must* be spared.

Dear Coastal Commissioners,

I understand that you are seeking public comment to re-imagine the use of the Oceano Dunes and Oso Flaco from San Luis Obispo County residents. I am an elementary school teacher at CL Smith Elementary School in San Luis Obispo and have taught at Oceano Elementary School. I am also a mother of 2 children, a 15 year-old and 12 year-old.

I am writing to emphasize the importance of re-imagining this space for three reasons. The first is to protect habitat and minimize carbon production to slow climate change. The second is to provide access to nature and recreation for our community and for visitors. The third is to advocate for the underserved primarily latinx Oceano neighborhood who should have the right to access their local beach without fearing being threatened or hit by off-road vehicles.

It is exciting to think of the possibilities of this beautiful place. The following ideas would attract tourists who appreciate and want to preserve this unique habitat. I also feel that these changes will be an economic benefit to the South County as a more diverse population feels safe on the beach in Oceano. Local campgrounds, hotels, restaurants, and other local tourist industry will thrive even more.

Here is my vision:

1. As we work to eliminate fossil fuel combustion engines, ELIMINATE driving on the beach.
2. Expand all of the free-to-the-public activities that people, animals, and plants naturally do at the beach!! It's the beach! And when there aren't scary, dangerous trucks zooming all over, it is a beautiful place where we all thrive! People of all economic, political, religious, and racial/ethnic backgrounds have a place at the beach. Our family goes to Pismo Beach almost every weekend and I love the diversity of people and activities there! Expanding the walkers, babies, children, surfers, runners, athletes, kite flyers, and people seeking rest and nature would be a huge and relatively cheap improvement over the polluting dangerous vehicles that exclude all of the rest of us. I resent that I pay taxes to pay for destructive vehicles that deny access to the people who live in the Oceano community and in our County.

Families in Nipomo and Guadalupe could bike to Pismo for day trips...and vice-versa!

4. Expand the Monarch Butterfly over-wintering site and ensure that there is more protected habitat for butterflies up and down the coast. As you likely know, western monarch butterflies are nearing extinction. The numbers this year are disturbingly low.
5. Protect more snowy plover habitat.
6. Have beach volleyball, sand soccer, ultimate frisbee, and other sport camps and tournaments on the beach through South County Parks and Rec programs.
7. Have a designated area for unleashed dogs to play. (Our border collie loves to play frisbee.)

Thank you for seeking our input on this very important matter. I know that I speak for many people who don't have the time or energy to write to you. I also speak for the endangered species and open space.

I hope that our voices are heard and that our State Parks makes a decision that puts us on the right side of history.

I am aware that you are taking new ideas to improve the beaches of Oceano Dunes and Oso Flaco. I am a student at San Luis Obispo High School, and I am one of many who love going to the beach to play volleyball, surf, and run. I trust that as leaders of this county you will make a decision that preserves the great beaches we are so fortunate to have.

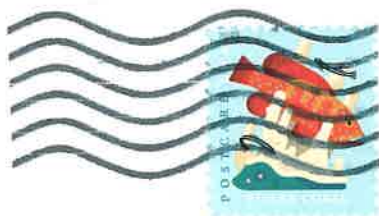

I know the park just reopened to camping and OHV, unfortunately! This evening I was walking well north of the OHV area, yet I could still hear the whine of the motors. (There was not much trash north of the OHV area.) I can't imagine what it's like for the animals that have lived in peace and quiet for the past, almost, year. It was beautiful and it is a glimpse of the future that should be charted for Oceano Dunes!

The Oceano Dunes needs time to recover and rest from the constant stress and destruction caused by all the vehicles, especially the offroad vehicles, to the fragile ecosystem. It is our duty to protect our extremely limited, small fraction of natural lands left in California, nevermind along the coast. It is a true treasure that has been misused and abused for too long. The following pictures from a walk I took last Monday, 2-15-2021 on the northeast side of the buffer zone.

The people that live on the Mesa deserve a halt to the unnecessary churning and degrading of the natural crust that can occur on natural sand dunes. Yes, the wind does blow, but the OHV activity, helps make the sand more airborne.

The long running and frequent arguments about the benefit to the local economy have been debunked by a recently released study by associate professor Pratish Patel at Cal Poly.

Additionally, the argument that we have done this for over 100 yrs. Is illogical.

Just because one has done something for a long time does not mean it is something that you are able to continue, makes it acceptable, or means you should continue it. Science continues to discover new things and we adjust over time. There is a reason that Oceano is the last beach, I think, in California, allowing vehicles on the beach! Why? I think that is because the other beaches have realized it is ultimately bad for business and the environment to continue to let the vehicles on the beach. The choice is obvious. The Oceano Dunes needs to stop allowing all vehicles on the beach and dunes!

Not to mention, have you seen Pier Avenue? It is an ugly, derelict area, especially when you consider it is on the California Coast! The area can be revitalized with the absence of the vehicles.

We had a glimmer of the possibilities during the pandemic! It was beautiful to be able to walk south of Pier Ave., on my local beach, without worrying about getting run over or breath in their exhaust, poisoning myself. As well as having to listen to the extra large vehicles with their extra large exhaust and noise! There was space to walk and sit on the beach without being too close or being run over. Also I have been able to get to the waves without worrying about getting run over. There has been a beautiful reduction in noise pollution, as well as trash.

I have lived in Oceano for about 20 years and I have always lamented feeling unwelcome and wanting to go to Pismo where I could be safe on the beach. Why am I not able to visit the local beach safely without feeling like I might be run over. Why am I always picking up the trash of people just having fun!

I pick up trash on the dunes and I have found a can from 1934, glass bottles that are old, and a shoe that looks like it is from the same era. As the sands shift different trash is revealed. Closer to the OHV area there is a different type of trash as illustrated in the following pictures from one quick walk around. As the sands shift they reveal different items and most likely different trash, usually some kind of plastic in the pedestrian only parts and near the OHV area more car parts, flag poles, or pieces of the possible old state Park Fencing. I found a whole bag the other day of metal fence ties left by the people that put up some part of the fence. I see the eroding old metal fence. What's the plan for cleaning that up? What is going to happen to the orange fencing as it starts to degrade? It is another environmental disaster waiting to happen, while the other is ongoing!

The Oceano Dunes needs to be protected from vehicles due to the destruction of the ecosystem. It is the correct thing to do. I think it will be for the benefit of Oceano as a whole not the few loud ones, that make a lot of noise!!

For as long as the OHV has existed Oceano and Pier Ave has been a forgotten and misused area. Everyone just wanted to get down the beach. It needs some TLC and Vehicle free development! It will help all areas of Oceano. Our future is at stake and our fragile ecosystem is on the brink. Protecting our most dear natural resource will strengthen our area in many ways!

The Parks Plan is a disaster for the fragile ecosystem of our area. Expanding Oso Flaco is a terrible idea! The "pristineness" is the attraction. Once you open it up to the destructive OHV, camping, etc. The ecosystem will suffer. Trying to survive the impacts of the oil refinery for years has been enough. I know it was part of the plan going back about 40 yrs? Luckily, now we know that would be a horrible plan! Let oso Flaco stay wild! It is a treasure as it is! Don't destroy it! 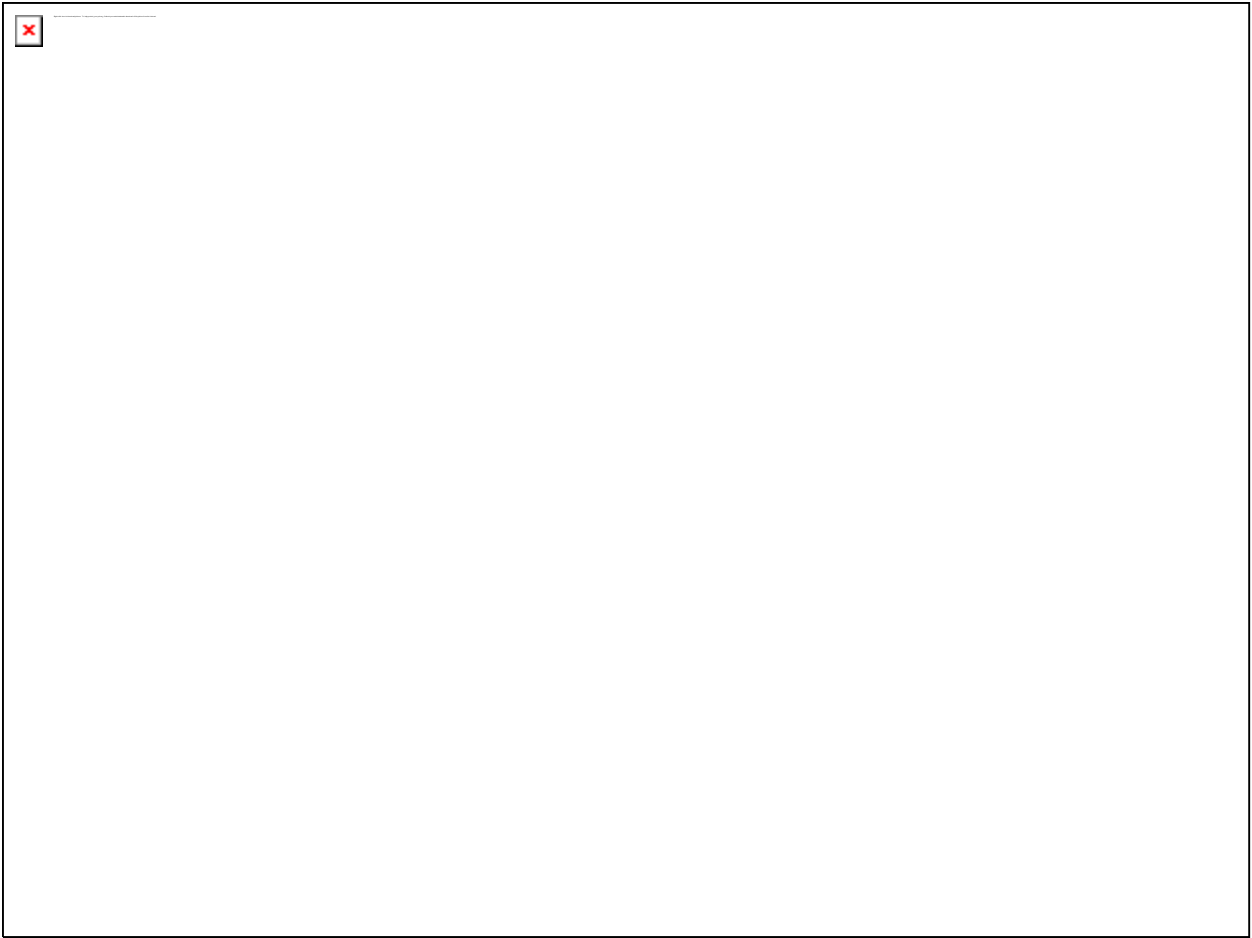

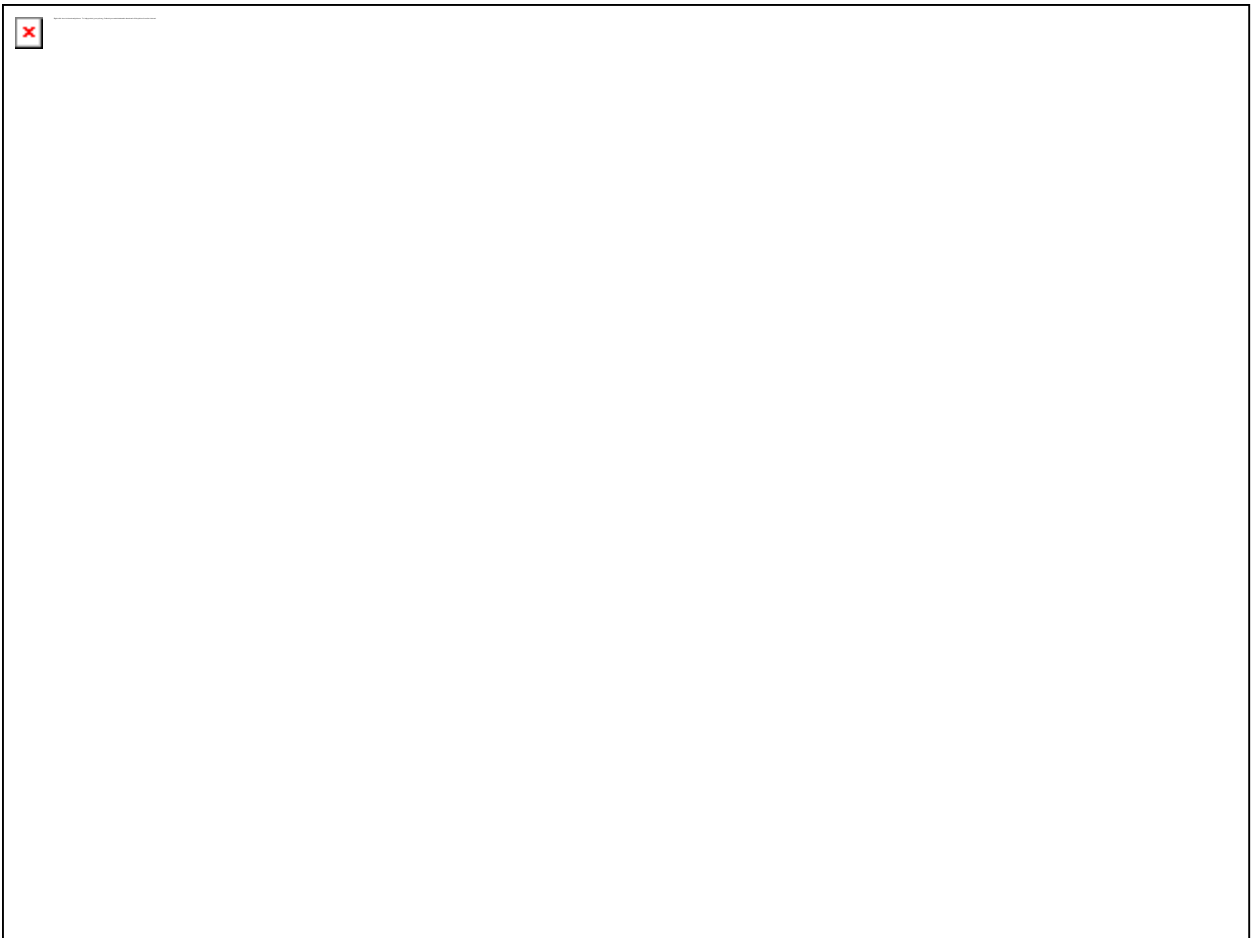

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

In our case, we have found we cannot leave windows open to let in the fresh air because of the particulates that traffic puts in the air AND we need to run a house-wide air filtering system to keep our allergies manageable. Plus we would love to be able to accessd that area for hiking, but the off-road vehicular traffic does not make that possible.

We have lived here since 1974 and have explored every mile from Pismo Beach to south of Guadalupe Dunes, including the Oso Flaco area. Some improvements have been wonderful - the boardwalks at Oso Flaco and Grover Beach, improved access at Guadalupe, closure of the Pismo beach ramp and creating a vehicle-free area north of the Grover Beach ramp.

We weren't excited when beach camping was allowed, because the traffic, exhaust and overcrowding made it difficult for those of us who walk the beach, to enjoy that part of the beach. However, it does provide an opportunity for those with RV's to enjoy the beach.

We have two concerns for the future:

1. air quality (which has improved drastically during the pandemic), and the issues that driving on the beach creates for the health and safety of those of us who live here.

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

We enthusiastically agree with the following CCC's Staff recommendations to:

1. Phase-out off-roading at the Oceano Dunes Park over five years and expanding different types of recreational uses that won't harm coastal resources at the Park. Moving car-camping to the area between Pier & Grand Avenues and eventually moving the camping further north closer to Pismo Beach is a brilliant idea. That way both the visiting public & local businesses benefit from the proximity to walk to restaurants & shopping. The statistical study done by the CalPoly professor Pratish Patel showed that during the covid related shutdown, there were no significant negative impacts to the San Luis Obispo County economy. Lodging revenue in hard-strapped Oceano actually went up!
2. Allow some hike-in/bike-in camping.
3. Implement enhanced habitat protection measures, including in the southern portion of the Park and near Oso Flaco Lake. This would help the Western Snowy Plover and Least Tern nesting areas. To Commissioners of the California Coastal Commission:

This message is for your consideration at the March 18, 2021 Hearing on the Subject.

I want to thank you in advance for taking a courageous stance concerning the control and eventual ban of OHV/dune buggy riding at the Oceano Dunes. I say "courageous," because you are undoubtedly being met with a well-organized, vociferous opposition from the OHV riding community.

I have observed that this community has been less than civil when it comes to social media discussions of the threats posed by sometimes extremely large quantities of particulate matter emanating from the dunes, particularly on dry, windy days when OHV usage is correspondingly extreme. I have also been in State Parks/APCD meetings where this lobby shows up in force and where the speaker presentations seem to be biased in favor of OHV/dune buggy rider interests. To me, it seems that their interests basically consist of total freedom to run amok over the dunes with their OHV's, with total disregard to public health as it relates to air quality. Based upon scientific studies, OHV riding on the dunes leads to an increase of airborne particulate matter by a factor of 4 to 10 times what it would be if the dunes were allowed to recover to a natural, undisturbed state. State Parks/APCD stated current goals are to reduce airborne pollution from the dunes by 50%. That is simply not good enough, as it means that tens of tons of particulate matter would still be thrown into the air, polluting large areas and a great number of people downwind of the riding areas.

Not only is air pollution greatly exacerbated by OHV riding, but tremendous trash and noise pollution problems are also exacerbated by this activity. I live about 4 miles directly east of the dunes and from here I frequently observe air that is darkened by large amounts of particulate matter, as well as the raucous noise emanating from multitudinous OHV engines. Also, I often see pictures and videos from news articles that show large amounts of trash left on the beach at Oceano Dunes. I would like to visit this area of the beach, but feel intimidated and unwelcome, as I am (obviously) not an OHV rider and would like to enjoy the beach for its natural beauty.

I have also observed that, during the COVID-19 pandemic closure of the ODSVRA, the incidence of "sandstorms" has lessened significantly. And, of course, there has been an absence of noise pollution caused by OHV riding.

Before closing, I would note that another public nuisance due to OHV riding has been notably absent during the COVID-19 pandemic closure. That nuisance, or travesty is probably a better word, is the stress placed upon first responders, hospitals, and law enforcement who are called upon to respond to OHV accidents, sometimes fatal, as well as misdemeanor and worse crime. Not to mention the absence of great amounts trash during the closure.

In summary, I would encourage the Coastal Commission to follow through with the Coastal Commission Staff findings leading to the stated positions in the most recent (65-page) Report on the ODSVRA.

Thank you for your consideration of my observations and request for follow-through of Coastal Commission Staff recommendations.

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

Now is the perfect time to start the phase-out of off-road riding on the Oceano Dunes, before the Seasonal Closures begin in March. The Oceano dunes have been closed to OHV riding for almost a year now, due to the coronavirus-related restrictions and the Shore Bird Seasonal Closures for the Western Snowy Plover nesting period. During the 2020 Seasonal Closure, combined with the riding restrictions on the dunes, the Western Snow Plovers were expanding their nesting sites into the formerly allowed dune riding areas. In fact State Parks confirmed that almost half of the plover nests were outside the fenced protected areas. Unfortunately it was discovered in early June 2020 that State Parks Staff were scuffing out nesting "scrapes" made by plovers outside the fenced protected areas and placing flagging to deter the birds from expanding their natural nesting areas. This indicates to me that the plover's protected nesting areas need to be expanded into these riding areas. Once a plover has found a good location for a nest, many will return to the same location every year. As one of the most threatened shorebirds in North America, why wouldn't you want to allow more areas for nesting to increase their numbers?

With the almost year long closure to riding on the dunes, hopefully the fore-dunes have been able to begin their slow recovery. Why undo whatever small progress has been made, by reopening these areas to riding again?

Dear California Coastal Commissioners,

Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments regarding the State Parks Public Works Proposal.

As stated on their website the Mission of CA State Parks is “To provide for the health, inspiration and education of the people of California by helping to preserve the state's extraordinary biological diversity, protecting its most valued natural and cultural resources, and creating opportunities for high-quality outdoor recreation.”

To reiterate, as stated, first and foremost in their Mission Statement is to provide health, inspiration and education of the people of California by helping to preserve the State’s extraordinary biological diversity, protecting its most valued natural and cultural resources, second is to create opportunities for high-quality outdoor recreation.”

This Battle at the Beach has been a 40 year modern day David vs. Goliath bout, fought by CA State Parks against the communities that are directly affected by the noise, pollution, dust, trash, and harassment by off-roaders when we dare attempt to recreate at “their” beach, and against the very endangered birds, amphibian, and plant species that State Parks is to preserve and protect. Instead State Parks has managed the OHV in the interest of vehicles and the revenue generated by these destructive activities over protecting the Oceano Dunes and the Oso Flaco Federally designated Environmentally Sensitive Habitat Area, (ESHA).

Recognizing this disconnect, in 2019 you asked State Parks to consider reducing the activities that were degrading this extraordinary site. Instead State Parks “doubled down” on the destruction.

That protection and preservation is threatened every day and night as ATVs, 4-wheel drive trucks, and other motorized vehicles rip the dunes, harass and crush the endangered avian, amphibian, and plant species and call it recreation, or more aptly spelled, “wreckreation”.

During the nesting season of the Western snowy plover, State Parks own mission was violated by the very division that was created to “protect and preserve the extraordinary biological diversity and protect its most valued natural and cultural resources”. With the Park closed due to CoViD-19, and with the absence of vehicles ripping up the beach along the so called “Sand Highway” those Western snowy plovers and California Least Terns had the gall to move in to the off-roaders neighborhood!!

It is further shocking to learn that State Parks employees were instructed to VIOLATE the Federal Endangered Species Act and sent employees into the Oceano Dunes to scrub out the “scrapes” the male plover makes to indicate a nesting site, install Mylar flags, and sent heavy equipment to move plovers to other areas to nest.

In the 5-year annual review of the 2019 U.S Fish & Wildlife Recovery plan which includes the entire California Coastline and Wildlife state, “poor reproductive success, resulting from human disturbance, predation, and

inclement weather.” In addition, human activities, such as walking, jogging, running pets, horseback riding, and vehicle use, are key factors in the ongoing decline in breeding sites and populations.

San Luis Obispo Air Pollution Control District has been battling for ten years with State Parks as well with regard to the repeated violations of Clean Air Act. To read that State Parks is proposing in the future to expand OHV riding area onto the Phillips 66 site and opening up a 40 acre area that State Parks spent at least 30 years and hundreds of thousands of dollars restoring, to now have it proposed as a OHV site was also disturbing to read, especially since Oso Flaco Lake is situated in an ESHA. This disingenuous plan would shift the air pollution generated by OHV from SLO County to Santa Barbara County with no thought of the environmental injustice of their action, which effectively deprive the mostly Hispanic community of Guadalupe one of their only recreational sites.

To implement the Oso Flaco portion of the PWP, State Parks also wants to end the use of this Prime Agriculture land with soils rates as class 1 and 2, end the lease with the farmer who has leased this land for over 40 years.

If this disastrous PWP is approved, State Parks will then begin the process to “pave over Paradise and put up a parking lot” and more; they will remove countless willow trees and other native plants, construct parking lots, 300 campsites, 20 cabins, sewage plant for the toilets, sinks and showers the potential 1000 people would need, in addition to the maintenance and operations infrastructure, residences for maintenance, on site management and emergency personnel, as well as flood the ESHA, with artificial lights, noise, traffic, and problems that this mini city would bring to Guadalupe area, thereby, de facto depriving the mostly Hispanic community from one of their only recreation sites.

The Guadalupe-Oceano Dunes beach belongs to all citizens of the State of CA to enjoy. It belongs to the animals and rare and endangered plants, Marsh sandwort, La Graciosa thistle, Nipomo Mesa lupine, Gambel’s watercress inhabiting the park that are protected by the state and federal Endangered Species Acts.

Regarding the other development projects of the PWP:

I support: closing Pier Avenue, and protection of the archeological sensitive native midden site, Oso Flaco Lake is beloved by the Guadalupe community, Birders, hikers, and visitors; it does need some “State Park Love” as it has been neglected for a long time; the drainage culvert needs seasonal attention as it is clogged by the late January storm, the boardwalk needs attention, boards have warped and edging is damaged, the concourse suffered damage with the recent wind and rain, and invasive species are gaining foothold once again, weed abatement needs to continue.

I do not support: any part of the Oso Flaco expansion, Phillips 66 expansion as it is now proposed, Butterfly Grove “improvements” creating parking lots and visitor amenities at the Monarch butterflies over wintering site, thereby potentially threatening the very Monarch butterflies that are hopefully soon to be added to the EPA’s proposed Endangered Species list for protection. Any improvements should be developed in consultation with the communities of Grover and Pismo Beach, as well as experts in the field, such as Xerces Society. Because any plan to Save the Monarchs must include planting and preserving their food source Milkweed. Nowhere in State Park’s plan is there any mention to plant milkweed! A perfect location could be along the borders of the 9-hole Golf Course adjacent to the existing Butterfly Grove.

I truly understand the desire and noble intention of State Parks to provide more camping and recreational activities to California citizens, but this disingenuous PWP does not adhere to their Mission: “To provide for the health, inspiration and education of the people of California by helping to preserve the state's extraordinary biological diversity, protecting its most valued natural and cultural resources, and creating opportunities for high-quality outdoor recreation.” It appears to me to be only a justification to keep their ATV OHV steady

stream of income and the PWP caters to these visitors at the expense residents who live in these degraded communities as a result of the destruction and negative impact of their OHV and degrading the Oceano Dunes.

If State Parks sincerely is interested in expanding camping along the California Coastline, there is at least one nearby area that would be an ideal location for an unique opportunity to camp on the California Coastline, and at the same time it could further the California Coast Walk Hiking trail that is designated but not completed, it's route is from the southern border of Oregon to Mexico; that local ideal site is at the Diablo Canyon site and the land that is adjacent to Montana de Oro State Beach.

Thank you again for your leadership on working to end the 40 year Battle at the Beach. Please vote NO on the CA State Parks Pismo and Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreational Area Draft Public Work Plan.

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

Your commission directed State Parks to evaluate phasing out off-roading and transitioning the park to nonmotorized recreation. But this plan prioritizes off-road recreation over protection of wildlife and doesn't address the resource-protection issues your agency raised. It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

The Public Works Plan would open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. It also proposes a massive 120-acre development near Oso Flaco Lake, including yet more off-roading, hundreds of campsites, huge parking lots, offices, residences, and other infrastructure. Leaving little room for wildlife, the development would destroy one of the best birdwatching spots in San Luis Obispo County.

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

I am a member of Santa Barbara Audubon. Our organization has become aware of the state parks plan to transform Oso Flaco state park to be an addition to the polluting Oceano Dunes SVRA proposal.

My first question is how can a state that the governor has mandated no fossil fuel vehicles to be built by 2035 present a plan such as this?

I am pleased from the 3/18/21 Coastal Commission notice that the staff recommendation is to not expand the SVRA and to leave the Oso Flaco lake area unchanged.

The Oceano Dunes SOHVRA to the north already negatively impacts the Oso Flaco Lake Natural Area. Dust and noise from OHV activities significantly undermine the visitor experience and scenic vistas.

So we certainly don't want to expand the SVRA into the Oso Flaco area as proposed in the Public Works Plan, which would only further degrade dune habitat, wildlife, the visitor experience, as well as the air quality for even more Central Coast residents further south.

Previously, it has refused to live up to promises it has already made. In September, SLO County's Air Pollution Control Board (APCD) rejected OHMVRD's second dust control plan for failing to include dune restoration as recommended by the Scientific Advisory Group, describing it as "critically deficient.

The Significance of the Oceano-Guadalupe Dunes and the Negative Environmental, Social and Economic Impacts of Vehicles Permitted on the Beach and in the Dunes

For decades the California Department of Parks and Recreation has ignored the negative and in some cases severe negative impacts of the off road vehicle traffic of an annual average of 2.2 million trips on Oceano Beach and in the Oceano dunes. These negative impacts add additional stress to the already stressed large numbers of state and federally threatened and endangered plant and animal species. Another negative impact has been the lack of protection of the Chumash sacred sites and cultural zones within the dunes for decades. Other negative impacts are economic, social and environmental consequences for the community of Oceano and surrounding communities. Ignoring, or as some assert supporting these consequences, are contrary to the department's stated mission. Protection and preservation of habitat, wildlife and cultural resources (in the dunes these would be Chumash) are mandated as higher priorities than recreation (underline mine):

State Parks' legal mandate is articulated in its mission "to provide for the health, inspiration, and education of the people of California by helping to preserve the state's extraordinary biological diversity, protecting its most valued natural and cultural resources, and creating opportunities for high-quality outdoor recreation."

The Place of the Oceano-Guadalupe Dunes

The largest California coastal dunes complex and the state's second largest dune complex, the Oceano-Guadalupe Dunes, with its wetlands, endemic flora, birds and sea and land mammals and

haulouts, was designated a National Natural Landmark in 1980. The landmark consists of two contiguous areas: 1) The Oceano – Guadalupe Dunes, which are fed by sand carried by offshore currents circulating in a littoral cell in San Luis Bay; and, 2) Point Sal, one of the last remaining pristine, rocky coastlines on the South Coast. This dune complex also maintains the highest measured dune along the entire West Coast of the U. S.

The dunes have immeasurable ecological and scenic value along with educational and scientific importance and represents one of the few coastal areas in the state still in an undisturbed condition, excluding the designated recreational areas which in some areas the California Department of State Parks has allowed complete obliteration of large swaths of flora and foredunes. Such destruction thus destroyed habitat for threatened and endangered fauna and the unknown destruction of specific threatened and endangered species of flora. There are beaches, headlands, estuaries, and lakes. Many plants are rare; a high percentage are endemic to the area. There are 22 listed state and Federal threatened or endangered plants species and 20 animal species.(see list at end of this section). At least 186 species of water and terrestrial birds have been recorded, including the Least Tern, the Peregrine Falcon and the Southern Bald Eagle. The expressed planned expansion into protected areas is contrary to the stated goals of the State Parks mission and should be prohibited.

Combined geological, meteorological and oceanographic forces shaped and maintain this land and seascape and their integrated and complex ecosystems. The geological forces include the long history of tectonic plate movement, subduction and fragmentation of plates into microplates. Two microplates, the Farallon M icroplate to the South and the Monterey

Microplate to its immediate north meet at the Arguello Canyon. The sea canyon is one of several geological land and ocean floor features caused by these forces. A combination of these features, including the coastal directional change at Point Conception from North-South to East-West, the Southern California Bight, the Channel Islands and the Santa Lucia upthrust block, in association with the meeting of several ocean currents, all contribute to the formation of the only persistent upwelling along the U. S. West Coast. The persistent upwelling provides nutrients entrained in the three mile wide pole-bound Davidson current nourishing nearshore and tidal dependent micro flora and fauna creating a portion of the foundation for the lush web of life found in the area. The meteorological conditions of the area are powered by the confluence of the meeting of two meteorological providences, the northern Oregonian and the southern Californian providences.² The demarcation line is Point Conception with northern and southern transition zones being one degree of latitude in each direction. The two oceanographic providences follow the identical outline. These features influence the area's high number of overlapping species from each of the providences leading to the high density of threatened and endangered species inhabiting the dune and beach complex.

The unique combination of semiarid and aquatic conditions with a climatic and oceanographic transition zone provides a wide variety of habitat and of associated plant and wildlife species. Coastal dunes, freshwater marshes, riparian habitat, coastal salt marsh, woodland, mudflats, beach, open water, and areas of transition between habitats provide a diversity of life uncommon to much of California.

The drainages of separate watersheds contribute to the wetland complex. The 1,880 square mile Santa Maria River drainage is one of California's largest coastal river basins. Extensive, tidally influenced wetlands sit at the river's mouth. The river's historic flood plain holds the Oso Flaco Lakes and their associated coastal wetlands. The 10 existing dune lakes are likely remainders of the freshwater bay.

About 186 species of water-associated birds have been recorded in the wetlands of the Oceano – Guadalupe Dunes Complex. Shorebirds, waterfowl, gulls, terns, pelicans, cormorants, coots, rails, loons, gerges, herons, and egrets are among those counted. Least Terns nest and raise fledglings near the Santa Maria River mouth and the Oso Flaco Lakes, Brown Pelicans roost at the shore, and Snowy Plovers inhabit the beaches. Over 100 terrestrial bird species occur among the dunes and related habitats. Among these are the endangered Peregrine Falcon and the Southern Bald Eagle.

Several plant species are found nowhere else. Two species, one aquatic and one terrestrial, reach their extreme limits with the Point Sal - Oceano – Guadalupe Dunes complex. At least eight species occurring in the dunes have been listed by the California Native Plant Society as "very rare" and "rare and endangered."

Nearly 50 species of mammals and 33 species of amphibians and reptiles inhabit the dune region. Though not in great numbers, fish are found in the lakes. There is a wide diversity of invertebrates. And the Pismo clam, subject of much recreational and scientific attention, is found along the beaches. Of the fish, the steelhead require easy entrance to Arroyo Grande Creek. State Parks without permits altered the natural course and thus flow of the creek into the ocean. The purpose of this change was for easier access to the beach for vehicles. The consequences to the steelhead are unknown.

Below are two charts detailing the numbers of threatened and endangered species in the dune complex. These species are essentially provided lip-service protection by the State Parks in this area. It is quite apparent the department in this geographical location have reversed its mandate

and prioritized recreation over protection of cultural resources and threatened an endangered species. Further proof of this is their willingness to expand off road activities into environmentally sensitive and protect areas.

Federally and State Threatened, and endangered, protected, rare species for Oceano Dunes

Human Discharge and Other Threats to the Dunes and the associated Beach Ecosystem

Agriculture

Historically, agriculture has had a significant negative impact on the dune complex, especially its wetlands. Estuaries were reduced, wetlands drained, and river and creek beds altered for farming and flood control. The extensive wetlands behind the dunes from Pismo Beach to the Santa Maria River have all but disappeared.

Entrained in the outflow of the Santa Maria River numerous agricultural chemicals pollute nearshore waters. This is a well known and documented toxic problem. This pollution finds its way into the food chain in numerous ways, one of which is its movement northward once captured in the Davidson north bound current. Tidal and wave action bring these pollutants to the beach damaging the micro flora and fauna. Such pollution also arrives from Arroyo Grande and San Luis Creeks mixing in the complex eddies of San Luis Bay. A warning sign has been posted at Oso Flaco Lake not to eat the fish because of contamination by agriculture chemicals.

Farmers have long denied that their applications of agricultural pesticides, herbicides and other sprayed chemicals drift. However, during the recent conflicts between these farmers and the newly approved cannabis farmers, the chemically dependent famers admitted, as an argument to prevent cannabis farming adjacent to their fields, pesticides from their operations would drift onto the cannabis crops. Agricultural chemicals and chemical fertilizers also are carried by the wind in the dust during plowing. The accumulation of these chemicals over the years have had an

unknown impact on all or many flora and fauna in the dunes.

Outfall Pollution

The San Luis Obispo South County water treatment plant discharges through its outfall off Arroyo Grande Creek directly into San Luis Bay nearshore. It pollutes the nearshore ocean waters with chemicals not captured. Some of these pollutants are detergents, house cleaning chemicals, medications and a variety of industrial chemicals. Such discharge also arrives through an outfall from Avila Beach. All are toxic to the ecosystems.

During heavy rains urban and agricultural pollutants are washed into the local rivers and creeks. These then are discharged into the ocean adding significant amounts of toxins to the nearshore ocean environment and beaches. During these events most surfers do not surf for a few days. Those who have ignored warnings have gotten sick with many symptoms.

The damage caused by the nation's largest underground oil spill in the dunes remains under studied. When exactly the pollutants reached the tidal habitat north of the Santa Maria River Estuary remains unknown. What and how much continues to migrate into the habitat remains unknown. Impacts for parts per billion are being ignored despite the known consequences to micro organisms.

Vehicular Pollution

Vehicular caused pollution comes in the forms of solids, liquids and gases. The primary concern of wind-blown particulate matter caused by churning and grinding of sand particles is but one problem. While its impact on humans living down wind is well documented and by itself a sufficient reason to shut down all vehicle traffic on the beach and in the dunes, there appears to

be little or no study of such impacts on the listed threatened and endangered species already stressed by others forms of pollution noted above.

Several petroleum products of unknown quantities drip from vehicles onto the beach or in the dunes. All are toxins in the ecosystems. Other toxic pollutants enter the ecosystems through exhaust. Many of the vehicles, being off road or trucks, lack street car regulations.

Not studied also is the damage to the ecosystem caused by the corrosive action of the sand to vehicle tires. Tires are known to contain benzene, mercury, styrene-butadiene, polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, and arsenic, among several others as well as heavy metals and carcinogens. Given the permitted amount of traffic (over 2,2 millions of “trips” per year) on the beach and in the dunes, the combined pollutants must be considered not within a suburban street assessment but as that of a busy urban thoroughfare or avenue.

Lastly, given the causes of climate change, one being exhaust pollution from vehicles, is it not time to regulate and stop unnecessary recreational pollution?

Light and Sound Pollution

What are the behavior changes caused by light and noise pollution of dune and beach vehicles to populations of nocturnal species? Vehicle lights on the dunes are visible from miles away at night. Depending on wind direction during the busy holidays and the summer season, the roar from the dunes sound like that of a nearby busy freeway blanketing Oceano. Given such intensities of light and noise pollution these cannot but add additional stress of the listed threatened and endangered species in the dune complex.

Other Pollutants

Human made pollutants enter the dune lakes and wetlands through the Black Canyon watershed, the Nipomo-Sury watershed, and the Santa Maria drainage into Oso Flaco lakes and eventually moving into San Luis Bay. These are lawn and garden chemicals and fertilizers and the complex of vehicular chemicals reaching the bay and dunes also through the Santa Maria River and other creeks. During heavy rains large amounts of such chemicals move into the dune lakes and the bay. After large storms it is not safe for surfing or other ocean water contact sports.

Climate Change

Given the dependency of the fragile ecosystem of the dune complex from the subtle ebbs and flows of weather conditions within the transition zone, climate change is now adding additional stress on top of the human caused pollutants damaging the ecosystems as the ebbs and flows become more extreme. The ocean's acidity, temperature increase, and ocean level rise also are adding additional stress to ocean dependent species.

Observations During Vehicle-Free Beach and Dunes

During the few months of a vehicle-free beach in 2020, many individuals contributed to a general agreement of positive observations:

- 1) Quickness of the return to natural contours of the beach from tidal zones to foredunes no longer compacted by vehicles. The return to a more normal appearance enhanced the beach experiences of individuals, families a groups.
- 2) Wildlife in numbers and species expanded along the corridors of the beach while vehicle-free. Bird species such as the black headed heron were seen in numbers as high as a dozen. Ospreys were noted at the Arroyo Creek. Coyotes were seen during the day. Also seen was flock of terns on the sand at the entryway at Pier Avenue. And noteworthy many observed for the first time at low tide large numbers of small Pismo clams in the shallow intertidal zone. There were several groups of hundreds of clams south Pier Avenue.
- 3) The enjoyment increased for beach walkers. There were large numbers of beach runners and

walkers free from the usual exhaust and noise pollution and the paranoia caused by vehicle traffic. Also, large numbers of groups enjoyed family gatherings in unprecedented numbers unassociated with holidays.

Reopening to Vehicular Traffic

Immediately upon the opening of the beach to vehicles, the natural contours and small forming mini dunes were flattened. The newly seen wildlife fled or numbers returned to rare sightings. The clams disappeared because during low tide vehicles drove over the beds. And the “pedestrians” who once were large in numbers enjoying the beach dwindled to the usual low numbers. With the

opening of the beach to traffic, the new Pismo Reserve hiking trails became over populated.

Cultural Resources

The Chumash people have inhabited this portion of their homeland for millennia. A date of 20,000 years ago has been established from radio carbon dating on Los Baros Creek. The artifacts were on display at the Guadalupe Culture and Art Center which financed the dating. At that time the ocean was 14 miles further west in the bay. It is unreasonable to believe this is the earliest date of the Chumash in the area. Another date of an artifact of the same time period was dated through its geological setting at Point Conception in the late 1970s. The oldest village datings along the coast are around 10,000 years old. At that time these were not coastal but inland sites. Depending on land slant the ocean was at its furthest distance was 7 miles to the west of today’s coastline in San Luis Bay.

For a long period of time there was a mirror image in form of an estuary behind the dunes in Oceano. It is now farmland. On the Nipomo Mesa edge are the remains of extensive Chumash village activity. The estuary, dunes and beach were part of their sacred way and a major source for food and other resources.

As far as specific comments regarding the neglect shown by State Parks regarding protection of Chumash sacred and other sites over the years and the current proposed expansion, I defer to the Northern Chumash Council comments added at the end of my comments.

Negative Economic Impacts to the Oceano Community

Oceano was designated a disadvantaged community and Opportunity Zone by Governor Brown in April 2018. For many the obvious cause is the negative impact of State Parks allowing off road activities on the beach and in the dunes that discourages normal beach recreational activities available elsewhere on county and state beaches. State Parks actively discourages pedestrian activities at Oceano’s beach by limiting direct beach access parking at the end of Pier Avenue. Also, the limited street parking is restricted; street parking is illegal until 9 AM on Pier Avenue. Just one mile to the North, State Parks actively encourages pedestrian activities at Grover Beach off Grand Avenue by providing a vast number of parking spaces. This hinderance is contrary to the State Parks statement (underline mine), “California’s state parks provide a wide array of recreational opportunities for everyone’s benefit and enjoyment.”

But limited parking is one of many negative impacts on the community of Oceano. Traffic on the beach discourages normal beach and recreational activity for families and groups. The traffic requires constant vigilance to such a degree the numbers seen north along the vehicle-free beach do not occur. This results in a narrow spectrum of beach front businesses. Current businesses cater mainly to the vehicle oriented small portion of the wider population.

At the moment of this writing four economic studies have discussed the monetary contributions and impacts of the off-road recreation to the county’s income in the last 15 years. The first study, published in 2007, was “Economic Impact of Oceano Dunes SVRA Visitors,” prepared by

William W. Hendricks, Ph.D., et al. On page 329 they conclude that the , “. . . direct annual impacts of approximately \$70 million” is the economic contribution to the county. The main reason for coming to the dunes was, “. . . the natural resources setting of the Dunes, being with others such as friends and family, and getting away from daily routines.” This study did not analyze negative economic, social or environmental impacts caused this recreational activity by the large numbers drawn to drive onto the beach and into the dunes.

This study, like the following study which is controversial, based its findings not on objective, unbiased data and methodology, but on an assumption that those surveyed provided accurate, non inflated expenditures. Those surveyed knew their responses would influence the operation of the Oceano Dunes SVRA. The larger the expenditures, the more “positive” the perception of their economic benefits. At least the above study attempted a narrow focus on individuals, families and groups directly accessing the Oceano Dunes SVRA area unlike the following study that surveyed beyond the boundaries of the Oceano Dunes SVRA.

The second study, by Oceano Dunes District-California State Parks, “Economic Impact Analysis Report 2016/17” prepared by SMG Consulting. It is another survey with the same built-in survey bias mentioned above. A second in-built bias was the considerably wider geographical boundaries of those surveyed. It included the entire Oceano Dunes District of California State Parks: campgrounds, the Monarch Butterfly Grove, Pismo Lakes, Grand Dunes, Pismo Nature Preserve, Oso Flaco Natural Area, and the new Oceano Dunes District Visitor Center. From page six of the report we read (my underline), “This project is designed to determine the economic impact of visitors to the Oceano Dunes District of State Parks on the local San Luis Obispo County.” The report concludes the economic contribution was \$243,580,919 dollars. This “economic contribution to the county’s economy” is almost 350 per cent increase above the 2007 published survey. This 70 million dollar contribution to the local economy remains suspect. Again, like the 2007 report, no negative economic, social or environmental impacts were reported.

A major impact of this particular study, unlike the 2007 study, was the creation of a false narrative of a large economic contribution to SLO County’s economic well-being by the SVRA activities. It was immediately and widely accepted by constituent groups supporting the SVRA activities as a fact that the off road activities were the cause of this high number. Naturally, the off road vehicle groups near and far quickly promoted this figure to justify their activities as a large positive contribution to the local economy. Intentional or not, by expanding the area of economic contribution this total figure became the rallying point for keeping the SVRA open and even a justification for expanding it. The political clot of the off road lobby was increased using this false narrative. Lacking a deep critical counter study, local chambers of commerce and elected officials also accepted the results.

The Grand Jury of San Luis Obispo County during its 2019 session studied the 2019 social and economic costs of the SVRA:

- 1) County jail costs \$390,000 for 306 criminal arrests of that resulted in jail time. There was a total of 399 arrests.
- 2) 260 Cal Fire responses: \$385,000.
- 3) 265 ambulance calls and 145 transports to local hospitals. Of these 14 were ‘life or death’ Code 3 transports; most of which went to Sierra Vista Trauma Center. The Combined Arroyo Grande Hospital, French Hospital and Marian Hospital admittance total for ATV accidents was 219. There were six reported accidental deaths.
- 4) Costs to the county for public defenders and processing through the D. A.’s office are

not tracked and thus unavailable.

The grand jury did not examine the medical costs experienced by the communities of the Nipomo Mesa experiencing harmful and even deadly particulate drift caused by the SVRA activities. The churning of the sand by the dune off road activities into smaller wind-carried dust particles is well known. With the destruction of the foredunes by the off roaders, the wind-carried

amounts of these particles have greatly increased causing severe lung damage and deaths to humans. Unknown are veterinarian fees for pets. Also unknown are damages to wild flora and fauna. While such damage and loss cannot be monetized, at least this must be considered as significant negative impacts into the tens of millions of dollars, if not more.

The fourth study, ECONOMIC IMPACT FROM SUSPENSION OF THE VEHICULAR USE AT

THE OCEANO DUNES SVRA by Pratish Anilkumar Patel, is recent and at this writing just entering public discussion after stories in local news. The 4 reasons for this study were twofold: a criticism of the methodology of State Parks' 2016/7 survey and an interest in the economic impact of the closure of the beach and dunes to vehicles because of the pandemic. After criticizing the methodology of the 2018 published survey to measure economic impact, Patel uses established analytical economic impact tools to measure as closely as possible the actual economic impact of the closure to the beach and dunes traffic. His final conclusion stated, "Using

a well understood and popular DiD approach, I find that vehicle suspension had no material impact on the County's economy."

Additionally, he shows little interest exists among visitors to Pismo Beach and Avila in the SVRA. This is another indication that only a small slice of beach oriented tourists are off road dune enthusiasts. Green tourism can easily fill in the economic loss of these off roaders while at the same time end the destructive economic, social, and environmental impacts caused by driving on the beach and in the dunes.

The Covid-19 pandemic has shown that when the beach and dunes were closed to vehicle traffic, the South County economy did not change. Elected officials and chamber of commerce witnessed this lack of change and appear at this moment studying green tourism opportunities as a more robust and positive economic prospect with less economic, social and economic harm to Oceano and the surrounding communities and the environment. The above recent study, though new, has added to this conversation.

The local history of impeded economic development caused by the off road activities is available through studying the respective time periods of Pismo Beach and Grover Beach when open and later closed to off road beach activities. Economic development of both cities increased upon closing their beaches to off road vehicle activities.

THE NORTHERN CHUMASH TRIBAL COUNCIL COMMENTS

Summary February 15, 2021

Any vehicle identified in CVC section 38010 and 38012 as an OHV must be halted and eliminated from being on the Sacred Chumash Dunes complex in Oceano California. We all must look to the future generations, working diligently together to preserve and protect Mother Earth, so our children and grandchildren can play in the pristine wonders of the Dunes, and they can honor our decisions to protect and love the great Oceano Sand Dunes and not letting the Dunes be destroyed by OHV vehicles.

The State Parks PWP planning draft document lacks California Native American perspectives, indigenous spiritual understandings, indigenous religious comprehensions, and respect for the human beings that have lived on the Dunes for all time, a Chumash cathedral of life. The PWP draft document lacks respect

for Chumash Heritage and Culture.

The Northern Chumash Tribal Council (NCTC) has spoken to the preservation of the Dunes for over 50 years, asking and pleading for actions that stop the destruction of the Chumash Culture, and Sacred Sites. In our opinion little to nothing has been done to protect Sacred Chumash Sites, what we have is minimal fencing around visible Chumash Sites, fences that out-of-towners drive over thinking it funny to destroy Chumash Sacred Sites, trucks with “Proud Boys” flags driving over our Sacred Sites with no care for the importance of Chumash Culture.

Who cares about the Chumash Culture and Sacred Sites? When you read this PWP draft document it concludes that there will be no significant impact to the Chumash Culture. NCTC finds this to be completely lacking in the truth and environmental justice. The PWP planning document will take you on a “Cookie Cutter” explanation of what drives their evaluations and twisted data and misleading archaeological institutional dominate non-indigenous understandings. In the end, compiling the “Cookie Cutter” institutional explanations for the white wash determination of no impacts.

This document, a boiler plate determination of archaeologist and institutional dogma, should open everyone’s eyes to the white washing of the Chumash Culture. Why don’t we all wake up, see that the Chumash lived for over 10,000 years on the sacred Dunes sands, lived, raised children, buried the elders, looked to the heavens of majesty, opened our souls to the Sun rises and Sun sets. As stewards of the care of the diamond that is the great Dunes and landscape of wonder, all points connected, walking, collecting, hunting, fishing, and living in the Oneness of All Things.

The Chumash today hold no rights of any kind through the dominate society to practice and experience our past, with honor for our ancestors on the Dunes. The Dunes must be honored for all, environmental justice for all.

Conclusion

Thrivability. Inclusivity. Equitability. Diversity. Accessibility. Sustainability. Collaboration. Innovation.

These are words heard clearly from our Commissioners, the Governor, State leaders, Native Nations, stakeholders, lessees, grantees, Commission staff, and the people of California, in every region and community, statewide. These empowering words echo as constant reminders of what the Commission has the responsibility to do, what it has the opportunity to change, and the role it has as a governmental leader and visionary change maker in the State of California.

State Parks has become addicted to the OHV revenues, State Parks is putting aside local residents opposition to OHV, State Parks has minimized California Native American Indigenous Peoples concerns about the long term damages already caused by OHV use, and our concerns for preserving our Sacred Lands for future generations. State Parks addiction to the OHV revenues has blinded their judgement and vision for the future. The OHV use must stop. State Parks addiction to the OHV revenues must be terminated, only then will the Dunes Thrive once again.

NCTC FEIR Comments:

8.1 Regulatory Setting

In the first and second sentence, the word “cultural” is used in a way that diminishes the importance, therefore what should be used is “Tribal Cultural Resources”.

8.1.1 California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)

Second sentence CEQA recognizes “Tribal Cultural Resources”; for far too long archaeologist have tried to take over our stories, the Indigenous Peoples stories. We do not need archaeologist to tell our story, we are not archaeological resources.

8.1.3.1 Unique Archaeological Resources

Once again California Indigenous Peoples are not “archaeological resources”; such a lack of “social and environmental injustices”.

Paragraph 5. Indigenous Cultural Resources do not have to be preserved in place, the word “disturbed” is often used to describe a Indigenous Sacred Place and then often considered

“insignificant”, which leads to the direct impact on the Sacred area or complete destruction, because an archaeologist could not collect data because of its designation. There goes another part of our Indigenous Heritage and Culture.

8.1.3.2 Assembly Bill 52 – Tribal Cultural Resources

“Assembly Bill 52 (Gatto, 2014). Section 1 of the bill states the legislature’s intent as follows:

“In recognition of California Native American tribal sovereignty and the unique relationship of California local governments and public agencies with California Native American tribal governments, and respecting the interests and roles of project proponents, it is the intent of the Legislature, in enacting this act, to accomplish all of the following: (1) Recognize that California Native American prehistoric, historic, archaeological, cultural, and sacred places are essential elements in tribal cultural traditions, heritages, and identities. (2) Establish a new category of resources in the California Environmental Quality Act called “tribal cultural resources” that considers the tribal cultural values in addition to the scientific and archaeological values when determining impacts and mitigation. (3) Establish examples of mitigation measures for tribal cultural resources that uphold the existing mitigation preference for historical and archaeological resources of preservation in place, if feasible. (4) Recognize that California Native American tribes may have expertise with regard to their tribal history and practices, which concern the tribal cultural resources with which they are traditionally and culturally affiliated. Because the California Environmental Quality Act calls for a sufficient degree of analysis, tribal knowledge about the land and tribal cultural resources at issue should be included in environmental assessments for projects that may have a significant impact on those resources. (5) In recognition of their governmental status, establish a meaningful consultation process between California Native American tribal governments and lead agencies, respecting the interests and roles of all California Native American tribes and project proponents, and the level of required confidentiality concerning tribal cultural resources, at the earliest possible point in the California Environmental Quality Act environmental review process, so that tribal cultural resources can be identified, and culturally appropriate mitigation and mitigation monitoring programs can be considered by the decision making body of the lead agency. (6) Recognize the unique history of California Native American tribes and uphold existing rights of all California Native American tribes to participate in, and contribute their knowledge to, the environmental review process pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (Division 13 (commencing with § 21000) of the Public Resources Code).”

“The Public Resources Code now states that “[a] project with an effect that may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a tribal cultural resource is a project that may have a significant effect on the environment.” Pub. Res. Code § 21084.2.”

“To determine whether a project may have such an effect, the Public Resources Code requires a lead agency to consult with any California Native American tribe that requests consultation and is traditionally and culturally affiliated with the geographic area of a proposed project. That consultation must take place prior to the release of a negative declaration, mitigated negative declaration, or environmental impact report for a project. Pub. Res. Code § 21080.3.1.”

State Parks has not consulted one on one with NCTC on this current FEIR, having informational meetings is not tribal consultation, this is a very important project that will impact California Native American Chumash Cultural Resources.

8.1.6 State Parks Native American Consultation Policy and Implementation

Sentence 2. Prior to implementing projects or policies that may result in the impacts on Native American sites within the State Parks System, State Parks will actively consult with local Native

California Indian groups...” this has not occurred, NCTC has had no current meaningful consultations with State Parks regarding this FEIR PWP.

8.1.9 State Parks Project Evaluation Process and BMPs for Cultural Resources

First Paragraph, Third sentence, “both a State Archaeologist and State Historian to review all projects” this statement states to Indigenous Peoples that archaeologist and historians understand our history better than Indigenous Peoples do, and in most cases their institutional backgrounds nourishes their dominant perspectives, NCTC would like to see a Tribal Liaison involved in all projects, almost all agencies in California today have Tribal Liaisons mandated by the State to assist in Indigenous perspectives understandings and communications, not institutional based book understandings only.

8.1.9. Second Paragraph, second sentence. Although State Parks thinks that they and their staff understand the Indigenous Perspectives through their educational back grounds and experience, this is not true. Indigenous Perspectives are unique to the First Peoples and therefore must be included in the brainstorming and planning of all projects that have the potential to disturb/ impact California Indigenous Peoples resources.

8.1.9 Third Paragraph. “Project components have been designed, and will continue to be designed, to avoid and minimize impacts to known significant archaeological resources and tribal

cultural resources, if identified.” The PWP design footprint is in one big California Indigenous Sacred Chumash Site, how you can pick the sites that are visible to avoid or minimize disturbance, when the whole area, the whole project footprint is a Chumash Sacred Site and Sacred Landscape.

Sentence 7 “In mobile dune environments, it is common to locate newly revealed archaeological resources in shifting sands” There are hundreds of hidden sacred middens that are the maker for our encampments, and lodges, the whole PWP project footprint is one big Chumash Sacred Site. State Parks claims that they know of 80 registered Chumash Sacred Site with half the park surveyed, we the Chumash of this Land say there are hundreds, and the whole area is a Sacred Living Landscape.

Sentence 8 “(Condition-2) Archaeological and Native American Monitoring” Monitoring is not mitigation under CEQA.

8.1.9.1 C-I: AVOIDANCE Sentence 2 “If documented archaeological resources”, our Tribal Cultural Resources are not archaeological resources, there may be things that are archaeological resources, but anything connected to pre-historic Tribal Culture are “Tribal Cultural Resources”. The meaning of avoidance for NCTC is the absence of any and all human intrusions that may have possible impacts to the Tribal Cultural Resources, which would be identified by the Tribal Governments review.

8.1.9.2 C-2: ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND NATIVE AMERICAN MONITORING

Californian Native American Indigenous monitoring must be included in any and all project that have a Tribal Culture aspect, from Sacred Landscape to Villages, not just when someone classifies Sacred soils as disturbed, to all Indigenous Peoples disturbed and undisturbed are the same thing, containing the essences of our Ancestors lives. California Indigenous Peoples have equal standing with any and all anthropologist and archaeologist.

8.2 Environmental Setting

Second Paragraph. “There are at least 48 identified and recorded cultural resources within the PWP planning area.” The entire PWP planning area is one Chumash Sacred Site and Living Landscape, and area where thousands of Chumash lived for over 10,000 years. State Parks is

minimizing the importance of this Sacred Landscape by only emphasizing 48 cultural resource sites, the Chumash live throughout the entire Dunes habitat with ever changing landscape building Chumash life ways one on top of another. Geological sand dune movements over the last 10,000 years are phenomenal.

8.2.1.1 Archaeological Resources

California Indigenous Peoples Tribal Cultural Resources are not archaeological resources and should always be respected in the proper context. Archaeology has been trying to take our stories over for several hundred years, and Indigenous Peoples are not an archaeological resource.

8.2.2 Native American Consultation and Coordination

As can be seen from looking at the Table 8.1 Summary of PWP Consultation Efforts, the last effort that State Parks made to have meaningful consultation was May 15, 2018. As NCTC has stated previously in this document, no meaningful consultation has occurred, one or two meetings do not qualify as meaningful consultation, Indigenous comments and opinions must be included into the process.

Meetings with a tribe that include other tribes, agencies, or the public are not a substitute for mandatory consultation with that individual tribe. "Tribes are not interchangeable, and consultation with one tribe does [not] relieve State Parks of its obligation to consult with any other tribe that may be a consulting party under CEQA."

8.2.2.1 Tribal Cultural Resources

Sentence 1 "Consultation conducted in support of the PWP EIR has not resulted in the identification of tribal cultural resources within or immediately adjacent to the PWP planning area." NCTC finds this statement to be misleading at best, NCTC informed State Parks of the importance of the Chumash Sacred Landscape which encompasses the project area. Additionally the Phillips 66 proposed developments area is one huge Chumash Site, NCTC personally worked on the recent survey conducted by Phillips 66 for the expansion for the oil railroad project. Over 75% of the Phillips 66 site is a Chumash registered Sacred Site, and State Parks is proposing to destroy our Sacred Sites with OHV tracks and camp sites, not social or environmental justice in our understanding, nor has there been meaningful ongoing consultation.

8.3.3 Impacts and Mitigation

Sentence 1, "Implementation of the PWP is not expected to result in a substantial adverse change in the significance of an archaeological resources as defined in Section 15064.5." This statement is not true, misleading, and makes conclusions leaving out substantial additional Tribal Cultural Resources data and information currently available through a simple records search. Phillips 66 Tribal Cultural Resources data was not included in this report, vital information. Additionally, once again Indigenous Peoples are not archaeological resources.

8.3.3.1 Ongoing Park Operations and Regular Maintenance Activities

The ongoing park operation fall short of offering protections to Chumash Sacred Site.

8.3.3.3 & 4. Oso Flaco Improvement Project (Initial and Future)

NCTC does not support the the additional use of the area. It would degrade the Chumash Sacred Landscape.

8.3.3.5 Park Corporation Yard Improvement Project

Any and all proposed disturbance to native soils in or near Tribal Cultural Resources must include meaningful tribal consultation prior to finalization of work to be performed.

8.3.3.6 Oceano Campground Infrastructure Improvement Project

Native American monitoring is not mitigation under CEQA. Meaningful consultation must be included prior to any finalization of plans for proposed project in this area.

8.3.3.7 Pier and Grand Avenue Entrances & Lifeguard Towers Project

Meaningful consultation with Tribal Governments must occur.

8.3.3.9 Butterfly Grove Public Access Project

Meaningful consultation with Tribal Governments must occur prior to finalization of proposed plan.

8.3.3.10 Pismo State Beach Boardwalk Project

Native American monitoring is not mitigation under CEQA. Meaningful consultation with all affected Tribal Governments must occur prior to finalization of plans.

8.3.3.11 Phillips 66/Southern Entrance Project

Tribal Cultural Resources were mapped and registered during the tribal cultural resources surveys done about 3 years ago, during the Phillips 66 rail extension for the transportation of additional crude oil to the Phillips 66 plant. Many sites were defined and recorded. If State Parks had been having ongoing meaningful consultations with NCTC they would have known this, Applied EarthWorks performed the on the ground survey. Phillips 66 site and proposed OHV road to the dunes is covered with sensitive species and many Chumash registered Sacred Sites.

Impact 8-2

The potential for human remains in our Indigenous Perspectives is extremely high, looking at the large area of Chumash Sacred Landscape, therefore it is NCTC position that the cumulative impact for human remains is very high, and must be a class 1 impact.

Impact 8-3

Consultation with Tribal Governments back in May of 2018 is not meaningful or ongoing consultation. In NCTC comments in the May of 2018, NCTC did strongly identify Tribal Cultural Resources as Chumash Sacred Landscapes, therefore the cumulative effect on these Sacred sites requires extensive tribal meaningful consultation, and must be mitigated.

8.4 Cumulative Effects

Californian Native American Chumash Peoples lands stretch from Malibu to Ragged Point, inland to the Carrizo Plains. Today we the Chumash People have been able to protect less than 1% of our 100% stewardship of these lands, every small piece of impacts to our Sacred Sites from project like the PWP is a major loss, when you add up all the proposed impacts from our Indigenous Peoples perspectives we see great cumulative effects. Any loss is the loss of a priceless resource, not renewable. NCTC finds State Parks determination of “not expected to result in significant cumulative effects” to be false and misleading from our Indigenous Perspectives.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this FEIR for the Oceano Dunes proposed PWP projects.

Northern Chumash Tribal Council

The area's complex topography is the result of the meeting place of three major tectonic plates. The Farallon Plate, moving eastward, was subducting beneath the North American Plate. As the Pacific Plate moved northwest, the subduction eventually ceased in our area. Remnants of the Farallon Plate, microplates, were captured by the Pacific Plate beneath the North American Plate;

continental margins of the North American Plate became part of the Pacific Plate. That is, all land and sea floor west of the San Andreas Fault that was part of the North American Plate, became part of the Pacific Plate. The microplates ride the Pacific plate (see for details:

As the Pacific Plate continued its northwest migration subducting under Alaska, it rotated the

Arguello Microplate, also known as the Transverse block, forming the Southern California Bite. It is bordered on its eastern side by the Transverse Range, on the West side by the Channel Islands with the Ventura-Santa Barbara Basin in the middle, and to its north, the Arguello Canyon. The rotation ended with the capture of Baja that now presses against this block causing folding and uplift.

The Monterey Microplate from the Farallon Plate, beneath western Santa Barbara County and San Luis Obispo County, is bordered on the East by the San Andreas Fault, on the West by the Santa Lucia Bank and the Santa Lucia Escarpment and on the South boundary by the Arguello Microplate. This boundary's exact location is within the Arguello Canyon, a significant conduit directing the West Coast's only persistent upwelling that provide nutrients for the nearshore and micro beach flora and fauna. The Monterey Microplate is deformed with a subsistence slant from the coastline to the Santa Lucia Bank. The Santa Lucia Bank is tilted with the uptrust on its eastern most side. Running nearshore is the Hosgri Fault, another huge crack in this microplate. The persistent nutrient-rich upwelling flows up the Arguello Canyon, enriching the Santa Lucia Bank, the Arguello Canyon and coastal waters from Point Sal to Point Conception. Here, in a transition zone blending upwelling nutrients with warm water from the South and cold water from the North, a unique, complex interaction of species and natural phenomena occurs. Feeding the web of life along the eastern rim of the Pacific Basin, the nutrients spread through and beyond both the dune tidal area, feeding planktonic communities, plants of the kelp forests, and various life stages of marine flora and fauna.

The northern portion of the transition zone between Southern California warm waters and Northern California cold waters is defined as beginning at Point Conception and extending 2 degrees north to 36 degree north latitude (20 miles south of Point Sur at Mill Creek Canyon). The proposed sanctuary expansions cover this area north to Santa Rosa Creek. The area is the meeting place of the Oregonian Temperate Eastern Pacific and the Californian Subtropical American Eastern Pacific climates and waters. The region is dependent upon as well as a cause of the complex interaction of the southward moving California current, the warmer northward moving subcurrent, the near-shore northward moving seasonal Davidson Current, and the upwelling. The dynamics are not fully understood, and systematic, ecosystem-based research is needed.

The Oregonian weather pattern brings strong northwesterly winds during the spring, a cool marine layer with much fog during the summer, and generally strong wet storms during the winter. The warm, clear autumn months are generally dominated by the California Subtropical climate, which also tempers colder winter weather from the North.

The California Current system flows from the North Pacific and is driven by planetary rotation and large scale winds. Offshore circulation is dominated by this current for most of the annual cycle. The current flows along the surface and near surface at the edge of the continental shelf. It is generally composed of low-temperature, low-saline, subarctic waters. The current's position and intensity varies with season and latitude; several coastal currents oppose it.

At the inner edge of this system is the California Undercurrent, characterized by warm saline water. The undercurrent ranges to within 100 kilometers of the coast; it runs from Baja California to Washington State. The undercurrent surfaces in the winter along the coast of Central California.

I've read about the plan of State Parks, which I usually consider on the right side of environmental protection, having plans to allow off road vehicles on the dunes. I ridden such vehicles on dunes along the Oregon coast, and after witnessing the damage, I definitely don't want to see that in California.

Please don't approve the Public Works Plan for Oceano Dunes State Park. It would not protect precious coastal resources there or endangered species, especially the marvelous snowy plover, and it doesn't satisfy the requirements of our 1972 Coastal Act.

Having directed State Parks to evaluate phasing out off road vehicles so as to move the park to excluding recreation with motorized vehicles, you must be upset with the proposed plan. It gives priority to motorized recreational vehicles off-road over protection of wildlife and fails to handle resource-protection issues that your agency has raised. Moreover, the plan doesn't even evaluate phase-out of such vehicles over a five-year time period, nor even the somewhat questionable alternative of limits for beach driving or camping proposed by your staff.

The plan fails to adequately discuss the solutions to specific issues that your agency had requested them to address: the crossing at Arroyo Grande Creek, any plans for endangered shorebird nests, and destructive off-road rides during the night, nor vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan suggests only inadequate interim measures, vaguely promising future studies with uncertain outcomes.

Specifically, the Public Works Plan would damagingly open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. The Coastal Commission's purpose is to "**protect and enhance**" the California coast. The California State Park at the Oceano Dunes operates in willful disregard to this mandate.

I am a retired local physician and my wife is a retired marine biologist who helped direct the Channel Islands National Park development. We live near the Oceano Dunes and we both believe deeply in scientific knowledge. We have wanted to believe that reasonable people would come to understand, through basic observation and scientific knowledge, the destructive nature of OHV activity on the dunes. Scientific investigation has clearly demonstrated how OHV activity disrupts the natural dunes formations. It is now clear that this activity results in loss of wildlife, environmental degradation, air pollution and medical illness. More recently this activity is now shown to contribute directly, through small particles (PM 10), to serious lung and heart disease. As our local community has grown, we are now at a juncture that may represent the beginning of a community medical crisis. There is a significant increase in respiratory illness in our local area. Pulmonologists are now recommending respiratory patients move from our area because of the air pollution and dust conditions. We are aware that Coastal Commission staff are recommending a 5 year phase out of OHV activity. I would suggest shortening this time period because of increasing medical illness.

It is clear that the OHV activity cannot continue on the Oceano Dunes. California is currently at the forefront in environmental concerns and leads the world in highlighting the correct path. If we are to be serious and resolute in these concerns, then there is no real choice for the Coastal Commission.

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

To: Members Of The California Coastal Commission,

We've reviewed California State Parks' latest Public Works Plan/EIR for the Oceano Dunes Park and Oso Flaco Lake wildlife area. It is abundantly clear that their planners have ignored the directions of the California Coastal Commission, agreements with the San Luis Obispo County APCD, and the input of citizens who live in communities bordering the Oceano Dunes.

For years local residents have asked that State Parks address the undeniable problems brought on by OHVs on the dunes:

- The destruction of the dunes and native vegetation.
- The ruin of habitats for endangered species and the loss of precious wildlife.
- The air/dust pollution that carries into the lungs of men, women and children living in the vicinity of the dunes.
- The local streets laden with sand stripped from the beaches, and never replaced to protect our shore. Rather, it is eventually hauled off to a nearby landfill.
- The ongoing OHV roar of revving engine noise ... an offensive noise pollution that carries miles beyond the park itself.
- The never-ending hordes of OHVs that act as if they own the beaches and the rest of us be damned.
- The ATVs, pickup trucks and RVs that, regardless of park rangers, have a complete disregard for speed restrictions ... endangering families seeking to have safe, peaceful outings ... putting their lives at risk as they walk from the dunes to the ocean.
- The vehicle exhaust that families must breathe as vehicles pass by.
- The gun violence that has occurred when off-roaders gather and "party" (sometimes at non-permitted events).
- The on-site OHV accidents and personal injuries/deaths that have become a way of life for aggressive, reckless riders.

State Parks response to "fixing" the Oceano Dunes unit is spelled out in the PWP:

- Turning the pristine Oso Flaco location into a **Magic Mountain** for thrill-seeking riders on ATVs, dune buggies, dirt bikes, pickup trucks ... all with destructive, heavy-duty tires and deep, open treads.
- Even greater acreage for OHVs to roam and tear up the landscape.
- Opening the door to an even greater negative impact on native vegetation, wildlife habitats and the species themselves.
- No limits on the quantity, types or sizes of OHVs.

- The introduction of on-site facilities to make riders' activities more electrifying and convenient than ever ... a “kids’ track”, “pro tracks”, cabins, concessions ... thereby attracting even larger throngs of vehicles more frequently.
- A “Special Event” arena (e.g., the potential return of the out-of-control “Huckfest” ... *“the world’s largest offroad jumping competition”*).
- No real plans to significantly reduce air/dust pollution ... just vague statements implying that somehow it will work out sometime in the distant future.
- No new scientific studies or EIRs regarding the impact of the new Oso Flaco sites and its activities on the air/dust pollution that the winds will drive into local communities.
- Suggestions for yet another entrance via the Phillips 66 property, which will put thousands of vehicles and enormous RVs on the one-lane, coastal Highway 1 and feeder roads, bringing far more air pollution, noise and traffic jams even closer to local citizens and businesses.

• **No mention of any area of peace and tranquility at the park.**

The PWP states that State Parks' new plan is bringing *“an acceptable balance between motorized recreation and protection of natural resources.”* That’s an outrageously misleading statement. Where does the “balance” truly address the needs of the environment and local communities? State Parks' scale of “balance” is brazenly weighted in favor of “motorized recreation.” The environment and local communities are a minor or non-existing part of the plan’s equation!

In reality, the State Park’s PWP planners are rewarding those who bring havoc to the dunes, all in the name of revenue generated for State Parks.

All of the above is why we welcome your recent statement/press release - “California Coastal Commission to Consider New Activities at Oceano Dunes.” You obviously recognize that State Parks has disdain for the stated views and directions of the California Coastal Commission, and that you will not allow them to continue on their destructive path.

We wholeheartedly endorse your staff’s recommendation to protect the Oceano Dunes and Oso Flaco Lake from the incursion of OHVs, and to *“reimagine the Park operating in a more environmentally sustainable way.”* We look forward to your March 18th hearing.

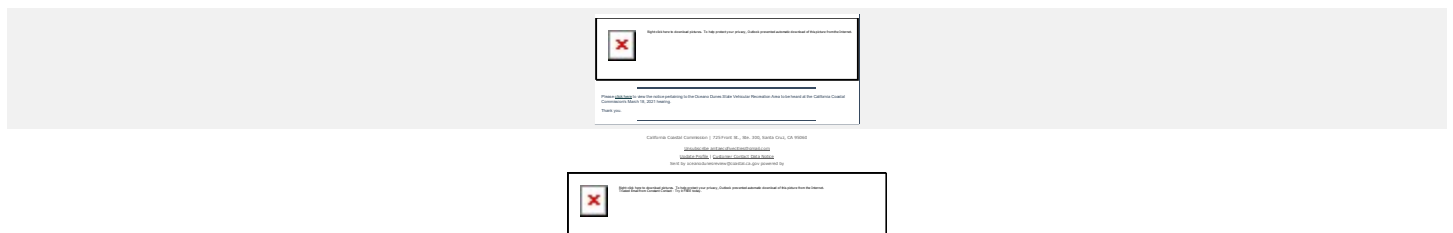

To: Members Of The California Coastal Commission ...

We've read newspaper articles (*see attached*) wherein California State Parks' is discussing its intent to acquire the Phillips 66 Refinery property in Arroyo Grande, and using the acreage to increase the size of it's Oceano Dunes off-road riding park.

This idea is completely at odds with reducing the environmental impact of off-road riding on the Oceano Dunes, and on the neighboring Nipomo Mesa community.

There is a significant amount of extremely hazardous chemicals on the surface and under the surface of the Phillips 66 refinery property. The extent of proper soil remediation would necessitate a remediation project similar to that which Chevron is now undertaking on the old Union Oil property known as the Guadalupe Restoration Project (*see attached file*). That site is just north of the Santa Maria River and west of Highway 1 in San Luis Obispo County. The Guadalupe Restoration site is approximately 10 miles south of the Phillips 66 refinery property.

The goal of the Guadalupe Restoration Project is to return native plants to the entire acreage. This also should be the goal of any remediation and clean-up of the entire Phillips 66 refinery property in Arroyo Grande.

Please do not allow the California State Park's Oceano Dunes unit to acquire the Phillips 66 refinery property. California State Parks have demonstrated over the years that they cannot be trusted to adhere to the mission of the California Coastal Commission.

Oceano Dunes plan would turn refinery land into a massive new off-road playground

California State Parks has announced plans for a massive recreational development on the Phillips 66 Santa Maria oil refinery property, even though the oil company will not [cease operations at the plant near Arroyo Grande for another two years](#).

Those plans, proposed by State Parks in its Public Works Plan and subsequent environmental impact report, hinge on whether the agency buys or leases the property from Phillips 66.

Additionally, State Parks would have to wait until the property has been remediated from the environmental damage caused by the oil refinery before it could begin construction, according to the Public Works Plan.

State Parks says it wants to develop on the land to “support recreational activities” for the nearby Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area. Should State Parks acquire the Phillips 66 property, about 1,800 acres would be added to the nearly 3,500 acres the park currently encompasses.

Bernardo Fallas, a spokesperson for Phillips 66, told The Tribune that the energy company is “aware of the California State Parks conceptual plan” and it “has no comment on the plan at this time.”

History of Phillips 66 Santa Maria refinery

Located off Highway 1 just north of Willow Road, the Santa Maria Refinery [was built in 1955](#) by the Union Oil Co. of California. Through the years, the energy company was bought by Tosco Corp., Phillips Petroleum and eventually ConocoPhillips — from which Phillips 66 was formed in 2011.

On average, the facility produces about 44,500 barrels of crude oil per day and employs 140 people.

The entire property encompasses 1,780 acres, but only 200 acres are used for the refinery and other Phillips 66 operations. The remaining 89% of the property is used to graze cattle and for nature preservation purposes, according to the oil company.

The crude oil produced at the Santa Maria Refinery is transported north by a 200-mile pipeline to a refining facility in Rodeo on the banks of the San Pablo Bay.

In August 2020, the [refinery announced plans to end](#) its 66-year run in 2023 because its sister refinery in Rodeo is set to transition into the world's largest renewable fuels plant, according to the company.

Phillips 66 Santa Maria Refinery next to Highway 1 on the Nipomo mesa can be seen from Oceano Dunes SRVA California Department of Parks and Recreation.

State Parks plans for massive development on Phillips 66 property

State Parks is the first to come forward with comprehensive plans to transform the coastal property into something new.

Included in the agency's roughly 900-page plan and report released at the end of December 2020 were ideas for extensive new facilities on the property.

They include:

- An entrance kiosk, visitor center and concessions for groceries and general merchandise;
- Six acres of paved parking spaces and 25 acres of staging areas for off-highway vehicles that would include picnic tables and stoves as well as concessions for OHV equipment rentals;
- An OHV track for youth, a 33-acre professionals-only track for motocross, ATV practice and quarter midget racing, and a separate area for a 4-by-4 obstacle course, plus a training area with an OHV safety and basic training center;
- An environmental education center that could include a campfire center, outdoor classroom and amphitheater; and
- An RV sanitation station with space for two three-hole dump stations.

Additionally, State Parks wants to build 225 RV campsites, up to 20 cabins, 50 drive-in tent sites, 25 hike-in or bike-in sites and a minimum of six group campsites. Another 15 acres would be allotted for equestrian use and up to 75 more campsites.

A new office building for park operations could be added to the property, along with storage facilities, residences for park staff and a weapons range for peace officer training.

OHV and walking trails would connect the Phillips 66 site to the southern part of the Oceano Dunes park and beach area, according to the plan.

Land set aside for conservation in decades-old agreement

A portion of the Phillips 66 site — 630 acres — was set aside in January 1999 for preservation, according to the Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes Preserve Management Program released in 2000.

An agreement between State Parks and Tosco Corp., the oil company acquired by Phillips 66 in 2001, stated that 630 acres along the western part of the property would not be developed, to maintain “the sensitive ecosystem that exists on the property.”

That agreement lasted five years. But Fallas told The Tribune via email that the oil company “continues to honor” the 1999 preservation agreement.

State Parks considers the property part of the Oceano Dunes SVRA, though it says no OHV riding is allowed there.

An OHV access trail currently runs through that portion of the property from the Phillips 66 refinery site to the dunes. State Parks notes in its plan that the trail “could be enhanced to provide access to the open riding area on the beach.”

Kara Woodruff, a former program director for The Nature Conservancy and the author of the 2000 Guadalupe-Nipomo Dunes Preserve Management Program, said State Parks’ plan to develop the Phillips 66 site would destroy an ecologically important area.

“It is odd that we’re talking about now running a southern entrance (to the dunes) through there,” which would undermine efforts by The Nature Conservancy to protect the land, Woodruff said.

Oil leak leads to groundwater contamination

State Parks points out in its Public Works Plan that the groundwater under the Santa Maria Refinery is contaminated with a light non-aqueous phase liquid, or LNAPL, which can be a liquid such as petroleum oil. The contaminated groundwater plume extends about 3.7 acres, at a depth of 50 to 70 feet underground, according to the plan.

It is unknown when the LNAPL leak began, but a line carrying the fluid was last “visually inspected in 2006” and the leak was stopped when the line was replaced in April 2016, according to [a letter sent to Phillips 66](#) by the Central Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board in 2019.

Though the leak does not pose any immediate human health threats, it could have significant impacts on development in the area.

“Chemicals could travel upwards through the soil and volatilize inside new buildings, which could result in an indoor human health hazard,” the plan states.

In addition, if groundwater is withdrawn from the area under the Phillips 66 site, “such withdrawal could either directly encounter contaminants or indirectly cause contaminants in the

plume to migrate, thereby expanding the size of the plume and potentially resulting in additional contaminated groundwater,” according to the plan.

Remediation efforts by Phillips 66 are currently underway, and the company had extracted nearly 3,000 gallons of the LNAPL as of January, according to Stantec Consulting Services, a company contracted by Phillips 66 to research and plan required environmental remediation on the property.

Matthew Keeling, executive officer of the Central Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board, told The Tribune in an email that the amount of LNAPL remaining is “currently uncertain and subject to interpretation.”

Once the recovery system is built — likely in the third quarter of 2021 — it’s expected to take less than five years to remove the LNAPL from the water “to the maximum extent practicable,” Keeling said.

Not mentioned in State Parks’ plan is additional environmental damage on the site, including an area contaminated by piles of unused petroleum coke — a solid material that is a byproduct of petroleum refining — and another area contaminated after being used as a dumpsite for chemicals and building waste.

The former dumpsite, which measures 0.8 acres, contains 13,000 cubic yards of oily soil that was first discovered in the 1990s and still exists there today. Contaminants identified in the soil include total petroleum hydrocarbons and two types of asbestos: amosite and chrysotile, among other things, according to [analyses by Stantec](#).

The former waste site was tentatively set to be excavated in the summer of 2020, but work has been delayed until summer 2021 or 2022 pending permits from the San Luis Obispo County Planning and Building and Environmental Health departments, Keeling wrote to The Tribune.

The area with [10,320 cubic yards of unused petroleum coke](#) had elevated levels of nickel and vanadium that exceeded the California Environmental Protection Agency limits, according to Stantec. Both substances can have negative health impacts to humans and the environment.

The unused petroleum coke piles were removed from the site, according to Keeling, though additional piles remain on the property because the refinery is currently in operation.

When asked about the remediation efforts, Adrienne Ursino, Phillips 66 public affairs director, said the company “has no comment at this time.”

Before State Parks were to continue with any of its plans for the Phillips 66 site, the plan notes that it would conduct extensive health risk assessments and hydraulic analysis to determine whether it can safely build and extract water from the area.

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

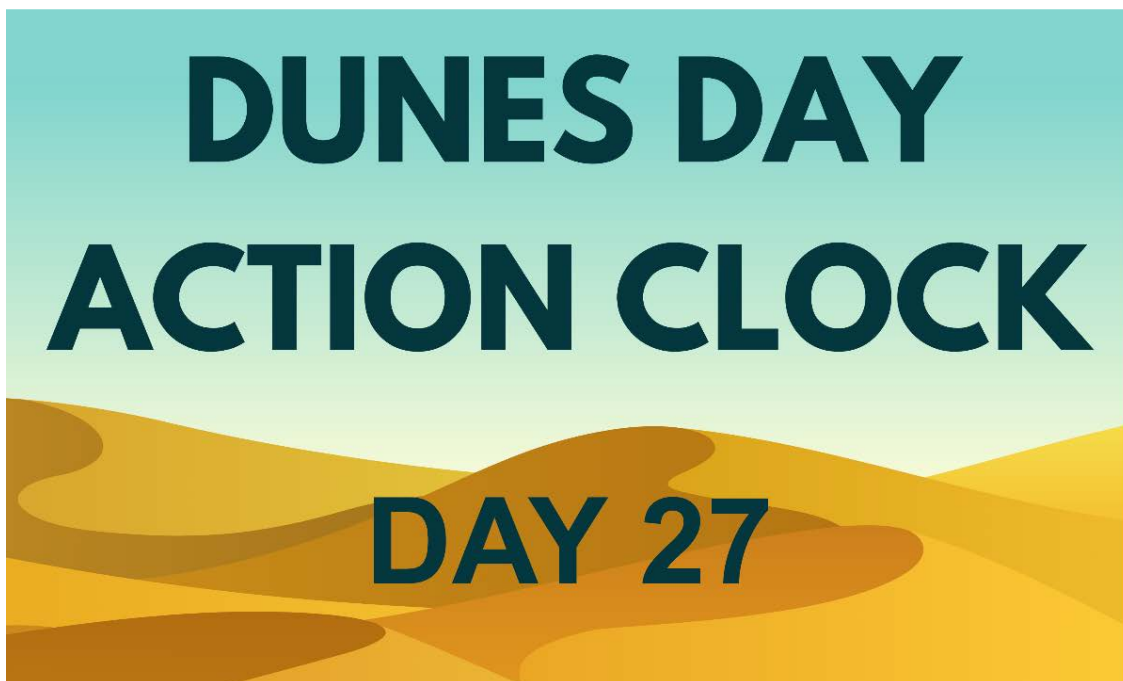

Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

The Public Works Plan would open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. It also proposes a massive 120-acre development near Oso Flaco Lake, including yet more off-roading, hundreds of campsites, huge parking lots, offices, residences, and other infrastructure. Leaving little room for wildlife, the development would destroy one of the best birdwatching spots in San Luis Obispo County.

It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

The Public Works Plan would open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. Subject: Please oppose restricting or ending powersports access to Oceano Dunes SVRA

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

The Public Works Plan would open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. It also proposes a massive 120-acre development near Oso Flaco Lake, including yet more off-roading, hundreds of campsites, huge parking lots, offices, residences, and other infrastructure. Leaving little room for wildlife, the development would destroy one of the best birdwatching spots in San Luis Obispo County.

Your commission directed State Parks to evaluate phasing out off-roading and transitioning the park to nonmotorized recreation. But this plan prioritizes off-road recreation over protection of wildlife and doesn't address the resource-protection issues your agency raised. It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

The Public Works Plan would open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. It also proposes a massive 120-acre development near Oso Flaco Lake, including yet more off-roading, hundreds of campsites, huge parking lots, offices, residences, and other infrastructure. Leaving little room for wildlife, the development would destroy one of the best birdwatching spots in San Luis Obispo County.

It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

I support Coastal Commission Staff's recommendations for the Oceano Dune Coastal Development Permit 4-82-300. California State Parks and Recreation has not put forth a serious attempt to address the Commission's past guidance and is proposing new impacts to the Coastal Zone.

I particularly do not support either of the Oso Flaco Lake Campground and Public Access Project concepts. Oso Flaco Lake is not a good location for a campground and ORV access to the dunes and this was realized years ago when the prior access was eliminated.

Part of the big attraction for Oso Flaco Lake is its beauty and quiet nature. Adding a campground and dune access will greatly increase traffic and noise levels. The proposed work plan would destroy the area's attraction with traffic and noise for those not using ORVs and greatly affect nature viewing. It should be noted that Oso Flaco Lake is the #1 "hotspot" location in San Luis Obispo County for Cornell's eBird project, in both bird species observed and checklists submitted. Bird watching accounts for a part of the daily visits by tourists seeking the quiet nature of this location. Together, there is already significant amount of tourism at Oso Flaco Lake. The Pismo State Beach and Pismo Dunes SVRA General Development Plan (1975) noted that "*The conflict with this secondary access is that it bisects the Oso Flaco natural area, and the sight and sound of vehicles in this area will not be compatible with the adjacent passive recreational uses.*" This is still true today. Off-road vehicle noise will only diminish the current visitor experience and the location's value as a wildlife refuge.

As State Parks knows, there are both Federal and State listed species and California Species of Special Concern found around the Oso Flaco Lake area. Adverse effects to these species will be ongoing and cannot be mitigated. These impacts will cease when off-road vehicles no longer destroy their habitats.

The heavy amount of agricultural traffic makes Oso Flaco Road a poor location for a campground and dune access. Oso Flaco Road is already dangerous and increasing the average daily trips will only make the situation worse.

Another reason the Oso Flaco Road campground and access should be abandoned is the adverse effect it will have on agricultural land. The California Coastal Commission has stated that "The Coastal Act includes provisions to protect and enhance coastal resources and land uses, including agriculture. Strong protection of agricultural lands and the agricultural economy in the coastal zone is mandated by the Coastal Act. These protections include requiring that prime agricultural lands be maintained in agricultural production, restricting the conversion of agricultural lands to other land uses, conserving agricultural soils, and promoting long-term agricultural productivity."

If anything, this proposal does not meet the State plan to reduce green-house gas production in California. Oso Flaco area improvements will lead to increased green-house gas production.

The Work Plan also calls for relocating the maintenance access road to the beach to bypass the Oceano Campground. It is not clear what equipment or how much equipment is driven through the campground, what is considered “early morning”, or why this is no longer acceptable. Two alternatives that will not adversely affect riparian wetland and dune habitats (both environmentally sensitive habitats (ESHA) in the Coastal Zone) are (1) the existing route and (2) Hwy 1 and then Pier or Grand Avenue to beach (~1-mile distance). Using those options at different times of day would avoid impacting environmentally sensitive habitats.

The Commission must support Staff’s recommendations.

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

Oceano Dunes federally threatened Western Snowy Plover population and its nine other state and federally threatened and endangered plants and animals and numerous migratory birds and other need all the help they can get. I would never consider driving my buggy in an area where there were nesting animals. Unfortunately there are many people who do not feel the same and have no problem disturbing wildlife, destroying nests and outright killing animals with their vehicles. ORV access is not a "right" and should only be allowed where it is prudent to do so. Changes to existing regulations must be based on real science and not driven by short sighted special interest groups. We need more vehicle free areas to safeguard wildlife. Therefore I am requesting that you reject the Public Works Plan for Oceano Dunes State Park. This plan doesn't adequately protect coastal resources or endangered species, and it doesn't comply with the Coastal Act.

Our vulnerable shorebirds and turtles need protection and Americans expect our National Park Service to be more responsive to our threatened species than to off road vehicle owners. The birds and turtles that build their nests on beaches cannot nest anywhere else - they need safe and secure beach nest sites. Their only chance for survival is to keep buffers in effect and keep ORVs off the beaches. Without the buffers Piping Plover nests, eggs, and chicks will be destroyed by being run over, or will be driven away by the chronic disturbance. Sea turtle other beach-nesting wildlife are also crushed beneath these vehicles and driven off by the disturbance.

Where off road vehicles are allowed, it is very important to not extend the ORV routes or extend spring and fall closures on any area of the beaches that could affect sea turtles or birds. Animals move around and therefore it is imperative that the beaches be checked for bird and turtle nests, eggs and chicks before the beaches open in the morning. For the safety of the wildlife this needs to be done prior to ORV traffic being allowed on the beach. Night driving should be strictly prohibited as this causes significant disturbance to turtles trying to nest on the beach and will keep them from coming onto shore. Those that have come onshore risk being injured or killed.

Please consider my comments. I truly believe that the majority of Americans would prefer our National Seashores free of vehicle traffic and full of scenic beauty and wildlife. Please reject this plan and impose your own permit conditions and a phase-out of off-roading, as recommended by your staff.

It also proposes a massive 120-acre development near Oso Flaco Lake, including yet more off-roading, hundreds of campsites, huge parking lots, offices, residences, and other infrastructure. Leaving little room for wildlife, the development would destroy one of the best birdwatching spots in San Luis Obispo County.

Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

Your commission directed State Parks to evaluate phasing out off-roading and transitioning the park to nonmotorized recreation. But this plan prioritizes off-road recreation over protection of wildlife and doesn't address the resource-protection issues your agency raised. It utterly fails to evaluate the five-year off-road vehicle phase-out, limited beach driving and camping alternative proposed by your staff.

The plan punts on solutions to specific issues you requested be addressed, such as Arroyo Grande Creek crossing, endangered shorebird nesting plans, nighttime off-road riding, and vehicle and camping use limits. Instead, the plan offers inadequate interim measures and promises future studies and plans with uncertain outcomes.

The Public Works Plan would open more sensitive dune habitat to off-road vehicles and slash protected breeding areas for threatened snowy plovers and least terns by one-third. It also proposes a massive 120-acre development near Oso Flaco Lake, including yet more off-roading, hundreds of campsites, huge parking lots, offices, residences, and other infrastructure. Leaving little room for wildlife, the development would destroy one of the best birdwatching spots in San Luis Obispo County.

Dear District Supervisor Kahn,

As an outdoor enthusiast who enjoys powersport activities, I'm concerned about the proposed Public Works Plan (PWP) for Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area (ODSVRA) which was released on December 30, 2020. I am opposed to several provisions in the proposed PWP.

As drafted, the proposed PWP supports reducing and ultimately even eliminating off-highway vehicle recreation at ODSVRA. Within the PWP, the most concerning proposals are:

- Proposes an immediate 42 percent reduction of OHV day-use limits, from the current 1,720 vehicles/day, down to 1,000/day (p. 78 of the PWP).
- Proposes ending OHV/ATV rental concessions when their current contracts expire in 2022. Phasing out of OHV rental concessions would require visitors to bring in their own OHVs and would impact low- and middle-income individuals. (p. 79 of the PWP).
- Proposes an Environmental Impact Review (EIR) alternative to consider phase-out of OHV recreation over five years (see Volume 3, Chapter 2, Alternatives).
- Proposes to conduct an "independently peer-reviewed carrying capacity study" to determine appropriate limits for beach camping and day-use by OHVs and street-legal vehicles and update use limits accordingly, which could further limit access/use by OHV in the SVRA (p. 76 of the PWP).

The off-highway vehicle community strongly advocates for responsible use of our natural resources and ensuring powersports enthusiasts are well-trained in the proper use of their vehicles to foster an enjoyable and safe riding environment. Many people cannot afford to purchase their own vehicles and eliminating the rental option is something that would not only kill local jobs, but would also disenfranchise lower income individuals who rely on the ability to rent powersports equipment. The Oceano Dunes SVRA has been a significant part of many individuals' lives in the outdoor recreation community. It has been a place for people worldwide to gather and enjoy powersport use and beach camping. The proposed PWP could end access to the park for many Californians, hundreds of thousands of individuals, and their families who have been recreating the dunes for decades. At a time when so many people have turned to outdoor recreation as a form of stress release, we should be looking at ways to expand recreation opportunities, not eliminate them.

Please strike these provisions from the PWP and preserve access for a diverse group of recreation interests at Oceano Dunes SVRA.

Leaving little room for wildlife, the development would destroy one of the best birdwatching spots in San Luis Obispo County.
