The Monterey Peninsula Water Management District (MPWMD), using the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments' (AMBAG) population and economic growth forecast, estimates that by 2045 we will need 786 acre-feet/yr more water than we use today. The expansion of Pure Water Monterey will provide an additional 2,250 acre-feet/yr, without Cal Am's desal.

This letter is written to urge the approval of the desalination plant to complete the Monterey Water Supply Project. This project is necessary to enable our community to fulfil its commitment to reduce the pumping of the Carmel River to the legal amount thereby providing for fish spawning, renewal of the conditions needed to protect endangered species, watershed vibrancy as nature intended.

The plant provides the only water supply not **impacted by drought** to feed the Seaside Basin Aquifer at a time it requires sustained recharge to remain a healthy, reliable water supply system for the people of the water community. That community benefits by finally being able to provide homes for workers who now travel twice daily to and from the Peninsula by automobile. The carbon emissions of those workers is replaced by people who have a better quality of life by eliminating commutes. When the goals of mitigating prolonged drought, aquifer sustainability, reduction of carbon emissions and housing needs all are satisfied by one project I urge you to approve that project.

I grew up in Monterey and have lived here all of my life. Dear Sirs,

I was born in Monterey in 1958. I remember the droughts of the 1970s that led to the creation of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District.

The mission of MPWMD was to find and develop new sources of water for the Monterey Peninsula. However, for over thirty years the only tangible thing they accomplished was to develop and maintain a bureaucratic system of "water credits" which amounted to a permanent water shortage codified into law.

Finally, one election year the mayors of the Peninsula cities placed an advisory measure on the ballot asking the citizens whether MPWMD should be dissolved. The vote was two-to-one in favor of dissolution. This result was dutifully forwarded to the California State Legislature. In response, MPWMD hired a lobbyist in Sacramento – using OUR MONEY – to convince the Legislature to ignore the desires of the people and to leave MPWMD intact.

The only good thing that came out of this was that MPWMD finally seemed to get the message, and they promptly started sending out newsletters and glossy mailers touting how much progress they were (finally) making toward developing a new source of water. This continued for a few months and then the mailers stopped and MPWMD went back to doing whatever it was they actually did.

Then a few years ago MPWMD started making all kinds of noises about wanting to buy Cal-Am. I don't know what makes them think that they can do a better job than Cal-Am does since for four decades MPWMD has never provided us with ONE DROP of water.

Lately I've received numerous unsolicited emails from MPWMD touting a new waterreclamation project they have apparently been developing. I watched their video presentation on the subject, hoping to gain some kind of overview of how the system will work, where it will be located, how the water that it reclaims will be fed into the distribution system, etc., but there is no such information, only glowing testimonials by various local officials about how this vaporware system – which won't be completed for another TWO YEARS – will supposedly solve our water shortage. Meanwhile, MPWMD continues to vitriolically attack Cal-Am's proposed desalination plant.

Given this history, to say that I have zero confidence in MPWMD is to put it mildly. For the last forty years, Cal-Am has dutifully done its best to provide us with water while MPWMD has rationed that water and denigrated Cal-Am at every opportunity.

Cal-Am has decades of experience and expertise in providing water and in maintaining the infrastructure that distributes it. MPWMD has no such experience in either of those fields. If MPWMD wishes to pursue their project, I have no objection (particularly since I'm being forced to pay for it anyway) and if they can actually complete a functioning reclamation system I will welcome it. In the meantime, kindly approve Cal-Am's desalination permit so that we may finally have a solution to our problem.

Dear Coastal Commissioners, Executive Director John Ainsworth and staff,

My name is Juli Hofmann and I am a Marina resident. I strongly oppose the CalAm Slant Well Desalination Project that is seeking permit approval sited on the CEMEX property.

This project had numerous critical flaws that the Coastal Commissioners and staff reviewed during the first application hearing in September of 2020. It appears that the only significant changes to the application is the smaller footprint of the proposed project.

None of the fatal flaws of damages to environmentally sensitive habitat and impacts to Environmental Justice have been adequately addressed by simply offering a scaled down project. I understand that the issues of water rights, ballooning project costs and viability as the best regional water solution for the area are not under the CCC review, but each of these matters adds to the burden that will ultimately affect everyone on the peninsula.

The phased development path offered by CalAm does not fix any of the negative impacts of this development—it only spreads the disruption and damages over a longer time frame. None of the conditions recommended by the staff will fix the unavoidable degradation of the Environmentally Sensitive Habitat—the project is simply not consistent with Coastal Commission doctrine. In the current proposed location there will be irreversible habitat and open space loss to future generations.

CalAm has shown a dismal ethical record for water management with decades of over-draft in the Carmel River and then the Seaside aquifer. Approving this application gives a for profit water company a path to privatize local water sources from Carmel Valley to Castroville. Pure Water Monterey has diligently provided incontestable data on how the current expansion project can provide water to the Peninsula for many years. Yet the CC staff recommendation appears to only review the project applicants figures as the only facts. Who has the most profit incentive to promote a flawed project, and, deliberately devalue contradictory evidence? My comments, shown in bold and underline, are as follows:

1. As described in the Staff Report, shown below, Marina residents bears all the adverse impacts of this proposed project and receives no benefit whatsoever. The proposed mitigation measures suggested by Cal Am are totally inadequate. The Commission needs to apply its adopted Environmental Justice policies more effective and creates special conditions for this project that truly provide Environmental Justice to Marina residents. "The Project's well field and some of its pipelines would be sited within the City of Marina, which is not in Cal-Am's service area but would be burdened with many of the adverse coastal resource impacts discussed herein. Marina is already disproportionately affected by other industrial uses, including a regional landfill, regional composting facility, regional sewage plant, a municipal airport, a contaminated site listed on the U.S. EPA's national priorities list, and the former CEMEX sand mining facility, which has ceased its operations. This Project affects several environmental justice communities in the region. While the Project provides a benefit to the Monterey Peninsula by providing a secure water source and helps to avoid future over-withdrawal of water from Carmel River, it will disproportionately burden low-income ratepayers in the service area and residents in the City of Marina. Cal-Am proposed a number of measures to help offset costs to low-income ratepayers and provide community benefits for the City of Marina."

2. "Cal-Am has also modified its proposed wells so they will extend as far as feasible seaward and thereby reduce any potential impacts to the City's and District's groundwater resources. Several recommended Special Conditions also address these concerns – for example, Special Condition 11 would require Cal-Am to construct its wells to extend as far seaward as feasible to reduce their potential groundwater impacts." "Special Condition 11: Groundwater Protection. The Applicant shall install the Project's slant wells to extend at least 1,000 feet seaward of the proposed well head locations and shall screen the wells so they extract from the 180-Foot Aquifer as far seaward as is feasible and without penetrating the 400-Foot Aquifer. Any proposed changes to this approved installation must be reported to the Executive Director for a determination as to whether those changes would require an amendment to this permit." This Special Condition 11 appears unrealistic since the existing

test well experienced failures and could not extend beyond 900 feet during its construction several years ago. Assuming that Cal Am can extend the new slant wells at least 1,000 feet seaward, it does not make any financial sense since Cal Am stated that it will relocate these slant wells in 20 to 25 years which is the end of life of these slant wells. And Cal Am does not know where the location of the replacement slant wells is and what environmental and financial impacts of the new slant wells are. Cal Am did not propose and the Staff Report did not discuss the construction of new slant well heads beyond the 2040 or 2050 sea-level rise like the CCC approved Doheny desalination plant. Why not constructing the new slant wells similar to the Doheny project so that Cal Am does not have to address the relocation of its proposed slant wells and environmental impacts? The Coastal Commission can require Cal Am to construct a new slant well intake system similar to the Doheny intake system that the Commission approved a few months ago.

3. "Special Condition 12 would require Cal-Am to develop a comprehensive monitoring and reporting program to detect any potential groundwater impacts its Project would cause and identify measures it would implement before those impacts occur." But It appears there is no special condition and details that require the Applicant to continuously monitor and measure the actual percentage of potable water that Cal Am pumps from the slant wells and needs to be returned to users of Monterey County Water Resources Zone 2 and cannot be delivered to consumers of Cal Am. And there is no condition that requires Cal Am to post these potable water percentage or content measurements on its website for public review.

4. "The Project will have adverse effects on ESHA. Its construction and operation would directly or indirectly result in several dozen acres of both temporary and permanent impacts to terrestrial ESHA, most of it consisting of relatively rare coastal dune habitat. However, even with these Special Conditions, the Project would not be fully consistent with several Coastal Act and LCP policies that do not allow the type of disturbance and loss of ESHA that would result from Cal-Am's Project." Again, Marina residents suffered environmental injustice when the California Coastal Commission does not apply relevant Coastal Act and LCP policies on this project.

5. The Staff Report did not address the existing slant test well that was constructed near existing shore line several years ago and will be used for this project. This slant well is expected to fail before other new slant wells or in-operable before the 20-year time frame due to erosion and sea-level rise.

6. How can the public review and provide comments of various monitoring data that are required and described in the Special Conditions? Will the Commission require California American Water Company to post all monitoring data and information on its website and on the Commission website so that the public can review?

7. How can the public review documents, biological surveys, habitat monitoring and mitigation plans, construction plans, mitigation measures and other materials as specified in the project conditions and Special Conditions and provide comments? I do hope you will consider my comments seriously and thoroughly.

They do this now despite in 2019 having recommended denial of approval for the same project on the basis of a number of well-researched and considered reasons. None of those reasons for the staff's disapproval have changed. The staff's about-face is stunning and disappointing.

The only change to their plan by California American Water is the offer to downsize the project to produce only 4.8 afy of desal water. Even this smaller desal is not needed or wanted by the Monterey Peninsula. Nor has there been an EIR done to support this change. What's more, when suggested to them prior to their original EIR, Cal Am stated a 4.8 afy desal plant is <u>not</u> a viable option for them, lacking economy of scale. Now it's OK? At least they'd get their big foot in the door, then expand later.

<u>Adequate drought-safe water for the Monterey Peninsula for at least the next</u> <u>30 years will be available as soon as the expansion of Pure Water Monterey is</u> <u>completed, a 2-year project.</u> It is a proven, viable source of new water! It has been delayed due to Cal Am's 2 years of refusal to sign a water purchase agreement, otherwise, 2,750 afy additional water would already be on its way to the Seaside Basin. TO THE CALIFORNIA COASTAL COMMISSION:

Apparently being under pressure from the governor of the state to approve desal projects, the CCC staff has recommended the Commission to give "approval with conditions" to the California American Water proposed desal project. They do this now despite in 2019 having recommended denial of approval for the same project on the basis of a number of well-researched and considered reasons. None of those reasons for the staff's disapproval have changed. The staff's about-face is stunning and disappointing.

The only change to their plan by California American Water is the offer to downsize the project to produce only 4.8 afy of desal water. Even this smaller desal is not needed or wanted by the Monterey Peninsula. Nor has there been an EIR done to support this change. What's more, when suggested to them prior to their original EIR, Cal Am stated a 4.8 afy desal plant is <u>not</u> a viable option for them, lacking economy of scale. Now it's OK? At least they'd get their big foot in the door, then expand later.

<u>Adequate drought-safe water for the Monterey Peninsula for at least the next</u> <u>30 years will be available as soon as the expansion of Pure Water Monterey is</u> <u>completed, a 2-year project.</u> It is a proven, viable source of new water! It has been delayed due to Cal Am's 2 years of refusal to sign a water purchase agreement, otherwise, 2,750 afy additional water would already be on its way to the Seaside Basin. I am unconvinced that a more traditional proven desal method isn't possible, i.e. two big pipes in the middle of the Monterey Bay. I accept the certainty that some marine life will be damaged both by the intake and the salty effluent, but the concept would minimize the environmental damage. Yes, it will be more expensive than rainwater. Yes, it will require energy use, also expensive, which should be supplied with solar and wind power, using those sources when available to store water for use when the sun and wind are inadequate to keep up.

I recognize that the legally protected status of the Monterey Bay is a factor, but a balance of other environmental concerns must be weighed and considered in changing the rules regarding the bay.

I would like to believe that drought is not a problem that could worsen. I have done everything possible to minimize the risk of a fire destroying my home, but my minimal landscaping is very dry. If we wish to continue to live in a region with little rain next to an ocean, we need to prepare for the future.

Dear Coastal Commission:

I **strongly oppose** the proposed Cal Am desal plant. For more than two decades I have been, and remain, a customer of Cal Am on the Monterey Peninsula.

Because the already well-developed and environmentally much superior, expansion of Pure Water Monterey (PWM) would supply the Peninsula with fully adequate water resources for the next 30 years, the **Cal Am desal project is not needed**. PWM, having now operated for more than two years, has proved itself a highly effective supplement to Carmel River water resources, and in particular has finally made it possible to meet the State's requirement that Cal Am cease over-drafting the Carmel river, which Cal Am had violated for a quarter century. Further, well-vetted studies by relevant local public agencies show clearly that adding the PWM expansion will more than adequately provide a drought-proof water supply for as much as three future decades or more.

Moreover, the **costs to ratepayers** for desalinated water from Cal Am's proposed system are **vastly higher than either current water rates**, or than estimated rates for water from PWM and its expansion. Thus not only is Cal Am's desal not needed, but it **inevitably and in perpetuity imposes on ratepayers excessive costs for** an essential commodity.

Approval of the Cal Am project would, by requiring Cal Am profits to be incorporated in water prices, **lock future ratepayers into unnecessary charges significantly above the cost of delivering water itself**. The CPUC's condition that ratepayers' bills include a profit allowance currently amounts to about 30% of a Cal Am customer's bill; that's an **addition of about 43% to the raw water-delivery cost**. A **similar proportion of future customers' bills can be expected for** *already* much more expensive **desal water**. In contrast the **PWM water alternative would not include a CPUC-driven profit allowance** because the PWM facility is and would be publicly owned. The **net reduction in PWM water relative to Cal Am desalinated water thus is simply enormous**.

Moreover, much of the very high basic cost of desalination itself results from the extremely high energy demands of desal systems; this exceptionally large energy use has significant adverse consequences for efforts to control both climate change and pollution levels. The available PWM option is highly superior environmentally because it greatly reduces energy consumption and pollution relative to desal as a water

Objective analysis of the current water supply/demand situation on the Monterey Peninsula, based on many considerations outlined above and in other communications, demonstrates again what previous California Coastal Commission staff reports have concluded: the **Cal Am desalination proposal should be denied**; it is **unambiguously inferior to the available PWM alternative.**

Indeed, the peculiar support in local media on behalf of the hospitality industry and a variety of other business interests, for the Cal Am desal project is extraordinarily difficult to understand; the much higher costs, complexities, almost certain delays and demonstrable lack of need for the project appear remarkably irrational. That support defies business logic and is not credible as a basis for favoring the project.

The Cal Am project clearly would have a highly negative impact on the future welfare of the people of the Monterey Peninsula, whose interests are your responsibility as a public agency to protect.

Dear Mr. Ainsworth and Commissioners:

I write as the former Director of the Association of Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) Energy Watch program; a program that reduced GHG levels, effectively meeting state targets, across the AMBAG region and supported climate action planning and sustainability for all 21 jurisdictions from 2006 – 2020. Our offices were located in Marina for many years and I had the pleasure of being a part of the Marina community. As an anecdote, I hosted staff from the California Coastal Commission to make presentations to staff from our 21 jurisdictions, in the old airport building of the former Fort Ord airport, now a part of the City of Marina.

As a professional working for regional government with state government, I know how important and how critical it is to the State of California that we effectively implement social justice in our climate action motivated decisions. I have had the pleasure of hearing staff from the California Coastal Commission speak at state conferences on this very topic. I ask you now, Mr. Ainsworth and Commissioners to put action behind your words, behind the Governor's words, and value social justice for the citizens of Marina, and for all of the citizens of Marina Coast Water District whose water source will be put at risk. Value their social justice, not the abstract concept of social justice, but social justice the in the moment now where you can make an actionable difference for social justice with your vote now to **defer any action** on the CDP permit until the pending adjudications of supply and demand and water rights are completed.

For the California Coastal Commission to rush ahead with a decision, using an "override" determination requested by CalAm, instead of following its normal course of a considered evaluation, following a defined protocol, is such a public slap in the face to social justice for the citizens of Marina and for the citizens who get their water from Marina Coast Water

District. It will be a defining decision and set the legacy for identifying what value, if any, the California Coastal Commission really puts on social justice. Please treat the citizens with the respect they deserve and defer this decision until the issues that would significantly impact a sound decision in this CDP Application have been resolved. There is no need for you to rush this decision through at this time.

There are at least nine unresolved or incomplete regulatory issues as identified by Monterey Peninsula's Water Management District's General Manager, David J. Stolt, in a letter submitted to California Coastal Commission, dated November 1, 2022, that need resolving prior to the California Coastal Commission taking a vote on this CDP Application.

How, when there are nine major regulatory issues or permit issues not in compliance, can the California Coastal Commissioners look the citizens of Marina in the eye and say "We are truly doing everything we can to look out for your very real social justice issues?" How can the Commission say it is behaving in an equitable way when it has rushed to a vote and trampled the social justice of the citizens in this rush to vote on incomplete information, not caring for them enough to wait until all the regulatory issues are resolved and in place?

The California Coastal Commission cannot say it values social justice unless it defers its decisions until these nine very critical regulatory issues are resolved. (These issues are listed in the November 1, 2022, Monterey Peninsula's Water Management District letter authored by David Stolt, General Manager submitted to the California Coastal Commission.)

- CalAm's Monterey County permits were revoked subject to additional environmental review. This issue is in Superior Court and many months from resolution;
- CalAm's exclusive negotiating agreement with Monterey One for use of their outfall has expired, an additional party has expressed desire to also utilize this outfall, and no agreement is in place with either party;
- The State Lands Commission has not agreed to a lease for the project's intake well;
- On October 3, 2022 the State Water Board removed CalAm's Intended Use Plan for state revolving loan funding of \$279.2 million due to a "lack of progress";
- CalAm has not applied for an amendment to its Water Distribution System permit through the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District;
- Marina Coast Water District contends that CalAm has no rights to take water from the CEMEX site and water extractions there are limited by an agreement with CEMEX's predecessor, Lonestar Cement. That case is currently being heard in Superior Court.
- The CPUC has on-going proceedings regarding supply and demand for additional water supplies that are expected to continue into March 2023;
- The CPUC has previously approved only a 6.4 MGD plant and specifically discouraged the 4.8MGD plant as little to no ratepayer savings, less water, no contingency, increased environmental impacts, as so on. CalAm would likely need to revisit its CPUC permission

to build the plant to pursue a phased approach;

• The CPUC's cost cap for the project is \$279.1 million. To expend funds that CalAm intends to recover from taxpayers beyond the capital cost cap, CalAm must file a petition to modify the CPUC decision. The Construction Cost Index since the last estimate would imply costs for the project far in excess of the CPUC cost cap.

The citizens of Marina and the citizens who get their water from Marina Coast Water District deserve social justice considerations from the California Coastal Commission. Please defer action on this CDP Application #9-20-0603, until these many unresolved regulatory issues have been resolved. Please give the citizens of Marina a fair process complete with the full protocols and levels of evaluation associated with most other California Coastal Commission decisions. Thank you for your consideration.

No one really knows what the Cal Am project might cost today because they are not telling us. But back in May 2013, when they first released the proposed "design-build agreement" to contractors, they said the following: "In the event the Construction Date occurs subsequent to Oct. 1, 2015, due solely to a delay caused by the owner, the Construction Component Price portion of the Fixed Design-Build Price will be adjusted by multiplying (i) the Construction Component Price, by (ii) the change in the Construction Component Price Escalation Index between Oct. 1, 2015 and the actual Construction Date." Since then, the statewide Construction Cost Index has shown costs are up 40.74% in the past five years. Updating those stale Cal Am estimates puts them at \$426.0 million in today's dollars.

During the past five years, Cal Am did update their numbers, but not for construction reasons, rather for the Trump tax act, a revised cost of capital, reduced dependence on ratepayer dollars during construction, an anticipated \$10 million state desalination grant, and an expectation of a low-interest state drinking water loan of over \$200 million. Unfortunately, on Oct. 3, the state removed Cal Am from that loan funding list due to a "lack of progress". What will be the real costs and will Cal Am re-qualify?

As a result of those updates, in September 2019, Cal Am submitted an advice letter to the CPUC, which said they would need \$35.8 million per year from ratepayers for the new desalination plant. When divided by 6,252 acre-feet delivered, that equals \$5,726 per AF.

Even though the public debt is now uncertain since the state removed Cal Am from the funding list, let's assume they get reinstated for the low-cost debt. The interest rate would be one-half the state's General Obligation borrowing rate, which was 3.983% in November, so that's 1.992% for the loan.

Updating the borrowing, the equity, and the O&M for escalation and inflation results in a \$49.9 million annual requirement or \$7,981 per AF, that's much more than twice the projected cost of Pure Water Monterey with expansion. If the plant is not fully used because the customer demand will be slow to materialize, the cost per AF goes even higher.

There is simply too much confusion about costs. Too much time has passed. Cal Am owes its customers a clear and concise update. I am a CalAm customer, and I urge you to demand new data before funding the desal plant at your Nov. 17 meeting.



Its been 8 years to date, and here we are once again.

I am very disappointed in the staff decision recommending approval after its earlier decisions recommening denial. Below is the link to that September 2020 denial. It would be important and informative for you to read or refresh yourselves about the severe problems of this ill-conceived project so ably spelled out just two years ago.

Commission's staff report: https://documents.coastal.ca.gov/reports/2020/9/Th3a&4a/Th3a&4a%20Staff%20Report.pdf

A review of this report will demonstrate *that very little has changed* in what Cal AM has been able to accomplish towards addressing the obstacles and concerns made by staff two years ago. Some issues of note:

1) ESHA has not been meaningfully mitigated. One might say it is exacerbated by having two rounds of development with this new phased approach.

2) Sea level rise concerns have not been addressed.

3) Environmental justice issues, particularly for the resident of the CIty of Marina have not been mitigated in any meaningful way. Marina was the poster child for your Environmental Justice work. Your staff worked very hard with Marina and your EJ guidelines were shaped substantially because of your consideration of Marina in this project.

These are three major issue, but there are many, many more. One that I find most confounding is that Cal Am has no approval from the CPUC to build a 4800 afy plant. It was deemed financially infeasible by Cal AM itself several years ago, because of economies of scale. Cal AM itself rejected the 4.8K size, and now they are asking you to approve it, before they have even got back to ask for it from their lead agency. What?!?

We all know what is going on. The governor is pressuring you to find a way to fast track water source development. This kicks the can down the road, and takes it out of your hands, waiting for some other permitting agency to step up and do the right thing.

But Cal AM is killing Peninsula communities with their bullying ways and endless delays. They have delayed the Pure Water Expansion for two years over the water purchase agreement. That project would be coming on line now if Cal Am hadn't mucked around with their lawyers sewing discord, confusion a*nd expense*.

The City of Marina, who you had in mind as you built your EJ regulations, has spent over \$8 million dollars to date defending itself against Cal Am before you, before the CPUC, and other agencies. That at-risk community is getting crushed financially. Eight million dollars could be better spent on infrastructure, housing, community resources, etc, than trying to save their water supply from a greedy behemoth who is committed to its own bottom line above all else.

When you approved Doheny, after rejecting Huntington Beach, commissioners were quoted in the press as saying there are good projects and bad projects and compared those two projects. Cal AM is a bad project. *You would be hard pressed to find a worse place to build, than the Cemex site.* Staff misrepresents the project when he says that the source water is coming from beneath the Monterey Bay Sanctuary... and he knows it. *The project is extracting source water from an aquifer system.* Those aquifers protect the coastline from seawater intrusion, and are part of the aquatic system that provides the sole source of drinking water for Marina. Not to mention the ESHA destruction to the dunes and coastline that several threatened species call home. As staff admits in the report, this is against your overall mission, but he recommends using exceptions to ignore that mission.

The Peninsula has been under the tyranny of Cal Am since the 1960s. They have not produced a single drop of product water, or source water, in all that time. They leave those engineering sorts of things to others. Then they take it, profiteer from it, and look for more opportunities. They absolutely do not have the engineering chops to accomplish what they are proposing. Their vice president of engineering for the entire state lacks an engineering degree. I think that indicates a lot about who this company is: Its all lawyers and lobbying... thats what they do.

So I join hundreds if not thousand of residents throughout the Peninsula as well as Marina, entreating you to *PLEASE* stop this nonsense now.

If you approve this project with conditions, it will not be built. But the real solutions, such as Pure Water, will have to overcome the bullying inertia of this corporate giant. Think of the damage caused. Please, think of it.

If you approve this project with conditions, you will be consigning residents in several communities to millions of dollars of litigation, waste and acrimony. The rate payers pay both sides of the fight. Take the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District for example. They get their funding from property taxpayers. Then the water ratepayers fund the legal expenses of Cal Am. In many cases the taxpayers and ratepayers are the same people. They pay for it, but they have no say in it beyond "public comment."

Those who support Cal Am are monied interests. Many of those interests are outside of the district and wont fund a nickel of the \$1billion to \$1.5 billion project (when you include paying back the funding instruments with rising interest rates)

Those supporters inside the district boundaries either have contracts for the building (for example, Paul Bruno, Monterey Peninsula Engineering) or are part of the hospitality and tourism industry. They get a sweetheart deal with flat water rates regardless of volume. Many of the people you will hear to come speak to you on November 17, the common man who supports Cal Am, is an employee for hospitality, and they are probably getting a paid day off to be here.

People need water to drink, to wash, and to survive. Water is life. It's the residents that shoulder the burden, that have been fighting Cal AM for decades, that gathered 24,000 votes (55%) on Measure J in 2018 when they were outspent by Cal Am by 15 or 20 to 1 but prevailed through determination and spreading the truth through a passionate ground game.

If you vote to approve, these are the people you are abandoning... and your environmental justice regulations might as well be toilet paper.

I understand the pressures the state and the governor can bring to bear, but I implore you to be courageous, to follow the guidelines from the California Coast Act, and do the obviously right thing by denying this permit.

Coastal Commissioners,

As an environmentalist and a Cal Am customer struggling to afford necessary water for my family each month in addition to all other rising costs of living on the Monterey Peninsula, I strongly oppose Cal Am's desal project. There is an environmentally superior and affordable alternative in the expansion of Pure Water Monterey that the Coastal Commission must consider. The Expansion will provide all the water needed for housing and reasonable growth for the next 30 years without any of the negative environmental impacts of the prosed desal plant, even in times of drought and at a fraction of the cost that would result from the proposed desalination plant.

Pure Water Monterey has been providing us with water for over two years now, and it has allowed Cal Am to stop over drafting the Carmel River. The Peninsula does not need this desal plant. The Monterey Peninsula Water Management District (MPWMD), using the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) population and economic growth forecast, estimates that by 2045 we will need 786 acre-feet a year more water than we use today. The expansion of Pure Water Monterey will provide an additional 2,250 acre-feet a year. How can Cal Am claim we need another 5,000 to 6,000 acre-feet?

Cal Am's investor-owned desal plant would produce water costing more than \$7,000 an acre-foot. How can any company justify this cost? This desal plant only enriches American Water shareholders, it is not in the interest of our community. I cannot afford to add the cost of this extraordinarily expensive desal water to the extremely high Cal Am water bill I already pay.

I also oppose the siting of these desal slant wells in a neighboring water district. Marina would get none of this water, but it would bear the environmental damage to its beaches and the risk to its aquifer from more seawater intrusion. This is a social justice issue for all concerned especially for Marina residents and those with limited incomes.

As a coastal Californian, I cannot agree to the massive greenhouse gas emissions this plant would produce and the power it would consume. I am alarmed by Governor Newsom's pressure on the Coastal Commission to approve all desal projects, whether they are needed or not and regardless

of environmental impacts the Coastal Commission is required to avoid if better alternatives exist.

Please read additional reasons listed below that have contributed to my decision to oppose Cal Am's Desal project. Please do your job, and protect the coastal environment from the unnecessary damage and added water cost that will result from approval of the desal option. Mark Farina

Monterey Resident

The Coastal Commission must consider feasible alternatives like the expansion of Pure Water Monterey.

No need for desal. The Pure Water Monterey Expansion will provide water for housing and growth for the next 30 years at a fraction of the cost.
The Expansion will cost \$60 million. Cal Am's desal will cost an estimated \$426 million.

• Pure Water Monterey is a proven project. It has been providing us with water for over two years now, and it has allowed Cal Am to stop over drafting the Carmel River.

• According to the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District's Water Supply and Demand Report we will need 786 acre-fee of water for new growth by 2045. The Pure Water Monterey Expansion will give us 2,250 acre-feet of water. MPWMD's report used the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) population and economic growth forecast to determine how much water we will need for housing and growth.

• The Peninsula currently uses 9,725 AFY. Our use has dropped from 15,000 AFY in 2004. Common usage on the Peninsula is 5,000 to 6,000 gallons per month. The common usage for California is 7,200 gallons a month. It is doubtful that consumption will increase with the state asking for more conservation and the price of water on the Peninsula already prohibitively expensive.

• Recycled water is drought proof – since 2014, during some of the driest years on record the municipal wastewater supply to Monterey One Water that

creates our recycled water has only dropped 5%. New growth will bring more recycled water.

The cost of water is an Environmental Justice issue. According to current CPUC data, Cal Am's desal project is estimated to increase water bills by 50% to 70%. Common usage on the Peninsula is 5,500 gallons, which currently costs \$150 a month. A 70% increase would raise the typical water bills by \$105 a month.

• The Return Water Agreement for Cal Am's desal is a fundamental Environmental Justice issue. To get around the prohibition on exporting water from the over drafted Salinas River Groundwater Basin Cal Am proposes to return 700 AFY of desalinated water to Castroville at \$110 an acre-foot. But this water would cost \$7,000 or more per acre-foot to produce. Who pays the difference? This agreement would force Cal Am's Monterey Peninsula customers to subsidize the cost of water to Castroville at a cost of millions of dollars a year added to Peninsula water bills.

• Desal is energy intensive and creates higher water costs per household driving low-income wage earners out of the region.

• Pure Water Monterey expansion will not harm low-income communities and individuals with drastic rate increases. This option is favored by the

community. The cost of Pure Water Monterey is estimated at \$3,500 an acrefoot, half of the expected cost for desal.

• Our community does not trust Cal Am for good reason. They've over drafted both our natural water resources and charge us the highest water costs in the

country. Local ballot initiative, Measure J, passed by 56% in 2018 mandating that our Water Management District pursue a buyout of Cal Am. The buyout is moving ahead.

• Monterey Peninsula residents currently pay the highest water costs in California for a system serving 90,000 people or more.

• Pure Water Monterey's water treatment process helps the environment by eliminating pollutants that might otherwise contaminate the Monterey Bay Marine Sanctuary.

• Pure Water Monterey is an innovative and sustainable model of water re-use and conservation in a time when water supplies are becoming more scarce.

• The process of desalinization requires substantially more energy than other forms of water purification.

• Cal Am's desal energy consumption is 52,000 megawatt hours per year. It produces 8,000 metric tons of CO2 per year.

• Draws 17,300 AFY of groundwater from the over drafted Salinas River Groundwater Basin.

• Adds 8 million gallons of brine discharge per day to the Monterey Bay Marine Sanctuary.

• Project must create seawater intrusion to work.

• Cal Am's desal could threaten the city of Marina's groundwater supply with more seawater intrusion.

• Will the CPUC Phase 2 hearing authorize Cal Am to build desal on top of the Pure Water Monterey Expansion? The CPUC's proposed decision to approve the Expansion was issued on September 30, 2022.

• Will Cal Am ever gets the water rights it needs to operate this desal plant? The Cemex lawsuit has not been heard or decided yet. We could pay for this desal plant and never see a drop of water. When Cal Am fails, its customers pay the bill.

The pipes would draw water from the aquifer below Marina (the site of the project), with the potential of salt-water intrusion into Marina's water table/aquifer.

The desal plant is not environmentally just. Marina would bear the risks of the project to its coastline and water source, lose beach access, and gain no benefits.

The Coastal Act requires the least environmentally damaging and most environmentally just project. There is a low cost alternative solution. Pure Water Monterey is a proven project. It has been providing us with water for over two years now, and it has allowed Cal Am to stop overdrafting the Carmel River. Pure Water Monterey can be expanded and will provide water for housing and growth for the next 30 years, according to the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District's Water Supply and Demand Report.

The PWM Expansion can do all this for a fraction (\$59 Million) of the cost of Cal Am's proposed desal (\$426 million for the first phase), and without harming coastal waters, snowy plovers, marine life, or Marina's water supply. The Expansion's source water is adequate and secure.

Exaggerated claims about the need for this desal project seem excessively greedy. It will cause damage to the environment and needless harm to local people. In addition to being guardians of our wonderful coastal environment, you are also vital protectors of justice, especially for small communities. The PWM Expansion is all that we need. Please deny the Cal Am application.

On Nov. 17 when county supervisors meet in Salinas, the Coastal Commission will consider a modified Cal Am application for a coastal development permit for the desal plant certified by the Public Utilities Commission in 2018. The modification will consist most notably of the reduction of the proposed size of the plant from 7,174 acre-feet per year to 5,389. Cal Am has recently been promoting the idea in several venues that it's reducing the plant size may finally reverse the prior disapprovals of its application to the Coastal Commission.

Likely, the reason Cal Am has been promoting that idea is that it has worked with the PUC. In 2013, Cal Am proposed a 10,761 acre-foot producing plant, which could be reduced to the currently-certified 7,174 one if recycling could produce an additional 3,500 acre-feet a year. Cal Am plans now to take this idea a step further with its 5,389 acre-foot proposal to the Coastal Commission based on CPUC approval of a recycling expansion to 5,750 acre-feet, but CPUC approval of that expansion will still not end Cal Am's problem with the Coastal Commission. That is because the CPUC has not certified a 5,389 acrefoot desal application, which Cal Am has yet to file.

The fate of that application is no more certain than the ultimate fate of the current one. The reduction of production units has to take into account the mass-production rule — as the number of units produced

goes down, the cost per unit goes up. The Marina Coast Water District has estimated the cost of water for the certified 7,174 acre-foot-per-year plant to be \$7,688 per acre-foot. For the now-proposed 5,389 plant, with its reduced production, the cost would be even higher, likely three times the cost of recycled water and far too high not only for the lowincome people for whom most new housing is needed but also for many existing Cal Am customers.

The problem Cal Am faces at the Coastal Commission, however, is not the size of its project. According to Coastal Commission Executive Director Jack Ainsworth, "We'll be looking for the environmentally preferred and environmentally just project." The key word in that statement is "environmentally." Rather than size, the problem Cal Am faces at the Coastal Commission is CEQA, the California Environmental Quality Act.

Cal Am's proposed desal plant, of whatever size, cannot resolve serious, if not insurmountable, environmental issues. The modeled predictions of environmental impact reported in the project's environmental impact report (EIR) have zero credibility because of the negative correlation between the predicted and the error component of an observed measurement resulting from modelers' "adjustment" (their word) of data to reduce error variation. I have published articles in two peer-reviewed statistical journals reporting this invalidating misuse of statistics.

Because Cal Am has no water rights in the Salinas Valley it proposes is to desalinate only seawater from the sea-water-intruded 180-foot aquifer though, according to the project's EIR, the freshwater Dune Sand aquifer — likely drawing water from the Salinas River — supplies up to two-thirds of the proposed project's source water.

Though sufficient to be fatal to the project, this is only a portion of one half of the environmental issues facing Cal Am. The other half is the project's site. It is in Marina, a disadvantaged city, which bears the burden of the project without getting any water or anything else from it. That is a textbook example of environmental injustice and, as such, is in itself sufficient reason for the Coastal Commission to reject the project. My Name is Greg Furey. I am a 20 year resident of Marina. I spent a 32 year career with Cal Fire and decided to retire here in Marina following my last career assignment in the area. When I first moved to Marina from Pacific Grove in 2000, I remember feeling as if I had moved to a 3rd world country. Whenever I had shopped at the Lucky's supermarket in Pacific Grove, I rarely stood in a checkout line of more than two customers. However, once I had moved to Marina and began to shop at Lucky's, I learned immediately that a line of 8-10 customers was the norm. Few people speak of this, as individuals tend to shop within their own communities, but to me it was profoundly obvious and insulting. That same (discriminatory) customer service pattern remains today. Ironically, this unfortunate pattern of class discrimination is now evident from the "water war" that Cal Am has brought to Marina via their proposed Slant Well project.

Marina is populated with an ethnically diverse population that evolved from the military community historically attached to Ft. Ord. Much in the manner that African American soldiers and their families were once "steered" into the city of Seaside after being posted to Ft. Ord, interethnically married (mostly enlisted) soldiers were similarly "steered" toward the city of Marina. Officers and their families (largely white) were directed towards the more privileged communities of Monterey, Pacific Grove, and Carmel. Many elderly veterans and their foreign-born wives and widows continue to live in central Marina. You might find historian and author Carol Lynn McKibben's excellent book "RACE AND COLOR IN A CALIFORNIA COASTAL COMMUNITY: THE SEASIDE STORY" informative in regard to our collective socio-economic history.

Marina is one of the most ethnically diverse cities of its' size in the United States. There have reportedly been as many as 71 different dialects spoken in our town. it is a working class community of teachers, tradespeople, nurses, and public safety and service workers whose lives revolve around their work and families. Unlike the Peninsula cities of Carmel, Monterey, and Pacific Grove, Marina does not rely on a visitor population like the one that descends upon the Peninsula. It is primarily a community of military retirees and working class families.

I continue to question why a slant well project that is intended to serve the much wealthier and privileged and tourist-based communities of the Monterey Peninsula be allowed to drop an unwelcome anchor here that could easily destroy our water supply in Marina? Marina already provides disposal, water treatment, and significant numbers of service workers to the Peninsula communities. How socially and economically just is it that a DeSal project is being dumped onto our beach area for the benefit of wealthier communities, especially when it might very well destroy our fresh water supply?

I was a member of the Marina Planning Commission when Cal Am first presented their test slant well for review and approval. We (The Planning Commission) denied their application, mainly because it appeared to present a direct threat to the future of Marina's (deep level aquifer) water supply. Destroying our water supply would create significant economic hardship for the working class and retired members of our community, potentially forcing us into becoming customers of a water purveyor we do not want here. Cal Am then appealed to the City Council. The mayor, who was rumored to face direct pressure from state, county, federal, and local political interests (presumably sponsored by Cal Am), "rolled over" and voted to support the test well project. He later claimed his vote was solely based upon "learning more about the science", which was on par with claims of a "stolen election". He ignored the old addage "Once the camel gets his nose in the tent, he's there to live". It was likely inevitable that Cal Am was going to win approval for their test well project, as they had linked the hospitality interests and co-dependent political leaders on the Peninsula together. They conjured up a plan which placed a disproportionate share of costs onto residential customers, all the while reducing the burden of costs for the hospitality (restaurant and hotel) industry. After agriculture, hospitality is the largest economic driver in Monterey County. A Peninsula Mayor's Group was formed to help solidify lobbying efforts. Concurrently, an alternative source of treated potable water has been developed which should be capable of providing enough water for Cal-Am's customer base for the next 30-40 yearswithout Desal. So, with a potential public buyout of Cal Am on the horizon OR a viable source of public water available at a far cheaper cost to consumers than their proposed Desal project would deliver, why would Cal Am want to continue to push this harmful and discriminatory project forward? The answer is simple-money and profits for their executives and shareholders. If a public buyout comes to fruition, it would afford Cal Am greater leverage to resist that possibility, as it would drive up the appraised valuation of their local water system by adding those capital investments to their asset sheet. If Cal Am is somehow able to move forward with their DeSal plans and start pumping treated water to the Peninsula, they stand to make millions from the extravagantly overpriced water that would be delivered to their Peninsula customers and beyond. In the process, Marina's precious water supply (to

If you support Cal Am's project, you will in effect be voting to support a "Bridge to Nowhere" economically, and be supporting a great injustice against the community of Marina.

I regret that I will not be available to make a public comment onNovember 17th. Please do the right thing. Deny Cal Am's proposed DeSal plant.

The cost of new water on the Peninsula By Dave Stoldt

We find ourselves two weeks away from the Coastal Commission's possible approval of the Cal Am desalination plant, despite the unknown financial impact on environmental justice issues, ratepayer impacts and viable alternative projects. It has been over five years without an update on actual project costs. A deeper look at the potential costs for current ratepayers should convince you to stay far away from this wolf-in-sheep's-clothing.

The last estimate for the Cal Am desal project was in September 2017 at \$298.2 million, a year before they received permission to build the plant. As you can see by gas prices or any other measure, a lot has changed. Perhaps Cal Am owes everybody an update about the impacts on all of us. They haven't, so we did our best to do it for you and we peg it at \$426.0 million in today's dollars.

No one really knows what the Cal Am project might cost today because they are not telling you. But back in May 2013, when they first released the proposed "design-build agreement" to contractors, they said the following: "In the event the Construction Date occurs subsequent to Oct. 1, 2015, due solely to a delay caused by the owner, the Construction Component Price portion of the Fixed Design-Build Price will be adjusted by multiplying (i) the Construction Component Price, by (ii) the change in the Construction Component Price Escalation Index between Oct. 1, 2015 and the actual Construction Date." Since then, the statewide Construction Cost Index has shown costs are up 40.74% in the past five years. Updating those stale Cal Am estimates puts them at \$426.0 million in today's dollars.

During the past five years, Cal Am did update their numbers, but not for

construction reasons, rather for the Trump tax act, a revised cost of capital, reduced dependence on ratepayer dollars during construction, an anticipated \$10 million state desalination grant, and an expectation of a low-interest state drinking water loan of over \$200 million. Unfortunately, on Oct. 3, the state removed Cal Am from that loan funding list due to a "lack of progress" — stay tuned on the real costs and whether Cal Am can requalify.

As a result of those updates, in September 2019, Cal Am submitted an advice letter to the CPUC, which said they would need \$35.8 million per year from ratepayers for the new desalination plant. When divided by 6,252 acre-feet delivered, that equals \$5,726 per AF.

Even though the public debt is now uncertain since the state removed Cal Am from the funding list, let's assume they get reinstated for the low-cost debt. The interest rate would be one-half the state's General Obligation borrowing rate, which was 3.983% in November, so that's 1.992% for the loan.

Updating the borrowing, the equity, and the O&M for escalation and inflation results in a \$49.9 million annual requirement or \$7,981 per AF, that's much more than twice the projected cost of Pure Water Monterey with expansion. If the plant is not fully used because the customer demand will be slow to materialize, the cost per AF goes even higher.

There is simply too much confusion about costs. Too much time has passed. Cal Am owes its customers a clear and concise update. Otherwise, the Coastal Commission could be handing them a blank check.

Dear Coastal Commissioners, Executive Director Alan Ainsworth, and staff,

My name is Dustin Wright and I am a historian and Associate Professor of Japanese Culture and Language at California State University, Monterey Bay. Much of my research focuses on the history of military bases and the environmental, economic, and social impacts they bring. I am also a resident and homeowner in Marina, where my family has chosen to live, to contribute to this small-town community and appreciate the beautiful beaches along the protected marine sanctuary of the Monterey Bay.

The private company California American Water proposes building the desalination plant on the site of the Cemex plant. which has been in operation for decades and has already extracted an environmental toll on the region. The nearby waste facilities are also already a substantial health and environmental burden that Marina carries on behalf of the County. The deleterious effects on our lived environment will be further compounded by the construction of the desalination plant.

The fuzzy economic rationales in support of the plant and its serious environmental impacts are obvious and have been exhaustively reported by the Marina Coast Water District, the City of Marina, Just Water: A Citizens Action Group, and many other policy and community organizations. While the clear-eyed concerns raised by the community should be more than adequate for denying the Cal Am permit, I add my voice on behalf of the wildlife of our region. Snowy plovers should get a vote, too.

I am particularly concerned with the further loss of wildlife habitat. This year, a *New York Times* analysis indicated that California "has the most imperiled biodiversity of any state in the contiguous United States" ("<u>This Map Shows Where Biodiversity Is Most at Risk in</u> <u>America</u>," March 3, 2022). Since 1970, there has been 69% decline in the world's wildlife and the primary culprit is habitat loss. In some places, the bird population has declined by 80% (*New York Times*, "<u>Researchers Report a Staggering Decline in Wildlife. Here's How to</u> <u>Understand It</u>," October 12, 2022). That is a staggering loss in a short historical time-period.

The <u>Monterey Bay Aquarium</u> estimates that only around "2,500 snowy plovers breed along the Pacific coast," and that only "28 major nesting areas remain," many of which are along the sandy beaches of our bay. As local citizens, it falls on our shoulders to protect this region.

As a historian, I recognize that humans are naturally inclined to understand their world through the relatively short lens of their own lifetimes. We see the world around us as "the norm," and it can be hard to imagine what the environment looked like just a few years before our own generation. If we are born into a place that has already experienced significant habitat loss, we tend to have an inaccurate "temporal baseline" for what a healthy environment (which includes humans), should look like. When our baselines are confused, it's difficult to appreciate the extent of the destruction created by human-caused habitat loss. This creates a snowball effect in which future generations have little understanding of what was actually lost before they came (Mihoub, JB., Henle, K., Titeux, N. et al. "Setting temporal baselines for biodiversity: the limits of available monitoring data for capturing the full impact of

anthropogenic pressures." Sci Rep 7, 41591 (2017). https://doi.org/10.1038/srep41591).

If the desalination plant is built, future generations in Marina will experience a place that is less wild, less clean, less inhabited by the determined beauty of our animal and botanical cousins. That's bad for humans, too.

I know from my own research that it takes generations to clean up a military base, a waste facility, or as will be clear, cement plant. In some cases environments can never truly be healed. Constructing a desalination plant in such an Environmentally Sensitive Habitat Area cannot be permitted. We cannot continue to burden the next generations (of all life) in our region with the environmental and policy mistakes of yesterday and today.

I implore you to deny the Cal Am desalination plant.

I am a Cal Am Customer on the Monterey Peninsula. I am opposed to Cal Am's desal project because it is not needed at this time.

Please note. The "Supply and Demand Forecast" developed by the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District (MPWMD) confirms that the Expansion of the Pure Water Monterey project will provide enough potable water for both new housing and economic growth on the Monterey Peninsula for the next thirty (30) years.

Cal Am continues to claim that the Monterey Peninsula needs its desal plant. If constructed, Cal Am's plant would produce 6,250 acre-feet of very expensive water per year at the cost of \$426 million. That would raise ratepayer water bills on a conservative calculation by as much as 50% and possibly more.

With the completion of the Pure Water Monterey Expansion project in two years, the total available water supply will be 11,468 acre-feet per year. The Peninsula currently only uses 9,725 acre-feet per year. Research using the fully vetted third-party Regional Growth Forecast developed by The Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) revealed that demand by 2050 will be 10,668 acre-feet per year. This allows for a hefty surplus for drought reserves and protected water levels.

"The desalination components within the coastal zone and subject to this Commission review are the proposed desalination facility's source water wells, which would extract water from beneath the Monterey Bay seafloor..."

Slant wells a are perforated along the majority of their run, so the draw does not come merely from the terminus of the pipe. As such... most, if not all, of the extracted source water WILL NOT be coming from "beneath the Monterey Bay seafloor" but from beneath the land within shoreline aquifers. This fundamentally changes the entire impact of the project, threatens the water supply of Marina, and legally creates water rights issues, to which Cal Am does not hold the proper water rights to proceed with this project.

Among the many complex issues, this is perhaps the most fundamental. That Cal Am could have already spent two hundred million dollars without the proper description of where the source water is obtained, and lacks the appropriate water rights is a travesty of the highest order.
