RE: Appeal No. A-3-STC-22-0018, Staff Report re: Substantial Issue Determination

Dear Chair Brownsey and Commissioners,

The City of Santa Cruz ("City") has reviewed the Commission's staff report for the above-referenced matter. The City appreciates and agrees with the Commission's staff's recommendation of "no substantial issue" and wanted to take the opportunity to provide some additional information and clarifications to supplement the report and the materials previously provided by the City. In particular, as detailed below, the City would like to emphasize the following points: 1) the City's Oversized Vehicle (OV) Amendments and Safe Parking programs aim to protect sensitive species and Environmentally Sensitive Habitat Areas (ESHA), along with alleviating coastal parking demands; (2) the City's OV Amendments and Safe Parking programs, together, aim to encourage people living in OVs to utilize Safe Parking facilities, in order to promote additional public access to the coast and to address environmental impacts related to entrenched OVs, many of which are located in the Coastal Zone; and (3) people living in OVs will not be unjustly impacted by the City's OV Amendments, particularly given the broad range of options available to people living in OVs. This final section includes additional details about the City's Safe Parking program that were not previously provided.

I. The City's OV Amendments and Safe Parking Programs Aim to Protect Sensitive Species and Environmentally Sensitive Habitat Areas (ESHA), Along with Alleviating Coastal Parking Demands.

The Commission's staff report cited concerns regarding the City's evidentiary linkage between the impacts that the City is aiming to address and the City's overnight OV parking prohibition. City staff previously provided photos, primarily of refuse in and around OVs but also of blackwater dumping, public access being occupied by OVs and associated belongings, and leaking fluids from OVs. (*See* Exhibit 10 to the City's June 23, 2022 letter to the Commission.) However, more emphasis could have been provided that these conditions are prevalent in areas with sensitive species, ESHA, and significant coastal access parking demands.

As noted in the City's letter to the Commission dated June 23, 2022, the majority of OVs in the Coastal Zone are located on the Lower Westside of Santa Cruz. Specifically, the OVs are often parked

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along Delaware Avenue, Natural Bridges Drive, and Schaffer Road. See City's Exhibit 11 (submitted with this letter, identifying areas of concentrated OV parking).

Natural Resources. Many areas in the City with severe impacts related to overnight OV parking are in close proximity to and often immediately adjacent to three creeks (Moore Creek, Natural Bridges Creek, and Arroyo Seco Creek) identified in the City's Creeks and Wetlands Management Plan from 2008<sup>1</sup>, which is part of the City's Local Coastal Program (LCP). These areas are ESHA for a wide range of sensitive species.

The sensitive species listed below, identified by the City's Creeks and Wetlands Management Plan, are likely to be adversely impacted by improper sewage disposal, inadequate sanitation resources, and trash because their habitat is immediately adjacent to or in very close proximity to areas with a high concentration of overnight OV parking. See City's Exhibit 11 (submitted with this letter, identifying areas of concentrated OV parking and adjacent ESHA).

- California red-legged frog (federally listed as threatened and California species of special concern): known to occur in Antonelli Pond and marsh at Natural Bridges;
- Monarch butterfly (locally unique species in Santa Cruz's General Plan and LCP): roosts at Natural Bridges:
- Tidewater goby (federally listed as endangered and California species of special concern): potentially present at mouth of Moore Creek at Natural Bridges State Beach;
- Southwestern pond turtle (federal and California species of special concern): known to occur in Moore Creek, Antonelli Pond, and marsh at Natural Bridges;
- White-tailed kite (California-designated Fully Protected Species): known to nest at Natural Bridges and potential habitat along portions of Moore Creek;
- Coopers hawk (California species of special concern): known to nest along Moore Creek;
- Yellow warbler (California species of special concern): formerly bred at and potential nesting habitat at Antonelli Pond;
- Yellow-breasted chat (California species of special concern): potential nesting habitat at Antonelli Pond:
- Tricolored blackbird (California species of special concern): historically nested at and potential nesting habitat at Antonelli Pond; and
- Yuma myotis, Townsend's western big-eared bat, and San Francisco dusky-footed woodrat (each federal and California species of special concern): each has potential habitat along Moore Creek.

Coastal Commission Senior Ecologist Dr. Lauren Garske-Garcia confirms concerns for some of these species in a letter dated July 17, 2019, where she called for a wildlife corridor for the California red-legged frog leading between Schaffer Road and Antonelli Pond. She also cited the potential for the Western pond turtle and tri-colored blackbirds near Antonelli Pond and cited the need to evaluate the presence of wetlands on the site at the northeast corner of Delaware Avenue and Schaffer Road, all locations immediately adjacent to a high concentration of regular OV parking. Dr. Garske-Garcia also says of the vacant site adjacent to many entrenched OVs that "even highly invaded grasslands may be

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considered ESHA." See Exhibit 15 for excerpts from Coastal Commission Senior Ecologist Dr. Lauren Garske-Garcia's July 17, 2019 letter to the City.

The City of Santa Cruz and its residents are highly environmentally conscious. The potential impacts to ESHA and sensitive species are of significant concern to both the Council and the citizenry, as is certainly the case for the Commission as well. Exhibit 11 to this letter provides a map showing locations of creeks, wetlands, and habitat, along with a key showing where additional photos in Exhibit 12 were taken. The photos in Exhibit 12 show recent situations related to long-term OV entrenchment and the resulting environmental impacts, such as OVs leaking fluids, riparian areas used as restrooms, and trash associated with OVs, which is often immediately adjacent to ESHA. Contaminants related to long-term OV entrenchment can create environmental damage and be detrimental to both ESHA and the many special status species in the immediate vicinity. Notably, many of the pictures in Exhibit 12 are very recent, having been taken in just the past week or two, as was the case with many of the photos provided in Exhibit 10 to the City's June 23, 2022 letter to the Commission. The purpose of providing these photographs is to show that, even with resources in place (for example, dumpster services nearby and safe parking facilities available), OV entrenchment results in significant pollution in close proximity to ESHA and sensitive species. While the City recognizes that not all OV dwellers cause environmental damage, the pictures show that OV entrenchment in the City is a serious, current, and ongoing problem.

The City also takes its public access requirements seriously. In addition to the environmental concerns noted above, the photographs in Exhibit 12 also show how the OVs occupy many parking spaces along Delaware Avenue and Natural Bridges Drive. These locations are directly adjacent to Natural Bridges State Park. The State Park charges for parking, and thus, the adjacent, free on-street parking is very popular with beachgoers in the spring and summer and with eco-tourists watching the Monarch butterflies in the fall. Because current parking rules allow vehicles to stay in one place for 72 continuous hours, and vehicles tend to only move a short distance after those 72-hours have expired, OVs often remain stagnant in popular on-street parking areas for extended periods of time, occupying parking spaces (with both vehicles and belongings) that would otherwise provide free parking for coastal visitors. See Exhibit 11.

II. The City's OV Ordinance Amendments and Safe Parking Programs, Together, Aim to **Encourage People Living in OVs to Utilize Safe Parking Facilities, In Order to Promote** Additional Public Access to the Coast and Address Environmental Impact Related to Entrenched OVs, Many of Which are Located in the Coastal Zone.

Page 15 of the Commission's staff report states the following:

Parking restrictions are proposed in local jurisdictions for a variety of reasons. Sometimes it is a matter of a desire to generate a funding stream, other times it is to facilitate desired use patterns (e.g., where a time limit is added to ensure turnover so potential visitor use is not thwarted by vehicles that never move), and yet other times it is to address an identified problem that the parking itself is generating. The parking restrictions proposed here have been framed by the City in terms of the latter, and the City has cited to public safety and public health problems, public nuisance issues, camping in areas not called out for camping (and thus not equipped to handle that type

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> and intensity of use), and coastal resource impacts associated with such overnight parking.

The City's position is that the OV Ordinance Amendments and Safe Parking Programs are aimed at: (1) facilitating desired use patterns (disrupting OV entrenchment and improving vehicle turnover for the benefit of the community, including potential visitors, thereby reducing the likelihood of environmental impacts and public access impacts); (2) encouraging those living in OVs to utilize Safe Parking lots, thereby addressing public health and safety issues that are associated with OVs that have become entrenched on City streets; and (3) addressing visibility issues related to OVs parked too close to intersections.

The City currently has a problem with *entrenched* OVs parked on City rights-of-way, and the OV Amendments and Safe Parking Programs are intended to disrupt entrenchment by directing OV dwellers to safe and hygienic OV parking alternatives. The City's experience is that OVs parked in the City tend to stay in one area.<sup>2</sup> The Vehicle Code requires all cars to move every 72-hours. See Vehicle Code 22651(k). With that said, the City's experience is that OVs tend to park in one spot for 72-hours, then move to a nearby location and stay there for another 72-hours, and then move back to the initial location, or somewhere else nearby. See Exhibit 16. The record includes ample evidence, showing the impacts of OV entrenchment on City streets. See, for example, Exhibit 16, Exhibit 10 and Exhibit 12.

One of the Council's goals in passing the OV Amendments is to break the cycle of entrenchment and encourage OV dwellers to, at minimum, spend the night at a Safe Parking location, where they will be able to access restrooms and trash facilities, reducing the amount that OV dwellers urinate/defecate/litter on City streets, sidewalks, and nearby areas, such as ESHA. If OVs are required to move every night, the City's hope and reasonable expectation is that: (1) OVs will not accumulate the same level of trash, debris, furniture, etc. that currently impact City streets and sidewalks (including streets and sidewalks in the Coastal Zone), and (2) OVs will move daily, helping with on-street parking turnover for the benefit of the community, including potential visitors to the coast.

It is also worth emphasizing that the City's current Safe Parking Programs are not close to full. As of the time of this writing, eight out of the nine City-operated Safe Parking spots are available. City staff has provided significant outreach to OV dwellers in the City, but the program, so far, is underutilized.

The demand for these programs has been low, most likely because OV dwellers, under the current regulations, are only required to move, at most, once every 72 hours, and, when movement does occur, it is often a very short distance. Current and former OV dwellers have made comments to City staff along the lines of "Why would I use Safe Parking when I currently don't have to move?"

The daily movement associated with the Tier 2 Safe Parking program represents a trade-off between an ability for OV dwellers to remain in place for extended periods of time and an attempt to better manage both environmental damage and public access. As described in Section III below, the Safe Parking locations are generally centrally located in the City, so OV dwellers will not need to travel far to reach them. Upon departure from Safe Parking facilities, it is unlikely that the same, large number of OVs will all go to where they are currently concentrated on and around Delaware Avenue and Natural Bridges State Park, where ESHA and sensitive species are concentrated and where coastal public access demand is very high. That location is approximately three miles from the downtown safe parking places, which is relatively far in Santa Cruz's compact boundaries. Instead, many of the OV dwellers will choose to park in other free parking spaces, closer to their designated Safe Parking location, many of which will likely be either outside of the Coastal Zone or in areas of the Coastal Zone where parking is not in such high demand.

### III. People Living in OVs Will Not Be Unjustly Impacted by the City's OV Amendments, Particularly Given the Broad Range of Options Available to People Living in OVs.

The City would like to emphasize three points related to the limited potential for parking tickets resulting from the City's OV Ordinance amendments for people living in OVs who make a good-faith effort to comply with the City's Municipal Code.

First, Santa Cruz Municipal Code (SCMC) 10.40.120(g)(7) assures that people living in OVs who are actively seeking safe, legal overnight parking or shelter opportunities will not receive a parking ticket. This section exempts the following individuals from the City's midnight to 5:00 a.m. OV parking restriction:

A person and oversized vehicle that are, collectively, registered and participating in a safe parking program or other safe sleeping or transitional shelter program operated or sanctioned by the city, but do not have access to a safe parking space or other shelter options under such programs due to a lack of capacity.

SCMC 10.40.120(g)(7). This exception will not be difficult or complex to implement. If there is a shortage of available Safe Parking capacity, the City plans to issue overnight parking permits to people living in OVs who register for sanctioned City, County, or non-profit Safe Parking or shelter programs.

Second, the City currently has readily available Safe Parking capacity, and that capacity is vastly expanding. It is worth emphasizing again that, so far, demand for City-sponsored safe parking has been minimal, most likely because, as described above, OVs can legally park in other locations, without needing to relocate daily. To summarize, the following resources are currently available, or will be available, in the very near term:

> • Within City limits, the Association of Faith Communities (AFC) manages approximately 21 safe parking spaces, including approximately 20 on religious assembly sites and one on City-owned property. AFC also manages up to an additional 21 spaces within the County of Santa Cruz, but outside City limits.

- As of March 1, 2022, the City began operating three Safe Parking Program locations on public parking lots that allow for nine OVs as part of the Tier 1 and Tier 2 parking programs. Currently, nine spaces are available in two Tier 1 and Tier 2 lots (Police Department Lot and Lot 4, respectively, with six of eight spaces in Lot 4 currently offered). See Exhibit 14 for a map of the existing and planned Safe Parking facilities.
- On June 14, 2022, the City Council approved a one-year, approximately \$400,000 contract for a Tier 3 Safe Parking Program which will serve approximately 22 OVs, with the operator providing wrap-around services with case management to support people in moving from their vehicles into housing. This is a 24/7 parking program, and participants are provided with free transportation to/from the Armory location and various points in the City. The City is investing in infrastructure improvements at the Armory and working with operators (AFC and The Free Guide) towards an expected start in July 2022.
- The City has direction from the Council to operate at least 30 Tier 2 Safe Parking spaces. While only six Tier 2 spaces are currently in operation (the other three mentioned above are in Tier 1), the City has locations identified for 40 additional Tier 2 spaces in the City, for a total of at least 46 Tier 2 spaces in the City, with most of those centrally located in and around the Downtown. See Exhibit 14. The current expectation is that 13 of the potential 49 Tier 1 and 2 Safe Parking spaces will be in the Coastal Zone. Another 18 spots are in Safe Parking locations within 650 feet of the Coastal Zone, and another 12 spots are in Safe Parking locations within approximately one quarter mile of the Coastal Zone. In fact, only six Tier 1 or 2 spaces are planned at any appreciable distance from the Coastal Zone, and even those are only an approximately one-and-a-half mile driving distance to the Coastal Zone. A number of the planned locations have additional capacity that would allow for future expansion beyond the 49 existing/planned spaces, should demand for additional Tier 2 Safe Parking spaces arise. At this time, the City's approach is to operate each location with a relatively small number of OVs and expand locations and capacity at sites when demand increases, while maintaining capacity for a minimum of 30 Tier 2 spaces.
- The City recently significantly liberalized regulations regarding vehicular dwellers on private property. Religious assembly uses can now host six (up from three, pre-2021) OVs on each property with no permits or authorizations required. (SCMC 6.36.030(a)(2).) The City also allows businesses to host up to three safe parking spaces (up from two, pre-2021). (SCMC 6.36.030(a)(3).) The City allows people to dwell in an OV indefinitely (previously only three days per month, pre-2021) on residential properties when certain conditions are met. (SCMC 6.36.030(a)(4).)
- The Santa Cruz Harbor, located in the City of Santa Cruz Coastal Zone and Coastal Appeal Zone, designates 15 parking spaces for recreational vehicles to park. Outside the City but in nearby areas, at least 429 additional recreational vehicle camp sites are available in at least five other locations within the Coastal Zone, for a total of at least 444 recreational vehicle spaces in Coastal Zone areas in and near the City. Exhibit 13 identifies the locations and number of recreational vehicles that can be accommodated at

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> each location. Many additional recreational vehicle camp sites are available in the County but outside the Coastal Zone.

Third, the City would like to provide some clarity with respect to the number of people residing in OVs that could be impacted by the City's OV Amendments. A recent Google aerial map (dated September 2021) found approximately 110 OVs parked on City streets. The count did not include trucks over 20 feet in length without a camper shell (SCMC Section 10.40.120(g)(8) exempts commercial vehicles from the 12:00 a.m. to 5:00 a.m. parking prohibition if a permit is properly displayed, and with the potential environmental impacts more likely to stem from people living in vehicles, trucks without a camper shell are unlikely to include a vehicle dweller). Of the 110 oversized vehicles identified, many are clearly not used as dwellings. For example, City residents might park their OVs or vans, such as Sprinter vans, on public streets. As such, the number of OVs used as shelter for people residing in them is likely substantially less than 110. A total of 52 of the OVs shown were located within the Coastal Zone, with the vast majority of those parked in the lower West Side neighborhood, raising public access and environmental issues in that area. See Exhibit 9 (submitted with 6-23-2022 letter), City's OV Count Methodology. See also Exhibits 9A-9G (Google Earth Images, submitted with 6-23-2022 letter). With 71 Safe Parking spots identified, the capacity to expand at many of those locations, and the Municipal Code providing for the issuance of parking permits to people living in OVs who register for Safe Parking or other sanctioned programs but cannot park due to lack of capacity, the City's OV Amendments will not result in parking tickets for those who seek to comply with the Municipal Code by utilizing Safe Parking spaces or registering for a Safe Parking program.

\*\*\*\*

No single or simple solution exists that can fully address the environmental and public access impacts associated with OV entrenchment in the City. The City's strategy of prohibiting overnight OV parking on City rights-of-way, while at the same time providing Safe Parking locations, was the City Council's reasonable attempt to balance the needs of RV dwellers, parking access, roadway safety, community quality of life, and environmental resources. This approach is similar to the approach taken by dozens of other coastal communities (see Exhibit 8, submitted with the City's June 23, 2022 letter) and was supported by a wide range of the local community, including one Marine Scientist who provided a public comment that is quite relevant to the Commission's decision today:

"I support your efforts to ban overnight parking in our coastal community. As a marine scientist, it is painful to observe the abuse and neglect of our coastal treasures in this community. Santa Cruz is blessed with incredible coastal and marine biodiversity which is being actively degraded by stormwater pollution, human waste, plastic pollution and hazardous materials disposal from RV and large vehicles who live on our streets.

We should protect our coastal watersheds as they are critical to climate change resilience and adaptation in the near term. . . . Protecting our coastal community while finding solutions to our surging homeless issue is not mutually exclusive, but it does mean identifying critical areas and habitats, such as our rivers, low lying areas, and coastal zone which demand immediate attention and protection. Please I urge you to put neighborhood, community and environmental well being at the top of your list when deciding among solutions."

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See Exhibit 16, p. 746 (comment from Rikki Eriksen, Ph.D. California Marine Sanctuary Foundation, Marine Ecologist, Director of Marine Programs).

This comment reflects the environmental stewardship that is at the heart of many City efforts, and while that environmental consciousness serves as guidepost for various efforts, the City's actions related to the OV Amendments also heed the local community's strong social consciousness by providing three tiers of robust Safe Parking options for people living in vehicles who would be affected by the midnight to 5:00 a.m. OV parking restrictions.

Thank you for your attention to this letter, submitted on behalf of the City of Santa Cruz. We look forward to discussing this matter with the Commission and hope that the Commission concurs with its staff in finding no substantial issue.
















# Recreational Vehicle Facilities within the Coastal Zone in the Santa Cruz Area

- KOA Coastanoa (65 RV sites)
- KOA Santa Cruz / Monterey Bay (Manresa State Beach) (120 RV sites)

Many other RV facilities are available outside the Coastal Zone as well.



Excerpts from Coastal Commission Senior Ecologist Dr. Lauren Garske-Garcia's July 17, 2019 Letter to the City

The letter is related to considerations for potential development on the property at the northeast corner of Delaware Avenue and Shaffer Road, which is immediately adjacent to concentrations of entrenched oversized vehicles. (Emphases in the excerpts are from Dr. Garske-Garcia.)

# Natural Bridges Gardens: Wetland

## Delineation

Dr. Lauren Garske-Garcia, Ecologist (July 17, 2019)

A preliminary delineation was submitted for Commission feedback ahead of any application to develop the subject parcel. Prior discussions have relayed concerns and potential issues to the extent possible in the absence of actual data. Overall, the submitted delineation has a multitude of challenges to address before we will be able to effectively use it in any permit analysis. Some of these present substantial hurdles while others may be resolved with another delineation that captures lacking information. Further research will be needed to determine whether wetlands were historically present on the site...

...

While we can appreciate that the land had also been used for agriculture historically, we also know that as land fallows, features such as wetlands can reappear following long-term suppression and manipulation. Indeed, this is the case on the adjacent property at UCSC's Coastal Science Campus, where several wetlands were mapped over the course of developing their Coastal Long-Range Development Plan and continue to be managed today. In the absence of on-the-ground data, we are going to have to seek out other forms of information such as aerial imagery and do our best to interpret from that. I note that in such circumstances, our conservative judgement favors the resources of the State over private interests and so it is to the benefit of all parties to pursue clarity. This is something the developer should be taking a lead on and we will review as well as supplement with knowledge from our own research during the review process.

...

The consequence of this error is signficant in that a few key plant species relied upon in the delineation based upon WMVC have a different indicator status in the AW, and which actually [further] favor recognition of additional wetlands. In particular: *Conium maculatum* goes from FAC to FACW, and *Rubus ursinus* and *Plantago lanceolata* go from FACU to FAC – this then necessitates reevaluation of data and calculations on the sheets, **resulting in recognition of SP2, SP3, and SP8 as Commission wetlands and thus, all sampled points in this delineation qualifying.** Note that we have also separately verified that the delineations completed at UCSC's Coastal Campus adjacent to this parcel used the AW supplement.

. . .

In looking at the broader area's soil maps (on NRCS), it becomes evident that the UCSC property has similar soil composition (namely composed of units 132 and 178, the latter of which is classified as hydric) and although 132 (Elkhorn Sandy Loam) is not listed as hydric, significant wetlands occur over these areas on the UCSC campus and directly adjacent to the subject parcel. The report seems to rely on this non-listed status as grounds for dismissing the potential for wetlands to occur except for the few occurrences it specifically documents and explains by way of farm runoff and a seep. I find this premature given the evidence at the adjacent property...

...

**Buffers would be applied to all known wetlands in the** *vicinity*, whether or not they are on the actual parcel of interest. For example, the wetlands near the railroad would benefit from protective buffers as would those on the adjacent UCSC campus. Generally, the Commission requires a 100-foot buffer surrounding wetland areas, which would also be consistent with the City-wide Creeks & Wetlands Management Plan (CCWMP) and the certified LRDP for the UCSC Coastal Campus.

...

Similarly, other important natural resources would be protected and buffered so as to be consistent with the surrounding area. For example, habitat connectivity for California red-legged frogs (CRLF) should not be bottlenecked between Antonelli Pond and UCSC, where a 300-ft wildlife corridor is established along the northern parcel edge – we would want to preserve the 300-foot width across the subject parcel. Coincidentally, that corridor would include the railroad wetland buffer and possibly others (e.g., wetland observed at SP9). Though the CCWMP cites setbacks for riparian areas as being based from the centerline of the watercourse, note that the Commission more often relies on the outer edge of riparian vegetation as the *starting point* for buffers and these are most often on the order of 50-100 feet for perennial bodies so this too should be considered when identifying a development envelope.

•••

While there is reportedly a dominance of non-native grassland vegetation, I note that the Commission recognizes this problem is universal statewide and **even highly invaded grasslands may be considered ESHA**. For example, grassland is typically characterized by a presence of herbaceous species (grasses, forbs and ferns) and by the limited presence of woody species. Specifically, herbaceous species should constitute at least 25% of the total landscape area, while woody species should represent no more than 25% of this (usually, this is encroaching scrub). To qualify as a native grassland such as coastal terrace prairie ESHA, 10% or more of the total cover should be comprised of native grassland vegetation. This will be considered when reviewing biological surveys.

Habitat for listed species such as CRLF is also protected, even if not demonstrably occupied but with a high probability of occupation provided the surrounding environment. Western pond turtles and tricolored blackbirds are also reported from the immediate area and potentially other species could factor in.

### California Coastal Commission:

The American Civil Liberties Union of Northern California ("ACLU"), Disability Rights Advocates ("DRA"), Abbi Samuels, Peter Gelblum, and Veronica Crow respond to the staff recommendation of "no substantial issue" for the appeal associated with the City of Santa Cruz's Ordinance 2021-20 (the "OSV Ordinance" or "Ordinance"), Project CP21-0174.

Although the staff report correctly found the City's support for the parking restrictions were unsubstantiated and that unhoused people are an environmental justice community, the staff report erroneously determined that the appeal raises no substantial issue. The staff recommendation failed to consider the impact of the 24-hour (or daytime) parking restrictions proposed by the City and otherwise underestimated the extent to which the Ordinance and Permit impede coastal access. Further the staff's interpretation of the Commission's Environmental Justice Policy effectively makes it meaningless. As in 2016 when this matter was last before the Commission, we request that the Commission reject the staff recommendation and find a substantial issue here. If the City's plan is allowed to go forward, localities across the state will be encouraged to adopt similar plans and to severely curtail coastal access for unhoused people, people with disabilities, people of color, and other populations that the Commission's Environmental Justice Policy is meant to protect.

# I. The Staff Recommendation Underestimates the Extent to Which the Ordinance and Permit Unlawfully Limit Access to the Coast, Ignoring the 24-Hour Restrictions.

The staff report recognizes that "free and/or lower cost parking, particularly along public streets and rights-of-way, is an important public access need, especially for those coming from further away and least able to afford pay parking options." Yet, the staff report did not consider the full scope of the ordinance's parking restrictions in its public access analysis. In determining that there was no substantial issue regarding public access, the report failed to address or acknowledge the City's 24-hour<sup>2</sup> parking restrictions, writing only that "the program would operate between midnight and 5am, a time when public access pursuits are typically quite limited." As we noted in our appeal, in addition to these nighttime parking restrictions, the City's ordinance also prohibits parking of oversized vehicles (OSVs) at any time within 100 feet of a "crosswalk, intersection, boulevard, stop sign," traffic signal, or arterial street. These daytime restrictions are under the Commission's purview. The City provides no analysis of the impact of these 24-hour restrictions on coastal access and the staff report makes no mention of them in their report. This omission is reason alone to reject the staff recommendation.



As seen in the above map, this 24-hour restriction <u>severely</u> limits coastal access for owners of OSVs, including during daytime hours when the "public . . . pursuit[]" of coastal access is popular—for example, by prohibiting any OSV parking at all along nearly the entire length of multiple streets in the City. Though the staff report concludes the restrictions would affect "very few public . . . users" because "there is simply not a lot of public access occurring between midnight and 5am," the City's 24-hour parking restrictions make it practically impossible for OSV dwellers to park their vehicles at any hour, including the daytime. This lack of permissible places for OSV parking in the coastal area will have a particularly negative impact on people with mobility disabilities, including the elderly.

In addition to overlooking the 24-hour restrictions, the staff report also misconstrues how nighttime parking restrictions have impede coastal access. First, the staff report wrongly suggests that there must be some undefined threshold of impacted people before it can make a substantial issue finding. Then, without any factual support, the staff report simply assumes that there will be few who seek nighttime coastal access. 8 Critically, the staff report fails to account for

how nighttime parking facilitates daytime coastal access. Though there may be less coastal use at night, the staff report does not address the fact that overnight parking restrictions will require OSV drivers to seek out parking somewhere far from the coast at night, and then drive back for daytime use. The need to travel back-and-forth to the coastal zone is cost prohibitive and will be particularly arduous for people with mobility disabilities, severely impeding their coastal access.

For example, appellant Veronica Crow is a 70-year-old trans woman who lives in her RV for safety and to be close to the beach, which helps her manage the mental health impact of her various conditions. Ms. Crow has several disabilities, including chronic brain cancer and arthritis in her hands and knees. Being able to park on the westside allows her to walk along the beach and along the cliffs daily, which is a significant source of comfort and solace to her. She reports that the parking restrictions would make it impossible for her to access the coast. She cannot move her vehicle on a nightly basis because of the high price of gas, her vehicle's low gas mileage, and her limited income. The only available parking spots she knows of are within 100 feet of intersections, meaning that under the City's proposed plan she will have **no parking access during the day**. The daytime and nighttime parking bans will effectively put the coast entirely out of Ms. Crow's reach.

Together, the City's daytime and nighttime parking restrictions severely limit coastal access, especially for OSV owners with disabilities and limited mobility. The proposed development, as the staff report acknowledges, is also inconsistent with Coastal Act Section 30210 and Local Coastal Program (LCP) Policy 3.5, which require Santa Cruz to **maximize recreational access opportunities**. Far from maximizing recreational access opportunities, the City's proposal will effectively leave disadvantaged OSV dwellers with no access at all.

# II. The Staff Recommendation Fails to Remedy the Environmental Justice Issue Posed by the Ordinance and Permit.

The adoption of the 2019 Environmental Justice Policy provides that the Coastal Commission should consider environmental justice principles in its permit decisions. The Environmental Justice Policy states that "[t]he coast belongs to everyone, and access cannot be denied or diminished on the basis of race, ethnicity, income, socio-economic status, [] place of residence or other factors listed in the Policy Statement," including "disability status, sexual orientation, or

gender identity."<sup>10</sup> In fact, developments and permits should "identify[] and *eliminat[e]* barriers... in order to provide for those who may be otherwise deterred from going to the beach or coastal zone."<sup>11</sup>

The staff report correctly identified unsheltered individuals sleeping in OSVs as an environmental justice community, which the Commission's Environmental Justice Policy is intended to protect. <sup>12</sup> Unsheltered individuals, the report states, are a lower income segment of the population. <sup>13</sup> Indeed, the staff report openly acknowledges that "the City's program would **disproportionately affect unsheltered individuals**," and that the City's alternative parking program **lacks sufficient detail to mitigate punitive and regressive treatment of the unsheltered**. <sup>14</sup> However, the report then dismisses these environmental justice concerns outright, stating simply that they do not rise to the level of a substantial issue because "such situations are a function of other societal issues, and not so much an issue of impeded public access" <sup>15</sup>—a conclusion that directly contradicts the staff report's finding that the City's program itself, not some "other societal issue," would "disproportionately affect unsheltered individuals." <sup>16</sup>

In doing so, the staff report again relies on wholly unsubstantiated conclusions that "the overall public access impact [is] relatively small" and that "the public access issues" are "limited." The staff recommendation's analysis of public access and environmental justice implies that because (supposedly) relatively few people are adversely affected by the parking restrictions, there is no substantial issue. However, the substantial issue determination does not focus on the size of population affected, but is centered on equitable access. The Environmental Justice Policy explicitly states that the "coast belongs to *everyone*," Regardless of the size of their group.

In concluding that there can be no substantial issue simply because the minority group disproportionately affected by a discriminatory policy is small, the staff report turns the Commission's Environmental Justice policies—which were intended to protect just such a minority group—on its head.

As previously discussed, the City's parking restrictions directly obstruct coastal access for the unsheltered, a recognized environmental justice community, by preventing both daytime and nighttime access. The report gives short shrift to the impact of the City's proposal on people of color, and contains no discussion at all regarding the impact on people with disabilities, another recognized environmental justice community. By requiring daily travel to and from the coastal zone and leaving few if any daytime parking options for people in OSVs, the City's restrictions significantly burden people with limited mobility.

In sum, the City's proposed parking restrictions are directly contrary to the Commission's Environmental Justice policies—they actively erect barriers to access for lower income people, people of color, and people with disabilities.

# III. The Public Access and Environmental Justice Concerns Amount to Substantial Issues.

In 2016, the City passed a similar OSV ordinance and approved a coastal permit, but the Commission found the ordinance and permit unlawfully restricted access to the coast and posed a substantial issue, notwithstanding a staff report recommending otherwise. <sup>19</sup> The City's permit and ordinance today is just as discriminatory and unjustified as it was in 2016. If anything, the need for parking for coastal access has increased. The unsheltered population in Santa Cruz has only grown over the past 6 years, meaning that the Ordinance and Permit will have an even greater effect on coastal access than the comparable restrictions in 2016. Since 2016, the Coastal Commission expressly adopted a policy of considering environmental justice principles in its determinations, granting it an additional reason to find a substantial issue that was not present when it rejected the City's proposed restrictions the first time. <sup>21</sup>

This "past practice" and the environmental justice principles, alone, demand a finding of substantial issue. CCR Section 13115(c). Moreover, the Commission has a "presumption of a substantial issue" finding, per its implementing regulations.<sup>22</sup>

In truth, all five factors that the Commission must analyze in determining whether the City's plan poses a barrier to coastal access weigh clearly in favor of a finding that the Ordinance and Permit create substantial issues.

The degree of factual and legal support for the local government's decision

First, the staff report already found that the City lacks any factual and legal basis to support the conclusion that its program addresses a coastal resource concern. This conclusion is correct, and should be upheld.

The extent and scope of the development approved by the local government

Here the staff recommendation was clearly mistaken in concluding the scope is only nighttime hours. Factually, the staff recommendation ignored the 100 feet restrictions in place at all hours. *See supra* page 3 for a sample map of restrictions.

The significance of the coastal resources affected by the decision

The coastal resources affected are significant: Public access is of "paramount concern[]" to the Commission, <sup>23</sup> and the Ordinance severely impedes access given both the growing unsheltered population with a need for coastal access and the full-day restrictions.

The precedential value of the local government's decision for future interpretations of its LCP

The City's decision here is also precedential. It is pursuing a policy directly contrary to its own stated LCP and Environmental Justice considerations, which will undoubtedly inform the local government's future LCP interpretations—as well as providing a model of discriminatory and unjustified coastal access restrictions for other public entities to adopt. In 2016, Commissioners indicated the need for a policy as it relates to similar parking restrictions, to guide future cases—the substantial issue determination here is therefore precedential.

Whether the appeal raises only local issues as opposed to those of regional or statewide significance

Finally, the restrictions are also of statewide concern related to coastal resources: Other California communities will likely follow with similar ordinances if this permit is upheld, obstructing more and more of the coast.<sup>24</sup>

The staff report supports its recommendation by citing previous appeals where no substantial issue was found, despite a development being inconsistent with the LCP. However, these appeals—A-3-SCO-16-0069 (Verizon), A-3-SCO-17-0037 (Britt SFD), A-2-SON-20-0042 (Chapman), and A-2-SON-22-0015 (Chang)—are all distinguishable from this case.

The Verizon project was designed to mitigate and minimize effects inconsistent with the LCP.<sup>25</sup> Here, the City takes no action to mitigate the coastal access impact of its development: Even the staff report acknowledges the City's alternative parking program lacks detail or steps for implementation.<sup>26</sup> In both Britt SFD and Chang, the staff determined that the developments were sufficiently consistent with the relevant LCP policies<sup>27</sup>—here, the restrictions are clearly at odds with the relevant policies requiring the maximization of access and the consideration of environmental justice.<sup>28</sup> Finally, in Chapman, the staff found that a new development that deviated slightly from lot requirements posed no substantial issue because it did not differ "in any significant way" from existing, surrounding developments.<sup>29</sup> We are, here, dealing with an

entirely new set of parking restrictions and proposed developments, not comparable to any existing restrictions in the City.

To our knowledge, <u>no prior decision of the Commission has ever approved restrictions as sweeping as the ones proposed by Santa Cruz</u>. This appeal does not concern a single beach or resource, but rather the entirety of Santa Cruz's coast. <u>Under the staff recommendation, a locality need not substantiate or justify parking restrictions that target unhoused people or other minority groups, because there is a presumption of minimal impact as long as the group affected is small in number. This cannot stand and contradicts the 2016 substantial issue finding, as well as the Commission's newly adopted Environmental Justice policies.</u>

Because the City's parking restrictions are contrary to Coastal Act Section 30210, LCP Policy 3.5, and the environmental justice concerns, and significantly limit coastal access, they pose substantial issues.

### Dear California Coastal Commissioners,

You are in the unique position to determine whether the Oversized Vehicle Ordinance (OVO) appeal brings forward a substantial issue. The City Council majority who voted to adopt this ordinance are not tasked with the responsibility of upholding the California Coastal Act as you are. Within this context, your decision has farther reaching implications on whether the Coastal Act is being upheld and how its provisions will be enacted. Your decision holds tremendous weight in how we treat minority environmental justice groups and their right to equal and fair coastal access.

Staff provided very useful information in their staff report. I'm structuring this public comment according to the 5 factors they've laid out that are to be assessed for finding a substantial issue:

- 1. Substantial Issue Assessment Factor #1. From staff: "The degree of factual and legal support for the local government's decision that the development is consistent or inconsistent with the certified LCP and the Coastal Act's public access provisions.."
  - Staff's research in this area concluded the following: "[S]taff evaluated the City's evidence supporting the need for the CDP and concluded that the record does not include adequate evidence to support the City's case that there is a coastal resource reason for the CDP for the nighttime parking restrictions and related program elements (e.g., clear evidence suggesting that those parking in oversized vehicles at these times are leading to significant coastal resource impacts). In fact, the City's evidence that nighttime oversized vehicle parking leads to public health, safety, and nuisance problems, and associated coastal resource concerns (to which the City-approved project purports to be a solution) appears to actually be fairly limited and is not well fleshed-out in a way that would allow more detailed conclusions to be drawn as it relates to oversized vehicles as compared to non- oversized vehicles, daytime versus nighttime hours, and actual coastal resource impacts. Thus, staff believes that the record does not provide full support for the City's argument that the CDP is needed to address coastal resource impacts."
  - In my public comment at the city level as well as in my appellant application I point out with associated codes/resources that all of the concerns named as being driving forces behind a perceived need for OVO, may be addressed with current laws. No new law is needed to address those issues which means it is a failure of our local government and societal structure that allows the issues to continue that are being associated with oversized vehicle parking.
- 2. Substantial Issue Assessment Factor #2. From staff: "the extent and scope of the development"
  - The design permit for signage of the ordinance is minimal in extent and scope of development. However, enforcement should be considered. The OVO would create a patrolling, enforcing and criminalization element to the coastal region in Santa Cruz. The existence of the signs and associated enforcement, would send a loud message that some people are allowed to be here all the time, while some are restricted to only certain hours. The signage and enforcement are a physical

presence with far reaching implications.

- 3. Substantial Issue Assessment Factor #3. From staff: "the significance of the coastal resources affected by the decision"
  - The City contends that coastal resources would be better protected and more accessible with the OVO. However, as staff has also concluded, the evidence for this is weak. The complaints from community members leading to the OVO are not about the vehicles being there at night and hence the need to restrict their access. All complaints leading to OVO may be handled with existing laws, as delineated in my appellant paperwork.
- 4. Substantial Issue Assessment Factor #4. From staff: "the precedential value of the local government's decision for future interpretation of its LCP"
  - Currently, everyone in Santa Cruz has fair and equal access to coastal resources. Adopting and enforcing OVO prejudicially limits coastal access for a subset of the population and on a basis of whether they depend on their oversized vehicles for shelter or as their mode of transportation.
- 5. Substantial Issue Assessment Factor #5. From staff: "whether the appeal raises only local issues, or those of regional or statewide significance"
  - It is my understanding that there are similar ordinances in other cities in California. What is different about this one is that it is being officially appealed directly to the only governing body with the responsibility to uphold the California Coastal Act and its equal access right provisions. Perhaps in the other cities in which something similar exists, an environmental justice group would not be prejudiciously excluded from that right to coastal access. In Santa Cruz, it is explicitly clear that this is a direct goal of the ordinance to restrict coastal access for this minority group, and to criminalize them if they continue to access the coastal region at nighttime.
  - A city's regulation of parking can take many things into consideration and generally function within its municipal needs. They are not responsible for upholding the CA Coastal Act; however, you are. A decision by the Commission that this type of prejudicial coastal access is not a substantial issue would set a huge and very public precedent.

For finding a substantial issue, staff also says, "The Commission may, but need not, assign a particular weight to a factor, and may make a substantial issue determination for other reasons as well." Staff has rightly concluded that the community members who rely on their oversized vehicles are an environmental justice group. However, their dismissal of the implications of preventing coastal access to this group as trivial comes from their classification of it being small. They say "it would only affect that subset of that very small sample size". That is the definition of a minority. What the City of Santa Cruz and CCC staff recommendation are asking you to do is to say that prejudiciously restricting coastal access for a minority environmental justice group is not a substantial issue and fits fine within the Coastal Act provisions.

I have seen the great care taken by the commission to ensure equitable access for all as well as your acknowledgement that access is becoming harder and harder for many folks struggling to survive in a society with ever-escalating cost of living. The ocean is a touching stone of sanity for a large percentage of the population. And whenever damage is not the result of such access, the access must be maximized. I agree with staff that the city provided little to no evidence that our coastal resources or access are being damaged by the presence of oversized

vehicles. Deductively, that means restricting access for those living in them or who depend on them for transport (some ADA), is strictly prejudicial.

In essence, if this appeal is not upheld, California Coastal Commissioners are publicly ruling that it is ok to restrict the coastal access of a low income minority - an environmental justice group. From my experience following the Commission's work and the great care that is taken to uphold the Coastal Act - from individual appeals all the way to the energy and focus given to periodically amend each area's LCP - I believe you will find substantial issue.

Those "Conditions of Approval" passed by the Planning Commission were actually appealed by a City Council member. The City Council voted to reject the Planning Commission's changes and that is when we appealed to the CCC. City staff, City Council and the Planning Commissioners were not all on the same page about the structure of OVO.

Dear Commissioners,

I'm writing on behalf of *HUFF* (*Homeless United for Friendship and Freedom*), an organization of housed and homeless folks in Santa Cruz concerned about the impact of the City's Oversized Vehicle Ordinance on coastal access particularly for the poor and homeless population. It also impacts anyone of whatever class who attempts to access the Coast between midnight and 5 AM, whether traveler or resident.

I addressed the City Council on this issue when it was formally raised last year and spoke as well as at subsequent local Appeals hearings--at the Zoning Examiner, the Public Works Commission, and the final City Council meeting this spring when it was approved in modified form.

I also appealed a prior Santa Cruz nighttime-RV ban City Ordinance to the Coastal Commission in 2016. At that time, the Commission was persuaded 11-1 to find that a substantial issue was involved and essentially reject its own staff's recommendation. To my understanding, this was based on the fact that the City--its claims notwithstanding--had no parking facilities for those in vans of all economic stripes who wanted coastal access in the early morning hours. Also there seemed to be a City presumption of criminality on the part of whose only home was their vehicle, suggesting that a complete late night ban would address this problem. The Commission suggested that more real evidence was required both on the issue of homeless criminality and adequate storage. Until now, the City has not returned to appear before a de novo hearing.

The staff report suggests five considerations for finding whether an appeal raises a significant issue. Public access here is key. The main argument of the report seems to be that there are too few vehicles involved for public access to be a meaningful issue. However, City and Commission staff present no evidence of the numbers of vehicles or the number of unhoused, travelers, and residents affected. Since a main concern of the Coastal Commission

is coastal access, total denial of access during five hours requires some evidence. Ironically, the City's claims of a "crime" problem based on citizen calls for service--indicates there are significant numbers of folks using the coastal zone during that period of time. Of course, "calls for service" without evidence of citation, much less conviction, does not equate with crime, but does show numbers of people affected.

Many folks are not comfortable with the homeless minority being visibly present in their neighborhood--something African-American minorities have had to contend with for decades. In response Santa Cruz has adopted a broader unstated anti-homeless policy of eliminating visible poverty from public areas without respecting the rights of the entire community to have access to those areas. Limiting public access unnecessarily and in such a sweeping fashion in Coastal Zone is not justified by the staff report nor by the facts.

Regarding the storage issue which the Commission in its August 2016 hearing also found significant: The Safe Parking program proposed by the City is essentially a handful of spaces for scores of vehicles--a homeless population that has escalated because of COVID, spiraling rents, wildfires, job flight, and other factors.

We agree with the staff's finding that the factual and legal support for the OVO is inconsistent with the Coastal Act's public access provisions. However accessibility to coastal resources is clearly impacted and significantly so--particularly for those whose housing is their vehicle. At the August 2016 hearing, Commissioners asked staff to establish city and regional standards on an issue that was reappearing (exclusion of the homeless under pretext of "oversized vehicles")--so precedential value of the Commission's action on the OVO will have state-wide impacts for other coastal towns and for the rights of the homeless minorities there.

On the storage issue, it is already true that the City's Safe Parking programs have high barriers, have not been established, and seem to be a pretext to persuade the Coastal Commission without actually making resources realistically available. More than that, it seems farfetched to claim that travelers arriving in Santa Cruz will be able to find, apply, and be accepted in programs ("Safe Parking") or face hundreds of dollars in parking citations and possible tows.

The 2022 OVO law discriminates against those who do not own or rent property in Santa Cruz by denying them access to the permit process.. The law was done without determination on its impact on those living in their vehicles and threatens their health and safety in a time of public health uncertainty.

We feel this law needs to be more closely examined anew by the Coastal Commission with more public input from individuals seriously affected (poor people who live in their vans, homeless service providers, rv associations) and to more closely consider its consistency with

the City's LCP.

We support the concerns as articulated in the ACLU/Disability Rights and Santa Cruz Cares appeals which go into greater detail on a number of these issues.

The Association of Faith Communities (AFC) is a faith based non-profit with the mission to relieve suffering through interfaith action. Our 10-year ministry is focused on walking with our unhoused neighbors as they shelter in our rotating shelter and the first and only safe parking program in Santa Cruz County. SafeSpaces serves nearly 50 individuals nightly and in its three years of operation has rarely had an opening.

Over the years, these programs have been occasionally funded by state and federal funds administered by local governments. As a result, we know both City of Santa Cruz staff and Council members, as we have consulted with them to develop a solid, safe parking program. We are the only bidder in partnership with the Santa Cruz Free Guide to operate the third tier of the City's parking program in response to the City RFQ posting some months ago. We have enjoyed working with the City and trust that the City's staff and those we know on the Council are committed to finding the most workable solution to the political and resource problems surrounding the Oversized Vehicle Ordinance (OVO).

We take no position on the ordinance except to share and support the Coastal Commission's insistence that alternative safe parking must be found prior to implement.

The AFC does not know the criteria that the City used to assure the Commission that their safe parking program, in number and services offered, will meet the current and future needs of those the OVO will most certainly displace. We urge the Commission to take an oversight role to also prevent the ordinance from merely creating an exodus to unincorporated area of Santa Cruz County where this vulnerable population would continue to live on the edge.

Vagueness in either area could allow the City, as staff and council turnover, to walk back any commitment they made to support those displaced while simultaneously continuing costly enforcement and criminalization thus, subjecting this population to more misery, more debt and more insecurity. We would ask that the Commission examine the City's criteria closely to ensure their safe parking program is based on the real demand, and monitor their performance to hold them accountable not just at the enactment of the OVO but for the years it will take to find permanent housing for our vulnerable neighbors.

### Dear Coastal Commission Members:

I write to ask that you deny the appeals to the OVO, A-3-STC-22-0018-2. I am the former chair of the Santa Cruz County chapter of the ACLU, and a former director of programs in Contitutional Law at Stanford and Yale Universities. I also am a home owner living in a modest house, on a modest but increasingly busy street on the westside of the City of Santa Cruz. I ask that you take heed of the significant deleterious impacts that oversized vehicles have on residential streets such as mine.

Campers and other oversized vehicles are specialized vehicles that present special, often undesirable, uses that significantly affect the health and safety of residential neighborhoods. These impacts include the following:

- 1) Oversized vehicles impede visibility on narrow two-way streets, reducing lane-size, and causing passing vehicles to have to cross the center lane divider in order to obtain adequate clearance. They also create harrowing situations between drivers who suddenly find a significant part of the lane in which they are traveling obstructed and bicycle riders. In addition, they obstruct drivers from "seeing ahead" cyclists, and homeowners exiting their own driveways. They also make it also impossible for homeowners to exit their own driveways safely.
- 2) Public streets and residential neighborhoods are turned into campgrounds when oversized vehicles are unregulated and permitted to park, often for multiple days, in places not intended for such activity. When such vehicles have parked in front of or near my house, I have often had to clean up all manner of discarded, and often disgusting, trash and garbage left in the gutter and on the adjacent lawn strip. Sometimes the garbage is thrown into my hedge, or even farther up my driveway or into my front yard. These items include common trash, but also dirty diapers, food waste, used sanitary napkins, glass bottles (some of them full of human urine, and used hypodermic needles. I have on occasion found "campers' on my property using my water spigots, and "discretely" using my shrubbery to screen bodily functions not properly inflicted on others.

Of course I feel compassion for the people who must live in their vehicles. No doubt, there should be designated places where camping in a vehicle can be done with releative safety and proper facilities for waste disposal. But just letting people camp in and around their vehicles on public street in residential neighborhoods is dangerous, reprehensible, and consitutes a deriliction of duty on the part of public entities that allow such things. Surely, less perilous and more humane solutions are possible.

### Dear Coastal Commission,

I am a resident of Santa Cruz who is both heartily opposed to NIMBYism and strongly supportive of effectively addressing California's and our county's homelessness crisis and growing economic disparities. However, I am writing to convey that parking of large numbers of recreational and other vehicles serving as homes in Santa Cruz is occurring in ways that impact basic safety and access to community parks, sidewalks and in some cases streets. It does not need to be banned, but it does need to be regulated and subject to city oversight - that is a reasonable expectation for a community, as all of us - housed and unhoused - strive to life safely and in a way that works for everyone. I no longer feel comfortable letting my kids bike to school on their own because the route takes them through multiple blocks of long-term RV parking with trash, unleashed dogs, and at times people behaving erratically on the sidewalk and in the street. Similarly, I now drive rather than bike if I am going to leave work after dark because of increasingly frequent thefts, robberies, assaults and harassment along my route and at my workplace parking lot (Coastal UCSC Campus). My route there and back includes several blocks of permanent, vehicle-based living.

Parks in Santa Cruz are to varying degrees increasingly unusable to residents, and RVs parked along parks contribute to this through unsustainable/inappropriate use of bathrooms and picnic facilities, cooking on open fires, burning trash, residents passed out or asleep on playing fields and benches, and so on. The severity of impacts ranges - for example, Riverfront Park downtown is completely unusable; bathrooms at parks such as Garfield are only marginally usable at certain times due to trash dumping, drug use and unsanitary use; and the greenbelt park between Woodrow and Almar Avenues is usable in daytime but increasingly a site for late-night dumping, urinating and noise.

While I am not affected by declines in the availability of parking, I know this is also affecting others in our community, and this is especially so as recreational RV- and van-dwellers flock to our community in addition to those who are living in their vehicles out of economic or social necessity.

I know that a common rejoinder to this line of reasoning is that not everyone parking an RV contributes in any way to these safety issues, and of course that is true. But it also true that everyone or nearly everyone contributing to these safety issues in these areas and along these routes is living in their vehicle or visiting someone who is. Allowing the city to maintain some oversight and authority (we are not talking about a ban) is central to maintaining peace, safety and environmental quality - not just for the housed in our community but also, and more importantly so, for the unhoused who deserve clean, safe settings with city oversight and services to live in.

We need to solve the inequitable economic state of affairs in California, particularly along the coast. However, the appeals to the OVO, A-3-STC-22-0018-2 are not a way to do it while also maintaining reasonable city oversight of its population, who all - housed and unhoused - are subject to community-based rules that enable the community and all of us to function and thrive. Please deny these appeals and encourage appropriately scaled, durable, non-zero-sum

solutions to housing inequities on our coast.

### **Dear Coastal Commission Members:**

Thank you for allowing our group to comment on the appeals of the City of Santa Cruz coastal permit to prohibit parking of oversized vehicles citywide on public streets between midnight and 5 a.m. (OVO).

Westside Neighbors is a large neighborhood group organized in 2019 in response to a proposal to allow overnight RV parking in our neighborhood. We have attached the comprehensive email that we sent to the City of Santa Cruz's Planning Commission at its March meeting where the appellants filed their original appeal for further information about our organization and detail about the issues necessitating the city's Oversized Vehicle Ordinance. We also attach the petition created by one of our members which gathered 1,054 signatures requesting that the city implement and enforce a "no overnight RV parking" ordinance.

We support the Coastal Commission's staff finding of "no substantial issue" and request that the commissioners vote to uphold the staff recommendation and permit the OVO to proceed with the establishment of a permit parking program and a safe spaces parking program.

We support the Coastal Commission's staff report, and stress the following key points:

- Protect coastal recreation areas, maintain all existing coastal access points open to the
  public, and enhance public access, open space quality and recreational enjoyment in
  a manner that is consistent with the California Coastal Act. The Coastal Act and the
  LCP require the Commission to analyze the impacts holistically and not to focus only
  on maximizing public recreational access opportunities in a vacuum.
- At the same time, the Coastal Act and the LCP also require that such access not be maximized at all costs, and explicitly require that the public access policies be implemented in a way that takes into account the "time, place, and manner of public access depending on the facts and circumstances in each case", including evaluating the capacity of the area in question to sustain use and at what level of intensity, the potential need for "limiting public access to the right to pass and repass depending on such factors as the fragility of the natural resources in the area and the proximity of the access area to adjacent residential uses. Five of the most impacted streets are Swanton, Delaware, Shaffer, Natural Bridges and Mission, four of which are in residential neighborhoods. (See City of Santa Cruz staff report dated 9/21/21, below).

- Similarly, the direction in LUP Policy 1.7 to maximize public access and enjoyment of recreational areas is tempered by the **need for such maximizing to be consistent with** "sound resource conservation principle[s], safety, and rights of private property owners".
- "Environmental justice" The deterrence, reduction, and elimination of pollution burdens for populations and communities experiencing the adverse effects of that pollution. At a minimum, the meaningful consideration of recommendations from populations and communities most impacted by pollution.

When considering maximizing access to the coast, we respectfully ask that you consider the needs of neighbors, seniors, children and bicycles and the impacts that unregulated overnight vehicle camping has on coastal access and enjoyment for these groups.







Please include and consider the comments below in your deliberation regarding the appeal of the Oversized Vehicle Ordinance (OVO) filed by the activist groups, Santa Cruz Cares and the local ACLU chapter.

Westside Neighbors is a large neighborhood organization established in 2019 in response to one city councilman's proposal to allow overnight RV parking on Delaware Avenue. As you are aware, the lower Westside, in particular, has been significantly negatively impacted by issues related to people living in their vehicles/RVs on city streets, particularly on Swanton, Delaware, Fair, Shaffer, Mission Extension, Mission/Grandview, Ingalls, Swift, McPherson and Garfield Park, as well as the side streets adjacent to West Cliff Drive. Our local neighborhoods have been regularly subjected to the consequences of illegal dumping, greywater/blackwater discharge, fires, garbage, environmental degradation, criminal behavior including drug dealing, theft, weapons, and domestic violence, documented by SCPD/SCFD calls for service. For a more detailed background and review of these neighborhood concerns and attempted mitigations, including calls for service and vehicle abatement data, please read the city's Staff Report on the City Council agenda dated 9/21/21. Concerns about overnight vehicle/RV parking on city streets are long-standing, documented in city records as far back as 2013, when the Public Safety Committee recommended that an ordinance be brought forward to address these significant impacts, which, although passed by the City Council, was suspended following a homeless activist lawsuit to the Coastal Commission in 2016. Following multiple requests to Council and the Santa Cruz Police Department, this issue was addressed by City Council in 2021 and an ordinance brought forward, the Oversized Vehicle Ordinance.

There are two distinct components to this issue that require differentiation. There are those who camp overnight in vehicles/RVs by choice, visiting for a limited period of time (VanLife, Boondockers, etc.), people on vacation who are attracted to the lower Westside due to the mention on their apps about the minimal enforcement of "no overnight parking" signs on the lower Westside. And then there are those who camp overnight in vehicles/RVs out of necessity, using their vehicles for shelter. These two groups both negatively impact the neighborhoods, but need to be addressed in very different ways.

We believe the first group (those on vacation or adventuring) are the easier of the two groups to address. People on vacation, and those who can afford a \$100,000 sprinter van or a \$150,000 RV can easily afford to go to one of the dozen commercial/state RV parks and campgrounds in the county, and need to do so. Those people visiting to see friends/family locally can alternately apply for a permit to park in front of their friend's/family's house for a limited time period. First problem solved (with enforcement). The OVO as written outlines this and also provides for a permitting process.

The second group, those living in vehicles/RVs out of necessity and using them for shelter, present a much more challenging situation, one that the city is currently attempting to address. People living in vehicles/RVs long term need sanitation services for dumping grey/black water tanks, garbage, clean water, etc., and also require social services to assist them in improving their living situations. Allowing unsanctioned overnight parking on city streets without services

makes it much more difficult to consolidate service providers and sanitation services to assist those who need them. City streets and neighborhoods are not appropriate places for people to live in their RVs/vehicles. We believe the OVO exerts significant pressure on the city/county to locate safe places for overnight parking on city/county property with services for people who need them, and we support the city's current efforts to do so. The complete staff package of the OVO included safe night time parking areas in an attempt to stabilize people's living situations and connect them to services. The homeless activists actually obstruct progress toward getting people services by paralyzing the city/county under threat of lawsuit into maintaining the status quo, much as has been seen at the Benchlands. Maintaining the status quo helps no one, not the neighborhoods and not the homeless. Granting this appeal would effectively halt the progress the city has made and continues to make in identifying sanctioned places for people to live in their vehicles safely with services, and would serve only to undermine the progress made to date.

We would like to address a few specific points noted in the appeals:

- The city has adequately engaged with the public for many years on this issue. One has only to review the more than 1,000 e-mails in support of an RV ordinance received during the City Council meetings about this issue, or take note of the 1,050 signatures on the June, 2020 petition requesting the city to address overnight RV camping in neighborhoods, to see that there has been much public engagement on this subject. We refer you to the 9/21 Staff Report for further information, and to the public correspondence e-mails received on 9/16/21, 10/14/21, and 11/2/21 to document the many hundreds of requests to create/enforce no overnight RV parking in city neighborhoods. The city has also created commissions to study and address this issue (Public Safety Committee, CACH), both arriving at similar conclusions (regulation is necessary; sanctioned safe spaces need to be established with services provided). Enough public input and comment has been received and included to feel confident that the OVO is the direction most people in the city want to see put into practice to address this issue and address related needs.
- We believe that the city **can** defend itself against the constraints of Martin v Boise based on the fact that it is providing places for people to go, and that with the addition of more safe spaces parking this will be recognized at the Coastal Commission level as well.
- The person identified by name in the ACLU appeal is well known to the lower Westside, as she has lived in her 29 foot FMC motorhome (with her accompanying VW beetle) for over five years, primarily parking overnight at Garfield Park but also on David Way, Woodrow, and Bethany Curve, as stated "deliberately parking within a half-mile from the ocean". Contrary to the benign statements made by the ACLU, this vehicle has been the subject of numerous complaints to Westside Neighbors and Vehicle Abatement. Contrary to ACLU statements that the OVO would result in blocking her access to the coast, she could simply park her motorhome in a safe spaces lot and drive her VW to the beach every day. (See photo below taken today at W Cliff/Woodrow of the FMC with VW). With oversized vehicles such as this one parking 24/7 for three days or longer at a time, these vehicles are actually blocking coastal access for the general public. There are a number of similar long-term RV residents such as this one parked in the lower Westside neighborhood streets that we could highlight, the reason that regulation is necessary.
- We do not believe the OVO conflicts with the General Plan, one of the basic tenets of which is to "Protect natural resources and the public health and safety". The natural

environment you are sworn to protect and the quality of life for Westside residents have both been significantly compromised by unsanctioned RV/vehicle camping, and we encourage you to make your decision in alignment with this principle of the General Plan. Enforcement is required to ensure that those living in their vehicles move to a sanctioned place where they can receive services and support, at the same time mitigating the negative impacts on the environment and city neighborhoods that unsanctioned camping creates.

In conclusion, Westside Neighbors requests that the Planning Commission reject the appeal of the OVO for the following reasons:

- 1) The lower Westside neighborhoods have suffered from significant negative impacts of unregulated RV/vehicle camping, well documented by city staff, and regulations have been attempted to be put in place since 2013. These neighborhoods have been waiting eight years for regulations to be implemented including enforcement and mitigation strategies to be put in place to address this situation.
- 2) Recreational camping on city streets must be prohibited, except for what is outlined in the OVO permit program. Neighborhood streets should not be used as unregulated RV campgrounds. Those with means must use commercial/state RV campgrounds.
- 3) We support an expanded safe sleeping program as outlined in the OVO and currently being developed by the city/county. People living in vehicles/RVs out of necessity need to have safe places to park, with sanitation services and social services to assist them improve their living situations. These safe parking spaces need to be on city/county property and not in residential neighborhoods. Supporting the OVO will apply pressure to support the city's efforts in identifying and establishing additional safe spaces for those who need them.

Good government creates and enforces effective policies to manage identified problems. We are counting on the Planning Commission to uphold the ordinance that the City Council has passed to address this long-standing problem. It's long past time to move forward from continuous stalemate to actually beginning to take steps to solve this problem. Please reject this appeal and uphold the OVO.

## **RECOMMENDATION:** Motion to:

1. Introduce for publication an ordinance amending Title 10 "Vehicles and Traffic" at Chapter 10.04 "Definitions" and Chapter 10.40 "Stopping, Standing and Parking" and Chapter 10.41 "City-Wide Parking Permit" Pertaining to the Parking of Oversized Vehicles and Chapter 16.19 "Storm Water and Urban Runoff Pollution Control" at Section Section 16.19.070 "Discharge of Sewage Prohibited."

2. Direct staff, in cooperation with an ad hoc subcommittee to be appointed by the Mayor to develop, and return for Council consideration, policy direction on expansion of city operated or sponsored safe parking permit programs for unhoused City residents living in licensed and registered oversized vehicles in the City of Santa Cruz, to be implemented prior to enforcement of overnight parking component of the proposed ordinance.

**BACKGROUND:** The City of Santa Cruz is experiencing an increasing number of oversized vehicles parking for long periods of time on city streets, impacting public safety, health, and the environment for those who are housed and unhoused. The City must balance the preservation of health and safety with helping our most vulnerable.

Local Context. The increase in the number of oversized vehicles parking in the City of Santa Cruz, and the subsequent impacts, may be quantified in multiple ways. In July 2021, local residents conducted a two-week oversized vehicle count of the most heavily impacted streets on the lower Westside (Delaware, Shaffer, Natural Bridges, McPherson, Ingalls, Fair, Mission St., and Garfield Park), as well as some other areas of the city (Harvey West etc.). An average of 65 oversized vehicles were found to be parked on city streets in those areas. This number can and does ebb and flow based on a variety of factors.

Community residents contact the city regularly with requests to address the presence of and/or impacts from extended oversized vehicle parking. These requests come via Santa Cruz Police

Dispatch, Public Works Parking Division, and through emails, phone calls, and verbal communications directly to staff and council.

The types of issues raised through these calls for service include: the illegal dumping of trash, debris, and human waste onto City streets, sidewalks, and waterways; fires associated with oversized vehicles; lack of access to neighborhood and coastal parking; and increased criminal activities in areas where oversized vehicles are parked, including theft of bicycles and other property, private water connections being used, and gasoline thefts.

Local data demonstrates the extent of the challenges. To date in 2021, there have been at least 15 emergency calls for service to 911 that have been related to oversized vehicles, with seven of those calls related to fire and/or gas leakage. In calendar year 2020 and to date in 2021, the Santa Cruz Fire Department reported 38 fire incidents that are vehicle related, three that were specifically related to oversized vehicles. Also to date in 2021, there were 12 oversized vehicle related service calls and 14 public right of way calls to the Wastewater Collection Division. Additionally, police vehicle abatement activities have continued over the years. According to the Vehicle Abatement Officer, in the calendar year 2020, 2,243 abatement notices were issued, 197 vehicles were towed, including 20 which were oversized vehicles or camper vans. Since January of this year, the Police Department has received 2,456 calls with a recreational vehicle/motorhome or abandoned vehicle associated with the call. In regard to the vehicle abatement program, the Police Department tagged 294 recreational vehicle/motorhome and towed about 12 of them. More oversized vehicles could be towed by police and Public Works parking enforcement personnel. The challenge is adequate storage space. Tow companies are incapable of storing oversized vehicles on their property. The City created its own tow yard at the landfill. The landfill space is maxed out and logistically cumbersome for staff at the landfill.

Attachment 3 provides additional vehicle abatement information including recent heat map data and graphs of frequency and locations of vehicle abatement activities. As the graph demonstrates, various parts of the city are disproportionately impacted. The five streets with the most vehicle abatement activity (Delaware, Natural Bridges, Shaffer, Mission, and Almar) were all on the West Side, and approximately one third of the abatements citywide are focused on the far West Side. The Vehicle Abatement Officer counted 15 out of state license plates on oversized vehicles that he was able to assess in one morning in certain areas of the West Side. A pilot parking study was conducted using the city's Smart City Sensor located at the Cowell overview parking lot, and showed that fewer than 6% of vehicles were blocking access for almost 30% of all parking spaces (see Attachment 4), with some of those vehicles being oversized vehicles. The City Manager's Office has spent approximately \$10,000 so far this calendar year in refuse services solely on the far Westside to mitigate the illegal dumping from oversized vehicle/car dwellers. This does not include staff time from the City Manager's office or Public Works in coordinating these efforts.

One of the issues that is most often raised with regard to extended oversized vehicle parking is the discharge of raw sewage onto City streets and into storm drains. Runoff from the City's storm drain system is periodically tested as part of regional testing efforts, but not at a scale that would be able to quantify the environmental impacts under discussion. Any verified discharge of human waste into the storm sewer system is considered a violation of the City's Municipal Code (Section 16.19.090); if left unaddressed, the City is at risk of violating its National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Municipal Regional Permit, which could lead to enforcement actions by the Regional Water Quality Control Board.

The challenges described above have been on-going. In 2013, the Public Safety Citizens Task Force came together to address the negative impacts (as described above) experienced by oversized vehicles on city streets. In late 2013, the Task Force recommended that the City review and implement strict parking ordinances related to oversized vehicles parking on City streets and called for additional enforcement of existing parking restrictions (see Attachment 5). On November 24, 2015 City Council approved the first reading and on December 8, 2015, it finally adopted Ordinance No. 2015-17 adding Section 10.04.085, 10.04.104, 10.04.106, 10.04.165, 10.40.120 and amending Section 10.41.060 of the Municipal Code Relating to the Parking of Oversized Vehicles. After consultation with Coastal Commission staff, City staff processed a Coastal Development Permit (CDP) for implementation of the Ordinance in the Coastal Zone. On June 1, 2016 the City of Santa Cruz Zoning Administrator approved a CDP to prohibit overnight oversized vehicle parking on City streets within the coastal zone from midnight to 5 a.m., which was appealed to the Coastal Commission. On August 10, 2016, the Coastal Commission found "substantial issue" with respect to the Ordinance's consistency with Coastal Act policies. The appeal is currently pending. Since the 2016 Coastal Commission decision, other cities in the coastal zone have passed similar ordinances.

## *Outreach, Council Direction and Efforts Underway.*

This report responds to city council direction at the June 22, 2021 hearing to: Direct staff to begin evaluating the City's existing RV ordinance (2015-2017) for amendments to align with the existing Camping Services and Standards ordinance including programming such as designated safe parking programs, in partnership with faith community/community partners; as well as time, place, and manner of use of RVs for daytime and nighttime camping, and return to Council to provide input on community engagement approach, with an update in October on ordinance amendment approach, and with an update on California Coastal Commission process for approvals in the coastal zone.

The community input regarding the challenges and impacts of oversized vehicle parking have been substantial since the 2016 Coastal Commission appeal. In February 2019, after a previous Councilmember's proposal to permit overnight oversized vehicle camping on Delaware Avenue on the lower Westside, over 400 letters in opposition were sent to the City Council. Community input concerns cited included environmental impacts, neighborhood safety, increased crime, garbage, human excrement, fire danger, drug dealing, and other illegal and nuisance behaviors. One recent example in which the community provided input regarding impacts from illegally parked oversized vehicles was on Olive Street, a one-block residential street off Mission Street. Many community members contacted council to request that oversized vehicle's not be permitted to park in this area due to public health and safety impacts and ultimately their request was honored by council. A petition with over 1000 signatures, urging city staff and council to address the public health and safety impacts of oversized vehicle parking was created on Change.org and sent to city staff and council.

Information was gathered on approximately 30 coastal communities throughout California, in order to explore existing practices and to explore options the City of Santa Cruz may have in addressing the ongoing oversized vehicle parking challenges in our City. Commonalities in impacts of oversized vehicles in like communities were reviewed. The city modelled the proposed permit parking provisions of the proposed ordinance after Santa Monica's ordinance.

The city currently has approximately 15 known safe parking spaces managed by the Association of Faith Communities (AFC), including approximately 13 on religious assembly sites and two on

city-owned property. AFC also has an additional 21 spaces outside the city limits. The city also allows businesses to host safe parking spaces; however, since no permits are required to allow such parking, it is unknown how many such spaces are being provided by businesses. This is a significant increase and improvement to what was present and available in the city when this ordinance was first introduced to the City Council in 2015.

Neighborhood allies have already begun working with county representatives and faith based groups to identify additional spaces, including spaces outside the city and in unincorporated areas of the county. Council members are also working with County Board members, non-profit organizations, neighborhood groups and faith-based groups to identify potential expanded safe parking spaces and partnerships on the development of a comprehensive program and policies to address the required services for people who are residing in oversized vehicles.

**DISCUSSION:** The purpose of this ordinance amendment and policy direction is to:

- 1. Provide parameters on time, place, and manner of parking of oversized vehicles on city streets in order to address environmental and public health impacts.
- 2. Form an ad hoc committee consisting of the three councilmembers and City Manager's Office staff to develop policy direction on expansion of city operated or sponsored safe parking programs. Implementation of the overnight parking prohibition component, pursuant to Section 5 of the proposed ordinance, would be deferred pending Council approval of such expanded programs.

The ordinance amendments build on existing Santa Cruz Municipal Code that address Oversized Vehicles' environmental and public health impacts while providing policy direction to expand safe parking programming.

A summary of the amendments are provided below.

Overnight Parking Permit. The following provisions would apply to Overnight Parking Permits:

- Available to a "resident" or "out-of-town visitor," as defined in Section 10.04.165 and 10.04.104, respectively.
  - o Residents
    - Valid for one year, allowing parking of an oversized vehicle for four periods of up to 72 consecutive hours per calendar month.
    - Parking location: Street curb immediately adjacent to the residence, or within four hundred feet of that person's residence if adjacent parking is not possible.
  - Out-of-town visitors
    - Valid for a maximum of 72 hours in the location identified above for residents, or
    - Valid for a maximum of 30 days in specific, non-residential parking areas designated by the city.
- Fee
  - A future Council resolution would establish the permit fee(s).

### • Denial of Permits

O The city may deny the issuance of an oversized vehicle overnight parking permit for up to one year if the city manager or his/her designee finds that: the applicant is not a resident; the resident or out-of-town visitor guests have been issued four or more citations for violations in the same calendar year; the out-of town visitor is not a guest of the resident applicant; or an owner of an oversized vehicle has procured any oversized vehicle parking permit through fraud or misrepresentation.

# City Operated or Sponsored Safe Parking Programs.

• In addition to the private property allowances authorized through Chapter 6.36.030, the City may operate, sponsor, or authorize safe parking programs for oversized vehicles on any City owned or leased properties in non-residential areas of the City. The City Manager shall develop a policy that establishes operational criteria for safe parking programs and shall submit that policy to the Council for review and approval.

At the time of the proposed amendments of this ordinance, a scan conducted on the most highly impacted areas, showed an average of 65 unpermitted oversized vehicles. We acknowledge that the parameters set forth and permitting requirements in this ordinance may be challenging for some community members with oversized vehicles. Therefore, as part of its consideration of the proposed ordinance, it is proposed that an ad hoc committee be formed to develop policy direction recommendations on expansion of city operated or sponsored safe parking programs. The recommendations will evaluate sanitation resources, requisite permits for participation (if any), costs for permits (if any), length of allowable stay, and oversight or supervision of the locations/program. The ad hoc committee will also explore low barrier programs, including but not limited to how low/no cost permits or parking, expired registration, and/or other factors can be accommodated for limited duration. The committee will continue to work with partners including the faith community, nonprofits and the County, so that safe parking sites will be dispersed throughout the County, including in the unincorporated areas of the County. Safe parking sites will link to existing community services that will lead to a pathway to housing.

The Santa Cruz Community Advisory Committee on Homelessess (CACH) recommended that the Council adopt "municipal code amendments to increase safe parking capacity at faith-based parking lots" in their August 11, 2020 final report to the Council. The Council has already made such amendments through the Camping Services and Standards Ordinance. While not explicitly called out as one of the final CACH recommendations, the recommendation in this report to further expand the number of safe sleeping locations available within the City and County, including through a City-sponsored program, is consistent with the CACH's desire to expand safe parking capacity on faith-based parking lots (Attachment 6).

# **Additional Supports**

Members of the community are committed to the success of these efforts in both mitigating negative impacts on surrounding neighborhoods where oversized vehicles are parked as well as supporting individuals who reside long-term in oversized vehicles. After analyzing the best practices in other communities, members of the community suggested some ideas to bring forward that they would initiate. These include:

- A voucher Program for Oversized Vehicle Wastewater Dumping. Developing and funding a voucher program for Santa Cruz city residents with a partial or full subsidy of the \$15 dump fee at the nearest dumping station. Community members interested in initiating this would coordinate with local nonprofit service providers to distribute and track the vouchers.
- A limited number of financial support subsidies for individuals who are Santa Cruz city residents needing support towards vehicle repair and registration. These funds would be established through partnerships with neighborhood groups.

# Consistency with Prior Council Direction.

- Public Safety Task Force Recommendations of 2013 (Attachment 5)
- Adoption of Ordinance No. 2015-17 adding Section 10.04.085, 10.04.104, 10.04.106, 10.04.165, 10.40.120 and amending Section 10.41.060 of the Municipal Code Relating to the Parking of Oversized Vehicles, December 2015
- CACH Final Report and Recommendations, August 2020 (Attachment 6)
- Current council direction provided on June 22, 2021

#### Health in All Policies.

*Health*. The health and well-being of all Santa Cruz residents are of utmost importance. The public health impacts of extended oversized vehicle parking include: dumping of trash, debris, and human waste onto City streets, sidewalks, and waterways, fires and criminal activities such as bicycle and other personal property theft, private water connections being used, and gasoline thefts.

Equity. We acknowledge that the parameters set forth and permitting requirements in this ordinance may be challenging for some community members with oversized vehicles. Therefore, the council directs staff to work with a council ad hoc committee to develop policy direction on expansion of city operated or sponsored safe parking programs. The policy shall evaluate sanitation resources, requisite permits for participation (if any), costs for permits (if any), length of allowable stay, and oversight or supervision of the locations/program. The ad hoc committee will also explore low barrier programs, including but not limited to how low/no cost permits or parking, expired registration, and/or other factors can be accommodated for limited duration.

Sustainability. Environmental sustainability is a core value of the City of Santa Cruz and informs all City operations. Prohibiting the use of public right-of-way for oversized vehicle parking throughout the City of Santa Cruz would accomplish reduction of the likelihood of human waste entering the storm drain system or contaminating the nearby environment.

#### Environmental Review.

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) provides several "categorical exemptions" which are applicable to categories of projects and activities that the Natural Resource Agency has determined generally do not pose a risk of significant impacts on the environment. Section 15307 of the CEQA Guidelines "consists of actions taken by regulatory agencies... to assure the maintenance, restoration, or enhancement of a natural resource where the regulatory process involves procedures for protection of the environment." Section 15308 of the CEQA Guidelines "consists of actions taken by regulatory agencies... to assure the maintenance, restoration, enhancement, or protection of the environment where the regulatory process involves procedures for the protection of the environment." The proposed ordinance is not anticipated to result in any

new construction, including but not limited to any construction of new facilities for public services such as police, parks, or fire. Many individuals already park oversized vehicles in the City, and the ordinance is not anticipated to result in any additional impacts associated with parking of oversized vehicles. By providing safe parking locations where sanitation facilities would be present and by prohibiting overnight parking elsewhere, the proposed ordinance is expected to result in significantly fewer instances of overnight parking on City streets where sanitation facilities, including restrooms and trash services, are unavailable. That change, in and of itself, will create beneficial impacts to the environment through an increase in the proper disposal of waste compared to existing conditions and allowances, where the City has no mandated safe parking locations. Further, the City's experience has been that the most significant environmental degradation associated with oversized vehicle overnight parking occurs in places where groups of oversized vehicles become entrenched in an area and remain in that area for an extended period of time. As such, the ordinance will reduce environmental impacts when comparing its outcomes to the status quo. As the majority of environmental impacts resulting from the ordinance will be beneficial rather than detrimental and with the other potential environmental effects being de minimis, the project is also exempt under Code of Regulations Section 15061(b), the "common sense exemption," since it can be seen with certainty that no significant effect on the environment will occur. Therefore, the adoption of this ordinance is exempt from CEQA.

## Summary.

The approaches proposed by City staff includes the amendment of existing codes to prohibit oversized vehicles parking in the City of Santa Cruz for extended periods of time; and an online oversized vehicles Permitting system that limits the total amount of time any oversized vehicles or registered owner of an oversized vehicle parks their vehicle on the City's right-of-way, streets, and off-street parking lots in a calendar year.

Additionally, the council proposes the formation of an ad hoc committee that will work with City staff and community partners to expand the existing safe parking spaces for long-term City residents who, due to their financial circumstances, are determined to be involuntarily unhoused and incapable of availing themselves of alternative parking arrangements, such as at state parks, privately owned RV parks, or similar facilities designated for oversize vehicle parking.

FISCAL IMPACT: The exact fiscal impacts of the ordinance and the policy direction contained in these recommendations will vary based on a variety of factors. Cost sharing with the County and with local non-governmental organizations is desirable and would be sought but is not guaranteed. City staff will need to dedicate time towards the issuance of oversized vehicle parking permits. Costs for said permits, along with the extent of cost recovery, are yet to be determined. The costs for the safe parking program will vary depending on the number of locations, number of vehicles, and hours of operation, each of which will affect the number of staff necessary to provide oversight and services to the program and participants. Cost estimates for the safe parking sites can be explored as part of the recommended policy direction.

City staff currently spend significant time and incur direct expenses for various work associated with oversized vehicles, such as trash removal surrounding oversized vehicles. The safe parking program could result in a reduction of certain expenditures; however, it is expected that the regular and ongoing staffing of such a program will be a net expense to the City.

The Oversized Vehicle Ordinance in Santa Cruz must be voted against. Nearly every week one or more elderly people come to Food Not Bombs asking about how to get into a shelter after their vehicle was towed and junked by the City of Santa Cruz. After seeking shelter that is always full I had the person a \$35 pup tent and ask one of our volunteers to help them find a place on the levee or Benchlands to camp. Many of these people are signal women in their late 60s, 70s and at time in their 80s. It is heart breaking to have to tell them that they will be sleeping on the cold ground knowing they may be attacked and robbed.

I hand out between \$500 to as much as \$2,000 a month in pup tents often to people who have just had their RV or camper taken by the city.

The Oversized Vehicle Ordinance if enacted will be a huge crisis as the number of people moving into their vehicles increase as a result of the failing economy. One of the first things a person who is facing homelessness does if they have the resources is to by a van or RV. Hundreds more "Oversized Vehicles" are likely to settle on our streets and the industrial areas on and near Delaware Streets on the West Side of Santa Cruz are the least intrusive to those who still live in houses.

The chaos and potential violence that could result from efforts to drive this ever growing population could be a huge crisis for everyone, housed and unhoused. The desperation of those being forced into tents is already intense and if hundreds of people are threatened with the lose of their only safety things could get very chaotic and dangerous for the police who at no fault of their own will be put into a position of having to confront and very angry mob with nothing left to loose.

If enforced and hundreds are driven into the doorways and parks this will also spark anger from those who must wake to camps outside their homes or shops.

If toilets, showers and dumpsters are provided in these industrial areas and people are allowed to sleep in their vehicles in those locations conditions for all of us in Santa Cruz will be must more safer and relaxed.

#### Dear Commission Members,

As a resident in the DeAnza Mobile Home Park located at 2395 Delaware Ave Delaware, Santa Cruz 95060, I am confronted daily along the route of morning jog with the situation of homeless individuals living in recreational vehicles, attached and unattached trailers and automobiles that are being parked and lived in along both sides of this stretch of Delaware Ave. The west side of Delaware Ave at this point is the borderline of Natural Bridges State Park and dead ends into the entry gate for the University of California Santa Cruz's Marine Science campus. The east side of the street affronts Antonelli's Pond.

The number of these vehicles have increased significantly over the past six months. A large percentage of these have been parked here, unmoved for months on end. Two of these long-term vehicles now have flat tires. All of this is happening in spite of the fact that this section of Delaware Ave. is posted with signage stating that parking is prohibited between 12 midnight and 6 AM every day of the week.

During daylight hours I have seen many of their occupants doing major mechanical work on their vehicles and then leaving removed parts, worn out tires and spilled motor fluids behind. This is in spite of a city ordinance that prohibits doing mechanical work on a car on any city street in Santa Cruz. I have even witnessed one individual taking a bucket of engine oil and pouring it down a rainwater collection grate who contents flow directly into Monterey Bay. Food waste and other refuge is piled up on the embankment of the state park and next to Antonelli's Pond. It's a common sight to see the disposed of food waste scattered by the animals that reside within the park and the pond area.

Two days ago I saw a gentleman coming down off the bream from the state park with a roll of toilet paper in his hand. He then entered a vehicle that had sunscreens blocking out both its front and side windows. With no restroom facilities on this side of the park, nor any available port-a-potties, it's no surprise that the individuals sleeping in cars use the park's wooded area as their toilets.

During the night time hours some of my neighbors have complained about the noise coming from generators being used in these vehicles. And they have also observed the use barbecue grills and even open fire pits next to the wooded and grassy embankments on several occasions.

Since parking is extremely limited within the UCSC Marine Science campus, a large number of students use Delaware Avenue as a place to park their vehicle while attending classes. With the growth in the number of these long-term camping units on Delaware Ave. many students are now unable to do so.

These vehicles also block parking access to city residents and visitors wanting to visit Natural Bridges State Park using one of the three trail heads that originate on Delaware Avenue.

I fully realize that these homeless individuals need a location where they can park their

vehicles for long periods of time and use them as their residence. But allowing them to use this area in growing numbers, ungoverned by any rules, regulations and laws, is extremely problematic and potentially dangerous.

Also during my morning jog along Delaware Ave. I have mentioned to three of these vehicle owners that this area is closed overnight parking. In each case I've been met with responses of "mind your own business", "what are you going to do about it" and "f... off.

I've included photos with this email that I've taken over the last two days.

In closing I want to thank each member of the commission for taking my statements into consideration in your discussions and rulings.



I am writing this email to you asking that you **do not repeal** the Santa Cruz City ordinance concerning unregulated vehicle camping on city streets. Due to lack of enforcement the current situation is a prerequisite to what will happen if the city has no ability to regulate street camping.

The West Side streets (Delaware, Natural Bridges, and Shaffer), have over 30 street campers at any given time. The campers hinder access to our residences, take up visitor parking access to the UCSC Longs Marine campus, Natural Bridges State Park, and Antonilli pond.

We are not comfortable walking along the street as some of the street campers parked there are doing and dealing drugs, and make rude aggressive comments to my wife. There is always trash left behind when they do move, and often there is the strong smell of human waste from the dumping of their holding tanks into the street drains that goes into the lagoon at Natural Bridges, and Antonelli Pond.

The Coastal Commission should mandate that the current ordinance be aggressively enforced by the city for the protection of the fragile environment, and maintaining the visiting public access to this splendid area that is winter home to the endangered Monarch Butterfly.

I'm a resident of DeAnza Manufactured Home Park. My home, #147, is the only home in the park with frontage on Delaware Ave and a view of Antonelli Pond. From our unique vantage point, we've seen "street campers" park on both sides of the street for weeks on end, urinating and defecating next to our yard, throw unimaginable trash in the street and into the creek leading directly to Natural Bridges State Beach. I have sent photos of vehicles, license plates, and drainage hoses leading directly from the vehicles waste receptacles to the creek itself. Many of the vehicles park here for weeks, even months, without ever moving. Many are trailers or 5th wheels up on blocks or jacks, with no moving vehicle attached. We've seen "campers" fight, use drugs, play loud music, run generators into the night, cut vegetation on and spray paint state park property. One camper screamed and cursed for hours, apparently on the phone, clearly disturbed. I was told, after multiple calls to SCPD, that it "wasn't illegal to scream". All this has happened about 25 feet from, in plain sight of my living room, bedroom and deck.

The residents of these vehicles are not, for the most part, tourists and beach-goers seeking access to the coast. Many never leave their vehicles. Some erect semi-permanent external shelters and actual wooden furniture. One resident installed a full-sized childrens swing set which remained in place for months. Several have chosen Delaware Ave as a location to rebuild their engines or remodel their campers, leaving all their trash behind when they left. This is not Coastal Access, these are homeless encampments on public streets.
