As a current resident of Pacific Grove and a former City of Pacific Grove (PG) Planning staff member who worked for several years on this project, primarily ensuring its consistency with the City's newly certified LCP, I strongly support Coastal staff's recommendation to approve the project as presented in the staff report.

The applicant has worked tirelessly to create a beautiful plan that meets the needs of the community - an architecturally stunning first-class hotel that will bring much-needed TOT, sales, and property tax revenue to the City, considerable visitor-serving amenities, and low-cost accommodations – all while staying within the parameters of the City's zoning code; no exceptions were granted at the City level.

The people of PG said "Yes!" to a ballot measure in 2016 that allowed hospitality use on this property and now the City is fortunate to have the opportunity to be home to this beautiful hotel and entertainment space. It is time for the City to reap the full value of proximity to the Aquarium and Cannery Row by establishing a hotel in this location. It will bring jobs, entertainment, and vitality to Pacific Grove, all of which are sorely needed.

Dear Chair Hart, Coastal Commissioners, and Staff:

I am a resident of Monterey County writing in opposition to the American Tin Cannery Hotel Project. The American Tin Cannery Hotel Project proposal is another example of a development that prioritizes luxury tourism and real estate interests while running roughshod over our state's precious coastal resources and ignoring the needs and opinions of Monterey Bay residents.

I urge the Coastal Commission to deny the proposed Coastal Development Permit as it runs afoul of several goals and policies of the Pacific Grove Local Coastal Program and the Coastal Act.

As it is currently proposed, the size and scale of the project would negatively impact water supply, habitat, public access, and historic resources. The minor reduction in size and the inadequate special conditions proposed by Coastal Commission staff do very little to address the serious concerns that have been raised throughout the process by residents, environmentalists, and the Coastal Commission staff itself. The project is simply too large for the project site. It should not be approved for the following reasons:

1. There is not a sustainable, long-term water supply sufficient to serve a project of this size. The project would result in a substantial increase in water use at the site, and Coastal Commission staff admits that the methodology used to justify the project's water use is "least protective of coastal resources that are impacted by water demand."
2. The project would cause unavoidable negative impacts to sensitive species such as harbor seals, due to the scale of the project and the decision to excavate for underground parking. The proposed special conditions would not prohibit construction during pupping season, even though the site is very close to sites where seals birth and raise their pups every year.
3. Rather than maximizing public access, the proposed project reduces public access by privatizing a public street. This privatization is necessary because the project is too big to fit within the existing street grid.
4. The project would provide only 18 units of lower-cost overnight accommodations, equivalent to less than 10% of the 188 high-cost rooms, despite the fact that the Local Coastal Program calls for lower-cost accommodations equivalent to 25% of high-cost rooms.
5. The project would remove 79 mature trees, including Monterey cypress and Coast live oaks.

To approve the project despite these serious problems would set a terrible precedent. I urge you to fulfill your mission to protect California's coastal resources by denying the Coastal

Development Permit for this project.

Bravo to CCC Commissioners Linda Escalante and Caryl Hart and to Pacific Grove Coast Watch members for appealing the City of Pacific Grove's short-sighted and altogether negligent decision to allow for the newest plans from the latest developers of this unique site to move forward with partial demolition, redevelopment, and expansion of the existing historic American Tin Cannery building and property.

This latest iteration of the American Tin Cannery hotel project is a **COLOSSAL FOLLY**.

But this project is not inevitable. The CCC holds the power to set things right.

I implore you: **UPHOLD THIS APPEAL**.

As currently proposed, this project makes a mockery of Pacific Grove's long-held and well-reasoned social, cultural, environmental, and economic policies, priorities, and protections.

As a City, both leadership and residents alike would surely agree that Pagrovians:

- √ Value our history, uniqueness, and precious quality of life over tax revenue
- √ Cherish each and every tree in our precious "grove"
- √ Wish to avoid all of the natural hazards that could impact our Marine Sanctuary or cause our harbor seals (a 'golden goose' of visitor interest and education) to migrate elsewhere
- √ Uphold policies that "do unto others as we would have done unto ourselves"
- √ Play fair and pride ourselves on transparency
- √ Refuse to revise, ignore, or circumvent our General Plan, Municipal Codes, Urban Forestry Standards Ordinance, and Local Coastal Program to fit one specific project

√ Honor and defend the studied decisions of All Pacific Grove Committee members, Board members and Commissioners, including Historic Resources, Architectural Review, and Planning

√ Never bend over backwards to accommodate outside forces who only care about profits for themselves, while not caring one whit about what makes PG so special

√ Will not accept a situation of “demolition by neglect” as an excuse to allow Pacific Grove architectural history to be callously demolished and will not consider “unkempt trees” as an irreversible status, condemning them to destruction

Alas, the City of Pacific Grove stepped off a very slippery slope when our City Council members ignored the fact that this project-as-stands does not uphold PG’s declared values.

I call this project a **colossal folly** because it was initially conceived many years ago, in the Before Times. No one could have envisioned the speed at which everything we all once knew or assumed would change so dramatically, with the pandemic.

What might have seemed sound six years ago (remember Project Bella for this same site?) has been totally eclipsed by six years of planetary changes and an unending pandemic that experts say is just the start of endless new and ever-evolving variants.

CLIMATE CHANGE and the current PANDEMIC have massively impacted TOURISM TRENDS.

The proposed ATC resort does not take any of this into consideration. It was motivated and designed based on now-old-school concepts. **It is doomed to fail.**

There is no shame — and in fact, there is much to respect— in changing directions right now.

Please seriously consider these facts about Trees, Climate Change, Pandemics, and Tourism Trends:

√ **Mature trees are KEY to livable cities.** All City planning must ensure that trees survive. **We don’t have 50 or 100 years to provide these same benefits of**

carbon sequestration and enhanced biodiversity that the mature trees on this site are already offering us now.

√ **Sacrificing trees to hardscaping is a city’s “death by a thousand cuts.”** It cannot be undone. There is no viable mitigation.

√ **The benefits of a single mature tree are incalculable. It cannot be replaced by a seedling or a lawn. Mature trees are the tentacles into our natural ecosystem.** Green areas are intricately linked to the good health and well-being of residents. The mature trees on the ATC site grew healthy and tall in the spot where they were planted, and they should remain — not rewarded by a chain saw.

√ **City leaders can no longer ignore their urban greening. If City Planners do not do so, then City Councils must insist on developers providing for new green areas with every newly proposed development.**

√ **“Greening” cuts down on noise and air pollution, reduces flood risk, and improves water quality.** Residents in neighborhoods with more nature have reduced blood pressure, fewer respiratory illnesses, and less depression and anxiety.

√ **Maximizing urban greening benefits requires very intentional planning. Residents have a right to expect this prioritizing.**

√ **City leaders must be forward thinkers and require developers as well as its own planning departments to consider the environment outside of the building itself.** It is possible to design developments that keep the existing mature trees in place. This must be demanded. **Existing trees may be “in the way” of the developer’s plans but the advantages of these trees to protect our City must outweigh everything else!**

√ **Sea waters will rise.** What will happen in the proposed basement of this proposed hotel when seawater intrudes? The wise man builds his home upon rock. Don’t we all take comfort in knowing that Pacific Grove sits on granite? **Why would we want to allow one single stone of our solid granite foundation to be removed?**

Moving on to **TOURISM TRENDS**: What are the new generations’ travel goals and preferences in this New World We Now Live In? Many more folks (up to 75%) are:

Staying closer to home

No longer looking forward to in-person conferencing or attending large, in-person conventions

Demanding ultra-safety and ultra-cleanliness

Traveling solo and preferring small, cozy, human-scale accommodations

Much more likely to drive to their destination than to fly to reduce their carbon footprint, meaning fewer international visitors

Craving sustainable, energy-conserving, active, non-material, purposeful holidays with an emphasis on mindful, transformative experiences and wellness opportunities

Enjoying much simpler pleasures

Desiring quality over quantity

Loving nostalgia: sleeping under the stars, farmers market shopping, skinny dipping, and spending time in Nature

Wishing to consume less, waste less, and enjoy life more

Expecting diversity to be embraced and expecting environmental sensitivity to be prioritized in every realm of life

Choosing to stay in hotels that can demonstrate (not merely “claim”) their commitment to conserving the environment and supporting the local community.

What is the Most Obvious Take-Away from this 2022 Research?

Nothing will resonate more negatively to a tourist today than the knowledge that:

Over a hundred mature trees were destroyed in the creation of this hotel.

If I don't want to fly, my hotel will be frustratingly difficult to reach or park near because of the heavy volume of increased traffic coming and going. Pacific Grove and New Monterey's entry points *already* clog up daily!

I once thought of Pacific Grove as a lovely, quaint, historic town with one-of-a-kind shops and restaurants, existing “out of step with the modern world” that I live in back home and am trying to escape from on this holiday. Now Pacific Grove is more like every other city everywhere else, with congestion, tall, cookie-cutter buildings, and chain stores and eateries.

California Coastal Commissioners, please:

Don't ignore science and statistics.

Don't disrespect Pacific Grove's voting, tax-paying residents who have done nothing to deserve this humongous threat to their neighborhoods, unique businesses, and homes.

Don't be blinded yourselves by new tax revenue dreams that have put stars in the eyes of the Pacific Grove City Powers That Be. Pacific Grove won't ever raise enough new money to outrun the fiscal failures that have been created here over the past 3.5 decades.

Our common, righteous goal now should be to live more lightly on the earth and survive sustainably by not introducing a gigantic-sized project that is doomed to failure because it does not take into account the enormous global disruptions underway, such as climate change, which is already unfolding.

Dear Honorable Coastal Commissioners,

We would like you to consider denying the current ATC Hotel Project in Pacific Grove (PG) .

We are receptive to a revised proposal that is a suitable sized structure for PG and the construction is not destructive but proactive for and sensitive to our very fragile National Marine Sanctuary and our birds, wildlife and marine mammals.

In addition to this area being our National Marine Sanctuary, it is a Marine Protected Area and a high Environmentally Sensitive Habitat known as an ESHA.

We are aware of the proposed mitigations but they fall short of being proactive and do not protect our harbor seal population and are not accountable for the destruction that will more than likely occur.

The ATC, as proposed, will harm our coastal wildlife from birds to our beloved harbor seals and their unique and treasured rookeries and will destroy our protected cypress trees.

One mitigation is limiting construction noise certain months throughout the year which ignores the fact that harbor seals don't migrate. They are nocturnal animals that get out on usually the same beaches and rocks in the daytime to rest, sleep and restore oxygen. This includes 3 rookeries on our central coast from 255 feet to only 1000 feet from the ATC Hotel proposal. Studies have found how our harbor seals have had detrimental health and death due to loud environmental noises. The noises from the ATC project will include construction traffic near the rookeries, the digging out of the large underground parking lot through granite and then hauling away thousands of truckloads and cutting down many trees including cypress trees that are required habitats for our wildlife.

This is where our argument lies, it is impossible to fully mitigate the loss and not prevent harm to so many.

Dear Ladies and Gentlemen,

I respectfully request that you **DENY APPROVAL** of the American Tin Cannery Hotel and Commercial Project, Item 15b on the April 11th CCC hearing.

The ATC proposal will hurt living protected trees, coastal wildlife from birds to seals, and people who live here or travel here to view the coast or go to the Aquarium. The noise pollution from construction will be the most harmful to seals and birds

The worst noise pollution from building this project will be the from digging out of the large underground parking lot through granite, and then hauling away thousands of truckloads. This is especially harmful to the Harbor Seals who hunt at night and rest on the Hopkins beaches close to the ATC proposed hotel site in the daytime (during construction hours). They also use the beach for their rookeries, birthing and raising their pups there. This much noise could drive them from the beach to protect themselves, potentially abandoning their pups.

Pacific Grove Coast Watch has already advocated a surface parking lot only. A smaller hotel will still be possible and also better fit the ATC site, rather than maximizing and overwhelming the land all the way up to the rear of the shops on Central Avenue. Since story poles were denied by the City, most citizens do not realize how massive a structure this proposed building will be, that Sloat Avenue will become part of the hotel, or that a 48-foot-high hotel wing will be built on the existing parking lot on Eardley Ave. - which is reason for the proposed underground parking.

Forcing abandonment of Sloat Avenue to private hotel use harms the adjoining neighborhood, decreases public access through the loss of 17 parking spaces on Sloat and additional parking spaces along Dewey and Eardley Avenues. Please keep Sloat Avenue from privatization.

In Pacific Grove, we already have the now-existing condos in the Holman Building, the enormous blocky condo building that was built next to it, thus blocking the vista to the Bay for many citizens, and a proposed hotel complex down the hill from the Holman Building. Once these vistas were lost, they can never be reclaimed. We don't need another oversized hotel complex to replace the ATC, blocking vistas and public access to the recreational walking trail along the shore. Something more modest with surface parking would be vastly more appropriate.

1. **Water.** This water jurisdiction does not have the water for accommodations and out of town visitors. This is an environmental issue. The city is under a mandatory cease and desist order for lots without meters and others who want to increase a bathroom on their current property.

Remedy, reduce the usage for the project those amounts of people who are currently on the waiting list what the residents on the wait list currently stand. This mitigation could be a staged agreement in the reduction of their usage. From the City of Pacific Grove documents:

"Residential Reserve There are numerous single-family residential projects on the Wait List requesting a total of **2.2082 AF**. Many of these projects have been on the Wait List since 2009 and range from new single-family dwellings on vacant lots which required approval of an Architectural Permit, to additional bathrooms Agenda No. 8A Page 1 of 3 2 which require no planning permits and are poised to apply for a building permit. No inclusionary housing units are currently wait-listed."

I do not see the social justice in denying our residents since 2009 (25 years) of not getting the water they have applied for and paid fees for in all that time.

After many years of advocacy from environmental justice activists and growing concerns from Black members of Congress, in 1992 the [U.S. Environmental Protection Agency \(USEPA\)](https://www.epa.gov) established the Office of Environmental Equity. This office, renamed the Office of Environmental Justice in 1994, defined *environmental justice* as:

"... fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin or income, with respect to the development, implementation and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations and policies."

In this definition, "fair treatment" means no group of people should bear "a disproportionate share of...negative environmental consequences." This definition, it is important to note, has been criticized by some environmental justice advocates who point out that fair treatment amounts to merely redistributing everyone's "fair share" of environmental burdens, instead of striving to eliminate the systemic root causes of environmental inequalities through technological advancement, **policy changes** or pollution reduction.

Policy changes are abundant in the issue of water management and are continually changing and evolving. Your report and analysis on the water issue is excellent.

The people and businesses in Pacific Grove should not bear the burden of being denied water, this is **not fair treatment**. There will always be a demand, but with the environmental issues around water, seawater intrusion, and issues of need for families to build on lots, or add bathrooms is an issue I do not see in the report.

In the Environmental Justice Policy, you are advocating for protection of the coast and state:

“Understanding that public health and the health of natural ecosystems are inextricably intertwined, ecological impacts are felt first by disadvantaged and at-risk communities, and that there is no environmental justice without a healthy environment, the Commission will continue to prioritize the protection of coastal resources. This includes sensitive habitats, watersheds, water quality, marine biodiversity, and biological productivity.”

I am a disabled senior citizen on a fixed income, considered low income and know many people on the wait list. It is unjust because they are denied opportunity to thrive.

2. Protection for the Harbor Seals.

There is not a clear understanding of the mitigations for protecting the seals. They are a part of our Pacific Grove community, and not many studies have been completed on their behavior to noise, however there is a strong group of advocates who know and understand the colony. In addition, the city has annually put-up fencing to shield them.

This issue requires more review. We need to protect our natural resources.

4. Sloat Ave. This attempt to gain city property to provide access is, in my opinion simply wrong. What city sells it's streets?

Public Views. As we do not see a development proposal from Four-Square the transparency here is lacking. Just like the misrepresentation of the room costs and value, there is lacking trust on my end as to what they are proposing.

In conclusion, your report has covered many issues in depth, there remain concerns around trees and construction traffic, this is a very large project and I appreciate your concerns addressed.

I sent a letter to the city as they were approving the project about two pools and the elitist determinations of the separate areas, ie Executive area and a separate pool. Good to see that's gone. We are a community of homes and families and object to the distinction of a "class".

At last nights city council meeting regarding a letter being sent to you from the Mayor, there was a lot of public comments regarding the project and many were against it as to scale and corporate manner of the administration of the project.

1. There is not a sustainable, long-term water supply sufficient to serve a project of this size. The project would result in a substantial increase in water use at the site, and Coastal Commission staff admits that the methodology used to justify the project's water use is "least protective of coastal resources that are impacted by water demand."
2. The project would cause unavoidable negative impacts to sensitive species such as harbor seals, due to the scale of the project and the decision to excavate for underground parking. The proposed special conditions would not prohibit construction during pupping season, even though the site is very close to sites where seals birth and raise their pups every year.
3. Rather than maximizing public access, the proposed project reduces public access by privatizing a public street. This privatization is necessary because the project is too big to fit within the existing street grid.

4. The project would provide only 18 units of lower-cost overnight accommodations, equivalent to less than 10% of the 188 high-cost rooms, despite the fact that the Local Coastal Program calls for lower-cost accommodations equivalent to 25% of high-cost rooms.

5. The project would remove 79 mature trees, including Monterey cypress and Coast live oaks.

Honorable Chair Hart, Vice Chair Escalante, and Commissioners,

I serve on the Beautification and Natural Resources Commission (BNRC) in Pacific Grove, but write to you today as a concerned PG resident and biologist. My area of expertise concerns conservation and endangered species, and given this, I recommend that you deny approval of the ATC Hotel Project.

This project is deeply troubling and overwhelming in scope- my concerns include our water supply, 52 Monterey Cypress, but mostly, our highly vulnerable resident harbor seals. I have further concerns with the removal of bedrock in a coastal earthquake zone (blasting? drilling?), and the high decibel levels and chronic reverberation that will propagate through rock, air, and sea. This colossal resort gravely threatens our coastal flora and fauna, and sets a concerning precedent.

Monterey Cypress are an endemic and iconic coastal California species, and are among the rarest of trees. The IUCN lists them as "Vulnerable"- only one precarious step away from "endangered". They are a vestige of prehistoric coastal forests that once extended far along our coast. Our Monterey Cypress forest remains as only 1 of 4 in the world. The culling of 52 trees is an enormous take, and removes considerable wildlife habitat along with it. These ancient trees are threatened by climate change and habitat loss due to felling and development.

We have the largest harbor seal rookery in the Monterey Bay at Hopkins Beach, and they have been a resident population since 1998. They do not migrate, this is their year-round home. It is here that they sleep every day, seasonally molt, and where they reproduce and raise their pups annually. This is a phenomenon very rarely viewed; we are all privileged to witness this. Viable habitat for them is unavailable- and their high site fidelity make this population extremely vulnerable to extirpation. Studies have found that:

"...individual harbor seals exhibit fidelity to specific haul-out areas used for breeding and molting [7–12]. Fidelity to such sites may put them at greater risk from disturbance. When confronted with a stressor, the reluctance of wildlife to move away (i.e., tolerance) is theorized to reflect, at least partly, the importance of that particular area for life processes, rather than indifference to the disturbance, with animals managing the consequences of staying rather than those of leaving [13–16]." (Jansen et al., 2015, <https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC4488586/>)

These animals are very susceptible to noise, vibration, movement, and general disturbance. They are skittish and shy, and have keen hearing both on land and in the sea. They often react to disturbance by flushing into the sea, and will abandon pups and rookeries in extreme cases. After a 2 month long road construction event near Hopkins rookery in 2022, one third of our pregnant seals miscarried, and 20% of the adult female population fled the rookery and never returned. We have since searched for them from north of Half Moon Bay and south to Cambria at multiple rookeries on multiple occasions, and they have never been found. NOAA ultimately halted the road construction, and released these findings:

"Effects of Land Based Anthropogenic Noise on Reproductive Success in Harbor Seals (*Phoca vitulina*) in Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary"

It sets a very concerning precedent when a rookery located alongside our oldest marine lab on the West Coast, next to a world renowned aquarium, within a Marine Protected Area and ESHA zone, within a National Marine Sanctuary, and protected by the Marine Mammal Act, if we cannot act to protect our seals and fragile coastline. It is incumbent upon us, both ethically and legally, to protect these highly threatened marine mammals.

I hope this promotes a greater understanding of the sensitivity and complexity of this issue, and that you will find the resolve to deny approval of the ATC Hotel Project. I thank you for your review, consideration, and continued service to conserving our coast.

Please deny the approval of the ATC Project. Following are some justifications.

This project is immense for our town and the immensity has not been witnessed by either our city council members or the public. No story poles or the equivalent have ever been erected. A small group of citizens floated some helium balloons up to the 4 story height for about half an hour. It was daunting to see them soar above the tallest cypress even though the wind careened them sideways from vertical. Such an endeavor was never orchestrated by the city even though it was requested and the used car lot style aerial balloons are easily attainable. The city has not really been transparent about this project and citizens are unaware of its true size and that it will cover and close Sloat Rd. A pretty picture on the corner of the lot doesn't convey the real size.

The ATC site is at the junction between Monterey and Pacific Grove. The traffic is already congested there as Lighthouse Avenue is the main artery in and out of PG. It gets backed up in the summer for a half mile already or when the Aquarium runs a special. A project this size, especially with the substandard or less than minimal parking requirements included will be a nightmare of flaring tempers as tourists slow to find the hotel parking entrance or seek egress, while employees and everyone else circles round and round searching for parking. Why? Because this project removes an entire street of public parking and a public parking lot. To reduce city parking to this extent and to require fewer parking spaces than one vehicle per room can't be considered reasonable.

We already have a beautiful gateway. As you drive down Lighthouse Avenue or Foam Street coming from Monterey into Pacific Grove, it is constant cement. I think there are two trees on Foam Street and that's all. The same is true if you are cruising down Cannery Row. Then you hit Pacific Grove and you know it because of the trees. From Central Avenue, on the ocean side down Eardley to Ocean View, there is a row of tall Monterey Cypress on one side and the 52 Monterey Cypress on the other side, on this project's site. These large iconic trees are what make people take a deep breath and say, "Oh, we've arrived. Here we are at our destination

that is quaint and peaceful, charming and safe, a place we can relax and restore in the beauty of nature.”

Take away these trees and people might as well be entering Monterey again.

I believe our council approved this project because we are “pension poor” and this project was touted as our savior through TOT taxes. That’s one way to think of it. But it isn’t very secure when our current hotels don’t even operate at occupancy and we have another hotel being built right now. To protect the seals, honor our duty to mitigate climate change, do our part to provide housing in California, and also to maintain the historical treasure in this steel building, it would be more practical and useful to reinstate the retail shops and restaurants that have been lost here and build housing units on top of ground level parking and retain Sloat Rd. to mitigate traffic congestion as it does now. The city can have a steady dependable income from the rents of the retail and housing units and can honor our municipal code.

Projects that fit a community don’t require the ignoring and breaking of city goals and rules to the extent this project does. Height, water, zoning, noise, tree ordinance, seal ordinance.... this project requires exceptions everywhere indicating it just isn’t a fit.

This project was initiated by the former city manager who has been let go from the city. It is possible it wasn’t vetted properly before being presented to council. It certainly has many exceptions to our code and local coastal program requirements. Many feel the city should not have issued a coastal development permit, that it was an abuse of the privilege granted to our city to issue our own CDP’s to grant this one.

Please deny approval of this project and help save our community.

I am asking you to deny the Coastal Development Permit for the American Tin Cannery Hotel project. This development is not only going to destroy the character of this small hometown but is far too large for the area. This hometown is so special and have adorable inns and hotels to choose from, each with their own character. This project does not fit the character of this town and is far too large for the area. This is something you would typically see in San Diego. If we wanted this kind of structure, we would go to southern California. Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary deserves better and so do we.

One of the biggest concerns is the loss of the harbor seal colony. These sensitive animals suffered enough two years ago when city road work killed a third of the pups and 20% of the adults. No one should fail to understand after that episode what will happen to the seals. The evidence is shown in the NOAA scientific paper written by Denise Drachenberg, titled "Effects of Land Based Anthropogenic Noise on Reproductive Success in Harbor Seals (*Phoca vitulina*) in Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary". These animals are Federally protected and there is no way this project, with the mitigations proposed, will proceed without violating the Federal Law. It will disturb the seals. This project should go no further until this issue is corrected. We are not okay with losing our seals for another hotel.

This city was known as a "city of trees" and yet this hotel proposal will remove 79 mature mostly Monterey Cypress trees. This area is a flyway for birds, and we are already losing far too many trees. It is outrageous that any project today start with removing all the trees. That is not being a good steward of the environment. Work to downsize the hotel, removing the underground parking structure and work with the existing mature trees. We need our mature trees to fight climate change.

I am writing in regards to the American Tin Cannery Hotel and Commercial Project, New Appeal # A-3-PGR-22-0004.

I am a resident of Pacific Grove, CA. I am extremely concerned about the size of the proposed project. It is too big for Pacific Grove (PG). I implore the California Coastal Commission to reduce the size and scope of the project.

My concerns are as follows:

1. Story poles and orange barriers were never put up around the property to show the actual perimeter and height of the proposed development. In addition, the signage that was placed was obscure and dark that it wasn't clear what the facade of the buildings were. I saw one diagram that was very boxy and like a 4 story Motel 6. Pacific Grove in its Victorian and character style deserves better.
2. Where is the water coming from to accommodate the size and scope? Reducing from two swimming pools to one and trucking laundry to Salinas is that really saving water efficiently for the size and scope of the project?
3. There are no parking provisions for employees. Many will be traveling from areas outside of Pacific Grove e.g. Salinas, Marina, Seaside, Monterey and perhaps further away. This will increase traffic. Expecting employees to car pool, park in residential streets, or ride bicycles is not practical.
4. The tonnage of granite removal to create underground parking is of concern. We had a Tsunami warning in 2023, in the event of such a disaster the underground parking lot would be subject to flooding. In addition, sea level rise is expected due to climate change.
5. The harbor seals will be at risk for stress and decreasing its successful births due to the noise and vibration of the amount of earth moving equipment required for the project as well as the duration of the project to its completion. How large of a "Take Permit" will the California Coastal Commission allow? Will the number be made known to the public? Who will do the reporting of the number of takes?
6. In the event of a Citywide evacuation there are only two main thoroughfares which are Lighthouse Ave and Forest Avenue. With an increase in tourists, evacuation for all residents and tourists will be difficult.
7. The loss of the tree canopy due to the number of trees to be removed is unfathomable. Residents have had to seek legal council and pay for arborists to declare one tree dead before

it is removed.. 79 trees can be "taken" at will to accommodate the size and scope of this project.

8. What protections are residences on Sloat given during the demolition phase of the project? Asbestos dust and other hazardous particulates are of concern. In addition, privatizing Sloat and forcing parking up the steep slope to Central Ave, as a result, this is an environmental justice concern for the mobility impaired.

9. The proposed project is not taking into consideration the residences as their neighbors. The humming of business will be 24 hours/7 days a week.

As I stated at the beginning of this letter, I ask you to reduce the size and scope of the project it is too big for PG.

I am a resident of Monterey County writing in opposition to the American Tin Cannery Hotel Project. The American Tin Cannery Hotel Project proposal is another example of a development that prioritizes luxury tourism and real estate interests while running roughshod over our state's precious coastal resources and ignoring the needs and opinions of Monterey Bay residents.

I urge the Coastal Commission to deny the proposed Coastal Development Permit as it runs afoul of several goals and policies of the Pacific Grove Local Coastal Program and the Coastal Act.

As it is currently proposed, the size and scale of the project would negatively impact water supply, habitat, public access, and historic resources. The minor reduction in size and the inadequate special conditions proposed by Coastal Commission staff do very little to address the serious concerns that have been raised throughout the process by residents, environmentalists, and the Coastal Commission staff itself. The project is simply too large for the project site. It should not be approved for the following reasons:

1. There is not a sustainable, long-term water supply sufficient to serve a project of this size. The project would result in a substantial increase in water use at the site, and Coastal Commission staff admits that the methodology used to justify the project's water use is "least protective of coastal resources that are impacted by water demand."
2. The project would cause unavoidable negative impacts to sensitive species such as harbor seals, due to the scale of the project and the decision to excavate for underground parking. The proposed special conditions would not prohibit construction during pupping season, even though the site is very close to sites where seals birth and raise their pups every year.

I am convinced that the excavation and construction for the two-year duration of this development will drive the harbor seals away from Hopkins Marine Station.

While some seals would be able to find new homes others would perish during construction.

Because we know the noise from construction like this will impact our seals, The Facebook staff isn't exactly neutral. We saw a real example 2 years ago, when the city allowed a relatively simple road work on Ocean View Blvd during the pupping season. The noises from that routine road work drove 20% of the seals away from this area and we have never seen them since. It also frightened a third of the pregnant seals into miscarriages. NOAA jumped into that deadly project, gathered the data and published a scientific report last summer to show how construction noise can harm nearby harbor seals. The report was written by Denise Drachenberg, titled "Effects of Land-Based Anthropogenic Noise on Reproductive Success in Harbor Seals (*Phoca vitulina*) in Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary".

We are speaking for the seals because they cannot speak for themselves. They need all of us to protect them.


Dear Commissioners:

Dear Chair Hart and Kay Huckelbridge,

My name is Marietta Bain and I am a life long native/resident of Pacific Grove and Monterey. My husband, Pierre, and I have owned and operated a business in Pacific Grove for 40 years and employ 35 people. I send this letter today to explain why the California Coastal Commission should support the staff report for the American Tin Cannery hotel project. I don't think you will find anyone speaking to this project that has more personal, emotional and visual concerns than me. My grandfather came here to fish in the 1920's and my relatives have been a part of the Cannery Row canning and packing houses and in the American Tin Cannery itself. In the 50's I took the Del Monte Express Train visit my grandmother in the Bay Area. That train traveled the coast from the Del Monte Sand Plant in Pebble Beach, where my father worked for 25 years, to San Francisco with a stop in San Jose. Every week we rode by the ATC site and saw that decrepit, dirty building that was already in a state of neglect. In the late 60's I started a life long passion of walking at least 5 miles a day along the Monterey/Pacific Grove coast line, which was before the pedestrian/bike path was built. I continue walking this path every day and every day I see the continued deterioration of this "eye sore". Does anyone remember what the Cannery Row area even looked like before it's renovation and renewal in the 70's? Cannery Row was not a safe place to be, it was dirty, empty and neglected. There were so many homeless and suspicious types and no one thought about going there to stroll around or inquire about access to the beach. The only safe beach in the area were Pacific Grove's beach at Forest Avenue and Carmel Beach. The areas surrounding the canneries wreaked of fish by-products from squid and anchovies. During my grammar school days, we often opted to have lunch indoors because it smelled so bad outside.

I have followed this project since the beginning and have seen the negotiations and concessions that have been made to get to this final decision. One thing I can tell you for sure, if this project does not go through, there will not be another business willing to come close to what The Comstock Group is making accessible to so many people of all ages and income. The amount of time, stress and money Comstock has spent shows that they have a connection and love of this property and to the sustainable process.

I truly can't believe how long this has taken. Please help us move this project forward so we can beautify this area and help make the coastal access available to all those entering our city.

As it is currently proposed, the size and scale of the project would negatively impact water supply, habitat, public access, and historic resources. The minor reduction in size and the inadequate special conditions proposed by Coastal Commission staff do very little to address the serious concerns that have been raised throughout the process by residents, environmentalists, and the Coastal Commission staff itself. The project is simply too large for the project site. It should not be approved for the following reasons:

1. There is not a sustainable, long-term water supply sufficient to serve a project of this size. The project would result in a substantial increase in water use at the site, and Coastal Commission staff admits that the methodology used to justify the project's water use is "least protective of coastal resources that are impacted by water demand."
2. The project would cause unavoidable negative impacts to sensitive species such as harbor seals, due to the scale of the project and the decision to excavate for underground parking. The proposed special conditions would not prohibit construction during pupping season, even though the site is very close to sites where seals birth and raise their pups every year.
3. Rather than maximizing public access, the proposed project reduces public access by privatizing a public street. This privatization is necessary because the project is too big to fit within the existing street grid.
4. The project would provide only 18 units of lower-cost overnight accommodations, equivalent to less than 10% of the 188 high-cost rooms, despite the fact that the Local Coastal Program calls for lower-cost accommodations equivalent to 25% of high-cost rooms.
5. The project would remove 79 mature trees, including Monterey cypress and Coast live oaks.

To approve the project despite these serious problems would set a terrible precedent. I urge you to fulfill your mission to protect California's coastal resources by denying the Coastal

Development Permit for this project.

Dear California Coastal Commission:

I am writing in regards to the American Tin Cannery Hotel and Commercial Project, New Appeal # A-3-PGR-22-0004.

I am a resident of Pacific Grove, CA. I am extremely concerned about the size of the proposed project. It is too big for Pacific Grove (PG). I implore the California Coastal Commission to reduce the size and scope of the project.

My concerns are as follows:

1. Story poles and orange barriers were never put up around the property to show the actual perimeter and height of the proposed development. In addition, the signage that was placed was obscure and dark that it wasn't clear what the facade of the buildings were. I saw one diagram that was very boxy and like a 4 story Motel 6. Pacific Grove in its Victorian and character style deserves better.
2. Where is the water coming from to accommodate the size and scope? Reducing from two swimming pools to one and trucking laundry to Salinas is that really saving water efficiently for the size and scope of the project?
3. There are no parking provisions for employees. Many will be traveling from areas outside of Pacific Grove e.g. Salinas, Marina, Seaside, Monterey and perhaps further away. This will increase traffic. Expecting employees to car pool, park in residential streets, or ride bicycles is not practical.
4. The tonnage of granite removal to create underground parking is of concern. We had a Tsunami warning in 2023, in the event of such a disaster the underground parking lot would be subject to flooding. In addition, sea level rise is expected due to climate change.
5. The harbor seals will be at risk for stress and decreasing its successful births due to the noise and vibration of the amount of earth moving equipment required for the project as well as the duration of the project to its completion. How large of a "Take Permit" will the California Coastal Commission allow? Will the number be made known to the public? Who will do the reporting of the number of takes?
6. In the event of a Citywide evacuation there are only two main thoroughfares which are Lighthouse Ave and Forest Avenue. With an increase in tourists, evacuation for all residents and tourists will be difficult.
7. The loss of the tree canopy due to the number of trees to be removed is unfathomable. Residents have had to seek legal council and pay for arborists to declare one tree dead before it is removed.. 79 trees can be "taken" at will to accommodate the size and scope of this project.
8. What protections are residences on Sloat given during the demolition phase of the project? Asbestos dust and other hazardous particulates are of concern. In addition, privatizing Sloat and forcing parking up the steep slope to Central Ave, as a result, this is an environmental justice concern for the mobility impaired.
9. The proposed project is not taking into consideration the residences as their neighbors. The humming of business will be 24 hours/7 days a week.

As I stated at the beginning of this letter, I ask you to reduce the size and scope of the project it is too big for PG.

Dear Chair Hart and Commissioners,

I thank the Commission staff for agreeing with the appeals that substantial issues have been raised by the Pacific Grove City Council's rushed approval of the ATC Hotel Project in 2022---at a meeting without much discussion or valid reasons, which seemed like it was already a conclusion. The Coastal Commission will do a much better job of protecting the wildlife habitat, scenic, historic and natural resources, and the surrounding community from environmental justice issues raised by this oversized proposed development.

PLEASE FIND THE APPEALS RAISE SUBSTANTIAL ISSUES.

1. WILDLIFE HABITAT. The most important issue is the west coast's leading **Harbor Seal pupping** beach across Ocean View Avenue from the ATC Hotel Project. People come from all over the world to enjoy seeing them. Construction noise, at much smaller levels than proposed by the ATC project, has disturbed the Harbor Seals and caused miss-carriages. If the seals are disturbed, they may re-locate to Lover's Point Beach and remove that asset from the public access it now enjoys.

2. A "GATEWAY SITE"

The ATC Hotel Project sits at the border of Pacific Grove and the City of Monterey. All traffic from hotel and commercial construction, guests, employees and deliveries will need to travel through Monterey on either Lighthouse Avenue or David Avenue, which are already heavily burdened. Because Monterey and Pacific Grove were established before the invention of automobiles, they were not designed to convey the current traffic and will be unjustly burdened with ATC Hotel Traffic, especially during construction. David Avenue is only two lanes, one lane in each direction, and 95% residential. Lighthouse Avenue currently has 2 lanes in each direction, but they are narrower than normal and sideswiping is common. One large construction truck will block both lanes and back up traffic for miles and hours. Commerce in Pacific Grove and New Monterey/Lighthouse Avenue and Cannery Row will be negatively impacted. Gridlock does not produce customers.

Over 5,000 people who live in New Monterey only have these 2 ways in or out since the Presidio was closed in 2001. No consideration was given to the citizens of Monterey by the Pacific Grove City Council's approval even though I commented at each hearing. We hope that the Coastal Commission will acknowledge this project's burden on Monterey and the thousands of people who work at the

Aquarium and Cannery Row use these 2 roads to commute. And most of the citizens of Pacific Grove must travel on these same 2 roads in Monterey to commute also, along with all visitors.

Maryland Gov. Wes Moore called the Francis Scott Key Bridge's collapse a "catastrophe" because it carried 30,000 cars per day. Lighthouse Avenue in Monterey carried only 30,000 cars per day during the pandemic. Normally it carries 37,000-56,000 cars per day according to Cal Trans (Monterey County Weekly, March 9, 2023)! And the **Lighthouse Avenue Tunnel** into downtown Monterey is predicted to be **flooded by Sea Level Rise within 10 years**. Adding additional traffic to Lighthouse Avenue is an Environmental Justice Issue that has not even been considered. This would create a GATE, NOT A GATEWAY.

Why wasn't the impact of increased traffic, from guests, employees, and deliveries for the ATC project, on the City of Monterey considered? Will they be directing ATC guests to use Highway 68 from Highway 1 all the way down Forrest Avenue through Pacific Grove, both coming and going and thereby impacting their downtown businesses? No, Pacific Grove has been silent on the impact on Monterey. Just the access to Pacific Grove being blocked by gridlocked traffic in New Monterey may impact Pacific Grove's already established businesses as well.

Therefore, because neither Pacific Grove, nor Monterey have the infrastructure to carry the additional traffic from the ATC Hotel and Commercial project, the access to the beautiful coastline could actually be decreased by this project. Gridlock is not coastal access.

3. WATER. The Coastal Commission will do a far superior job at keeping the ATC Hotel Project from using water rights they are not entitled to. In an area that has the most expensive water in the country, and the lowest per capital water use in the state due to all our citizen's conservation efforts, it is not fair to allow new water uses that jeopardize our own need. Was Pacific Grove going to let the ATC Hotel use more water than allowed and just say, "whoops". That is disrespectful to all neighboring citizens who so diligently conserve water, and would drive up our price for new supplies even more.

4. HISTORIC PRESERVATION. As a life-long active preservationist, I care about the historic buildings in Pacific Grove as well as everywhere else. While I am relieved that the proposed development at the American Can Company site no longer plans to excavate for underground parking under the historic building section of the property (for many reasons), I am still appalled that the developers plan to cut an unnecessary "courtyard entrance" into the center of the historic sawtooth roofed building (where there an existing entrance with atrium---better for our typical weather). This plan will destroy the historic integrity of the building and prevent the owners from qualifying for historic tax credits. Keeping the historic buildings' Art Deco character intact will make a more successful project, more attractive to tourists like the Aquarium and Cannery Row, with less legal protests.

The Page & Turnbull's report in the DEIR describes three buildings (the office building, the factory and the warehouse) as being historically significant for their association with California's fish canning industry. The American Can Company buildings are on the edge of the Cannery Row National Historic Register District in Monterey. Despite some alterations, they were found to retain a high degree of integrity and are eligible for listing in the California Register of Historic Places and the Pacific Grove Historic Resources Inventory. How did they disappear from the 2004 historic inventory? Just stating the 1928 buildings are not currently on the historic inventory does not make them "non-historic". The EIR doesn't begin to mitigate any of the significant impacts to historic resources. Cutting the middle third out of the historic façade of the Art Deco building is NOT an unavoidable impact. It will even save

the developer money to keep the historic façade intact. There is NO public benefit to defacing it, now that a public park is being created on the corner. **The current project is in violation of CEQA.**

5. SLOAT AVENUE and its CROSSOVER BRIDGE with gorgeous view. Sloat Avenue has been here for over 100 years. The Residential block of Sloat does not want to become a cul-de-sac with only one entrance or exit. That makes their neighborhood less accessible for emergency vehicles. They don't want to have roaring garbage trucks at the blocked end of their street early every morning. Surely a better location could have been chosen for the hotel loading dock on this large property. Commercial Central Avenue would be easier access for trucks.

Why is the City of Pacific Grove giving away the block of Sloat between the Historic American Canning Buildings and its parking lot? This block provides public parking and more traffic circulation options. The bridge from the existing parking lot over Sloat Avenue to the Canning Buildings (converted into shops in the 1980's) has the most incredible view of the bay. I have seen whales spouting from that bridge many times as I crossed it to shop or dine. I mourn the loss of the American Tin Cannery Outlets that were bustling when I moved to Monterey in 1998. The owners of the buildings let them deteriorate because they had other development plans. Now the developers have to take public access land for this project too? Why? Greed and thoughtless selfishness are the only reasons I can think of. And maybe that is why the developers did not consider the Coastal Commission staff's guidance in their comments all through the planning process. Local citizens, the Planning Commission and the Architectural Review Board have expressed concerns about this project all along the process that were also ignored by the developers and the City Council.

OVERRIDING CONSIDERATIONS? Why did the Pacific Grove City Council approve this project? Their financial problems should not be imposed on the neighboring city that they must drive through. They should not deprive the citizens of California and world travelers the privilege of enjoying and learning about one of the last original remaining cannery buildings that was unique and essential to the success of the Fishing Industry. They should not scare off the Harbor Seals, nesting birds in large established beautiful air-cleaning trees. They should not burden their neighboring city with the costs and gridlock of their traffic. They should not give away access to Sloat Street that could aid in a Tsunami Evacuation. They should not decrease public access to parking just for corporate profits. They should not allow the garbage and loading dock to be placed next to their own residential tax paying neighbors.

A right-sized smaller hotel and commercial shops could be built **without doing so much damage** to local residents and businesses, losing a public street with parking, blocking one access for homes on Sloat, harming harbor seals, existing trees, historic assets. I hope the Coastal Commission will take over this CDP and gives us all a right sized, better planned project.

I thank you all for finding substantial issues were raised by the appeals from local citizens. If this project cannot be changed by the Commission Staff to better mitigate all the issues it raises, then I ask you to just deny it, in the hope that a better, less damaging project that we can be proud of, will be brought forward in the future.

Editor's Note

IN EVERYDAY PARLANCE, MOST OF US DON'T MAKE A DISTINCTION BETWEEN THE WORDS "STREET" AND "ROAD." Some roadways are streets, others roads or drives or avenues or boulevards and this seems, in terms of common usage at least, a mostly aesthetic distinction.

In urban design, however, a "street" is fundamentally different from a "road" – and understanding what separates the two can open up a whole new way of thinking about mobility.

"In a simple form... a road is really about mobility and a street is about access," explains Todd Muck, executive director of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County. In other words, a road is primarily about connecting two points, and about allowing people (most likely traveling in cars) to get from point A to point B as quickly and easily as possible. A street, meanwhile, is lined with buildings and businesses and destinations – the goal of the street is to allow people, whether they are on foot, on a bicycle or in a car, to comfortably access those destinations.

But streets and roads have become confused, and not just in our language – they've melded into one another in real life, too. This is where the term "stroad" comes in, a portmanteau of the words street and road that was coined by land-use planner and civil engineer Charles Marohn.

In Marohn's thinking, a stroad takes both street-like qualities (like driveways and businesses) and road-like qualities (like wider lanes and faster speed limits) and mashes them up to create something that's the worst of both worlds.

Imagine (we bet this won't be too hard) a four-lane roadway with long blocks, few crosswalks and businesses (or strip malls) lining each side of the road. Maybe the speed limit is 35mph, but people are driving faster – which makes it difficult to access those businesses if you're in a car and downright dangerous if you're not. That's a stroad. "They don't function well for anybody, really," Muck says.

Stroads are everywhere. But they don't have to be – part of Muck's work with TAMC is helping cities turn bad stroads back into good streets (or good roads) as part of the agency's Complete Streets Program. In this package we take a hard look at some of Monterey County's streets, roads and stroads to ask what's going wrong – and what's going right – in our urban design, and how the streetscape can impact downtowns in Monterey, Salinas, Seaside and King City.

SOMETIMES HISTORY, GEOGRAPHY AND ECONOMICS CAN HELP OR HURT A GOOD ROAD, as is clear by comparing two of Monterey's most important thoroughfares: Alvarado Street and Lighthouse Avenue. Alvarado's history, stretching back nearly 200 years as the center of the growing city's economic life, laid a foundation for the successful "main street" that it's become. Lighthouse, on the other hand, has always been a road to somewhere else, struggling as both a road and a business district street, a quintessential "stroad."

It's been a balancing act for Monterey officials over the decades, figuring out how to serve the needs of motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists while managing the demands and expectations of residents and business owners. A vision for Alvarado Street forged a decade ago in the city's Downtown Specific Plan has led to what is now a flourishing destination. The vision for Lighthouse Avenue, laid out in the Lighthouse Specific Plan adopted in 2016, has been clouded by its geography and competing opinions on how to make it work as best it can for all involved.

RENEWAL, and it was a fire that eventually brought renewal to Alvarado Street. The T.A. Work building, a prominent structure along the street, burned to the ground in February 2007. It left a gaping hole in the downtown streetscape but the disaster eventually helped spur the city in to create a new plan for downtown that led to a revitalization that brought Alvarado as a street back to life.

Included in the plan was creating sidewalk bump-outs where permanent seating for outdoor dining was installed in front of several restaurants. "It's one of the best things that ever happened to our downtown," says Rick Johnson, who served for 22 years as the executive director of the Old Monterey Business Association, as well as the Lighthouse Business District, until he retired last summer. "It gave not just the opportunity to sit outside, but it created an energy on the street. People always want to be where they see people, and that was a great opportunity for downtown."

The increase in energy along Alvarado is evident on a daily basis. Pedestrians stroll up and down both sides of the street, with numerous restaurants and shops to visit, in almost every kind of weather. It's not difficult to walk across the one-way, tree-lined street. Parallel parking is available, although it's more plentiful in nearby parking garages. With crosswalks and bump-outs, it's not a street where drivers consistently speed. It closes to traffic on Tuesday afternoons for the popular farmers market and on New Year's Eve for First Night Monterey. It

is the true definition of a street, a destination where people shop and meet – it's not the fast way to get to somewhere else.

Monterey's Community Development Director Kim Cole says most of what the city envisioned for downtown when the plan was adopted in 2013 has come to fruition, including renovating the bookends of the street – the Monterey Conference Center at the north end and Cooper Molera Adobe to the south. It helped bring Monterey's downtown out of the Great Recession of 2007-2009, which reverberated for several years among municipal commercial districts like Monterey's downtown. Today there are few commercial vacancies.

"We were able to get businesses excited about outdoor seating," Cole says. To encourage buy-in, the city relaxed its rules about adding seating to sidewalks adjacent to the street, leaving a pathway for passersby. Alvarado Street Brewery was the first restaurant to jump in, followed by a few others. The improvements were all funded by businesses. "Outdoor seating definitely made it more pedestrian-friendly," Cole says. "It made you feel like you are part of an active, vibrant downtown."

As Alvarado continues to evolve as a downtown destination, there is in the downtown plan a goal of one day turning Alvarado into a two-way street. That plan was set aside by the last Monterey City Council to focus on spending to upgrade city infrastructure like sewers and sidewalks. That wasn't the only idea for Alvarado, however.

"There was a lot of discussion about shutting down traffic altogether on Alvarado," Cole remembers. Research shows that to be a success in transforming from a street to a pedestrian thoroughfare, the street in question already must be successful as a destination; the 3rd Street Promenade in Santa Monica is one example of that, or State Street in Santa Barbara. Alvarado had a ways to go before it reached that level of success as a destination.

WHERE ALVARADO SUCCEEDS AS A DESTINATION FOR SHOPPING, restaurants and entertainment, **Lighthouse Avenue** can't help where it lands geographically, **as one of two ways in and out of Pacific Grove**. **With an estimated 37,000 cars each day zooming through post-pandemic shutdowns – the highest number pre-pandemic was 56,000, with an average of 50,000-54,000 daily, or 80 percent of the 70,000 daily vehicle trips on Highway 1** – it labors as an effective transportation route, let alone a welcoming destination for pedestrians.

“Lighthouse is not a walking street, it's a drive-by street,” says Kelly Sorensen, owner of On the Beach Surf Shop. The store has been located at the corner of Lighthouse and Prescott Avenue since 1993. The highly traveled road during rush hours and weekend tourism traffic presents both opportunity and challenge.

“It hinders [business] a little bit. That's 30,000-plus cars per day at our doorstep, but there's a deterrent because there is no parking or it's tough to get to,” Sorensen says. “Lighthouse has been that way forever.”

With narrow travel and parking lanes, it's not conducive to people feeling safe getting out of and into vehicles parallel parked on the sides of the road. It's not a street where people would want to sit and eat outside, or take leisurely strolls, with thousands of cars whizzing by. The city's Lighthouse Specific Plan adopted in 2016 sought to improve conditions along the road,

but while some improvements have been made, most of the plan has been on hold to focus on other projects, Cole says.

One of the most helpful improvements – aside from prohibiting left-hand turns in early 2003 – has been the installation in 2018 of cameras at intersections connected to a system that uses vehicle detection and artificial intelligence software to adjust the timing of signal lights and synchronize with other lights in real time. (The cameras are low-resolution and can't make out details like people's faces or license plates. They also do not record.)

Monterey was one of the first cities in the U.S. to utilize the system known as SCOOT – Split Cycle Offset Optimisation Technique – software developed in the United Kingdom, says Public Works Director Andrea Renny. SCOOT enables traffic to proceed with few or no stops, which in turn results in reduced fuel consumption and fewer emissions, in addition to improving vehicle travel time and safety. “What we are trying to do is create these platoons of cars that move together and get away from the stop-and-go, stop-and-go,” Renny says. The city has experienced an annual reduction of 20 tons of particulate matter as a result.

After success on Lighthouse, the city has since installed the SCOOT system in other major traffic corridors. The system is overseen on a large monitor from Monterey City Hall in the tiny office of Engineering Assistant Marissa Garcia, who can make manual changes in case traffic spikes.

SCOOT has helped improve traffic flow, but the heavy traffic on Lighthouse continues to be a challenge. As the Lighthouse plan was being created, there were five to six ideas floated – one involved three lanes of traffic flowing out of P.G. in the morning, then flipping that in the evening – but no consensus could be reached among business owners and residents.

To make Lighthouse Avenue more attractive to pedestrians would require removing a lane of traffic, Cole says. That would require an alternative route for overflow traffic, something the geography of the area doesn't allow for.

Without good alternatives to transform Lighthouse Avenue from road to street, it will remain a stroad.

Lighthouse Avenue covers just over one mile of pavement in Monterey but it ranks No. 6 for traffic volume in Monterey County.

On an average day **54,000 cars come around the Lighthouse curve passing Private Bolio Gate to the Presidio of Monterey. That is more vehicles than travel any given spot on Highway 1, Highway 101, Highway 68, or Highway 156 in Monterey County.**

"The only way to get from one side of town in Monterey is Lighthouse Curve, so we experience extreme congestion," said traffic engineer Andrea Renny with the city of Monterey.

It's a problem newly appointed city manager Hans Uslar would like to see addressed.

Ahead of his inaugural press conference on Tuesday Uslar identified traffic congestion as one of the major issues that needs to be solved in the city. In an email he specifically pointed to the Lighthouse and Del Monte Avenues coordinator as a problem spot.

The peninsula is geographically divided by the Presidio of Monterey, which use to keep an alternative route to Lighthouse open. Drivers were able to enter on Taylor Street through the Taylor Gate entrance, drive through the base on W Rifle Road and exit through the Franklin Gate, driving down the hill on W Franklin Street right into downtown.

The army closed the route in 2001 just months before the September 11th attacks and has no plans to reopen the base to thru traffic.

"Given the continuing threat to U.S. military forces across the globe, it is unlikely that the installation will be reopened to routine access by the general public in the near future," wrote Jim Laughlin with USAG Presidio of Monterey in an email on Wednesday.

Given the geographic constrictions of the peninsula the city is not looking at adding a new road or route. Instead traffic engineers are trying to improve traffic flow.

The first step has been adding adaptive traffic signals.

"What this system does is every two and a half minutes it makes decisions based on the traffic that is coming," Renny said.

The signals also keep a history of traffic so the system can make predictive decisions. A portion of Lighthouse Avenue in Monterey already has the signals but by Summer 2019 the city plans to install the lights stretching from David Avenue and Lighthouse Avenue all the way to English Avenue and Del Monte Avenue.

The money for the project is coming from a grant, neighborhood improvement fund dollars and Measure X.

In 2016 Monterey County voters approved a retail transactions and use tax of a three-eighths' of one-percent to raise money to fix roads. The Transportation Agency of Monterey County will hand back %60 of the money generated to cities for local projects.

Theresa Wright with TAMC said Monterey will be getting about \$925,000 to spend on projects including the new adaptive signal system.

Wright said plans are also in the works to add new lanes for Monterey Salinas Transit Buses on Del Monte Avenue and Highway 1.

On Del Monte the bus lane would prevent bus stops from backing up traffic and Renny said the lane on Highway 1 could encourage more riders.

"If you see the bus sitting next to you in traffic, you may not want to take it but if it zooms past you, you might be encouraged," she said.

The Highway 1 bus lane would utilize the highway shoulder for a fast ride between Monterey and Marina.

Renny said getting more drivers off the road is a big part of improving traffic flow.

"When we are severely congested there is no signal system that can currently handle that level of congestion," she said.

In response Renny is trying to get Traffic Demand Management off the ground in Monterey. She wants to see fewer cars on the road and fewer drivers traveling during peak traffic hours.

Renny is working with employers large and small to get businesses to offer bike to work incentives and even alter employee schedules to take them off the road during rush hour. She said it's been tough to get employers to actually participate but said the Monterey Bay Aquarium, Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula and The Cat's Meow all have successful programs in place.

The city is also trying to get tourists to drive less when they visit Monterey. Renny's team has launched [Car Free Monterey](#) a guide pointing visitors to the free trolley offered through MST, parking garages and the rec trail.

I am a resident of Monterey County writing in opposition to the American Tin Cannery Hotel Project. The American Tin Cannery Hotel Project proposal is another example of a development that prioritizes luxury tourism and real estate interests while running roughshod over our state's precious coastal resources and ignoring the needs and opinions of Monterey Bay residents.

I urge the Coastal Commission to deny the proposed Coastal Development Permit as it runs afoul of several goals and policies of the Pacific Grove Local Coastal Program and the Coastal Act.

As it is currently proposed, the size and scale of the project would negatively impact water supply, habitat, public access, and historic resources. The minor reduction in size and the inadequate special conditions proposed by Coastal Commission staff do very little to address the serious concerns that have been raised throughout the process by residents, environmentalists, and the Coastal Commission staff itself. The project is simply too large for the project site. It should not be approved for the following reasons:

1. There is not a sustainable, long-term water supply sufficient to serve a project of this size. The project would result in a substantial increase in water use at the site, and Coastal Commission staff admits that the methodology used to justify the project's water use is "least protective of coastal resources that are impacted by water demand."
2. The project would cause unavoidable negative impacts to sensitive species such as harbor seals, due to the scale of the project and the decision to excavate for underground parking. The proposed special conditions would not prohibit construction during pupping season, even though the site is very close to sites where seals birth and raise their pups every year.
3. Rather than maximizing public access, the proposed project reduces public access by privatizing a public street. This privatization is necessary because the project is too big to fit within the existing street grid.
4. The project would provide only 18 units of lower-cost overnight accommodations, equivalent to less than 10% of the 188 high-cost rooms, despite the fact that the Local Coastal Program calls for lower-cost accommodations equivalent to 25% of high-cost rooms.
5. The project would remove 79 mature trees, including Monterey cypress and Coast live oaks.

To approve the project despite these serious problems would set a terrible precedent. I urge you to fulfill your mission to protect California's coastal resources by denying the Coastal

Development Permit for this project.

My position is against this item. 15 b

My name is Ellen Stanton. I am familiar with harbor seal behavior, having followed this in La Jolla for many years. I am also a STEM lecturer, award winning filmmaker, educator, and continuing observer of harbor seal behavior in the wild. I find this proposal to be very concerning and inadequate in terms of addressing the likely negative impacts on the harbor seals that haul on a regular basis very near to the proposed construction and related activities. These marine mammals are protected from disturbance by the MMPA.

This species is a small pinniped phocid type that is quiet and very sensitive to disturbance. Extensive studies about the impacts of disturbance on harbor seals have been conducted over many years. This includes a study involving the Richmond Bridge construction that looked at impacts of disturbance on the nearby harbor seals.

The excavation of thousands of tons of solid granite bedrock will be very loud next to the seal beaches, as will the cutting down and hauling away of many large trees.

The proposed construction actions and monitoring/planning details in this item 15 b are inadequate in many ways. First, the time period would allow extensive disruption/noise during the annual catastrophic molt time that follows the pupping season (c. August at this latitude), when animals need undisturbed access and time on the specific haulout site beaches for this molt. Also, at the conclusion of the pupping season, newly weaned pups need access to undisturbed rest after their beginning solo ventures into the sea, learning to live on their own. Second, the proposed db level would

allow for excessively loud noise that would also be very loud and experienced in varying ways in the area due to acoustic and other audio transmission, as well as physical vibration impacts of sonic and seismic-like events. Continuing, repeated, irregularly spaced, intermittent and/or combined noise going on for extended periods of time, including such things as varied construction noise, blasting, cutting and hauling of trees, trucks and other vehicles, and more, going on near the animals would be providing a lengthy and wide variety of disturbance types and levels.

While a hotel may be of value for business reasons in the area, the considerations to protect the animals during the related construction activities need to be handled in a more responsible and informed way. Other proposals would seem to be in order.

Dear Coastal Commission,

I am writing to urge you to not approve the building of the American Tin Cannery Hotel proposal. This project is the largest hotel development in Pacific Grove and will be located across the street from two of the seal rookeries and year-round haul-out sites with a third one just down the road. These three-in-a-row beaches around Stanford's Hopkins Marine Station make up the largest harbor seal haul-out and rookery on Monterey Bay.

The construction noises, especially from removing an estimated 2,200 truckloads of bedrock granite from the earth, grading down a natural hillside, demolishing the concrete buildings from the old sardine canning days, and removing all the trees (79, mostly mature Cypress Trees) will drive the seals from the area. There are no suitable habitats for so many anywhere else on Monterey Bay. Harbor Seals (like all marine mammals) are protected by law under the Marine Mammal Protection Act

We **CANNOT** further destroy wildlife habitats. Harbor Seals are very skittish, and they will not be able to rest during the day when such a huge construction site is right in front of them. They will feel threatened and will abandon the rookery. With this project we will drive them away from a PROTECTED area. Our wildlife, especially Harbor Seals and Marine Mammals deal already with a lot of threats to their existence. They are already dealing with harassment by people, habitat degradation (commercial and recreational development including resort development) , chemical contaminants, vessel collisions, etc.

This area is not only a Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary but is also a Marine Protected Area and a high Environmentally Sensitive Habitat known as an ESHA. It is not okay to destroy such a sensitive environment nor our wildlife.

I am an animal care volunteer at The Marine Mammal Center in Sausalito, CA which is the largest Marine Mammal Hospital in the world. We do know that the ocean is in trouble not only from the depletion of fish stocks to increasing ocean temperatures but also due to human activity that threatens our marine ecosystems. Every year we admit hundreds of marine mammals who are in distress due to the above threats they are facing.

The patients I am working with are one of the most helpless and vulnerable creatures, the harbor seal pups. We deal with pre-mature born seal pups who have been separated from their mothers and in most cases the premature births happens when a seal mother is stressed and has no safe place to deliver their pups. Other pups who are not pre-mature are also in our care. These are pups who were harassed by humans or had human interaction and are separated from their mothers. Mothers get spooked and abandon their pups.

Those pups come to our center totally malnourished and with a lot of different problems as their immune system is not developed at that stage. Most of our patients still have their umbilical cord attached to them.

I can tell you it is a very rewarding but monumental task to be able to help them grow up and to get them to a state where they can be released into the wild again. Unfortunately, half of the admitted Harbor Seals in our care will not survive due to their prematurity. This is heartbreaking and it all happens mostly because of **HUMAN** intervention. I urge any of you to visit our hospital to see all our patients and see for yourself what pain we inflict and what damage we do to marine mammals.

I am writing to you as I want to give the seals a voice as they cannot speak. However, I am sure none of you would like it when a builder comes along and destroys your home and living.

We need to stop just living for profit and wake up and realize what damage we do with projects like this hotel. How we destroy nature, habitats and when I say habitats I also mean our habitats.

I urge the commission to not approve the project as it will harm this protected area. The hotel will destroy the home of the local harbor seal rookeries due to noise, pollution, increased traffic and foot traffic, additional disturbance from people staying at the hotel just to name a few.

Hello, I am writing to oppose the American Tin Cannery Hotel and Commercial Project. The American Tin Cannery (ATC) is an historical landmark essential to the Monterey Bay. Destruction of the ATC would eliminate one of Monterey's iconic buildings.

Furthermore and more importantly, the development required of the demolition and building of a new large edifice would result in high disturbance to the local wildlife. Tourists from around the world come to the Monterey Bay (Pacific Grove included) for its wildlife and nature. The majority of tourists experience Monterey Bay from the coastal path. The seal population is an essential component of this experience as it is likely the nearest animal visitors have access for viewing/observation. The development is known to disturb the seals with an article published by National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) conducting a scientific study on the anthropogenic (man-made) effects of construction noise on harbor seals. Their findings indicate that seals departed and roughly 20% of the population did not return. Harbor seals are essential the Monterey Bay Sanctuary ecosystem. According to Stanford University, " females bear one pup each year and nurse it for 4 to 6 weeks before it is weaned. Pups weigh about 20 pounds and can swim at birth after a pup is born. The mother will leave the pup on the beach while she forages for food in nearby waters. Unfortunately some beachgoers mistakenly believe that these pups have been abandoned, and will approach, touch, and even take pups away from the beach. All human interaction with seals and pups is harmful and often results in the injury. Death of the animal. Seals are protected under the marine mammal act of 1972, making it illegal and punishable by law to take marine mammals without a permit, harassing a marine mammal, causing any change in its behavior is considered a "take" under this law." As supported by science, construction noise disturbs and disrupts harbor seals, and as noted by NOAA's research, leads to change in behavior as demonstrated in the reduction of the population during and after a prior construction project. The proposed development located at the ATC should be stopped indefinitely, along with any other proposed project ideas.

To the Coastal Commission, regarding the ATC Project in Pacific Grove, CA

For years I have watched my hometown languish in an economic ice age. A fear of losing that "America's last hometown" feeling has only stymied economic development to the detriment of residents and local tourism alike. I see valuable real estate on our main street sit empty, or worse, get taken over by doctors offices and "by appointment only" storefronts. I may not be an economist, or a city planner, but I can tell you why the life has gone out of my town. It's a lack of draw, a lack of locality, a lack of foot traffic! Tourists and inland locals may come to sit at the beach for the day, but--with the exception of a few bright weeks in summer and the odd golf tournament--they don't stay. For most of the year, they don't eat at our restaurants or shop in our stores, they don't sit in the park or visit the museum. They get in their cars and they drive away.

The American Tin Cannery building is a perfect example of the decline we've seen in the face of a desire to remain the same. When I was growing up, the ATC building was alive with shops that supported locals and appealed to tourists, but rising costs forced many businesses out that were only replaced with bike rentals and tourist traps. Once, this building offered activities, restaurants, shops, and most importantly jobs. Now, it's a husk of its former self, sitting virtually empty in one of the highest foot-traffic coastal areas of the peninsula. Maybe I'm sentimental, but the worst thing we could do is let that site languish in its death throes when it has the opportunity to be a vital support for our community again after all these years.

In my view, the ATC hotel project would bring construction and hospitality jobs to the peninsula, and significantly increase Pacific Grove's TOT taxes. More importantly, it would bring more *people* to Pacific Grove, people who *stay*. This would have knock-on benefits for the rest of the town's businesses, increase foot-traffic in town, and bring some new life into our tourist economy.

I understand the Commission is concerned about the equity of such an up-market hotel, but even the Lover's Point Inn, one of the most affordable hotels on the water, is \$200 a night in tourist season. The project planners have done their part including low-cost accommodations and amenities accessible to the public. This project may not solve the problem for high-cost accomodation, but if we're talking about affordability in a fundamentally unaffordable place, I wonder what project would?

As far as environmental impact concerns, all I can say is that the Aquarium's LEED-certified education center 4 blocks away passed muster, and I'm not sure I understand why a LEED-certified hotel wouldn't as well. This project helps set the tone for a sustainability-minded community that recognizes the invaluable beauty of the coast and makes it accessible in a way that is respectful of our

unique ecosystem. In addition, it appeals to the environmentally-conscious visitor and offers a perfect location for many of our area's conservation organizations to host their events.

All this to say, I whole-heartedly support the staff recommendation and urge the Commission to approve the project as presented. I want to see the ATC site resume its role in our community and I want to see Lighthouse Ave busy with people again. I want to see a future for Butterfly Town.

I am a resident of Monterey, CA and a small business owner.

I am writing to express my dissatisfaction with the American Tin Cannery Hotel Project as it is currently construed. I believe there has not been adequate consideration of the environmental impact on the Harbor Seal population at nearby Hopkins Beach in Pacific Grove.

This population of Harbor Seals, which exists within the Lovers Point State Marine Reserve, is extremely vulnerable to human interference, particularly in the form of noise from machinery. Harbor Seals generally hunt at night and rest during the day. Rest is essential for these animals, particularly for the female Harbor Seals to replenish their energy to be able to carry their pup to term. Sustained noise such as that which would occur in the demolition and site work phases of the proposed construction would assuredly cause disturbance for the Harbor Seal population, most likely resulting in increased mortality numbers.

I urge you to reconsider approval for this project and to require adjustments to the process and schedule of the Hotel Project that will allow this local Harbor Seal population to continue to coexist with us here on the shores of Monterey Bay. These Harbor Seals won't survive unless we act responsibly in our proximity to them.

Dear California Coastal Commission Representatives:

I am writing this note to express my deep concern regarding the construction of a 200 plus guest room and commercial hotel at the current site of the American Tin Cannery.

As a local resident and volunteer with the Marine Protected Areas (NOAA), I have first-hand knowledge of the consequence of noise in the vicinity of the Hopkins Marine Station area. When disturbed, seals will flush from the beach into the water. Seals are nocturnal animals; they rest on beaches and rocks during the day. Noise disturbance impacts their need to recuperate. When pups are present mothers and pups are separated and, depending on ocean conditions, may not reunite.

The beach adjacent to Hopkins is the primary Monterey Bay location for harbor seals to haul out, rest, and have their pups. The seals are protected under the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 which prohibits disturbance. It is puzzling that a hotel requiring major construction could be considered not to cause irreparable disruption to the area and dramatically impact the wellbeing of the seals.

Consider the impact not only to the animals but also the disruption to the city during the construction and the increase in local traffic when the project is completed. This hotel along with the one currently being built on Grand Avenue will negatively change the overall milieu of Pacific Grove.

I am writing in enthusiastic opposition to the development of the American Tin Cannery site in Pacific Grove for a 200+ room hotel, based on several reasons.

Firstly, there are multiple existing hotel rooms available in PG and the immediate region which can accommodate visitor need. Development of an additional hotel does not help meet our significant housing needs; if that space were to be used for new housing construction jobs would be provided and essential new homes would be added to our community.

Secondly, the water usage footprint of new housing will be significantly less than the proposed enormous hotel for laundry, cleaning etc. needs.

Thirdly, no realistic 25-yr much less 40-yr plan should include such a large footprint for automobile parking! The proposal to pulverize and remove bedrock to produce a 300-car space will have significant negative effects on the adjacent harbor seal breeding rookery. We must continue to make decisions that consider negative impacts on wildlife and our surrounding environment. This location is essential for our Central Coast population and the educational impact adjacent to the Monterey Aquarium cannot be overstated.

Lastly, another resource that cannot speak or lobby for itself are the multiple Monterey Cypress trees that are proposed for removal. I've been a resident of Pacific Grove for 40 years, and as a practicing architect my firm resided in the city for 23 of those years. I am writing to express my support for the ATC Hotel and Commercial Project. This exceptional project has been designed by a highly professional team of architects, planners, environmental experts and qualified hotel developers. There is no legitimate reason to deny approval of this long-awaited project. Construction has taken place for many years in the vicinity, including ongoing construction at the Monterey Bay Aquarium, Stanford University's Hopkins Marine Station Library and miscellaneous projects on the Hopkins campus both of which are in closer proximity to the harbor seal rookery than the ATC property. The harbor seals and other wildlife are still here and have continued to thrive. Denial of this project would equate to eliminating any construction on this parcel as well as surrounding properties. Such a decision would be detrimental in so many ways to Pacific Grove's economic stability, the Central Lighthouse Business District, and the future integrity of a possible fair and reasonable development process. As stated in the Commission's own agenda staff report this Project complies with all applicable requirements. There is likely no better project or development team that will propose a project of this caliber for the property. Simply stated, project denial by the Commission overturning the City Council approval would be relinquishing the economic health and future of our town to a small contingent of residents whose primary desire is for Pacific Grove to remain frozen in time. Pacific Grove voters approved a ballot measure to change the zoning to allow a hotel on this property. Hello, I am writing to oppose the American Tin Cannery Hotel and Commercial Project. The American Tin Cannery (ATC) is an historical landmark essential to the Monterey Bay. Destruction of the ATC would eliminate one of Monterey's iconic buildings.

Furthermore and more importantly, the development required of the demolition and building of a new large edifice would result in high disturbance to the local wildlife. Tourists from around the world come to the Monterey Bay (Pacific Grove included) for its wildlife and nature. The majority of tourists experience Monterey Bay from the coastal path. The seal population is an essential component of this experience as it is likely the nearest animal visitors have access for viewing/observation. The development is known to disturb the seals with an article published by National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) conducting a scientific study on the anthropogenic (man-made) effects of construction noise on harbor seals. Their findings indicate that seals departed and roughly 20% of the population did not return. Harbor seals are essential the Monterey Bay Sanctuary ecosystem. According to Stanford University, "fema females bear one pup each year and nurse it for 4 to 6 weeks before it is weaned. Pups weigh about 20 pounds and can swim at birth after a pup is born. The mother will leave the pup on the beach while she forward just for food and nearby waters. Unfortunately some beach girl mistakenly believe that these pups have been abandoned, and will approach touch to even take pups away from the beach. All human interaction with seals and pups is harmful and often results in the injury. Death of the animal. Seals are protected under the marine, mammal act of 1972, making it illegal and punishable by law to take marine mammals without a permit, harassing a marine mammal, causing any change in its behavior is considered a "take" under this law." As supported by science, construction noise disturbs and disrupts harbor seals, and as noted by NOAA's research, leads to change in behavior as demonstrated in the reduction of the population during and after a prior construction project. The proposed development located at the ATC should be stopped indefinitely, along with any other proposed project ideas.

Our concerns center on the near certain negative impacts in this NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARY on the harbor seals and their domiciles that literally are across the street (and down a very short bit) from the proposed project.

Harbor seals are extremely sensitive to noise. Of note, a NOAA report recently documented a six-fold increase in seal miscarriages from a water main project in the same vicinity. During that time, some 20 percent of the harbor seals left their domiciles and never returned. Just this last summer, we observed seals flushing from rocks to the water as noise from a house renovation project near Lovers' Point disturbed their daylight rest and recovery time. Surely, the American Tin Cannery project, many orders of magnitude larger in scale, will have substantially more effects on our protected marine life.

We appreciate the recognition that staff has given to this issue. The proposed mitigation solution, a Biological Monitor (or monitors) hired and paid by the Permittee, however, is fundamentally flawed. Having the Permittee hire and pay the monitor (or monitors) establishes a structural and inherent conflict of interest. Thinking that such an arrangement could provide any meaningful professional independence is unrealistic and naïve. At a very minimum, the perception of independence is blemished, if not abolished, from the outset.

Furthermore, we are concerned about any efforts to diminish harbor seal disturbances once the project has begun and momentum is established. The best way to avoid disturbances in this National Marine Sanctuary is to avoid such a large, out-of-scale project so near to sensitive harbor seal domiciles. In other words, consistent with your mission -- to protect and enhance California's coast and ocean for present and future generations -- please do not approve this project.

Specifically, we request that the Commission: First, vote to establish that a substantial issue exists relative to this project, and, Second, vote to deny the CDP – amended or not – for this project.

> I am a proud member of the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary's Bay Net naturalist program. As such, it has been my privilege to position myself along coastal trail interpretive areas and participate in actively engaging more than 29,000 visitors and community members in 2023. As a Bay Net volunteer I spend most of my time at Hopkins Marine Station which is the largest Harbor Seal haul out site and rookery in MBNMS. A critically important part of my job is to educate all shore visitors about the need to respect and protect our treasured wildlife in the sanctuary and state marine protected areas. Harbor Seals in particular, need our constant care and concern due to their being a nocturnal species that need rest/sleep time to rebuild their energy supplies, molt, digest food, give birth and nurse their young. They are extremely vulnerable to human caused disturbances as shown in a recent sanctuary report written by Drachenberg [Effects of Land- Based Anthropogenic Noise on Reproductive Success in Harbor Seals (Phoca Vitulina) in MBNMS].

> I am writing today to implore you to reconsider your approval of the proposed hotel at the American Tin Cannery site in Pacific Grove due to the very close proximity of this year round colony of Harbor Seals. This colony attracts thousands of people from all over the world that view, connect and deepen their understanding of how to become stewards of this magnificent natural resource.

> The hotel proposal will surely bring devastating disturbances such as drilling, demolition, excavation, hammering, tree removal and god forbid explosives to a site that is right next to a protected, highly sensitive ecosystem intricately linked to a greater complex web of life.

> The added vehicle traffic and noise of trucks and heavy machinery alone may result in such a disturbance level as to cause the seals to flee, flush and perhaps never return. Simple remedies such as biased/untrained monitors measuring decibel readings is simply not enough protection!

Dear Chair Hart, Vice Chair Escalante, and Coastal Commissioners,

The developers started out with a concept that initially appealed to a wide spectrum of the community, retaining two of the American Can Company complex (aka, ATC) buildings, but then the disturbing details became apparent—huge destruction of Pacific Grove’s resources:

1. In fact, a significant portion of the façade of the factory building itself, with its Art Deco sawtooth roof, would be demolished, degrading the historic integrity of the building, along with the demolition of the ATC warehouse building—much of the historic complex would be lost. Furthermore, these are well built structures built to last (despite the owners’ purposeful neglect creating its run-down appearance). **The EIR considers this an unavoidable and significant adverse impact of the proposed project.** It is not an acceptable one.

The claims of the proposed hotel’s sustainable features fail to consider the extraordinarily unsustainable demolition of these adaptable concrete and steel buildings and the thousands of truckloads of resulting debris being hauled to the landfill. A quote on the National Trust for Historic Preservation’s website says, **“The greenest building is the one that’s already there.”**

2. The huge size of the proposed hotel—for which the **City and the owners/developers denied the community story poles, or any comparable alternatives suggested by Coastal Commission staff in a comment on the EIR, to provide a real-life sense of the impacts on views and community character—**would also require extraordinary excavation into granite bedrock for underground parking, with more tons of rock hauled off to the landfill.

Pacific Grove residents have heard the overwhelming noise caused by relatively minor excavation into granite (which extends under the entire city) for City infrastructure projects. This noise would be hard on humans in the area and would last for months. For the Harbor seals across the street, the largest colony and rookery on Monterey Bay and a major tourist attraction in Pacific Grove, it would have an even harsher impact, as their hearing is more sensitive than humans’.

3. And, the proposed hotel is so huge that it would require the **removal of the entire tree canopy of the 6-acre site, 79 mature trees, including 52 Monterey cypress, considered by the LCP to be character-defining resources for Pacific Grove that the City “will preserve” and “are [to be] retained”. (LCP BIO-7, and -18, SCE-9, and LCP IP 23.90.160(b)(3)(C))** Chain saws removing valuable, mature trees so

characteristic of Pacific Grove's shoreline and such an appealing feature of the Central Avenue and Ocean View Blvd gateways to Pacific Grove and its waterfront, will not only destroy highly valuable scenic and biological resources, but also be a source of extreme noise within 250 feet of a Harbor seal rookery and year round haul-out sites.

4. **The Harbor seal population here suffered serious losses to their colony in 2022 as a result of City approval of a water main replacement (which was not time sensitive) on Ocean View Blvd, the coastal road that also runs in front of the ATC site—during pupping season!** The Community Development Department had issued a CDP Exemption without the usual public notice and disregarding the LCP Harbor seal protection policy. By the time the public learned what was going on and brought it to the attention of Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary personnel who had the project stopped and postponed until after the end of pupping season, much of the damage had already been done. **That work was at a greater distance from the main colony than the ATC site is, but 20 adult seals left the area and have never returned, and 29 pups were lost to miscarriages, approximately six times the normal number.** NOAA documented the findings in a report that poses extreme concerns regarding the proposed ATC project. Coastal Commission staff inexplicably downplays that report.

While “the loudest construction activities” would be conditioned to be avoided during pupping season, it’s not clear how the extreme noise of demolition of concrete and steel buildings, prolonged excavation in granite (or potential use of dynamite), and chain-saw removal of 79 mature trees at any time of year would be tolerated by the Harbor seal colony and whether they could thrive, given that they must rest on Hopkins’ protected beaches during the day to replenish their oxygen reserves for hunting in deep water at night.

In addition to these very serious concerns, please consider the following proposals:

1. Staff claims the revised project will have only 206 hotel rooms (188 high cost + 18 lower cost) and concludes that will make it “generally smaller” than the original 225 rooms. However, there are an additional 16 4-bed units in a group wing, each sharing a bathroom with another 4-bed unit. That amounts to **222 rooms** (206 + 16), **a very small reduction from the original 225 rooms. Yet this reduction leads staff to conclude: “The reduced scope of the project also helps to better address public view and character concerns, as well as to more clearly align the project with the LCP’s water supply requirements.”** How would the reduction of 3 rooms improve public views and community character? And how would it reduce water use significantly when 16 units that they’re not even counting will contain 64 beds?

2. It is good to see that one swimming pool/spa has been eliminated as well as the Ocean View Blvd hotel entrance. Since those unnecessary elements of the plan suggested an intention to convert to time-shares, it's very good to see there's a prohibition of conversion to timeshares or condominiums in the permit. The project now includes new "public access elements", including a new public park and plaza at the corner of Ocean View Blvd and Dewey, but why doesn't the park retain the existing, beautiful stands of Monterey cypress trees along Dewey there? And how many stories/feet are the public stairs to the roof garden? The public restroom on the lower block of Eardley is an improvement, and it appears to be accessible.
3. There is also a claimed reduction of some 85,000 square feet of "hotel development", but there are no specifics detailing those 85,000 square feet. It appears they may be reductions that were already approved by the City Council.

There are also discrepancies in the Findings. On page 26, footnote #6, we are told that, "The overall site includes the American Tin Cannery Outlets facility, an adjacent warehouse facility, and adjacent office building, an **adjacent dry-cleaning facility (which would remain)**, and surface parking for all such operations." (Bold font for my emphasis.) **QUESTION: The dry-cleaning facility has never been part of the site, only that facility's parking lot. Has the facility itself now been added? For what purpose?**

Also on page 26, the location description says, "The site...extends up a **gentle slope inland to Central Avenue.**" **The slope up to the 20 free parking spaces on Central is actually an approximately 1:12 rise, eliminating its use by wheel chairs and those with mobility impairments, making the removal of public parking from Sloat Avenue a bad idea. Sloat is actually up a gentle slope from the coastal road and Recreation Trail.**

4. **Of great concern is that the permit is to be approved in advance of the normally required plans being completed.** The developer has never provided story poles or equivalent alternatives that would allow the public and decision makers to understand what the actual mass, height, scale, and view impacts of the hotel would be. It's a massive project! And now the **actual plans for the revisions are not even available for review prior to the staff-recommended approval—the Revised Final Plans are to be approved by Staff prior to pulling the permit (CDP)**, an opportunity for more negotiations. Furthermore, **the three pages of diagrams of Applicant-proposed revisions in the Exhibits section (starting on page 129/636) are difficult or impossible to interpret, and the Proposed Hostel Floor Plan does not match staff's description in the permit—it does not show 4 beds per unit.**
5. **Regarding the lower-cost visitor accommodations**, of the 206 standard hotel rooms, 188 are "high-cost" and 18 are lower-cost double-occupancy rooms (one queen or twins) at \$184/room. In the hostel-type accommodations described

earlier, the cost would be \$85/bed—that’s \$340 for a family of four. **Neither situation is targeted for families. They’re targeted for “single travelers and couples” as described in the staff report.** With the hostel-type rooms, “the Applicant proposes to bring lower-income youth, school groups, and other under-represented communities to the group wing for at least 300 bed-nights (i.e., one guest per bed per night) per year, 150 of which would be free and the remainder would be capped at lower cost rates.”

6. The proposed revisions will not eliminate very concerning environmental and natural resource impacts:

- **the removal of all 79 trees on the property, 52 of them Monterey cypresses** which the LCP “protects” and specifies “will be retained” in the Implementation Plan, and **which currently enhance the blue water views** from Central Avenue. It’s a Condition of Approval that, “All landscaping shall be removed”;
- **continuous, massive walls of glass rising 7 levels (68 feet) as seen from Ocean View Blvd, and a continuous wall (the rear of the building) rising 30 feet above the street level with no separation for blue water views as seen from Central;**
- **closing off virtually a full block of Sloat Avenue with its traffic relief benefits for the community and parking convenient to the Recreation Trail, in order to enlarge the project--Sloat could otherwise reduce the impacts of delivery trucks which should be approaching from Eardley (commercial street), instead of Dewey (residential neighborhood) while bridges could be used, as one is currently, to facilitate access across Sloat;**
- **privatizing Sloat and forcing parking for the Rec Trail, currently 17 spaces, to be shifted up the steep slope to Central Ave** not navigable for a wheelchair or for the otherwise mobility-impaired, an environmental justice concern;
- **20 parking spaces in the lot on Central** (next to the dry cleaners) will be free to the public for 3 hours during a 6 hour/day timeframe in a more distant and less accessible location, to access the Rec Trail (**but what will keep those spaces from being used for the benefit of patrons of the businesses on Central?**);
- **Inadequate parking for hotel employees;**
- **nominally improved but still seriously inadequate protection for the vulnerable Harbor seal population** with their documented sensitivity to noise of far less intensity and duration than they’ll experience during demolition of concrete and steel buildings and blasting and excavation in granite bedrock for underground parking followed by years of construction noise, all broadcast from the steep hillside—once demolition and tree removal start, there’s no going back if the seals

fail to thrive due to lack of their required daytime rest, and eventually depart; cutting back the demolition, excavation, and construction plan would help reduce the project's impacts on the harbor seals;

- **inadequate protections for Black Oystercatchers from drone flights during their nesting season which extends from March/April until the end of August, longer than the Harbor seals' pupping and molting season—Special Condition 3 only extend the drone flight protections for the very sensitive Black Oystercatchers until July 31st;**
- protections for birds from collisions with glass windows and exterior glass surfaces due to transparency and reflectivity of glass seem to be appropriate: non-glare/non-reflective glass windows, and exterior glass surfaces, with bird-safe glass windows treated with visually permeable barriers designed to avoid bird strikes (birds can see it, people can't—it is not clear whether ALL exterior glass surfaces are required to be treated with bird-safe glass;
- **disregarding required current data for the allowed existing water usage and a lack of consequences for overuse;**
- **a false economy of trucking dirty laundry to Salinas to “save” water, while increasing carbon emissions;**
- **construction vehicle, delivery truck, and guest traffic congestion on Ocean View Blvd, Central, Eardley, and Dewey, with no requirement for the Applicant to provide at least a 4-way stop at Central & Eardley;**
- increased noise and traffic congestion affecting neighboring residents during construction and after completion, including from rooftop dining and/or drinking.

Changes that are needed—but not provided—include downsizing the project to be compatible with PG's community character and to avoid the necessity of excavating for underground parking; preserving and rehabilitating ALL the historic buildings unique to Pacific Grove's history, and the remaining, existing building to reduce demolition and thousands of dump truck loads to the landfill and to maintain the historic integrity of the factory complex; and retaining much of the Monterey cypress tree canopy—to protect Pacific Grove's Harbor seals, scenic beauty, public views, and community character.

Please consider this description of the American Tin Cannery on the Cannery Row Company's website:

California's First Factory Outlet Center

In 1926, the American Can Company opened its sprawling sardine can production plant a short distance over the Pacific Grove city line near the Hovden Food Products cannery. This sardine can factory produced a purported twenty-six million cans in its first season of operation, going on to dominate the can supply industry from its location on part of the old Chinese settlement site at China Point. Today it boasts great shopping in California's first factory outlet.

3. Rather than maximizing public access, the proposed project reduces public access by privatizing a public street. This privatization is necessary because the project is too big to fit within the existing street grid.
4. The project would provide only 18 units of lower-cost overnight accommodations, equivalent to less than 10% of the 188 high-cost rooms, despite the fact that the Local Coastal Program calls for lower-cost accommodations equivalent to 25% of high-cost rooms.
5. The project would remove 79 mature trees, including Monterey cypress and Coast live oaks.

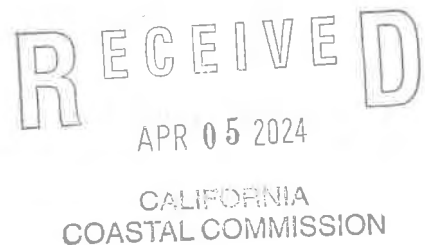

I am writing in regards to the American Tin Cannery Hotel and Commercial Project, New Appeal # A-3-PGR-22-0004.

I am a resident of Pacific Grove, CA. I am extremely concerned about the size of the proposed project. It is too big for Pacific Grove (PG). I implore the California Coastal Commission to reduce the size and scope of the project.

My concerns are as follows:

1. Story poles and orange barriers were never put up around the property to show the actual perimeter and height of the proposed development. In addition, the signage that was placed was obscure and dark that it wasn't clear what the facade of the buildings were. I saw one diagram that was very boxy and like a 4 story Motel 6. Pacific Grove in its Victorian and character style deserves better.
2. Where is the water coming from to accommodate the size and scope? Reducing from two swimming pools to one and trucking laundry to Salinas is that really saving water efficiently for the size and scope of the project?
3. There are no parking provisions for employees. Many will be traveling from areas outside of Pacific Grove e.g. Salinas, Marina, Seaside, Monterey and perhaps further away. This will increase traffic. Expecting employees to car pool, park in residential streets, or ride bicycles is not practical.
4. The tonnage of granite removal to create underground parking is of concern. We had a Tsunami warning in 2023, in the event of such a disaster the underground parking lot would be subject to flooding. In addition, sea level rise is expected due to climate change.
5. The harbor seals will be at risk for stress and decreasing its successful births due to the noise and vibration of the amount of earth moving equipment required for the project as well as the duration of the project to its completion. How large of a "Take Permit" will the California Coastal Commission allow? Will the number be made known to the public? Who will do the reporting of the number of takes?
6. In the event of a Citywide evacuation there are only two main thoroughfares which are Lighthouse Ave and Forest Avenue. With an increase in tourists, evacuation for all residents and tourists will be difficult.
7. The loss of the tree canopy due to the number of trees to be removed is unfathomable. Residents have had to seek legal council and pay for arborists to declare one tree dead before it is removed.. 79 trees can be "taken" at will to accommodate the size and scope of this project.
8. What protections are residences on Sloat given during the demolition phase of the project? Asbestos dust and other hazardous particulates are of concern. In addition, privatizing Sloat and forcing parking up the steep slope to Central Ave, as a result, this is an environmental justice concern for the mobility impaired.
9. The proposed project is not taking into consideration the residences as their neighbors. The humming of business will be 24 hours/7 days a week.

As I stated at the beginning of this letter, I ask you to reduce the size and scope of the project it is too big for PG.
